County Criminal Court.

The Erie Steamer brought 507 tons soft coal from Cleveland for A. & S. Nairn. The Margaret arrived at wharf No. 3 yesterday morning light. She will load malt for Oswego.

There seems to be very little lumber moving, although there is a considerable quantity on the stocks.
