The British Elections.

The general result of the British elections was undoubtedly a foregone conclusion. The expected happened, and it happened with a vengeance. All of us looked for a substantial majority for the Coalition Government.

On the urgency of these problems and the necessity of speedily tackling them all then were agreed. And Mr. Lloyd George was known as an ardent advocate and enthusiastic pioneer of all these measures.

Never in our history, since the adoption of parliamentary government, had a statesman such an opportunity. The tide was at the turn, and with the supreme opportunism of genius he took it, and was carried on the crest of the thundering surges to the greatest and most spectacular political victory in the history of our race.

The elections were, therefore, first and foremost a great personal triumph for the premier. It was a declaration of the belief of an overwhelming majority of his countrymen of his belief in him as the man of the hour, and their faith in his ability to "wash out" in the critical days now ahead, as he had in the "dark and bloody" years now, thank God, only a memory.

Never in the palmy days of Gladstone, Palmerston, Salisbury, to keep within my own personal recollections, was a British statesman so wholeheartedly and unreservedly trusted, and I, for one, believe that he will justify this trust in the future as he has so brilliantly and convincingly done in the past.

He is a man of the past, present and future. While a "progressive" to his finger tips he has affinities with the old regime not yet passed; but to the most casual or prejudiced observer moribund and doomed.

He is no long haired, wild eyed formula worshipping fanatic, bent on creating an earthly paradise overnight with the stroke of a pen or the slash of a sword or a "whiff of grape shot."

The Journal of Education states that any pupil in Grade XI shall take English and any other five subjects optional. We understand that in Wolfville High School no such option is possible, and pupils from outside Sections who have no previous knowledge of languages are obliged to pay extra for instruction in other branches. Considering the fact that out of town pupils have to pay an extra fee of \$2.00 for tuition, is further charge justifiable?

# Why Eggs Should Not Be Washed.

Grocers receiving eggs they expect to keep on hand at any length of time should not wash them, even if they are dirty. The dirt is wholly on the outside, and only affects the appearance of the egg. The shell of an egg contains a gelatinous substance which prevents air and germs from entering the egg. Washing destroys this substance.  
Many customers will not buy soiled eggs, but it is desirable that the grocer should explain these facts to his patrons. The public has been trained to demand and buy clean eggs. It should be remembered that dirty eggs, while not pleasing to the eye, are often the best. According to the Department of Agriculture, more than five million eggs spoil unnecessarily in cold storage every year because they have in some way become wet before being sent to market.

# Magnesia and Cancer.

A remarkable association of magnesia with cancer has been demonstrated to the French Academy of Medicine by Dr. R. Dubard. Many experiments have convinced him that the nervous system present the development of certain forms of cancer, and has in it that regions where cancer is most common are those where there is a deficiency in magnesia. It is in fact found in cancer develops at an age when magnesia in the organism tends to give way to lime. Daily doses of eight to twelve grammes of magnesia over a period of many months has given striking results, and it is estimated that a fifth of the patients operated on for cancer are afterward kept in the return of the disease for five years or more. To keep up the body supply of magnesia special measures are required.

# CANADA'S FIRST FLIER

## CAREER OF MAJOR DOUGLAS HALLAM IS NOTABLE.

He Became an Airman Before the Outbreak of the War, but Served in Other Branches of the Army Before He Finally Devoted Himself to the Type of War Work in Which He Made His Reputation.  
MAJOR T. D. HALLAM, of Toronto, is said to have contributed more than any other flier to the success of the British air campaign against enemy submarines. Hallam is far too modest to sing his own praises. Hence it is that his fellow citizens in this country have heard comparatively little of his remarkable career since he crossed the ocean on the outbreak of war in August, 1914.

Some of his Toronto associates in the Arts and Letters Club and other organizations remember that he anticipated the war for some months and endeavored to prepare himself to do his part when the time came. Choosing the air as his field of activity, he went to the United States and took a course of flying under the direction of the Curtiss School. With this training behind him he enlisted as a private in the First Canadian Trench Battalion, and was stationed in the trenches. Once in England he joined the Naval Air Service as a Royal Naval Volunteer. He was organized a traveling circus of machine guns with which he saw a great deal of active service in Gallipoli. Those who have read John Galsworthy's description of that frightful campaign against the Turks, and the conditions amidst which Hallam and his associates struggled. He was attached in turn to the Australians, the French and the celebrated 21st British Division. He was sent to whatever portion of the lines most needed machine guns. He was killed by the sun, almost eaten alive by the voracious lice, and wounded three times. The third wound cut an artery and he was evacuated from Gallipoli to England. He carried with him the D.S.O. together with a mention in despatches. This was at the end of June, 1915, but he had not yet had his fill of war. As soon as his convalescence was complete he secured a commission at the great British air station at Hendon, where his previous experience under the auspices of the United States stood him in good stead. For the first twelve months he held the rank of lieutenant, and had charge of the flying school for young men who have since become famous passing through his hands. Later on he became commanding officer with full authority at Hendon. In March, 1917, he was made commanding officer of what is now the most important naval air base on the coast. Up to that time little had been achieved in the way of fighting the submarines from the air, and the Admiralty had to be convinced that this kind of warfare could be made effective. Hallam's task and that of his associates was to show the anti-submarine flying-boat base in Great Britain, with more than a score of others scattered at strategic points along the coast of England and Scotland.

# OUR NATIVE NUTS.

Canada Has Generous Supply of Nut-bearing Trees.  
Throughout Canada there is a generous supply of nut-bearing trees which yield an abundance of edible nuts rich in food value, as the butternut, hickory, chestnut, hazelnut and beech nuts. Nuts are more nutritious than milk, eggs, bread and meat. They are a source of delicious sandwiches, in salads, in fruit jellies and cakes, and a handful may be kneaded into bread before it goes into the oven. A few kernels put through the meat chopper and scattered over the breakfast cereal adequately supply the place of bacon.

This important food crop is waiting in the woods to be gathered. In the woods during the bright autumn days will supply the home with nuts for use in the kitchen. A good supply for our country's defence. After gathering, the nuts should be spread on the attic floor or on shelves in a dry place to dry the surplus moisture to escape. They may be cracked at leisure by the boys and girls in the winter and stored in air-tight glass jars.

A few of the finest nuts should be saved for planting nearer home. Nothing will give children greater pleasure than to choose and plant their own nut trees. If space allows, a future nut orchard might be planned on young trees transplanted as shade trees. 





# EVANGELINE'S LAND TO HAVE A GATE




Evangeline's Land to have a gate

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
