Report of the Royal Commissioners.

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In regard to the claims of the Acadian French, we think the Commissioners came to a very proper decision. The French may have been ill-used, but the treatment which they received cannot be charged upon the proprietors more than any other class of men.

The Commissioners very justly, we think, confirmed the right of the Indians to the undisturbed possession of Lennox Island in Richmond Bay. They, in our opinion, were entitled to even more than this. Their case differed from that of the French, in that the latter had a sense very few conquerors like the English, had a right to lose as well as to gain, by the fortunes of war; but the Indians were the original possessors of the soil, and we do not hesitate to say that as such they have been an ill-used people.

We believe there are two clauses in the Report, to which Mr How did not advert in his exposition of the award; namely, that in reference to proprietors of not more than 1500 acres, not being affected by it; and those desirous of retaining 1500 acres, to that extent being also exempt from its operation; and the clause in reference to leases under 40 years not being interested with. Both of these clauses we consider very objectionable.

of his life upon it, and nearly all his strength, liable to be turned out, and sent to seek a home in his old age some other where. It may be argued that it was necessary to have a clause exempting from the general operation of the award those who have let improved farms for a term of years. True, such persons ought to be protected; but it would have been very easy to make a distinction between the general tenant, and the person who has rented improved land for a shorter period.

We regret very much the existence of these two clauses in the Award; first, because we consider they were unnecessary to protect the interests of the proprietors; and secondly, because they must render it partial in its operation, thus causing dissatisfaction to a number of the tenants. We admit that the proprietors, if they so desired, should be allowed to retain four or five hundred acres of land, but not for the purpose of letting it out to tenants, except as improved land.

The weather of late has been unusually wet and stormy. It has rained almost every day for three weeks; and so boisterous has it been, that the Steamer *Weston* has been unable to perform her last few trips with regularity. On her passage from Charlottetown to Pictou on Friday last week, she leaked so much that it was found necessary on her arrival there to take her up on the marine railway for repairs. She did not return to Charlottetown until Sunday morning. On Monday she proceeded to Shediac, whence she started yesterday at 2 o'clock. This morning she left for Pictou, consequently the English Mail due here yesterday morning has not been received.

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The Steamer *Weston* took the largest and most valuable freight for Summerside and Shediac, upon her last trip, that she has probably carried for the past two or three seasons. Among the rest she had 200 barrels of eggs, and some 20 heavy bales of goods.—*R. Weekly.*

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—We copy the following from the Toronto *Parade* of the 30th ult.—We have received from the author, Mr C. Birch Bagster Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, a valuable work, entitled *The Progress and prospects of Prince Edward Island*; a sketch intended to supply information upon which inquiring emigrants may rely and actual settlers adopt as the basis of a wide range of statistics for the island home. It was written in 1861, and goes very fully into the various matters on which it treats, amongst which are: Charlottetown, Agriculture and the Proprietary, Coastlines, Population, Census, Natural History, Ornithology, Entomology, Ichthyology, Botany, Farming, Religion, Morality and Worship, Societies Militia, Law, Education, Exports, Imports, and the Proprietary, Penitentiary, Geological Notes, Fisheries, &c. The work before us will undoubtedly do much, if well circulated, to induce emigration to the sister colony. One thing we must warn the work; the author has given no statistics or other information relative to the Royal Orange Institution in the Island. We believe it feasible most numerous and most powerful Society, and the public should be made aware of several matters in connection with it. If a respectful application were made to the proper Orange authorities of the Island by the author, the necessary information would, without doubt, be given him.
