Solignum as a preservative for wood against the attack of worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 spruce, about two feet long, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the other two-thirds untreated. The piece was suspended by a wire through the water about one foot from the bottom, immersing a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf. In the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first after a month. On taking it up at the end of that time we found the untreated wood eaten through in places where the water was in contact with it. The piece treated with Solignum was perfect both above and below. It seems to me that trees are one of the wonderfullest things in nature, whose beauty few of us appreciate.

So many people confine their admiration and enjoyments to the conventional. They have about sunsets and sunrises—if they ever get up early enough to see them—and flowers and vast woodland vistas, because everyone admires such things. But equally wonderful, though less obvious and conventional beauties, such as an individual tree, for instance, or a wonderful cloud effect, they never notice at all.

How many men and women there are who couldn't tell you what kind of trees they pass on their way down town or to work, or even what kind of trees grow in front of their homes.

And yet, can you think of anything more lovely than a white alder tree standing slim and tall and straight, like a beautiful young girl, with every leaf a quivering in the wind like the shimmering and fluttering of her garments?

Household Notes.

I have a drawer in which I keep a full set of undergarments for each member of the household, in a neat, compact, and convenient package.

I have learned, by experience, that cherries may be kept fresh and hard by dipping in cold water. This is valuable to know when a quantity is picked at night, as no other fruit gets soft or milder so rapidly.

That a bit of reliable coloring placed in the water in which a tub frock is washed will restore its color and may be used with safety if it is properly rinsed and dried. This applies only to such goods as are not trimmed with white or other colored trimmings.

If one has some cherished table linen and it shows decided signs of wear, place it smoothly on a sewing table wrong side up, over the iron, and dab it down through the holes (if not, using fine flax thread for the purpose) remove the bastings.

It is considered a mark of beauty to have half-moons at the base of the finger nails. Some women have these naturally, while others have to cultivate them. The only thing to do is to keep pushing the cuticle back from the nail every day, being liberal with a good cold cream.

Carpets—After shaking, spread out and sweep with a clean broom dipped

in soft water and ox-gall, three gallons of water to one pint of ox-gall, or wipe the carpet as it lies on the floor, after sweeping well, with a cloth wrung out of above solution. Ammonia may be used if preferred.

Furniture—Good polish is made of one pound of melted wax, one pint turpentine, one gill alcohol beaten in the last. Apply with soft cloth and rub over it a moderately hot iron. When quite warm, rub hard with grain of wood.

I made a most artistic hanging basket by wetting thoroughly the crown of an old Panama hat, setting into it a tin can in which a vine had been planted, then tying the hat securely around the upper edge of can with lina twice—the brim standing on the rim. It makes an attractive addition to either porch or window.

A damp hand is not healthy and cannot be beautiful. Apply the following lotion two or three times a day: Ten grains of tannic acid, two ounces elder flower water, six ounces rose water and one half ounce tincture of benzoin. If used persistently it will arrest excessive perspiration and dry up the moistness in the palms of the hands.

Do not throw away crusts of bread. Keep all the bits that accumulate in an open receptacle in a dry place. Every once in a while dry in a pan in a slow oven. Then put through the finest part of the meat chopper, fill glass jars and they will be all ready for bread puddings, stuffings for turkey, chicken or lamb and for covering scalloped dishes.

Wet linen should never be thrown into the clothes hamper, as it apt to mildew and communicate mildew to the other things in the basket. Dampness also turns the willow of the basket black. If anything sweet has been spilled on table linen rinse it out or throw in rough dry into the hamper. Otherwise it may become the prey of roaches or water bugs in a city flat.

French women keep their lawn dresses fresh all summer by following these directions: When the dress soiled or mused, put on ironing board and wipe off, with a thin solution of gum arabic and water (five cents worth of

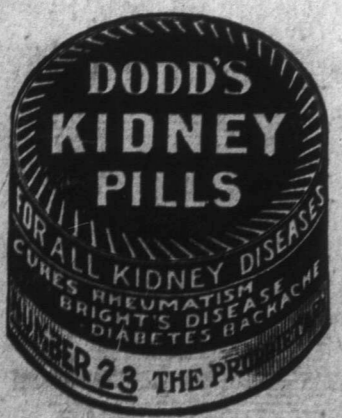

It would appear from the cable message on the House of Lords question that the bottom has dropped out of the fight put up by the Tory party against the Government Bill. The attitude of the Lords seems to be that of making time with a view of taking advantage of opportunities which it is hoped may offer, and with a vague hope that they may tide things over till a General Election and that the Government may then be defeated and a chance afforded them of carrying out a reform on Landowner lines. Meanwhile, they are waiting for something to turn up in the near future. If their worst fears are realized and nothing turns up, and the Government carry their bill, they have a vague hope that a succeeding Government will face a reversal of the order established, repeal the Vote Act, and proceed with the policy already outlined. Why both parties cannot come together and effect a settlement is difficult to understand. The true inwardness of the tactics of the Peers is in all probability due to the House Rule in Ireland. How the lessons of the success of responsible government can be lost upon the Peers is strange. It is a pity that the Coronation was not availed of as an occasion to settle the National question.

The object of the Garden Party is to raise funds to build and repair churches and schools, and no more insufficient finances can be thought of. The parish is extensive, the people under his care are few and sparsely populate the shore so that many churches and schools have been built to bring education and religion within easy scope of all. Poor in itself, with insufficient finances to afford a living apart from building work, Fr. Coady has to solicit outside help to keep up his many institutions. Thus it can be easily seen how worthy this object is and how it ought to appeal to the generous hearts of all.

His Curiosity Kills Three Persons.

Railroad Helper Struck Lighted Torch in Fuel Tank to see Effect. New Orleans, La., July 4.—Marshall Delaney, an inquisitive negro shop helper, stuck a lighted torch into the fuel oil tank of a locomotive in the yards of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad shortly before daylight this morning to see what would happen. The result was a terrific explosion, in which three persons were killed. Frank Blaine, an engine driver, and Frank Carroll, a yardman, received injuries which caused their deaths in a few minutes, and Delaney was almost instantly killed. The locomotive was wrecked.

Hamilton Has Another Deep Murder Mystery.

Boy Supposed to Have Suicided Now Believed to Have Been Murdered. Hamilton, Ont., June 27.—The county police have a mystery to solve which may result in the cleverest of fevers of the provincial police being called in. A week ago Gordon Haggerty, 14 years of age, who was employed as a farm hand by John Thomas, Lowville, ten miles from here, was found dead in the Thomas home. His body was discovered by Thomas, the boy being nude and the arms folded across the chest. Beside him was a box in which it was supposed was strychnine. On the other side was a spoonful of sugar. Not a grain of the sugar was on the floor of the room. Thomas claimed the boy had hanged and stated that all the doors of the house were locked, as were the windows, and that when he returned from his farm he had to force an entrance through the window. Dr. Jones, the acting coroner, said that when he arrived on the scene the window was shut and the old cob webs made it appear that no one had made an entrance there. At the inquest held last night it was shown that none of the strychnine had entered the stomach, the provincial analyst testifying to that effect.

Bathers Drown in Each Other's Embrace.

Double Tragedy in Boston Caused by Deadly Clutch of Sinking Girl. Boston, July 4.—In sight of many people, Anna H. White, 16 years old, of 7 Farrell Street, Chelsea, and Sarah Gordette, 15, who lived in the rear of 24 Lincoln Street, Brighton, were drowned yesterday afternoon while bathing opposite the starting line of the Charles River speedway in Brighton. The frantic clutch of Miss White dragged Miss Gordette under the water to her death. The two girls, shrieking and struggling to reach shallow water, nearly pulled down with them Mary Doyle, 16 years old, of Kelly Court, Brighton. Miss Doyle escaped from their grasp and managed to swim till she could be reached by some of the score or more boys and girls bathing nearby.

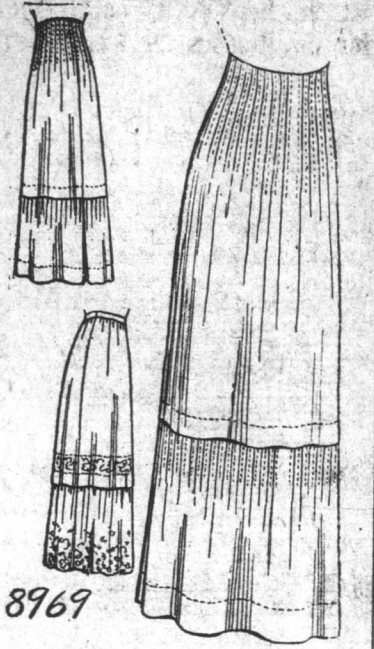

A Sculler's Story.

Ernest Barry, Champion of England, Talks.

My first win as a professional sculler, writes Ernest Barry in Answers, was when I took the London Rowing Club coat and badge, and I followed this up by winning Dorset's coat and badge the next year. After beating Towns for the English Championship, I challenged Armit, the Australian, for the Championship of the World, and, as is pretty generally known, I went out to row him on a neutral river—the Zambesi—last summer, where, to my great disappointment, he beat me after a gruelling race.

I am not seeking after excuses for my defeat, for I fully recognize that Armit is a really good man, but that match was a terrible ordeal for me. The intense heat rendered serious training something like a farce, while, when it came to racing, I found that the rarified air caused me to have to breathe quite three times as often as I should over in England. In fact, the peculiar atmospheric conditions made it almost impossible to work the oars. Our little friend strained and pulled at the machine in great style for about two minutes, and then the bolt gave way. He tumbled over backwards, but was tremendously apologetic, as he was quite under the impression that his great strength had broken the machine. I really ought not to laugh, however, for he was a very decent little fellow, taking him all round.

By the way, if you are anything of a gourmet, it would not be wise to go to the Zambesi district. The particular place where I was staying holds a great reputation for its chickens, but this is a fallacy. As a matter of fact, to eat one of these prehistoric roosters is just about as pleasant as chewing string.

My two trainers and myself each had a native "boy" as a servant. These fellows absolutely refused to wash. They became so uncomfortable that I had to use them, like these "boys" down to the river every morning, soap them all over, and then duck them, in spite of their vigorous protests.

The would-be sculling champion must keep fit if he is to do any good personally. I find that a two-mile run every morning, combined with a fast, followed by a good, stiff rub-down, is about the best start to a day. After breakfast I have a good hour on the river, paced by a double sculler. Then another rub-down and breathing exercises. In the afternoon I have another turn on the river, and that about finishes the day. In the early stages of training I indulge in some wrestling and boxing, but I have to stop afterwards, as a sprain would be fatal to me.

In Passing.

Canada has 100,000 Indians, according to latest statistics for the fiscal year. This is about the same number, as shown by the count last year.

A comprehensive system of forestry protection is being organized by the Dominion Government from Hudson Bay to the summit of the Rockies.

A large sugar company in Cuba is experimenting with a new process in which the cane is dried and handled in a manner similar to that adopted in making sugar from beets. This process promises to greatly increase the yield of sugar from the cane.

This was followed by a birthday dinner. The Prince received many gifts of much value, the most notable being from his father, King George.

The Kaiser was immensely pleased, and forthwith conferred the Grand Cross of the Order of the Red Eagle on the donor.

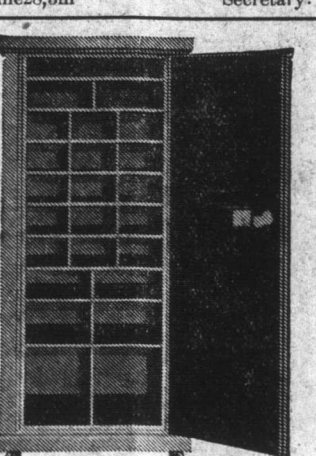

Britisher Claims Foul.

Moran Knocked Out For the First Time in Eleven Years in the Ring—Rolled on his Side and was Unconscious Several Minutes.

San Francisco, July 4.—Owen Moran, the British pugilist, went down to defeat before Ad. Wolgast, the world's champion, in the 13th round this afternoon. A stiff solar plexus blow, followed by two lightning stomach punches and a heavy swing to the jaw, ended Moran's prospects. Until the thirteenth round, the men seemed evenly matched. Moran excelled at long range fighting, but at fighting the champion proved himself the sufferer, and in the twelfth round showed himself able to stand a tremendous amount of punishment. A large crowd witnessed the fight, gate receipts being estimated at nearly \$40,000. Wolgast was the favourite in the betting at odds of 10 to 6. Jack Welsh refereed. The men fought at 133 lbs.

The measured time of Referee Welch's arm tolling off the ten seconds over the writhing body of Owen Moran brought victory to Wolgast. It was a straight knock-out, and the decisive victory was earned by the rugged strength and punishing power of the champion. Right uppercuts to the stomach, followed by a left hook to the jaw, forced the game little English fighter to take the count for the first time in his eleven years in the ring. Moran came up undistressed for the 13th round, although it was plain he was tiring. Wolgast met him with a well timed rush and forced his way to close quarters. Moran checked him with a left jab but was backed against the ropes in his own corner. Suddenly Wolgast whipped his right arm free from the clinch and swinging from his hip sent his glove crashing three times to the pit of Moran's stomach. Moran's face got white and twisted with agony under the smother of blood from his cut lips. He groped blindly to smother the smashing blows, then his knees gave way under him and he slipped from Wolgast's grasp to the canvas that covered the ring. The champion whipped over a left hook to the jaw as Moran fell, but it was not needed. Moran rolled on one side and his legs scrambled for a footing, but his mouth was open and his eyes rolled back and the shouting conditions brought no meaning to his deadened senses. He was unconscious several minutes. Moran's seconds entered a claim of foul, but the blows in question were plainly seen from the ring-side and the protest was not allowed.

It was in the clinches that the champion showed the best advantage. Moran was unable to perfect a defense against the short ripping uppercuts. At long range Moran clearly outpointed the Michigan boy, and his clever ducking and footwork extricated him from many a tight corner. It was a battle of a clever and experienced boxer against a tearing, ripping fighter, and the fighter weathered the storm with never a sign of distress.

The Coronation Chair.

The King may be said to have a suite of thrones—or shall we say a set of "ceremonial thrones"—on each of which he probably sits at least once. Certainly he only sits on a single occasion upon one of them—that is the Coronation Chair in Westminster Abbey—the worm-eaten, battered, lion-footed old oak settle which contains the Stone of Destiny, and upon which all the King's predecessors since Edward II. have been crowned. That chair might, perhaps, claim to be the throne of the Empire, as it is infinitely the most ancient, and inasmuch as the King must sit upon it to be crowned.

It is not at all likely that the King would sit upon it often, even if it were in his "almighty nook" because it is an extremely uncomfortable chair. It stands year in and year out, in the chapel of Edward the Confessor, where it was first placed by Edward I. and it is only removed for the Coronation, when, covered with gold brocade, it is set under the altar, between the choir and the altar.

And Given Four Years in Prison For Smuggling Opium From Canada.

Binghampton, N. Y., June 24.—The climax of what secret service men designate as the most important smuggling case of the kind that has ever been brought to trial was reached last night when the jury in the case of the Federal Government against Walter L. Funk, charged with bringing opium across the Canadian border, returned a verdict of guilty.

Funk was arraigned before Judge Rainey and a sentence of 4 years in prison and a fine of \$20,000 was imposed.

At the expiration of the sentence the fine will be remitted provided Funk takes the "paupers' oath."

Funk was charged with having brought over \$100,000 worth of smoking opium into this country.

Woman Uses Apron to Hang Herself.

Trenton, N. J., July 3.—Mrs. Adella M. Fielder, formerly of Asbury Park, a patient in the New Jersey State Hospital for the Insane, this city, strangled herself to death with an apron she had torn from a nurse.

Miss Ruth Manning, a nurse, while passing Mrs. Fielder's room, heard a strange noise and went to the door. Mrs. Fielder sprang at her and knocking her to the floor, strangling her and tearing off some of her clothing, other patients rushed to the attendant's rescue. Finally, Miss Manning freed herself and locked Mrs. Fielder in her room.

Miss Manning went in search of help. She was weakened by the struggle and unable to hasten. About fifteen minutes later she found a physician, and they returned to the room. Unlocking the door they entered and found Mrs. Fielder hanging dead, an apron torn from Miss Manning having been used as a noose.

Many Thrones for the King.

The One Most Familiar to the Public is That on the Dias in the House of Lords.

Most people talk about the throne of England as if it were a special armchair on which the King sat daily, but as a matter of fact, there is no officially recognized throne, and it has become a metaphorical symbol of monarchy, just as "the Crown" has become practically captured by the law courts.

One would naturally, perhaps, look for the throne proper at Windsor, but surely should be the King's "Windsor chair," and, as a matter of fact, there is both a throne and a throne-room in the ancient fortress and palace, but it is probably the very last chair our King would be likely to be found seated upon if one could pay an afternoon call. And, so far from this throne being unique, there is actually one at each of the Royal palaces, and it is probable that the one at Buckingham Palace is the most generally used, inasmuch as most ceremonial occasions take place there.

Though the throne at Windsor is but little used, it is unique in one respect. It is really an Eastern throne, after the style of the one we read of in the records of King Solomon, for it is composed entirely of ivory, and was the gift of one of the Princes of India.

It would seem to have been the custom in ancient times to crown kings on a stone, for not only is there the ancient Stone of Scone in the Coronation Chair, but visitors to Kingston-on-Thames can see in the market place the ancient Coronation Stone of England. Why the Scottish Stone should be preferred to the stone upon which Alfred the Great was crowned it is hard to say, and why the one should be housed in the Abbey and the other exposed to wind and weather near Kingston's busy market place is still more of a puzzle. Surely that old stone is the true throne of England—Tit-Bits.

The warrants were placed immediately in the hands of the Scotland Yard officials. The latter insist there is no evidence that the parties wanted in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building are here, beyond the belief of the Californian authorities that they came this way. The British police received the usual printed circular giving descriptions of the men, and saying that they were supposed to be in England.

Immediately following the issuance of the warrants, detectives in all parts of the Kingdom were instructed to keep a sharp look-out for the fugitives.

Drove Auto in Front

Of Trolley Car, and Three Persons Were Killed.

Warwick, R. I., July 5.—His view cut off by dense bushes growing on both sides of the road. Gustave Menzel, of Riverside, drove his automobile directly in front of an open trolley car moving at the rate of 40 miles an hour yesterday afternoon, and as a result three of the occupants of the auto are dead, and Menzel and the fifth occupant are badly injured. The dead are Mrs. Eva Hartley, 50 years of Providence; Miss Millie J. Hartley 18 (Mrs. Hartley's daughter); Miss Ella M. L. Bidwell, 25, of Providence.

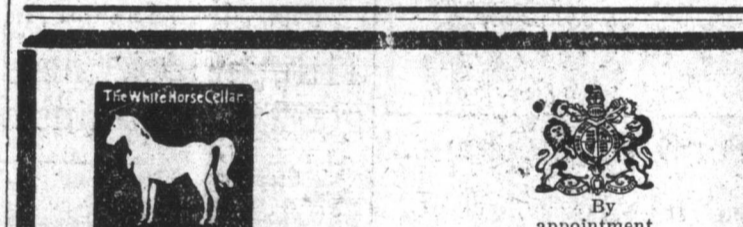
