The Extension of Quebec.

The Legislature of Quebec is now passing the necessary measures for annexation of Ungava, as provided by a Federal Act of last session. This makes Quebec by far the largest province of Canada. At the time of Confederation the area was supposed to be about 223,000 square miles. In 1896 the boundaries were ex ended to take in 118,000 square miles. Some contend that this was not an enlargement of the province. but merely a declaration that this territory was properly part of the
