GERMANS UNABLE TO LOOSEN BRITISH HOLD

VICTORY BONDS TO LONDON KIDDIES

MASSES OF TEUTONS CUT DOWN BY DIAZ: ITALIAN LINE HOLDS AGAINST HUN WAVES

Massed Onslaught of Austro-Germans Fails! To Break Italian Line and Brings Tremendous Losses-Many Divisions Are Worn Out.

Washington, Nov. 27.-Heavily massed forces of Austro-German troops, vainly trying to break the Italian defensive line, have suffered great losses, according to official dispatches today from Rome, and between the Piave and Brenta rivers alone have worn out six divisions.

'In Thick Waves.

'In fact, after a short while, the Austro-Germans appeared in thick waves and directed a furious assault against our positions. At the outset of the attack one of our officers was wounded by an explosive bullet. The soldiers, seeing their officer bleeding from a large wound in his forehead and wishing to avenge him, launched themselves forward with the bayonet with such violence that the bayonet with such violence that all the Austro-Germans who had reached our line were completely wiped out with the exception of one who, taking off his coat, fled, shouting: 'I am an Alsatian!' The enemy renewed his efforts and delivered attack after attack with unabated fury, and our wounded officer re-mained forty-eight hours at his place directing counter-attacks."



Found Not Guilty of Prescribing Booze in Contravention of Act.

WAS TRICKED INTO IT

Evidence Showed Elgin Man Got Prescription by Using Warden's Name.

The ease with which a physician may be tricked by an unscrupulous person bent on getting liquor by means fair or otherwise was brought to light in police court today when Dr. James D. Wilson was found not guilty of having issued a liquor prescription to Frank McNicholl, a Yarmouth Township farmer.

The charge was laid under section 51 of the Ontario temperance act, which reads: "Did give a medical prescription to be used in evasion of the act."

The charge was laid as the result of McNicholl having been arrested a week ago at St. Thomas and convicted on a charge of drunkenness. County Magistrate Hunt of St. Thomas, Walter Ross, inspector of Elgin County, and Vice-Chairman Dingman of the Ontario license commission were in court to hear the case.

McNicoll testified that he came to the city and was wandering down Carling

McNicoll testified that he came to the city and was wandering down Carling street. He wandered into Dr. Wilson's office. He got the prescription on his representation that he needed it for his father, James McNicoll.

Dr. Wilson testified that McNicoll told him that he lived in Westminster Township and that he needed the liquor for his father, who was sick in bed with bronchitis and heart failure. Dr. Wilson declined for some time to give the prescription, but when McNicoll informed him that Warden Archie Blaikie had sent him in, he made out the pre-

trate.

As McNicholl had convictions for drunkenness registered against him in St. Thomas police court, Magistrate Graydon stated he had no hesitation in believing Dr. Wilson in preference to a person whose record was none too good.

McNicholl, although stating he was a farmet, afterwards said he did not own a farm, but worked only as a hired man.







With such a showing under such severe conditions, what may we expect if the Interstate Commerce Commission authorizes an increase in freight rates, which, at the moment, is more than a reasonable probability? Here, again, the war taxes make a substantial impression; but, can hardly be sufficiently burdensome, even with a continuation of present rates, to justify the apprehension of a decrease in dividends by these

Standard American securities have been subjected to the acid tests of war, war taxation, price regulation, Italian invasion, Russian revolution, general liquidation; but, are yet to feel the effect of inflation, and the splendid prospect of continued large business with good even though regulated profits, and, above all, an end to hostilities.

Peace, momentarily far distant, as our vision is obscured by many diplomatic clouds, nevertheless, is a prospect and ever before us-an event certain, which may, without a moment's notice, become a reality. Peace! The end of destruction—the beginning of reconstruction, when the thousands of American ships now under construction will be placed in commission to serve a useful, rather than destructive purpose, to carry, under our flag, the products of our fields, mines, and factories into every port of the world.

This is not the time or place for the pessimist or financial slacker. Idle funds serve no useful purpose. An investment in any of our standard securities, at the existing level of values, will aid the nation by creating financial stability; and for the investor, it will eventually result in substantial profits.

WHAT SIR SAM HUGHES THINKS OF THE UNION GOVERNMENT

We reproduce herewith extracts from an interview given by Sir Sam Hughes which appeared in the Daily Warder of Lindsay, Ont., on October 16, 1917. Sir Sam was asked: What do you think of the new Union Government?"

"It is a splendid triumph for the plans long ago laid by Sir Joseph Flavelle and Sir Thomas White," replied Sir Sam. "How does that appear?"

"It is now more than a year since the movement to form a National or a 'National Trust' Government as it was sometimes termed, was proposed by Sir Joseph and his friends. It is understood that the undertaking involved at that time a replacement of Sir Robert Borden by Sir Thomas White." "How will coalition affect you personally?"

"No man can serve two masters," quoted the Sage. And no woman can master two ser-vants," added the Fool. What? We may be dumb,

"Every candidate and member of Parliament/owes allegiance to his constituents and to them only. The people are masters; the members are their servants; and in turn the cabinet are the servants of the members. At least that is what should prevail under responsible government, and just as governments depart from these principles do they become kaiser-like; the machine prevails and liberty is endangered."

"You seem to think there was no pressing need for coalition?" "None whatever. That is, had the Government done its full duty during the last year."

"But Laurier held up proceedings for the successful carrying on of the war?"

So at Christmas time, instead of the regular food parcel, the prisoners—everyone of them—will receive a parcel containing the following: 1-pound tin English roast beef, I pound cooked bacon and beans, 1-pound tin Fresh butter, 2-pound tin Christmas pudding, 1 plain chocolate cake (¼ lb.), 1 package muscatels and almonds, ¼ pound tea, ½ pound sugar, pipelights hussifes, on handkerchet.

-pound tin fresh butter, 2-pound tin hiristmas pudding, 1 plain chocolate cake (14 lb.), 1 package muscatels and ilmonds, 14 pound tea, 15 pound sugar, 1 pint cream, 2 Wrigley's Spearmint gum.

BRITISH AND FRENCH. ITALIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Sunday, Nov. 25 .- (By the Associated Press) .- Solid ranks of Franco-British infantry with artillery and supply trains, were seen by the correspondent today within sound of the battle on the Italian

Twelve different enemy assaults had been made within a few hours preceding the correspondent's visit to headquarters on the field, but the Italian lines had not yielded a foot of ground, and Gen. Di Giorgio was calm and confident that the defensive line would hold until reinforcements were swung into the fighting line

Now we have the minister of militia distinctly announcing at Dundas: "We don't intend to call up 100,000 men all at once and clean out the country, but in the first draft we hope to get probably 25,000." Frightened by the opposition in the farming districts he now promises exemption from military service to farmers' sons save in rare cases.

If, as he says, 100,000 men will not be called out at once and so "clean up the country," and only 25,000 are hoped for in the first draft, what a farce the whole thing becomes.

Nine-tenths of the Quebec constituencies are rural; this declaration of the minister of militia means that nine-tenths of that Province are to be exempt from conscription.

The Government's sole object is office. Frightened by the opposition found everywhere in the rural districts the minister of militia in order to secure votes, pledges himself to exempt the GREAT FLOW OF WHEAT farmer and not to "clean out the country."

The other day it was "the last man and the last dollar" now it is "don't vote against us, farmer, we don't intend to take you, the 25,000 are to be taken from the cities and towns.'

The Government are now promising exemption to farmers sons solely because they are frightened of losing the rural constituencies. What confidence can be placed in any of their professions? Does anyone think that 100,000 can be taken from the cities and towns without "cleaning out the country"?
