Arrested and Confessed the Crime.

WAS MURDERED

Sensational Tragedy in Aldborough Township--Was Jealous of the Boy.

St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 13.-The little village of Bismarck was stirred confession of a murderer just a few miles from that place.

Chief Detective John A. Murray, of Toronto, accompanied by Drs. Law-rence and Duncombe, of this city, left for Bismarck at 7 o'clock this morning with the intention of having the body of little Willie Freeman (who, it was supposed, died from wounds received from a shot gun while in the act of playing with the same last Monday) exhamed and a post-mortem held to be used at the adjourned in-

quest on Monday. Detective Murray started an investigation of the suspicious circumstances surrounding the tragedy, and as a result, at about 2 in the afternoon placed Charles King, a man employed as a laborer upon the Freeman farm, under arrest charged with the murder of Willie Freeman, who is the 15year-old and the adopted son of Daniel Freeman, a farmer living about three miles from Bismarck. Shortly after the arrest, King con-

fessed. He said he did not know that the gun was loaded. When Detective Murray told the prisoner that his story regarding the accidental shooting of the lad was most improbable, King collapsed and made a clean breast of the whole thing. LORD BERESFORD'S ADVICE.

Lord Charles Beresford, with that truthful directness for which he is famous in his utterences upon public questions, gives the British merchant and manufacturer some wholesome advice which touches the secret of Britain's declining trade, says the Moronto News.

British merchants must adopt the methods which give success to foreign mations in the competition for the world's business, they must handle what foreign customers want, instead of what they think they ought to want, and not decline orders however small.

Better advice was never given, for we all know that it's next to impossible to get a British house to turn ment goods according to order, if that order calls for anything in the manufacture or putting up of the goods out of the ordinary stock runs, or opposed to the past traditions of the house. The day when the manufacturer or merchant can dictate to his customer what kind of goods he shall have or how they shall be put up, is long since past, and this is one of the things the British manufacturer and merchant has got to learn.

PROPOSING COALITON.

The Toronto Globe comes out with a proposion in more or less veiled language that the Conservatives should agree to a coalition government when the house meets. It is a proposal that is not altogether unexpected and is equally impossible to acquiesce in. In an election campaign during which the Ross government resorted to every method of corruption and brought to bear every influence, legitimate and otherwise that its position could command, to secure itself from defeat it polled a minority of the popular vote, but nominally won by one seat. The Citizen believes, as every Conservative believes, that if gross corruption had mot been resorted to Hon. Mr. Whitney would have been returned to power. Under the circumstances there can be no bargaining with such unscrupulous opponents, whose methods in the past have been unreservedly condemned and have earned the disapproval of the public. We are convinced that the popular verdict will be clearly and unmistakably in favor of Mr. Whitney, because "the machine" has exhausted its resources in the last effort, and without the sinews of war It's time the Dominion Government cannot be reorganized on the old ef-

THE KING NO FISHERMAN.

When His Majesty Was in Canada He Was Unskilful,

Among the mass of anecdotal matter recalnled by the recent cor-onation of King Edward VII., Canadian sportsmen are interesting themselves in reminiscences of the lack of skirl as an angler displayed by the King when, in the course of his progress through the Dominion in 1860 as Prince of Wales, he visited some of the best fishing waters of Canada. The late Senator Price took the Prince on a trip up the Saguenay to Ste. Marguerite River, the present preserve of the Ste. Marguerite Salmon Club, and then, as now, noted for the abundance of its salmon and trout. A few small trout were, however, all that the whole party could boost of. Mr. Price hooked a large sabnon for the Prince and gave it to him to land, but his attempt was not successful. The Prince had not

King Edward has occasionally angled for coarse fish in Scotland, but has never made any reputation as an angler, though it was recently stated on the authority of Lord Knollys that upon one occasion he really did kill a 21-pound salmon in the Tweed. He has a reputation as a successful hunter, especially of large game, but he is almost the only member of the British royal family who is not also

an enthusiastic and fortunate angler. Many Canadian fishermen can testify from personal observation on the Restigouche and Cascapedia Rivers to the clever angling of the present Prince of Wales, and of his aunt, the Princess Louise, Marchioness Lorne, now Duchess of Argyll, the favorite sister of the King. cottage built for her on the banks of the Cascapedia is still standing, and the pool in which she killed her largst salmon still bears her name.

It was while visiting her in Canada hat the present Prince of Wales and his late brother, the Duke of Clarence, proved to the Canadian anglers their skill, with the fly rod. Prince of Wales has, indeed, been called the angler-in-chief of the royal family, and both in dexterity luck he recalls his late uncle, the Duke of Edinburgh.

Queen Alexandra is well known as keen disciple of Izaak Walton, and often fishes for salmon in Scotland with her daughter, the Princess Victoria. The Alexandra fly, which has been called after her, is so deadly a killer on some of the Old Country streams, that its use on many of them has been absolutely forbidden. This remarkable fly was not, as sometimes supposed, invented by Queen, but by Dr. Hobbs. It was originally known as the Lady of the Lake, and this name was abandoned for its present one because of the success obtained with it by the then Princess Alexandra. In America it is less known as a salmon fly than as a successful lure for large trout. In fact, it may not properly be called an artificial fly at all, being intended as a vague imitation of a minnow, and it was originally intended to be cast and played minnow fashion just below the surface of the Its coarse, green hackles partly enclose a bright, silvery body, glimpses of which are given to the fish by allowing the line to run with the current and then drawing it up stream by short, sudden jerks,

or other live bait, as in the British Isles, this imitation is not so much affected by salmon fishermen. King Edward's daughter, the Duchess of Fife, is devoted to angling, and spends much of her time at the sport, accompanied by her daughters, while the Duke is away deer-stalking. 

of His Career and the Establishment

Lord Dundonald, who succeeds Maeneral O'Grady-Haly in the comand of the Canadian Militia, has ached Canada, and assumed the duties of his new once.

The general belongs to one of the most ancient families in Great Britain. Tradition has it that the Cochranes were derived from Scandinav-ian rovers, who settled at a remote age on lands in Renfrew and Ayr.

The newly-appointed commander to Canada, is the twelfth earl of Dundonald, and is the grandson of the famous Admiral Lord Cochrane, tenth earl of Dundonald, whose brilliant naval career attracted the eyes of the whole world - his service to his country in destroying Napoleon's fleet in the Basque Roads in 1809, is a matter of history, as is the aid he rendered to Chili in its war of independence in 1820, and to Peru and

The admiral was a scientist and inventor. He directed a great deal of energy to improving the engines of steam boats, and kept the advantages of such continually before the Admiralty.

At the time of the war with Russia, some fifty years ago, he laid a scheme before the Government, the secrets of which have never been nade public, in which he claimed, by some chemical discovery, to have the power to reduce all the Russian strongholds bordering on the sea. The ninth earl gave the chief energies of his long life to scientific research, to the considerable advantage of his nation. It was through his labors that the art of extracting tar from coal was discovered, and aided much in the manufacture of gas. His knowledge also gave an impetus to the production of glass at

that time. The present Earl has some of the inventive ability of his progenitors, having designed and perfected a "galloping carriage" for machine guns, a

weapon on which he is an enthusiast. He is now 50 years of age, having been born in 1852. He was educated at Eton, and entered the Second Life Guards in 1870.

During the Nile campaign of '84-85 he served with his regiment, beng mentioned in despatches for disinguished services, and receiving consequent promotion. The command of the camel transport was his in Sir Donald Stewart's famous desert march.

He was colonel of the Second Life Guards during 1895-99, and had retired on half-pay, but went into active service at the opening of the war, commanding the mounted troops

that cleared the Natal district. The Earl is a typical, dashing, cavalry leader, highly popular with both rank and file, and having led volunteers and colonials, does not look down upon them, as a few regular oficers have been inclined to do

It was his handling of these mount ed troops that proved their effectiveas a mobile and ness and utility quick-moving body for rapid machines against the evasive Boers, and led to the adoption of the general flying column scheme.

At the relief of Ladysmith he was the first man to enter at the head of relieving column. Lord Dundonald did some effective operating in the Transvaal, and was promoted to Major-General in 1900 or distinguished service.

On the death of his father in 1885, he succeeded to the earldom, and is married to Winnifred, daughter of Robert B. Hesketh, of Gwyich Castle, North Wales The army of regulars and volun-

eers that the Earl will command is one of which Canada may be justly roud. Although the history of Canada and her military forces is comparatively short, the efficiency of the soldiery has stood the test of many hard fought field. The traditions of the British army have been nobly sustained by the offshoot on this side of the pond. True, the opportunities that have been afforded the Canadian nilitia to distinguish itself on the Canadian field of battle have fortunately not been very numerous, but at all times and under any circumstances has it been found perfectly fit and competent to discharge the duty required of it, as evidenced by deeds of 1812, '37, '66 and '85, to say nothing about the fighting the Empire's battles in distant parts of the world. In this latter connection, t is interesting to note the list of Imperial war services credited to officers of the Canadian forces. Most prominent among these of coutse, is the late South African war, in which about 175 officers, and 6,500 men of Canada were engaged. Canadian of-ficers also served in the Egyptian expeditions, Nigerian campaigns, Soudan, China, etc.



A GREAT BATTLE.

One Known In History as the "Victory of Victories."

The battle which is known in history as the "Victory of Victories" took place at Nehavend, in Ecbatana, and was fought between the new Moslem power in 637 and the empire of Persia, then one of the most powerful of the eastern monarchies. It was one of the most absolutely decisive battles in the history of war, and it was all the more amazing by reason of the fact that it was won by a people which twenty years before had been unknown barbarians, lost in the deserts of Arabia.

Arabian historians place the Persian loss in a single day at 100,000 men killed. This may be and probably is an exaggeration, but the fact remains that the Persian dynasty came to an end when the battle was over and that Zoroastrianism, which had been the religion of Persia for over a thousand years, was at once supplanted by Islam. Its modern representatives, as is well known, are now the Parsees of India.

The victory was so absolutely decisive that it extended the Arabian dominions over the whole of the region lying between the Caspian sea and the Indian ocean. With the exception perhaps of the battle of Tours, no single fight ever made such a difference in the after history of the world.

DR. M'LEAN ON INDIANS.

ome Interesting Information About Those O: 1... 11 051

Rev. Dr. 'McLean, of Carman, Man. in a recent talk on our Northwest Indians said that when he first went west he had not mastered the Indian language so to speak the Gospel he had to employ an interpreter. This man, a curious sort of being, between a negro and an Indian, demanded a dollar an hour. When his hour was up he would turn to Dr. McLean and

the sermon was at an end. Dr. McLean tells of the effect of the climate upon the Indian. Along the rugged coast of British Columbia the redman was short in stature and vigorous in action, with strong passions and by nature artists. the indentations in the coast are greatest there reside the more rugged and the more literate. The coast Indian was contrasted with the bigbodied inland Indian, with his unde veloped brain. The Indian who lived inland was too lazy to either work or

The languages of the different races of the Indians were spoken of by Dr. McLean, who probably has mastered more of the languages than any other white man in the west. Indeed, it has been said that Dr. Mc-Lean could speak every Indian language. He however, did not claim any such achievement, for he told those present at the talk there were 1,500 languages and if he could speak them all, then he guessed he might be admitted to a professorship in Victoria University.
In the mind of Dr. McLean the

Cree language is just as beautiful as the Greek. The struggles of Dr. Mc-Lean in mastering the language were told in a most interesting way. The speaker did not think there was a dialect or language on the face of the earth that did not have beautiful laws. God had made all laws or anguage as real as the laws of nature. He believed there was a con-nection between religion and language, and said that the language of mankind showed the Divine hand. Next Dr. McLean dealt with the history of the Indian missions of the Northwest, The work was begun in 1840 at Norway House, when James Evans tramped out to that point. Associated with him as missionaries were George Barnley, Ro-hert Rundell and William Mason. Now Barnley is living in England, while Mason went over to the English church and is a clergyman. Mason traveled to Norway House to assist Evans in the translation of the Bible into Cree. A printing press could not be taken into that country because of the opposition of the Hudson Bay Company. Evans made moulds out of lead from tea chests and cut types out of wood. These were stamped in the Indian language on birch bark. Evans, and not Mason, was the first man to translate the Bible into Cree syllabic charactlabic system of writing similar to

that invented by Evans. It was George McDougall who started the mission in the "Devil's Playground, close to the Old Man's River in Alberta, where previous to the eighties the buffalo roamed in great numbers. McDougall was frozen to death during a snow storm in 1876, returning from a buffalo hunt near Calgary.

ISSUE PREFERENCE STOCK AND CHANGE SOLICITOR

Proceedings at the General Meeting of the Binder Twine Company-Shareholders Appoint Lieut-Col. Rankin as the Company's Solicitor—Rapid Sale of Preference Stock.

he Chatham Binder Twine Co. was Mr. Leverton, the president, occu-pied the chair, and in his opening re-marks said he presumed a number would wonder why they had been again called to a shareholder's meeting. He supposed they were quite familiar with the action existing against the Company, the contention that is going on and otherwise. And there is not the least doubt there may be sympathizers with both sides of the question. As some may not have thorough know-ledge of the circumstances, as they have occurred, he proposed to run over the points under consideration.

In the first place, the by-law confirmed by the shareholders on Feb. 11, as regards the increase of directors

was illegal, either on account of the through some other reason, I can say, cuted, consequently no good, so that the election of Feb. 13th fell through as was revealed on the 14th of March. He (the speaker) vacated the chair at that time, when he found that he had been illegally elected. Mr. Wilson, when he took the chair, pledged himself to have the formalities attended o and a meeting of the shareholders

There were no steps taken to carry

out this promise to the shareholders, but in the place of that a number of by-laws were passed by the old board on April 5, confirming themselves in office until the second Thursday in December, which was illegal. Had the promise been carried out, the by-law properly attended to and a meeting alled for shareholders to elect whom they saw fit, that would have ended the matter, but it was not done. Then meeting of shareholders was called for May 10, claiming to be under the equisition, but instead of carrying out the program in the requisition alling that meeting, the old directors framed a notice for that meeting contrary to the requisition. This, I am satisfied, was a premeditated thing to kill the requisition. Now, if the old board had called for the business in the requisition that would have been an end of the matter, but they did not do it. Then the act says if the directors fail to call a meeting he shareholders can do so themselves, which was done, and a meeting held on June 21, and an election took place. Since that time we have been trying to do business, but under very great difficulties. In the first place we were served with an injunction by the old board preventing us from doing any business whatever, during the term of the injunction. That injunction came up before the judge in Toronto, his decision was that, if the old board would undertake within 48 hours to repeal all by-laws they had passed and call a meeting of the shareholders to elect a new board, the injunc-tion would be continued. They failed to do so. The injunction was there-المنتقل المنتقل المنتق fore dissolved and that barrier was aken out of our way. They also tried stop us doing business at the bank and post office, but the authorities interfered. Then they put a warning the newspapers, cautioning people not to have any dealings with the Binder Twine Co., or buy any twine. Then we asked them to withdraw the awsuit and we would pay the expenses if they would put in an itemized account of what the costs would be, but they wanted us to agree to pay what-

ever they saw fit. The former president came to us and acknowledged they had been misguided by their solicitor. When the warning was published in the papers a A Valuable Little Book Sent Free Eor the writ was issued against the four directors authorizing the same, for preventing sale of twine and hindering our business in any other way. do not wish, of course, to force that action, if they would only withdraw the opposition. After refusing to withdraw the suit, we passed a bylaw changing our solicitor from Matthew Wilson to J. B. Rankin. Now these by-laws will come before you today to be confirmed. One of the most important things is this. There is a ien against the property of about \$9, The lien action would have given about three months before the property could have been disposed of unler the lien. The old board made an agreement with Geo. McGarvin to raise the money to pay the lien and agreed to pay him back the money n one month. The very next day afer the new board assumed control of affairs a writ was issued and an application made for speedy judgment o put the sheriff into possession and sell the property, and it looks to me as if some one wanted the sheriff in there now to sell the property at 25c on the dollar. The question is-how are we going to meet that liability? We can all see the folly of getting into dispute. iInstead of selling stock, as we should have done during the last summer, had there been no dispute. Now, who is to blame for this? If I felt was to blame I would step down and out, and ask your pardon; but who is to blame for it? cannot express my disgust at the way these things have been handled. Now, the question before you is-here is a factory, with machinery as good as can be found in the country. It has cost the shareholders about \$40,000 to put it through. Are you going to let the sheriff in and sell it for \$9,000?

A voice-No, sir. If you are not there must be some action taken to pay that honest debt. We have passed a by-law which will not be of any use iunless confirmed by the shareholders, so that it gives every man the chance to use his judgment. The by-law is to sell preference stock, bearing five per cent interest to those shareholders who already hold it will be sent promptly by return to those shareholders who already hold it will be sent promptly by return to the company. common stock in the Company.

Mr. Leverton then explained what mail.

I believe in every man freely expressing his views, yet it is necessary that every man in speaking, should have respect for his fellow men. The next order of business was dis cussing and deciding matters mentioned in the notice which was read by the secretary, and clause three, which was as follows:-

"To approve and ratify all proceed-ings taken in an action brought against four of the old directors, namely M. J. Wilson, Lawrence How-ard, Samuel Bullis and Alister Mc-Kay, for the pretection of the share holders and the Company's interests against a "Warning" published by said four old directors."

This was taken up and discussed After considerable discussion, or motion of John Grant and A. Hunter, the action of the directors was ratified and approved. The next order was confirming the by-laws of direc-The by-law for the issue of preference stock, which provides for the issue of \$30,000 worth of preference stock, to the ordinary shareholders, but if they do not take it up in three months it can be sold to outfully discussed and amended in some particulars, it was carried unani-

mously. There was a by-law appointing J. B. Rankin, K. C., solicitor, which was duly confirmed. The next was a by-law authorizing the president and secretary to sign praecipe order changing solicitors from Messrs. Wilson ,Kerr & Pike, to J. B. Rankin, which was confirmed.

"The preference stock," said Managing Director J. J. Ross, "will without a doubt go like hot cakes. Several shareholders, before leaving the hall, were so enthusiastic over the prospects that they left their orders right there. One man was particularly enthusiastic and left his money for his preference stock shares. Everything will run smoothly as soon as we get this lien debt paid off, and then we will start making twine.
