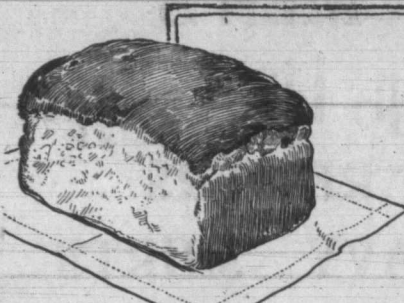

Big Orders for Jam.

English war orders for over \$2,500,000 worth of jam and canned fruit have been a great stimulus for Canadian fruit growers, according to advices. The 82 Canadian canneries turn out yearly \$6,000,000 worth of products annually, while the 65 evaporators produce dried fruits worth \$500,000. A stiff duty on American canned goods, including jams and jellies off competition. Apples pay a duty of 40 cents a barrel, or 13½ cents a box, in addition to a surtax of 7½ per cent ad valorem.

OPENING OF AMERICAN MAILS BY BRITISH GOVT REVEALS SPY SYSTEM.

London, Jan. 13. (7.11 p. m.)—The recent inauguration of a censorship upon both outgoing and incoming American mails has already produced results, according to officials, in the form of the revelation of a wide-spread espionage plot, which the officials declare has amply justified the organization of the large department necessary to carry on the work. According to evidence revealed by the opening of American mail, it is said, an organization of spies here has been sending information to an American branch, which forwards it to Germany by various routes chiefly by one through Holland.

ARRIVED SAFELY IN ENGLAND.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—It is officially announced that the troopship Metagama, which sailed from Canada Jan. 1, has arrived in England. The total number on board was 1,682, including No. 7 Dalhousie Stationary Hospital, 14 officers, 121 men, nursing sisters, 27.

THE GRAHAM SUITS.

R. J. Graham Loses to Annapolis Fruit Growers.

The last has been heard of the celebrated suits of R. J. Graham against the numerous fruit growers of Annapolis and Kings for fraudulent packing of apples bought by him in 1908. In 1910 Mr. Graham recovered damages in a case of this kind against J. W. Bigelow of Wolfville. With this as a precedent he brought some eighty suits against different growers in Kings and in almost every instance succeeded in forcing settlements favorable to himself upon the parties proceeded against. Several of the Annapolis County growers however stood out and retained A. L. Davidson, M. P., of this town to act for them. The result was that upon a motion by Mr. Davidson a few weeks ago these cases were dismissed and Mr. Graham was obliged to pay the costs incurred. — Outlook.

BRITISH SHELL LILLE!

Berlin, Jan. 16—(Via London)—British artillery is bombarding the important French town of Lille, near the Belgian border, and inside the German lines, but so far the shells have caused only slight damage to the place, the German headquarters announced today. The statement also says there was lively artillery fighting along the French front.

What a Progressive and Wide-Awake Government is Doing

The new science school which was formerly opened at Truro on Tuesday last is a monument to the progressive agricultural policy of the Borden Government.

Appreciating the vital importance of the farming industry in Canada, very soon after taking over the reins of power in 1911, Sir Robert's Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Martin Burrell, initiated his great policy of aiding and developing agricultural education in the Province.

For this purpose an initial expenditure of ten million dollars was authorized by the government and ratified by Parliament; the money to be distributed in yearly grants to the several Provinces.

In the fiscal year 1913-14, \$700,000 was thus expended. In 1914-15, \$800,000 was expended. In the present fiscal year 1915-16 \$900,000 is to be expended.

Nova Scotia's share of this grant was \$54,288.45 in 1913-14, \$61,144.45 in 1914-15, and is \$68,001.87 for 1915-16.

These grants are apportioned under agreement made between the federal government and the respective Provincial governments to several branches of agricultural education. Among these objects is the new Science School at Truro.

The Science School was thus made possible, as the Province alone could not afford the expense.

Of the grant to Nova Scotia for 1915-16 \$27,500 is appropriated to the Science School; \$7,500 to pay the interest and sinking fund charges on the capital investment; and \$20,000 to pay salaries and maintenance.

The Science School, therefore, is the product of the enlightened and advanced agricultural policy which fortunately for Nova Scotia has come to us from the progressive government of Sir Robert Borden.

It may be further noted that by this federal government policy which is richly endowing the provinces, we are enabled in Nova Scotia to carry forward other important lines of agricultural education.

For example \$7,000 is provided to assist in defraying salaries and expenses of instructors, directors, superintendents and district representatives.

The valuable work of a dairy instructor is made possible by a grant of \$3500.

For instruction in poultry, bee-keeping, soils and drainage, horticultural and fruit growing and short courses \$16,000 is granted.

\$3000 also granted enable the work of Women's Institute and Domestic Science to be organized and advanced; and \$10,000 is provided for agricultural instruction in schools and the training of teachers and school gardens.

Add to these \$500 for Bulletins and \$501.87 for contingencies; and we have the grand total of \$68,001.87, which comes to Nova Scotia from the federal treasury; and gives us the ability to carry on advanced work that we could not otherwise touch.

Hon. Mr. Burrell leaves to the provincial government the actual expenditure of this money; and the responsibility rests upon Premier Murray and his colleagues to make good use of it.

In the final analysis, however Nova Scotians will very properly remember that the beneficial results from these yearly expenditures stand as striking testimony to the statesmanship of Sir Robert Borden's progressive government.

Conscription is causing a flurry in the British Parliament, but even if an election is rendered necessary there will be no weakening of the national determination to win.

STOP THAT COUGHING AND HAWKING

The Boston Herald lately said:

"Dr. Woods Hutchinson, the well known popularizer of medical knowledge, wants people to stop coughing whether they have colds or not. He says that the sanitariums for tuberculosis have been able to educate coughing almost out of existence so that visitors frequently comment on how seldom they hear one of the patients cough. A large share of the credit of this change, he says, is due to the gentle and persuasive training and the good example of the other patients. Coughing does the consumptive no good, and does him much harm by exhausting his strength, breaking his sleep, and increasing the danger of ulceration. If the habit can be stopped among the tuberculous it is immeasurably more inexcusable among those who can complain of only an ordinary cold."

"If you have never tried, the next time you are tempted to cough or clear your throat, see how well you can get along without doing so, and after a little practice you will find your control complete. Coughing is for the most part a nervous habit, due to a tickling in the throat brought on by previous coughing, and also by a sort of unconscious imitation. Did you ever notice in a theatre or other place of entertainment that nobody coughs in a highly dramatic moment? Did you ever notice that if one person coughs a lot of others do, and that the amount of coughing in a public place depends not on conditions of throat and lungs, but upon habit, tradition and usage?"

"The despatches relate that 'Billy Sunday expressed himself as decidedly annoyed with his auditors at Syracuse the other day because they coughed so much. He was entirely justified in this. This coughing was unnecessary. It may have reflected a languid attitude on their part which they would not have experienced had he made the occasion one of great theatrical stimulus. But beyond that they had no excuse for disturbing him—except a bad habit."

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HOW LONG WILL THE WAR LAST?

The War Against Health Is Quickly Ended By "Fruit-a-tives".

Three Cent Stamps Issued

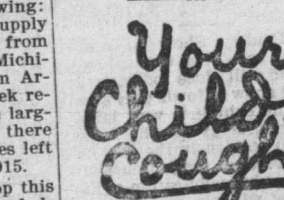

HOW SHALL WE GOVERN OUR TOWN?

Tuesday next is Nomination Day—the day when a Mayor and three Councillors will be nominated for Election, which takes place Tuesday, February 1st. On that day every man twenty-one years of age and over will have a right to use his franchise in a way to honor his town.

Remember men, each of you have a personal responsibility in this matter. It is the town in which you live, you have a right to say how it shall be governed.

We want men to represent us who are fearless and honest, men of business ability, broad-minded, loyal men, men who will work regardless of self-interests. We have such men and it rests with the people to place them in a position where they will expend their energies in making our town the best in the Province.

Think this matter over calmly—it is an important matter and worthy of our most careful consideration. Our Town will be what we make it. We must see to it that we give our best, and we will be repaid by having a town of which we can be justly proud.

THE WAR SITUATION

The Russians are still doing effective work all along the Eastern line of battle. In the Caucasus front the Grand Duke is making his influence felt and latest reports state the Turks have been driven back over a front of over 66 miles. At many places the retreat assumed the character of a flight in panic and several Turkish units were almost annihilated.

Along the Bessarabian front the Russians also have begun a strong offensive and the Austrians are alarmed at the strong reinforcements being sent by the Russians into Galacia.

On the Western front the British are now holding 125 miles of the 400 miles of battle front. This is a very much longer line than formerly, and shows the British are moving large bodies of men up to the firing line and relieving the French of a portion of the long line they formerly defended.

At Saloniki the Allies are very strongly entrenched and will be able to meet the onslaught of the enemy no matter how large the number sent against them.

The German drive to Egypt seems to be delayed as the central powers have their hands more than full in other war centres.

POULTRY SHOW AT KENTVILLE.

The Poultry Show at Kentville has been open the last two days and will close today. It is the best show of fowls ever seen here. The exhibit is very large and the birds are of the finest breeds. Most of the judging has been done but publication of the prize list will not be given until a later issue. The management deserve the highest praise for gathering together such a fine exhibit.

Mr. Bert Hartien, locomotive engineer is recovering from his recent illness and operation. As the result of an accident about a year ago he was obliged to go to the Infirmary at Halifax the last of the year and had his index finger amputated and part of the hand. He is now so much recovered that he expects to resume his work in a short time.

AT THE CHURCHES.

Special recruiting sermons were preached in the churches throughout the Maritime Provinces on Sunday evening last. In Kentville splendid addresses were given by the pastors of the different churches.

At the Baptist Church, the pastor, Rev. J. D. Spidell, spoke to a large audience, giving a very able address from the text "Why Young Men Should Enlist for Overseas Service, and Every Person Do Some Work Along Definite Lines to Bring the End of the War Nearer." The address was destined to teach the people the greatness of the Empire to which they belong, her power, her ideals, her noble purpose. England is fighting not only to save herself but to save others, to maintain the freedom, which we all love. Canada owes much of her greatness to the Mother Country. Think of our British Freedom, religious liberty and all the benefits which are ours under the "Old Union Jack." How can we keep back from enlisting in the service of our King and Country.

The address was one to inspire all to loyalty, and as evidence of the good results achieved, a number of men called at the Baptist Parsonage Monday desiring to enlist.

Special Patriotic music was well rendered during the service.

ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH.

The Rev. Dr. Donohue took for the subject of his sermon Sunday both at Kentville and Woodside "The War and the Necessity of Service." He pointed out to his congregation the great need of still more recruits to bring Britain's army up to the strength necessary to cope victoriously with the Teutonic forces. He showed them that it was the intention of God that men should live in society, that society should have within itself the means necessary to procure the good of its citizens, that as a consequence, it should also have the right to protect its existence and prerogatives against unjust aggressors, even by the use of such extreme measures as war. The present war is just such a case in question. England and her Allies are fighting against a cruel and unjust aggressor, and he said, it was the duty of every man who is not lawfully hindered to offer his services to his country in her hour of need. As children of the British Empire, Canadians must fight for that Empire, and in doing so, they are doing their duty and nothing more.

Dr. Donohue finished his discourse by appealing to the people of the parish to do everything in their power to help along the noble work of the Red Cross Society. He urged them to give generously of their time and means to further the good work, so that the men at the front, who are laying down their lives for them, may have all the necessities and comforts possible under existing conditions and the hospitals be properly equipped.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

The men of the 112th will parade to St. Paul's Church, on Sunday morning. This may be the last church parade. The subject in the morning will be "Courage." In the evening Mr. Layton will speak on: "By Whom are We Judged?" The annual meeting of St. Paul's congregation will be held next Wednesday night. Refreshments will be served at the close of the business.

The Mission Band meets this afternoon at 3.30.

Misner—MacDonald

A marriage was performed at the Manse, Kentville, by Rev. R. B. Layton on the 15th inst., when Mr. Charles William MacDonald was married to Miss Mabel Misner of Chipman's Brook. Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald will live at Centreville.

FOR THE ABSENTEES

The citizens of Kentville missed it again on Wednesday night, the 19th inst. It was a beautiful moonlight night, not cold. The walking was good. The Court House, as usual, was well-heated. But in spite of the fact that the meeting had been advertised in both Town papers, and in other ways, not half a dozen voters of Kentville, and only thirteen ladies were present to hear the two gentlemen who drove up from Wolfville to deliver carefully prepared addresses on a very important matter.

Whatever these gentlemen may have thought of the empty seats; they did not mention them, as did the learned gentlemen who were sent from Halifax and from Wolfville a few weeks ago, to speak on the Hospital Unit. The empty seat speaks eloquently of vacancy.

Rev. G. W. Miller, M. A., was the first speaker. It was for him to introduce the subject, and the main speaker, Mr. Herbert Stairs. The Children's Aid Society is a money saver for Kings County as well as a child saver. The work done through this Society is one of the most important operations of the present day. Men receive great praise because of their skill in developing our material resources, and increasing our national wealth by production. But the Children's Aid Society is doing more. It is conserving and developing our greatest asset—manhood and womanhood. It is preventing childhood from being dwarfed and destroyed by evil. It gives it a chance to develop in strength and usefulness. The work done for children during the past year by Mr. Stairs has saved this County thousands of dollars in the years to come. Mr. Stairs, although appointed agent of the Children's Aid Society by the Government, receives no salary. Mr. Miller said it was with difficulty that he could be got to send in a bill for all his travelling and other expenses. The work has grown so that it now occupies almost all his time. It was unfair to ask Mr. Stairs to devote so much of his time without some remuneration.

Mr. Stairs then presented his third annual report. Last year he travelled over two thousand miles over the county in the interests of children. He mentioned the many cases that had come before him. He had paid several visits to Kentville. A criminal case now pending in the courts was one in which Kentville was interested. There were cases in many other parts where he had been able to give aid. A girl, with a foot cut off, was last year begging from house to house in Kentville. Through Mr. Stairs' efforts this girl has now an artificial foot, and has been placed in a good home. A boy of fourteen had never been to school, although living beside it. He is now going to school. This is only one of many like cases. It is expected that this excellent report will shortly be published so that all may know the full extent of Mr. Stairs' labors.

Money is needed to carry on the operating expenses of the Society. The County Council has voted an appropriation. But it is not sufficient. There are about 66 members of the Society in Kentville. The annual membership fee is fifty cents. Mrs. W. W. Rockwell, Mrs. Wm. MacBride and Mr. E. B. Newcombe were appointed a committee to secure new members, and collect subscriptions. It was also decided to take some steps to secure for Mr. Stairs some remuneration for his services, as it was felt that it is not just to ourselves to expect Mr. Stairs to continue the sacrifices which he is involving in carrying on so faithfully this important work.

A despatch from Copenhagen, Dec. 9, said it was Prince Viggo, a younger brother of Prince Eric, who was to visit Canada to study practical farming.

Items From Digby Courier

The Life Boat Daring, from the Bay View Life Saving Station, had a rough trip in the bay during Monday night's southerly storm, having gone to Trout Cove to rescue a disabled gasoline fishing boat containing two men. The Daring was in Digby Tuesday afternoon for supplies for the station.

Last week thousands of lobster traps were put out along the whole of the Digby County coast, the 6th being the date for the opening of the season for this district. The season for the neighboring county of Yarmouth opened a month earlier and large shipments of live lobsters have been going forward to the Boston market.

CANADA NEEDS MORE GOOD OFFICERS.

Minister of Militia States That Until They Are Available, Recruiting Will be Largely Confined to Existing Units.

Ottawa, Jan. 16—While hundreds of offers are being received from all parts of the Dominion for the raising of regiments, General Hughes states that there is a dearth at present of competent and efficient officers to command such regiments, and that until such time as such officers can be properly trained, the present constituted battalions will be permitted to recruit beyond their normal strength up to a second or even a third battalion. Afterward these regiments can be properly organized under competent heads, trained efficiently at the new schools which are to be instituted throughout the Dominion.

"We want to know who is who before we make appointments or permit the raising of new regiments under new auspices," said General Hughes this evening.

EDITH CAVELL IS AVENGED.

Body of Spy Who Denounced Her Found in Street Riddled with Bullet Holes

London, Jan. 14, 4.25 a. m.—A despatch to the Daily Express from Amsterdam says: "The Belgian spy, Cels, who denounced Edith Cavell, the English nurse who was executed at Brussels some time ago, to the Germans, was assassinated yesterday. His body was found in a street of Schaerbeek, near Brussels, with two bullet wounds in it." A despatch from Brussels, French soldier whose confession to the German authorities resulted in the arrest and execution of Miss Cavell, had committed suicide by hanging in the military prison at Brussels.

CANADIAN CUSTOMS REVENUE INCREASING

Ottawa, Jan. 16—If customs revenue for the latter half of January is as great as that during the first half, the receipts for the whole month will be double those of the corresponding period last year. Up to January 15 the receipts were \$5,015,125, or more than twice as great as those during the first fifteen days of January 1915, \$2,319,088. It is hoped that this increase will be maintained throughout the whole month.

TURKS RETREAT

London, January 15—Turkish forces occupying positions on both banks of the River Tigris, 25 miles south of Kut-el-Amara, in Mesopotamia, are retreating according to an announcement made today by the official press bureau. The war office adds that, after hard fighting, the Turks began to withdraw on January 13 and January 14, and that they are being closely pressed by British troops under Commanding-General Aylmer.

Some Heroes of the War.

"The fortitude of some of the men is simply amazing. Take the case of Lance-Corporal J. Williams, of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers. This is the way he won the D. C. M.: There was a sharp engagement at Festubert on September 15. Killed and wounded were stretched out all around after the charge and the counter-charge. There was a lull in the fighting, and when Williams took stock of his injuries he found that a bullet had pierced his left shoulder and that merely two threads were supporting what was left of his left hand. Have you ever run a splinter under your finger nail. If you have, how much use were you until you had it extracted and your finger bound up? Williams looked at his hand and then looked around and saw a lot of his comrades who were even worse off. And so he used his good right hand—for good hands, right or left, were scarce just then—to assist in bandaging all the wounded near him, and all the time he cheered and encouraged the wounded about him. When the work was over he refused the offer of the stretcher bearers and walked unaided through the communication trench to the first hospital, where the two threads were severed.

"In normal times Jim Sweeney might think his a hard lot if he had to lose a night's sleep, but Lance-Corporal J. Sweeney is quite a different man. Any man covered soldier you see slipping into the city in the early morning hours for a few days' rest at home will tell you that Hooge and its vicinity is 'a hell of a hole.' And when you see these soldiers fresh from the trenches you can believe it. Lance-Corporal J. Sweeney was stationed in an open trench in Hooge. It was his duty to direct the stretcher bearers and assist in emergency dressings. For twenty-seven hours he stuck to his job. Then he led the stretcher bearers up and down to the advance trenches for twenty-one hours more. All these forty-eight hours the Germans were dropping shells and bombs and working their machine guns and rifles over the section where Sweeney was stationed. He has red hair, broad shoulders, grit and determination and a D. C. M."

DEATHS OF TWO ACADIA GRADUATES

Rev. Horace G. Colpitts.

Rev. H. B. Smith, M. A., died on January 17th at Hebron of pneumonia after a brief illness. He was in his 58th year, and had been pastor at Hebron for three years. He graduated from Acadia in 1886, and was a pastor at Melvern Square. His burial takes place at Nictaux today (Friday). He was a near relative of Mrs. A. L. Hardy and often visited Kentville.

GERMAN PRISONERS ESCAPE AT AMHERST

Twelve Dig a Tunnel and Obtain Freedom.

Amherst, Jan. 18—Twelve German prisoners escaped from the internment camp on the Amherst Highlands at an early hour this morning, but no information concerning the event leaked out until well along in the afternoon.

It is understood that the prisoners tunneled their way under the walls of the building well out past the entanglements. If such is the case the tunnel undoubtedly would have been started underneath a bunk, as a previous occasion, and the distance to go would be some 20 or 30 feet.

In some manner unknown, the Germans kept at their attempt to secure freedom without the knowledge of their guards, who have been extremely vigilant.

Practically every town in the Maritime Province has been notified of the escape of the Teutons and an early capture is looked for. Parties of guards scoured the surrounding country-side this afternoon, and while traces of the men were rumored, tonight they had not been located.
