The Products Contract.

A favourable feature of the situation in regard to the deliberations on the Newfoundland Products Contract, has been the disposition so far dis played by the parties to the agree ment, of taking into consideration objections which have been raised to many of its clauses. In a number of cases, the suggestions have already borne fruit, and some new resolu tions have been tabled making modifications suggested. There are, however, a number of suggestions which are in our opinion worthy of consideration in the interest of the country. One of the most objectionable clauses in the agreement is number

"Notwithstanding the grant of the pair. water powers herein all persons shall have the right to the temporary The West End Bazaar, use of the said waters for the purpose of passing to and fro in small boats, and for the purpose of floating logs and lumber belonging to such persons to their mills, provided that such use shall not seriously interfere with or prejudice the business or operations

of the Company.' This clause virtually gives the grantees exclusive control of their waters, for the proviso is so broad and general that the grantees will be able to sustain objections to the ordinary use of the waters by rivermen generally. In the leases of water rights in Canada the position is reversed, and the lessees are not permitted to interfere seriously with other loggers in the use of the streams and they are called upon to make provisions that other loggers may use the streams effectively. Moreover, in the Act of 1904, relating to the Reid grants in regard to wa-ter-power, the first clause provided "It shall be lawful for all person whomsoever to float saw logs an other timber, rafts and draws over all streams and lakes within the Col-



ony, when necessary for the desc of such logs or other timber."

It will be noted that there is no proviso in this clause, that the use shall be TEMPORARY, or that "it judice the business or operations of the Reid Nfld. Co."

The King, as Sovereign of the Order of the Garter, says an official announcement, issued this evening, has given directions that the following names be struck off the roll of Knights of the Order: The Emperor of Austria, the German Emperor, the King of Wuertemberg, the Grand Duke of Hesse, Prince Henry of Prussia, the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and the Duke of Cumberland. The Order of the Garter was constituted by King Edward III. about August, 1348. Since 1831 it has consisted of the British Sovereign and 25 Knight Companions, who were lineal descendants of King George I, and of Knights who have been ad mitted by special statutes.



WELL-TO-DO WORKERS IN THE RANKS.

The Industrial Reserve formed to assist in meeting the heavy demand for workers in the munitions industries has, after nearly a fortnight's trial, proved its usefulness. The reserve was first suggested by Mr. J. Chartres in a letter in The Times on

March 25. His proposal was that men should be enrolled to do work neant to reply to the objections which otherise would be neglected from lack of labour and to fill temreferred particularly to the tying up porarily the places of men on active service

The recruits have been of two classes—semi-skilled and unskilled. The semi-skilled men are those who have some knowledge of machinery, men who have been through the workshops in their early days, or who these water powers were given to the have taken up model engineering as a hobby, or have a natural antitude for mechanical work. The unskilled workers whose rate is smaller than that of the semi

skilled men, are as a rule, higher in Company to secure the the social scale. One member works daily through the week for 6d. an hour, and goes from his home to his work in his own motor car. Arrangements are being made to supply men to keep machines engaged upor production for the government at work on Saturdays and Sundays, thus enabling the ordinary staff to put in a fair amount of overtime during the week and to get two days rest at the week-end. This may be extended to providing a number of
