VALUABLE RECEIPTS.

TO PREVENT RUST.

If rusty iron is rubbed with boiled oil, in which some red-lead has been mixed, on a warm day, the rusting process will be arrested.

WHITEWASH THAT WILL NOT RUB OFF.

Mix up haif a peifful of lime and water, ready to put it on the wall, then take one gill of flour, mix it with a little water; then pour on it boiling water sufficient to thicken it; pour it while hot into the whitewash.

CURE FOR WARTS AND CORNS.

An English physician of good repute says, that corns, warts, bunions, or any other excrescences, may be cured by applying to the parts a decoction composed of the bark of a willow-tree, burned to ashes, and mixed into paste with strong cider vinegar.

HOW TO DYE SMALL ARTICLES.

In domestic dyeing, for trifling articles, the Dye and Mordant are often boiled together, and the stuff immersed in the liquid. The following are some examples:

Crimson.—Boil four ounces of Brazil Wood with half an ounce of Alum, and a quarter of an ounce of Cream Tartar, in a gallon of water.

Purple or Lilac.—Cudbear, two ounces, Pearlash, quarter of an ounce, hot water, half a gallon.

Rose or Flesh Color.—Pink saucers, with a little lemon juice, or Cream of Tartar, will be found convenient.

Violet.—Boil four ounces of Logwood with one ounce of Alum, and a quarter of an ounce of Cream of Tartar, to a quart of water.

Blue.—Add to water as much Liquid Blue as will make it the desired color.

Yellow.—Boil two ounces of Tumeric, or a drachm of Saffron, with half an ounce of Alum, to a quart of water.

Green.-Add to the Yollow dye sufficient Liquid Blue to render it green.

Black.—Boil one ounce of Logwood, a quarter of an ounce of Sumach, and half a tea-spoonful of Copperas, in four quarts of water.

Buff.—Boil one ounce Fustic, with one drachm of Alum, in four pints of water.

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VALUABLE RECEIPTS.

WATER-PROOFING FOR CLOTH, LINEN, CANVAS, ETC.

We have given receipts for making cloth waterproof, but the following is the most simple and cheapest method: Brush the cloth with a solution of isinglass, and when dry, with a solution of nutgalls. This last preparation changes the gelatinous mass of isinglass into a true leather.

TO SET COLORS IN CALICO.

All colors in calico may be set by the use of the following mixture: Dissolve one teaspoonful of ox-gall in a gallon of warm water, and wash the article in it, without soap. This is a cheap process, and every family should have a bottle of the mixture always on hand.

THE GIRL WITH A CALICO DRESS.

A fig for your upper-ten girls, with their velvets and satins and laces,
Their diamonds, and rubies, and pearls, and their milliner figures and faces;
They may shine at a party or ball, emblaces with half they possess,
But give me, in place of them all, my girl with the calico dress.

TO RESTORE COLOR.

When the color is taken out by acid, it may be restored by an application of sal volatile and hartshorn, which will not harm the cloth.

TO DYE NANKIN COLOR.

A pailful of lye with a piece of copperas half as large as a hen's egg boiled in it, will color a beautiful nankin which will never wash out.

TO DYE A HANDSOME GREEN.

Boil out the old color, rinse in soft water, then take fustic, boil it in soft water, and it will make a bright yellow dye. Next take a bowl full of this yellow dye, and put into it a table spoonful of the blue composition (see page ten), stir it up well with a clean stick, and dip the articles which you have already dyed yellow in the fustic, into it. They will be a fine sharp grass green.

LIQUID BLUE.

This is the English process: Mix one ounce of Spanish indigo with one and a half pounds of best vitriol, and scrape in a little chalk. Put it in a bottle. Set an iron pot half full of sand over the fire. When hot, place in the bottle, and let it remain until its contents boil gently (fifteen minutes). Then take the kettle off the fire, and let all remain twenty-hours, then bottle the liquid for use.

TO PURIFY BAD WATER.

Five drops of sulphuric acid put into a full quart decanter of bad water, will cause the noxious particles to fall to the bottom. Twenty drops of diluted vitriolic acid will answer the same purpose. The water should stand two hours, and then pour off about three parts for use; the rest throw away.

VALUABLE RECEIPTS, &c.

Rules for Dyeing.—The materials should be perfectly clean; every vestige of soap should be rinsed out in soft water. The article to be dyed should be thoroughly wetted with the dye or it will be spotted; light colors should be steeped in brass, tin or earthen, and if set at all, should be set with alum. Dark colors should be boiled in iron and set with copperate, too much copperate will rot the threads.

To Dye Blue.—Boil out the original color and rinse in soft water; then get at the hatters or apothecaries an ounce or more of "blue composition." It is a compound of vitriol and indigo, which they always keep on hand; an ounce of it should cost about fifteen or twenty cents. Twelve or sixteen drops of this blue composition in a quart bowl full of warm water, stirred (and if there are any settlings it must be strained), will color a great many articles. If you wish a deep blue, pour in more of the composition. No cloth containing any cotton in it must be died with this, as the vitriol will destroy cotton threads. After the dyed articles are quite dry, they should be washed in cool suds; this prevents any bad effects from the vitriol.

To Dye Slate Color.—Take old tea leaves or grounds and boil them in an iron pot with a little copperas (sulphate of iron); this makes an excellent slate color.

A Hint for the Summer Season.—The simplest and best way of preserving woolens through the summer from the destruction of the moths, is to wrap them well up, after brushing and beating them, in cotton or linen cloths. The moth can pass neither. Two covers, well wrapped around and secured from the air, will be effectual. An old sheet will answer, and save all the expense of camphor, etc.

INTERESTING MISCELLANY.

To make Old Black Cloth Clothes look like New.—Take two ounces of blue galls bruised, and half an ounce each of logwood, sulphate of iron and sumach. Then take one pint of vinegar and put into it the galls, logwood and sumach. Macerate in a close vessel with heat for twenty-four hours, then strain off the clear liquid, and add to it the sulphate of iron and a little sugar and gum arabic. Shake the bottle twice a day for a week. Keep it tightly corked, and apply with a brush or sponge. It will make faded old black clothes bright and fresh as new.

To Color Drab that will not Fade.—Boil chestnut bark for two hours, or until the strength is extracted. Dip the cloth in strong copperas water, if a gray drab is required, and alum water if a purple drab. It will color cotton and woolen.

Tomato Soup.—Put in five quarts of water, a chicken, or a piece of any fresh meat, and six thin slices of bacon; let them boil for some time, skimming carefully, then throw in two or three dozen tomatoes, peeled, and let the water boil away to about one quart; take out the tomatoes, mash and strain them through a sieve, mix a piece of butter as large as a hen's egg with a tablespoonful of flour, and add it to the tomatoes; season with salt and pepper; an onion or two is an improvement. Take the meat from the kettle when done, and put back the tomatoes. Let them boil half an hour. Lay slices of toasted bread in the tureen, and pour on the soup.

To Dye Black.—Take a sufficiency of old cider, put it in an iron pot, and add logwood and a small portion of sulphate of iron (copperas); boil thoroughly. This makes a good clear black.

Black antimony, 8 ounces; Flour Sulphur, 4 ounces; Powdered Nitre, 4 ounces.

Mix and divide into 16 powders. Give one in the feed every night.

Take 1½ drachms Blue Vitriol, 1 drachm Digitalis, 1½ drachms Cream Tartar, 3 drachms Nitre, 1 ounce Ginger, and 2 drachms Gentian.

Mix. and give two powders per day.

Bathe freely. Excellent for strains, bruises, sprains, windgalls, etc.

Ointment for Bone-Spavin.

2 ounces of Cantharides, 4 ounces of Mercurial Ointment, 3 ounces of Tincture of Iodine, 4 ounces of Turpentine, 3 drachms of Corrosive Sublimate.

Mix with 2 pounds of Lard.

DIRECTIONS.—Cut off the hair from the part affected, and grease thoroughly with the Ointment. Let it remain two days, then grease the part with lard. In two days more wash it off with soap and water, and apply the Ointment again. Continue this method until a cure is effected.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per ‡ oz., but if posted unpaid, such letters are charged 7 cents per ‡ oz.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per 1 oz., with optional prepayment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom is, by Canadian Packet,

Not exceeding 1 oz .. Exceeding 1 oz. and not exceed'g 1 oz. 25

and so on, increasing two rates of postage for

each additional ouxce.

And by Cunard Packet, 17 cents per 1 oz., &c.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling on delivery.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond Sea, and Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

MAILS FOR CANADA FROM ENGLAND.

Two Ocean Steamers carrying mails for Canada leave Liverpool in each week, viz.; a Canadian Packet on every Thursday, via Derry on Friday, sailing to Quebec in summer and Portland in winter, by which the Postage rate is 6d. stg. per † oz.; and a Cunard Packet every Saturday, via Cork on Sunday, bringing mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and New York, by which the Postage rate to Canada is 8d. stg. per 1 oz.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet salling after the letter is posted, unless the letter bears a special direction—"By Canadian Packet" or "By British Packet"—and in that case they are kept over for the packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive super-scription; for any Mail for Canada is a "Cana-dian Mail," by whatever packet forwarded.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons posting Letters containing value, should be careful to require them to be regis-tered, and to obtain from the Postmaster a Certificate of receipt for Registration.

The charge for Registration, in addition to the Postage, is as follows, viz. :

On Letters to any other place in Can-ada, or British North America.... 2 cents. On Letters for the United States... 5 " On Letters for the United Kingdom. 12; "

On Letters for British Colonies or Possessions, sent via England ...

On Letters for France and other Foreign Countries, via England, an amount equal to the postage rate.

Both the postage charge and the registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a Letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced when an Unregistered Letter cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A Registered Letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an Unregistered Letter.

MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on Parcels by the Parcel Post, which is limited to places within the Pro-vince, is 25 cts, per lb. (with 8 cents additional

One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars (Printed Circulars, if sent in envelopes, whether sealed or unsealed, are liable to letter postage), Prices Current, Hand Bills, and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 or. in weight, 12† cents on † lb. packets, and 12‡ cents additional for every additional † lb. These charges must be prepaid. Photographs, provided they are not upon glass or in cases containing glass, may be forwarded to England at the Book rate of postage.

Transient Newspapers-that is to Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Can-ada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only British Newspapers distributed to regu-lar subscribers by Canadian booksellers or news agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR

UNITED STATES

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on de-livery. (This is the American Transit charge.) United States Newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on Periodical Publications is, if not exceeding 8 ounces in weight, 1 cent; over 8 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, Periodicals published in Canada, weighing over 8 ounces, may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to the education of youth (both religious and general), to agriculture, to temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication, to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Periodicals received in Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

Money Orders payable in the Province may be obtained at any Money Order Office in the annexed list, at the following rates of commission:

No single Order can be issued for more than \$100.

Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britan and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in Sterling, the commission chargeable being: for £2 and under, 25c.; ever £2 and up to £5, 50c.; over £5 and up to £7, 75c.; over £7 and up to £10, \$1. No order can be drawn for more than £10, but any number of orders of £10 each may be procured.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage Stamps are provided for sale of the respective value of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 124 cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet.

Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 5 cents and 10 cents respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5 50 per hundred, or 66 cents per dozen. The price of a single enve-

lope is 6 cents.

The 10 cent envelopes will be sold at the rate of \$10 50 per hundred, or \$1 26 per Single envelopes, 11 cents. dozen.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Act contains the following penal clause:

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

VALUABLE RECEIPT.

Pumpkin Preserves.

An excellent and economical sweetment is thus prepared: To seven pounds of pumpkin, take five pounds of sugar, four lemons, and two ounces of green ginger-root, to be obtained at most grocers' stores. Cut the pumpkin in slices half an inch in thickness, and in size and form to suit the fancy. Boil the pumpkin in the syrup until tender, then remove it and add the lemons and ginger-root. These should be sliced thickly and scalded before being put into the syrup. Boil it down until it is rich enough to keep without fermenting, and then pour it over the pumpkin. If the ginger-root cannot be obtained, lemons alone impart to it an agreeable flavor.

HISTORY OF CANADA.

June 24, John and Sebastian Cabot discover Canada.

1500. The Portuguese mariner Cortereal visits Canada, and is said to have discovered the Gulf of St. Lawrence

1517. June 11. Sir Thomas Pert's expedition, which is accompanied by Sebastian Cabot, enters Hudson's Bay, but does not explore it, owing to the timidity of the commander, 1524. Francis I. despatches an expedition under Verrazzano, who takes possession of the North-east coast of North America, which he calls New France.

1535. Jacques Cartier ascends the St. Lawrence as far as the present site of Montreal, and carries several of the natives, with their chief, to France.
1540. The French erect the fort of Charlesbourg.

1549. Roberval sails for Canada, and is lost. 1581. The French again trade to Canada.

1591. A French fleet sails to Canada.
1598. Henry IV. of France commissions the Marquis de la Roche to conquer Canada, but the undertaking proves a failure.
July 3. Quebec founded by Champlain.

1627. Richelieu intrusts the government of the colony to the company of a Hundred Associates. 1629. Quebec taken by the English. 1632. March 17, Quebec and all Canada restored to the French by the Treaty of St. Germains.

1648-49. The colony suffers much from the incursions of the Iroquois Indians.

1663. Louis XIV. erects Canada into a royal government, with the laws and usages of France. 1665. Canada is granted to the French West India Company.

1667. Peace is made with the Indians, 1690. Sir William Phipps is despatched from New England to conquer Canada. He reaches Quebec Oct. 16, and re-embarks without effecting any conquests, Oct. 22.

The British American colonies send another fleet to conquer Canada, but it is wrecked

at the mouth of the St. Lawrence, Aug. 22.

April 11, The peace of Utrecht restores tranquility to Canada.

1746. Shirley, governor of Massachusetts, projects the conquest of Canada, but only carries his arms into Nova Scotia.

1755. The English again attack Canada.

1759. Battle of Quebec, and death of General Wolfe, Sept. 18. The town surrenders to the British, Sept. 18.

1760. Entire reduction of Canada by the British.

1763. Feb. 10, Canada ceded to Great Britain by the Treaty of Paris.

1765. Canada submits to the Stamp Act. 1774. Legislative Council of twenty-three members appointed.

1775. The American forces invade Canada, and land at St. John's, Sept. 10. General Montgomery takes St. John's, Nov. 3, Montreal, Nov. 12, and in company with Arnold, assaults Quebec, Dec. 81. He is killed in the action, and the Americans surrender to General Carleton.

1776. June 18, The Americans evacuate Canada.
1791. March 4, Pitt proposes the Quebec Bill, by which Canada is divided into the Upper and Lower Provinces, and receives a representative constitution.
1792. The first House of Assembly is opened by Lleutenant-Governor Clarke.

1793. Canada is erected into a bishopric.
1812. The Americans, under General Hull, invade Canada, but are compelled to surrender,
Aug. 15. A second army, under General Wadsworth, also capitulates, Oct. 14; and
a third, under Van Rensselaer, Nov. 27.

1813. The Americans take York (Toronto), April 27; Fort George, May 27; they repel the British at Sackett's Harbor, May 29; and are defeated at Stony Oreek, June 6. Indecisive battle of Williamsburg, Nov. 11.

1814. The Americans gain the battle of Longwood, March 4; take Fort Erie, July 3; and gain the battle of Chippewa, July 5. Indecisive battle of Brigdewater, July 25. Peace signed at Ghent, Dec. 24.

1828. 87,000 Canadians petition the king against the manner in which the governors had applied the revenues

1836. Sept. 22, The Houses of Assembly refuse to vote supplies.
1837. The "Sons of Liberty," under Papineau, rise in rebellion at Montreal. They are defeated in an attempt to seize Toronto, Dec. 4; and again at St. Eustace, Dec. 14.
1838. Jan. 15, Resignation of Sir Francis Head. He is succeeded by Lord Durham, who arrives at Quebec, May 29.

1841. Feb. 10, Upper and Lower Canada united into one province.

1842. The seat of government is transferred from Kingston to Toronto.

1849. April 25, Disturbances in Canada, owing to the Rebellion Losses Indemnity Bill. The

1853. May 9, By 16 Vict., c. 21, the Legislature is empowered to make provision concerning
the lands known as Clergy Reserves, and their proceeds.

1855. Sept., Extensive immigration from the north of Scotland.

1856. March 12, An accident on the Hamilton Rallway; seventy people killed. April 17,
Quebec is made the seat of government.

1958. Ottawa made the capital.
 1860. The Prince of Wales visits Canada. Aug. 18, He is received with great onthusiasm at Quebec. Sept. 20, He leaves for the United States.
