## More heroic conduct of our solddicrs-recopture of the Mortar Batiery from the Russians. Camp before Sebastopol, Mareh 23.

 The affair of Thursday night and Friday aorning last was not so serious for us as wasat first imagined.
Our loss, in instead of bein nearly 100 killed, wounded, and missing, die not amount to mueh more than half that num by. When the Mortar Battery was carried an enormous force of enemy, they held it for
about 15 minutes, and were dislodged by a handful of men, who displayed the utmos gallantry and daring. Our men do not relish
