## TEMPERANCE GUILD.

The usual fortnightly meetings of the Guild were held on the 18th and 24th April. There was a larger attendance on the 10th than on any previous occasion. At this meeting Mr. Hoyles, the Vice President of the St. Stephen's Society, was present, and delivered a most earnest, practical, and interesting address, and one which was appreciated by all who heard it. Mr. Kersley was the principal speaker at the second meeting, and he shewed that enthusiasm which is of great importance in a cause of this kind. On both occasions different members of the Guild, played, sang, or read, thus making the evenings pass most pleasantly. Refreshments also were served.

The Guild is making steady progress. New members have been enrolled at each meeting. On the 24th at least a dozen were admitted.

During this month two general meetings were held of those interested in the Church of England Temperance Society. The first was at our school-house on the 6th April ; and it was then decided that a conference of all the clergy and of delegates from the Temperance Guilds in the Deanery of Toronto should be called. Accordingly a meeting was held in the St. James school-house on the 20th April, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the Chair. It was then decided to form a Central Association for the Deanery to promote the cause of Temperance. A committee was nominated by His Lordship to draft a constitution for such an Association and to draw up a scheme for its working, the result to be laid before a meeting of the Clergy and Temperance workers which he intended to call on the 10th May. The President and Treasurer of the St. George's Guild were nominated on this committee.
