Fears for Missionaries-The United States

London, Nov. 1 .- The Daily News says ed.tor.ally: "The Turks may go too far with the United States. Minister Terrell is not disposed to acquiesce in the Americans being treated like the Armenians."

United States Minister Terrell has succeeded in moving the Turkish Government to punish the men who murdered the American bicyclist Lenz in Armenia. He has cabled his State department that the has cabled his State department that the Kurds and Armenians who committed the murder will be tried at Erzeroun, and that the United States will be represented at the trial by the British consul of that place. This official was the lirst person to learn of Lenz's murder, and as there is no American consul there he actively interested himself in the case and reported the results of bis investigation to Mr. Terrell.

Constantinople, Nov. 1.—Advices from Marsoven, Asia Minor, say the trouble which was anticipated by U. S. Ambassador Terrell, in the despatch to Washington of August last, has culminated in an attempt to burn the American college there. It is added that the would-be incendiaries have not been discovered. The agitation against Americans at Marsovan began about a year ago, when a number

aginst Americans at marsovan began about a year ago, when a number of pupils of the American college were expelled because their fathers were ac-cused of being implicated in the Arme-nian movement. This caused suspicion to fall upon the professors of the college, five in number, two of whom are American citizens. Mr. Terrell notified the authorities that Washington Gerabed, a naturalized American citizen, had tend a religious service. Garabed was one of the students previously sent from the college, at the request of the Turkish authorities, on the ground that he was connected with the Armenian revolutionists. He was the chief man of the Protestant community at afarsovan and chairman of the Council of Thirty, who are held responsible for the peace of the city. Garabed, however, is said to five been murdered by the revolutionists because he had given the revolutionists had mark at the professors at Marsovan for slaughter long before the Sassoun atrocities were committed. President Tracy and Prof. Riggs, of Marsovan college, were especially disliked by the revolutionists, and their lives were threatened for having consented to the expulsion of Armerian students suspected of being in sympathy with the revolutionary movement. 


