PLANS TO TRAP **DISEASE MICROBES**

Boston Prolessor Says Milk and Other Things Can Easily Be Purified.

Boston, Oct. 11.-That microbes can be caught in traps, that they can be lured away by a real "bait" from water, milk or other liquids they infest, and that, once in the trap, they can be destroyed or can be kept for observation like rats and mice, is asserted by Professor F. P. Gorham, of Brown University, a bacteriologist, whose experiments in treating infected milk with the ultra violet ray have already had important effects in food purification.

Professor Gorham's idea is supported by experiments just completed both England. It means that before very long the householder who suspects the milk is infected may set his trap, and in a very short time feel assured that he has drawn out from the liquid all the infinitesimal creatures that bring

disease and death. When these traps are perfected and placed upon the market, they will do away with the boiling of water or milk to kill the dangerous microbes, and the person drinking the liquid atter it has been exposed to a "trap' will know that it is clear of the micropes, instead of being filled with their bodies, as is the case when they are killed by the boiting process.





THE FOREST FIRES. The forest fires are raging mainly in the State of Minnesota, immediately south of the Ontario boundary. Minnesota and Ontario are separated by the Lake of Woods, the Rainy River, Rainy Lake and a chain of small lakes reaching down to Lake Superior. The burned district thus far is chiefly south of Rainy River and the Lake of Woods, but the flames have crossed the boundary at several points, extending even into the wooded portion of south-eastern Manitoba. The town of Rainy River, which is

threatened with destruction, is on the north side of the Rainy River, which has so far been its protection. Beaudette, Minn., on the southern side of the river, opposite the town of Rainy River, is in ashes. The Canadian town is crowded with refugees, but they may be driven out at any moment. The flames have already leaped the river at that point and destroyed 250,000,000 feet of lumber.
