



New Cable Lines

TO CONNECT ALASKAN CITIES AND SEATTLE.

Ketchikan, Alaska, June 10 .- With the completion of a new cable between Seattle and Seward, Alaska, next fall by the United States army, Ketchikan will be one of the largest cable stations in the world, according to officials handling the laying of the

which links Seattle and Ketchikan was finished May 31 by the cableship Dellwood. The Dellwood then went to London to load cable for a second section which will connect Ketchikan and Seward. Another new line is to link Juneau, Wrangell and Petersburg with this city. Ketchikan will then be a relay office for four lines, two going into southeastern Alaska, one to Seaward and one to Seatttle. All these cables will be used commercially.

The new cable will be equipped for duplex operation, enabling six times as much traffic to be handled as on the old line from Seattle to Sitka.

Fruit all the Year Round

As a result of a long series of found possible to preserve fruit of all kinds for several months without cooking it.

Pineapples from the West Indies. grapes from South Africa, and peaches from California, if packed by this new method, will arrive in London just as fresh as when picked. Dried fruit, too, can be preserved in such a manner that, when water is applied on arrival, the fruit regains all its original flavour and size.

The preserving apparatus is simple and cheap. The fruit is washed and packed into tin cans. A light sugar syrup is then added, and all air is excluded. The tins are then hermetically sealed and stored in refrigerators. On arrival at the port of destination the frozen fruit is thawed out, when it immediately becomes as fresh as it was before pack-

Grapes are preserved by placing the bunches in tins, into which sulphuric acid gas is pumped. When all air is excluded the gas tube is withdrawn and the tins are sealed up. The sulphuric acid kills the germs which atttack the grape skins, and so preserves the fruit until required

These new methods of preserving should enable us to have a supply of cheap foreign fruit throughout the

Diagnosis by Post

Increasing interest is being taken by medical men in a new system of diagnosing and treating disease, a method which has caused world-wide ontroversy.

The method is known as the "E. R. L" (Electronic Reactions of Abrams), and was discovered five or six years ago by Dr. Albert Abrams, a San Francisco medical scientist. By means of a machine known as the oscilloclast (vibration breaker) Dr. Abrams claimed to detect disease by the radioactivity of the patient's blood.
