Proposals for improving the discipline of the established church regard to moral offences of clergy members and persons to be examined on their trial; for revising the existing agreements between the Government and the Bank of England; and for amending the law with respect to the liability of employers for injuries incurred in their employment, will also be commended to your attention.

I pray that Almighty God may guide you in the performance of your weighty functions.
