The colder eggs are the quicker they will boil. Silk dries quickly ,and should be ironed extra damp. Lace should be ironed when damp, and over muslin. When measuring syrup. or any sticky substance, avoid waste by dipping the cup in boiling water. To brighten gilt frames, put enough flowers of sulphur into a pint and a half of water to tinge it golden, and boil five bruised onions in this. Strain off the liquid, and when cold apply with a soft brush to any gilding that needs brightening or restoring.
