Dundonald's Exit.

Lord Dundonald was given an en thusiastic send-off at Ottawa. There was no pretense that the demonstration was anything but a party hurrah. Th organizers sent out printed circulars appealing to party feeling by insulting references to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Five bands, a procession, and an Earl combined, make a strong attraction for the multitude, so there is nothing surprising in the statement that many Liberals were on the streets. It is fortunate for Imperial sentiment that Dundonald is not a type of the British functionary who is brought into official relations with the colonies. He has done his best to work mischief in this country, but he is powerless because Canadians have faith and confidence in the wisdom of British statesmanship. If British public men made a practice of interfering in party politics in this country, they would endanger British connection, Lord Dundonald has deliberately thrown himself into a party agitation, but it can be pleaded in excuse for him that he is by training a soldier, and has not been schooled in the constitutional principles upon which the relations of the mother country and the self-governing colonies depend. British statesmen recognize his blunder, and the Imperial Government has made haste to recall him, though the Canadian people are quite capable of taking care of themselves in this matter.

Lord Dundonald came to Canada with the goodwill of Canadians, who had vorable accounts of his record in South Africa, and were hopeful that they had found at last an Imperial officer who understood this country. His short tenure of office has revealed personal defects which were not suspected. His overgrown egotism shows itself in an almost childish delight in popular adulation, such as being carried on the shoulders of husky youths, and distributing handshakes from his carriage. It leads him to imagine that these popular demonstrations are a purely personal tribute, but every Canadian knows that he is merely a pretext for politicians to work up party feeling by insidious appeals to race prejudice. eave to Appeal Granted In Famous Saunby Case

Plaintiff to the Privy Council.

The important announcement made today that the application in the case of Saunby vs. the water commission of London, for leave to appeal from the decision of the supreme court at Ottawa, has been granted by the Privy Council. Thus the water commissioners will be compelled to defend themselves once again, this time in England, against the action for dam-ages instituted some years ago by Mr. Saunby. The action dates back to 1897, when

Mr. Saunby instituted proceedings, claiming damages from the water commission for maintaining flashboards on the waterworks dam, thereby backing the water up in the north branch, so that his dam was incapable of furnishing proper power to turn the wheel at his mill. The case hung fire until 1992. when it was tried before Judge Falconbridge at London, and a verdict in favor of the plaintiff was rendered, and the commissioners were ordered to remove the flashboards, and a reference was also made to the master in chancery to assess the damages, the defendant had suffered during the years the flashboards had been maintained. The water commissioners appealed and the water commissioners agree and carried the case to the court of appeal at Toronto, but the judgment given at London was upheld. Once again the commissioners refused to accept the verdict, and appealed to the

supreme court at Ottawa. In this latter appeal the commissioners beat Mr. Saunby, and all appeared plain sailing for the commissioners. This was, however, reckoning without considerng what Mr. Saunby might do. Messrs. Hellmuth & Ivey, acting for the plaintiff, after considering the case, decided to appeal, and made application to the Privy Council, for leave to appeal, which has now been granted. Mr. Ivey said today to a reporter that in the face of all the facts, he felt thoroughly justified in carrying the case to the highest tribunal in the Empire. 

In hunting the otter the natives of these northern islands employ frail crew. skin canoes, called bidarkas, somewhat resembling the kayaks of the Esquimaux. The natives of the Aleutians and the Kuriles are very expert with spear, which is thrown with a




