



Awarded Military Medal He is Later Killed in Action

Lieut Col. J V. Ralston of the 85th battalion in a letter to Mrs. Mary McNeil, Sydney pays high tribute to her husband Sergt. A. R. McNeil, D. C. M. who was killed in

As an original member of the 85th. says Col. Ralston, your husband has left behind him a shining record of service which will ever be cherished by the Battalion and of which you may well be proud. With the exception of seven months evacuation to England, consequent to being wounded he has been with the Battalion from the time of its mobilization and has taken part in every action of note in which the Unit has been engaged. On the 26th, June, 1916 he was promoted to the rank of Corporal, which was followed on the 30th., May 1917, by the full rank of Sergeant. During the operations at Passchendaele on the 30th. October 1916 he was wounded and was therefore evacuated to England for a period of convalescence and rest, He rejoined the battalion on the 30th. May 1918 For his splended work during the fighting of the latter part of June last year, he received public recognition in the award of the D. C. M. the official recommendation for which r. ads as follows:
