## Evolution.

HOW PRIMATES ACQUIRED MAN-

(By Ransome Sutton.)

Hebrew writers have told us that on the banks of the Euphrates lay a miraculous garden wherein home sapiens sprang god-like out of the ground; that the first human pair, having been created perfect and in the image of their Maker, multiplied and spread until the flood came and drowned all but one family; that after the waters subsided, from three prothers three races arose; that hereafter the father of the three cursed one of them for not concealing his drunkenness, and that, because of the curse, all the Hamites turned black and became the servants of the other races.

Dr. Hillis, of Plymouth Church, in his great sermon on "Twentieth Century Man and Evolution," said: "If a man reads the story of Adam and Eve in Eden and how they lost their paradise, and reads it with his aftifu parable, full of meaning, full of inspiration; but if he takes it for pure historic fact, the flower is turned to thorns, while Adam and Eve and their children become Laocoon and his sons caught in the deadly coils of a serpent, slowly crushing out the very lifeblood. Plainly, the men of the Middle Ages overstres the story of Adam's fall!" Nor does Dr. Hillis or any other studious believer in the Bible think that racial

difference grew out of Noah's curse. More modern historians have held that somewhere in Asia, the orthodox land of human origins-in Bactria, or on the slopes of the Caucasus Mountains, or among the Siwalik Hills, or elsewhere, but always in Asia—the white and yellow races arose. The black race has always been assumed to have originated in Africa.

Only a few recent writers continue to contend that, because blonds are found in northwest Europe, the white race de luxe, the Nordic, was evolved on Scandinavian shores, separate and apart from the black and yellow races—as if it were possible for protoplasm to have formed in a germless fjord and to have risen, under Baltic conditions through fishes. amphibians, reptiles and mammals into a special kind of man!

"This contention would be very pleasing to Teutonic vanity," as Theodore Roosevelt remarked. "if it were true." That it cannot be true is proved by the presence of halfbreeds and mulattoes. For if the races had evolved in segregated regions, they would have developed specific differences and could no inter-breed. That the races are merely varieties of one species, and not true species, is demonstrated every time a hybrid child is born. 



In my letter to the press on our fisheries in March last. I strongly pointed out to all that in many cases, we were handling our fish as an article of food to the consumer and that we must all combine, fisherman, planter, merchant and government, in curing our various kinds of fish with quality first, and get all the latest nodernized ideas as to same. It is a Government's duty to encourage and assist with all means in its power the fisheries of Newfoundland, as all other matters are of minor importance, and then we Newfoundlanders will not worry about our competitors, Norwegian, etc., as our codfish, herring, salmon and caplin in their raw state are superior to any other in the world.

As I am only slowly recovering the health that I lost in endeavoring to uplift our country, as to its fisheries. hope my methods will succeed. Hoping that Sir John's letter will have the effect that it deserves, and thanking you for your valuable col-






