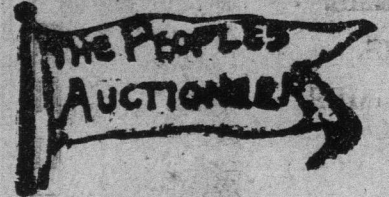

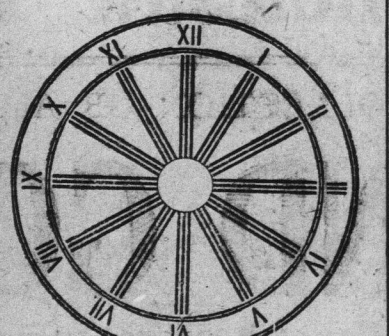

LONDON ENTHUSIASTIC.  
LONDON, Aug. 28.  
Roumania's declaration of war against the Austro-Hungarians, while not unexpected, created the greatest enthusiasm in London. Long after the news had been received from Berlin, the Roumanian Legation was without official confirmation from Bucharest. Before conferring with the members of the Crown Council with whom the final decision rested, King Ferdinand had a prolonged conference with the leaders of all the Roumanian political parties, including those favorable to intervention in the great war and those who supported Roumania continuing her neutrality. Roumanian military officers have discussed for some days what probably would be the first step taken when war was declared, and had dismissed all alien employees, many of them German. Despatches from Berlin stated that the Roumanian Minister to the German capital would be handed his passports to-day. The Roumanian Minister at Vienna doubtless has asked for his passports. **MOVING TROOPS.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 28. A Journal despeich from Geneva says Roumania already has begun a movement of troops preparatory to opening hostilities against the Central Powers.

**HOSTILITIES COMMENCED.**

BERLIN, Aug. 28. Fighting has begun between Roumania and the Teutonic troops on the Transylvanian frontier, an official announcement to-day indicates. The announcement adds that Roumanians were captured on the Transylvanian frontier. A military censorship has been established in Roumania.

**ROUMANIAN PRISONERS TAKEN.**

VIENNA, Aug. 28. The first clashes between the troops of Roumania and the Central Powers occurred last night on the southeastern and eastern front mountains of Hungary, says an official statement given out here to-day. The attacks by the Roumanians are described in the statement as treacherous. Some Roumanian prisoners were taken. The advance guards of the two forces came into contact in Rothenthurn Pass, 15 miles south of Hermannstadt.

**BRITISH OFFICIAL.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. The British official to-night reads: To-day our long range guns successfully fired on troops and traffic at different places between Esparme and Miramont. The enemy's artillery shelled our front during the day, more especially between Posieres and Tisjeval Wood. On other parts of the front our artillery and trench mortars have been active, especially opposite Calonne and Neuve Chapelle and between Auchy and Hohenzollern. One hundred and thirty-seven prisoners were captured by us during the past 24 hours. On the evening of the 26th a heavy storm overtook eight of our aeroplanes and five have not returned.

**GREECE'S POSITION.**

ATHENS, Aug. 28. A report is current here that the heavy German reinforcements heretofore held in reserve along the Danube have been called into action. The Greek army staff does not recognize any danger growing out of the Bulgars' penetration of Thessaly. The Serbian army is reported to be engaged in a heavy action at Karadjova, the report says, continues.

**HEAVY BRITISH CASUALTIES.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. The War Office has announced casualties for the week just finished totalling 31,872. Of these 1,047 were officers, of whom 275 were killed. Casualties among the men were 31,225, of whom 4,891 were killed.

**NO INFANTRY ACTION.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. Artillery fighting is in progress along the Macedonia front, but no infantry action of importance is underway so far as is indicated by to-day's official account of the operations on this front.

**ROUMANIA'S ACTION KNOWN TO BERLIN.**

BERLIN, Aug. 28. German Government circles have expected some action on the part of Roumania for nearly two weeks. It was known here that the Entente proposed using Roumanian territory for the Russian advance against Austria-Hungary and Bulgaria. Roumania, it was argued, would, in that event, consider the Central Powers. Little is known here of the intentions of the Central Powers against Roumania, but it is felt Roumania cannot avoid war with all the nations of the Central Powers should Russian troops advance through her territory. News of the Roumanian declaration of war against Austria-Hungary was received here calmly, although followed close upon Italy's declaration of war against Germany.

**RUSSIAN FRONTS UNCHANGED.**

PETROGRAD, Aug. 28. There has been no change in the situation on the Western Russian and Caucasus fronts, says an official given out to-night. On the Caucasian front, on a line from Kyghi to Lake Van, fighting continues. Our detachments drove the Turks from their trenches on the bank of the River Maslaadrist, which joins the Euphrates at the village of Narkel, and crossed to the western bank. We took in this operation 11 officers and 200 Askaris, also captured three machine guns. In the direction of Mosul we are pressing the Turks and also in the region of Neri and Sakki.

**NOT A LEGITIMATE PRIZE.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. A despatch from Stockholm says the German prize crew which early this month took the Swedish steamer Temis, captured by a German warship, into the Swedish port of Gotland, owing to shortage of coal, has been ordered to quit the vessel. After long negotiations a decision has been reached that the steamer and her cargo were not a legitimate prize.

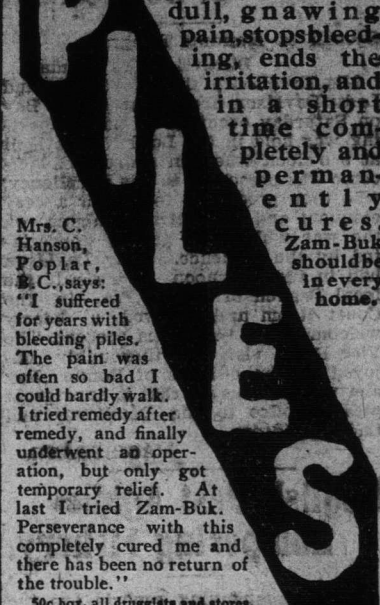
**LINKING OF RAILWAYS.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. An agreement between Sweden and Russia for the linking of the railway systems of the two countries by bridging the River Fornea, which forms part of the boundary between Sweden and Russia, has just been ratified, according to a Reuter-Stockholm despatch. Construction of the bridge will begin on Sept. 1st.

**BULGARIANS REPULSED.**

PARIS, Aug. 28. The Serbian forces made considerable progress near Vukuk yesterday from the Grand Banks, halting for 400 quintals of codfish.

**FRANCE ENTHUSIASTIC.**

PARIS, Aug. 28. The entrance of Roumania into the war was received with popular rejoicing. For the first time in months the papers were permitted to publish extracts and in half an hour all parties learned the news. The city is being girded with Roumania's colors.

**GREEK STEAMER SUNK.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. The steamer Leonoras has been sunk, according to a despatch from Valencia, Spain. The crew were saved. She was a Greek vessel of 1,564 tons gross, was 73 feet long and built at South Shields.

**GERMAN ATTACK FAILS.**

PARIS, Aug. 28. A German attack on the French positions to-day at Fleury failed, according to the official communication issued to-night.

**GERMAN REPORT DENIED.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. The British Admiralty to-day made a denial of the German wireless report last week that Dutch sailors had sighted east of the Dogger Bank a British destroyer which had been abandoned by her crew and was sinking. There was no engagement of any sort, the Admiralty announcement says, and no British destroyer is missing.

**THE SUPPLY QUESTION.**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28. Sir Joseph Pope, Under Secretary for external affairs of the Canadian Government, has arrived in Washington to discuss with Secretary Lansing the alleged refusal of the Canadian Government to the right of American vessels to get supplies at Dominion points. It is understood that by the end of the week, W. A. Found, Canadian Superintendent of Fisheries, will also come here to help settle the dispute.

**IRISH QUESTION REVIVED.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. Strong efforts are being made through the parliamentary recess for a resumption of negotiations for the settlement of the Irish question, according to reports in Irish political circles. It is understood that both the Unionists and Nationalists are inclined to regard these efforts sympathetically.

**CHINESE WORKING IN FRENCH MUNITION FACTORIES.**

PARIS, Aug. 28. One thousand Chinese laborers arrived at Lyons to-day. They constitute the first contingent of Chinese who are to be brought to France for work in munition factories.

**PROFOUND IMPRESSION CREATED IN GERMANY.**

LONDON, Aug. 28. Italy's declaration of war against Germany, and the declaration of war by Roumania against Austro-Hungary created a profound impression in the German capital, says a despatch from Berlin by way of the Hague to the Exchange Telegraph Co. The Berlin papers, it adds, express themselves bitterly against Von Jagow, the German Foreign Minister, and Doctor Alfred Zimmermann, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs. Those statesmen are considered by the Germans to be partly responsible for what is declared by the Entente to be Germany's diplomatic defeat.

**AN EVENT OF FAR-REACHING SIGNIFICANCE.**

PETROGRAD, Aug. 28. Roumania's declaration of war against Austria is regarded in Russian circles as an event of far-reaching significance. The Foreign Office points out three striking benefits which will accrue to Russia as a consequence. To aid the substantial Russian army which is pitted against Austria will ease Russia's task and will afford greater freedom of action on the left wing of the Western Russian front by tightening the ring around the Central Empires and opening up a new line of attack and cutting of grain supplies from the Austro-Germans, upon which they are believed to have placed great reliance.

**ROUMANIA'S ARMY.**

PARIS, Aug. 28. It is estimated that the strength of the army which can be mobilized by Roumania is about 900,000, including

THE ENTRY of ROUMANIA.

The simultaneous declarations of war by Italy upon Germany and by Roumania upon Austria, can hardly have been more coincident.

Italy has undoubtedly made some agreement with her Allies which assures to her certain Eastern possessions, which probably include the island of Rhodes, territory in Asia Minor and Valonia, the key of Albania.

The meaning and effect of her decision at this moment can hardly be exaggerated. We are told, and can well believe it, that the news has made a profound impression in Berlin, but we are not too hopeful that the obtuseness of the Germans will permit them to view it in the right light.

The actual military effect of her intervention will be tremendous. She declared war, be it noted, upon Austria, thereby disclosing the direction in which her ambitions lie, though the formality is of small moment, since Germany has at once spoken and may be said to speak for Bulgaria as well.

sector, little important fighting is reported from any front along the line where the Teutonic Allies are in contact with the Serbians. The British and French officials report gains for their respective forces. Berlin reports the capture of heights south of Zbraco by the Bulgarians and the repulse of Serbian counter attacks on Mount Ceganska, while Paris says the Serbians made considerable progress near Vretnek and repulsed with heavy losses Bulgarian attacks on the road from Banca Ostrovo. Paris admits the occupation by the Bulgarians of the positions abandoned by the Greeks west of Kavala on the Aegean Sea. Artillery engagements again characterized the fighting on the western front. London reports the shelling of British positions by the Germans between Pozieres and Thierval Wood. A German attack near Fleury failed. From the Riga region to the Carpathian passes there have been isolated engagements between the Russians and Austro-Germans, but no notable successes by either side. Hard fighting is in progress between the Russians and Turks in the Lake Van region. North of Bitlis the Turks have been driven southward by Russian counter attacks with loss of men and guns. The situation in the Austro-Italian theatre remains unchanged.

**ROUMANIA'S INTERVENTION.**

LONDON, To-day.  
The morning papers devote the major part of their editorial space to a discussion of Roumania's entry into the war, emphasizing the economic, political and moral as well as the military effects of this intervention. With reference to the military effect it also offers Russia a route into the heart of the enemy's country, a route the defence of which involves a large extension of the enemy's line and an enormous increase in the enemy's responsibility. The Daily News says it is an envelopment of the Central Powers which a Russian success would complete, that is the capital fact of the situation. It is economically of importance, for Roumania's step is a loss to the Central Powers of the supplies they have been drawing from her big Balkan state. The Express says Roumania has been receiving cattle, wheat and petroleum from Roumania; a great quantity of this supply is now out off.

**THE EFFECT ON GREECE.**

LONDON, To-day.  
The papers believe Roumania's entry is likely to have its most immediate effect upon Greece, strengthening the hands of Venizelos and the pro-Entente party. The Morning Post says that for her indecision and weakness Greece is now suffering heavily, but there are signs that under the teachings of a bitter experience the Greek people are coming to their senses. They will be wise to look to it that their repentance does not come too late. The Daily Telegraph says Germany awakes after an orgy of hysterical delight on the safe return of her submarine from America to hear that the strongest armed European neutrals is ranged against her, ready for instant war at the point of the greatest peril in her defensive scheme.

**LEGISLATION NECESSARY TO AVERT STRIKE.**

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
President Wilson to-night definitely decided to go before Congress in person to-morrow or on Wednesday to recommend legislation aimed to avert the threatened nationwide railroad strike. He worked until late last night on a message in which he will tell the members of the Senate and lay before them a definite legislative programme.

**THE ROUMANIAN NOTE TO AUSTRIA.**

BUDAPEST, To-day.  
Following the note from Count Czernin, Austrian-Hungarian Minister to Roumania, at the conclusion of the meeting of the Roumanian Crown Council which preceded the Roumanian declaration of war: The alliance concluded between Germany, Austro-Hungary and Italy, according to the statements of those Governments, had only a conservative and defensive character; the principal object was to guarantee the Allied countries against attack from the outside and to consolidate the state of affairs created by previous treaties. It was in accordance with these specific tendencies that Roumania joined this alliance. Devoted to the development of her internal affairs and faithful to the resolution to remain as an element of order and equilibrium on the Lower Danube, Roumania never has ceased in her devotion to the maintenance of peace in the Balkans. The last Balkan wars, by destroying the status quo, imposed upon her a new line of conduct, but her intervention gave peace and re-established equilibrium for herself.

She was satisfied with the rectification of her borders, which gave her the greatest security against aggression and repaired certain injustices of the Congress of Berlin, but in pursuit

of this aim Roumania was disappointed by the failure of the Vienna Cabinet to take the attitude which Roumania was entitled to expect. When the present war broke out, Roumania, like Italy, declined to associate herself with the declaration of war by Austria-Hungary, of which she had not been notified by the Vienna Cabinet. In the spring of 1915, Italy declared war against Austro-Hungary. The triple alliance no longer existed, and the reasons which determined Roumania's adherence to this political alliance disappeared. Since the Balkan crisis they are no longer unhesitatingly, but determinedly, Roumania's adherence to this political alliance disappeared. PARIS, To-day.  
The War Office announced to-day that German attacks in the vicinity of the Fleury and Vaux work were repulsed.

**BULGARIA AND ROUMANIA.**

PARIS, To-day.  
The Bucharest correspondent of the Petit Journal writes that he is informed that Bulgaria has decided not to declare war on Roumania even if that country permits passage through it of Russian troops.

**THE KAISER'S MOVEMENTS.**

LONDON, To-day.  
A despatch from Cologne says the Kaiser first heard the news of the declaration of war by Italy and Roumania while visiting Cracow. The visit was at once abandoned, the Kaiser motoring through the city and returning at top speed to German headquarters in the east at Pless in Silesia. He is expected in Berlin this week.

**BRUTAL ORDERS TO GERMAN SOLDIERS.**

LONDON, To-day.  
The Times correspondent on the Somme front says that a letter written by a German prisoner and captured on him shows the German troops of the 13th Corps to which this man belonged had received the following orders: "Take no prisoners, but despatch them all with the bayonet." **VENIZELOS' INDICTMENT.**

ATHENS, To-day.  
Commenting on Bulgaria's occupation of Kavala, former Premier Venizelos said to an Associated Press reporter: "I am confident that the Bulgarians' assurances that they would not occupy Kavala would not hold good for five days. They lasted just four days. Can you conceive anything more criminal in a military sense than the action of the Greek General Staff in demobilizing their army corps and leaving the entire army, and other supplies behind to fall into the hands of the Bulgarians?"

## FROM ST. JOHN'S TO SUVLA BAY.

By Returned Soldier and Chaplain.

There was a full audience at Wesley Church last night to hear a returned hero from the Dardanelles, Rev. W. D. Stenlake, tell of his experiences from the time of leaving here until his being invalided to England. Revs. H. Royle, T. B. Darby, B.A., Hon. J. R. Bennett, Acting Premier, G. H. Hutchings, K.C., and A. W. Martin, Esq., with the lecturer were on the platform. Rev. Mr. Royle then introduced Sir Joseph Outbridge, Chairman of the Patriotic Association, who presided, and after expressing his pleasure at being present, referred to the splendid spirit and example shown by Mr. Stenlake. Some one had said that if a minister's duty was to fight the devil and all his works, that we were just about doing that thing now, it was a war of defence for the weak and security from tyranny. Sir Joseph made a splendid opening speech, and then the soldier parson gave a thorough and consecutive review of the work of the first five hundred, comprising the Nfd. Regiment from the time of leaving here Oct. 1914, to the evacuation of Gallipoli, and his return to hospital. Mr. Stenlake, who by the way, belongs to Jersey, Channel Islands, told his story with all the bright vivacity of a Frenchman, combined with the honest, matter of fact statement of a Britisher. He paid a high tribute to his comrades who had fallen either from sickness or Turkish snipers, but he at the same time mentioned no names, so as not to harrow the feelings of many a soldier whose loved ones lay on the shores of Sulva Bay, or the slopes of Caribou Hill. Telling of his rambles in Lemnos, Alexandria and Cairo his hearers were amused to hear of a Newfoundland policeman who pummeled an Egyptian policeman for whipping a woman, and told him if he tried it on again, he would give him some more fist.

In rapid review he recapitulated the happenings in camp and trench and hospital, and an hour had all too quickly passed when the speaker took his seat. Mrs. Miller then sang with much taste and in good voice the grand old song, "Land of Hope and Glory," Mr. Trapnell also gave a fine rendering of that lovely song "My Task." On behalf of the League, Mr. A. W. Martin proposed a vote of thanks from all to Sir Joseph Outbridge for his great kindness in presiding, and expressed also the pleasures of Wesley congregation in having present the Hon. Mr. Bennett, Colonial Secretary, and Lady Horwood, Mrs. Browning, Mrs. Cliff and other ladies of the W.A. It seemed as if our common anxiety, and common sorrow in a common cause, was bringing us as denominations closer together, and he rejoiced that it was so. Mr. Stenlake had followed the lead of many clergymen in enlisting. Over fifty young men had returned to each of the Western Canadian Methodist Conferences to protect the Empire, and several of them Newfoundlanders. He believed in a just and war was justifiable, and muscular Christianity also under certain circumstances. Hon. J. R. Bennett rose to second the motion, and referred to the splendid services Sir Joseph Outbridge had given our Colony since the war commenced; he eulogized the "fighting parson" as he hoped Mr. Stenlake would now be known. He referred to the heroism of our brave lads who through extreme heat or freezing cold had waded through floods, or slept in dirty holes in the sands. The motion was carried by acclamation amid much enthusiasm. A collection of one hundred dollars was given for the Cot Fund and all joined in the National Anthem.

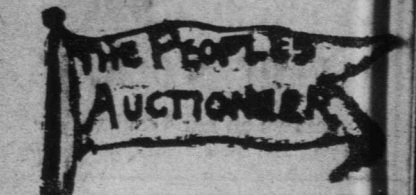
