

U. S. SHIPBUILDING PROGRAM

By Courier Leased Wire.

Washington, April 25.—For military reasons the exact situation of the future building program was not made public. From previous statements of Chairman Hurley, however, it had been estimated that the construction in 1919 will be in excess of 10,000,000 tons, the largeest amount ever built in anyone year by any nation. Before January 1, all shipyards will be in full operation and many old yards which have demonstrated their ability to build efficiently will be expanded.

Of the total tonnage next year approximately eight million tons will be steel.

It is expected that 2,500,000 tons of wooden ships will be turned out next year, virtually all on the gulf and Pacific coasts. Continuation of the navy building program may be expected.





Treaty for Bird Protection

are parties to a treaty for the protection of birds unique in the history of the world. The full text of this pact may be obtained on application to the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, along with the text and the enabling act (bill 92), passed by the Dominion Parliament on July 21, 1917. An abridgment of the text of these laws is in course of preparation, and will be issued in leastet form for distribution by the Canadian Society for the Protection of Birds this year.

The Canadian enabling act is known as the Migatory Birds Convention Act. This splendid Actwhich the public should be made aware of, is now operative throughout the Dominion-imposes a maximum penalty of one hundred dollars er six months' imprisonment, or both fine and imprisonment, on any person violating its provisions. It also provides for the confiscation of all guns, ammunition, vessels, vehicles and outfits of every description, that may be used in the violation of the act or even with intention to violate it.

Under the act. Dr. C. Gordon Hewitt, Dominion entomologist, has recently been appointed as Dominion consulting zoologist. The administration department, which will include same officers, invested with the powers of both a constable and justice of the peace, is in course of organiza-

Excellent though its provisions are, and its administration may be, however, the act and the great treaty will be of little avail for their purpose unless the people are enlightened regarding the value of birds to man and their nests and eggs. Until this is done and the knowledge of the mission of birds in nature, and pure interest in birds for their beauty and habits and song become widespread, laws for their protection will be evaded or only half-heartedly obeyed. The Canadian Society for the Protection of Birds exists for the purpose of disseminating this knowledge. It is a voluntary movement receiving the approval of the Ontario Government, which has assigned to it suitable headquarters at 153 University avenue, Toronto. Its object is the education of the people regarding bird life and bird service. It is the

T. H. Rogers, K.C., chairman of Willner's son the Halifax Relief Commission, has submitted to the Government. The statement shows the total material loss from the disaster, excluding Government and shipping property, to be estimated at \$15,000,000.

The provision of a capital sum to provide for the dependents of those killed and take care of the injured may reach five million dollars. The relief funds, including the million pounds sterling appropriated by the Imperial Government, five million dollars by the Canadian Government and three millions by general subscription, reach the sum of about

thirteen million dollars. It is estimated that four million dollars are required for emergency relief, temporary housing, hospital and medical attendance, living allowances, etc., extending over the current year.

Canada's Net Debt.

Canada's net debt stood at \$1,010, 780,470 on Feb. 28, an increase dur-ing February of \$13,251,263. The total gross debt of the Dominion on Feb. 28 was \$1,996,393,359. Total assets were \$985,612,889. Total war expenditures for the eleven months' period to the end of February was \$207,849,726.

February, 1918, the revenue was \$21,225,872, as compared with \$17,513,473 in February of last year. Expenditure on account of consolidated fund was \$11,323,497 in February of the present year, in comparison with \$12,581,954 in February, 1917.

The Thunder Eagle. "Thunder Eagle," sacred among the Ojibway Indians as personifying the spirit of the Mineto, supposed to have its nest on the Sleeping Giant, 1,400 feet above Thunder Bay, was seen depicted in fire in the brilliant display of aurora borealis several weeks ago. The Ojibways say the Thunder Eagle has not been seen for many years, and that its appearance portends wonderful happenings in the world. The figure of the eagle travelled swiftly southward over the bay.

Our Foreign Trade.

Canada's foreign trade, particullarly the exports, will be about \$2,500,000,000 in the year ending this month. Our war market is measured principally by what we can make and get shipped, but when the war stops we shall have to fight hard for all our overseas markets, except, perhaps, in some foodstuffs and raw materials.


