PEOPLE OF ERFURT ARE STARVING, SPARTACANS SE ZE ALL FOOD

Weimar, Tuesday, March 4.—Weimar hourly becoming more fearful that general strike will spread to this the general strike will spread to this city.

Two of the city councillors of Erfurt, a few miles away, succeeded in reaching Weimar this morning and immediately demanded food. They declared they had not eaten for two days and reported the majority of the population in Erfurt starving because the Spartacans had seized all the food supplies and distributed them exclusively among their own adherents.

Erfurt also is without water and light, the strike resulting in the shutting down of the waterworks power plant. The town had been depending for its water on a tiny stream flowing through it. This water, however, has now become tainted and unsanitary. It is impossible to bury the dead and the bodies are left unattended. The councillors were deposed by the Spartacans who locked up the city hall.

GERMANS ASSUME DEFIANT ATTITUDE: WILL REFUSE TO SUBMIT TO ANY COERCION

Cabinet at Weimar, According to Zurich Dispatch to Paris, Has Agreed to Oppose Any Undue Pressure From Allies in Regard to Armistice Negotiations or Peace Conference

Paris, March 5.-At a meeting of the German cabinet on Monday morning attended by party leaders and delegates of shipowners, it was agreed unanimously, it is understood, that Germany could not submit to coercion from the Entente powers, either in the armistice negotiations or in the peace pourpariers proper, according to a Zurich dispatch to Le Journal. Germany will also oppose the dismissal of German crews from ships requisitioned, it being pointed out that this would throw 42,000 seamen out of employment. It had been planned by them, he declared, to oust Sir Robert Borden, and ultimately place Sir Thomas in the position of leadership.
