



Speaking on this point, some of the doctors said the cure hes in the hands of drunkards themselves. They alone deede what and when they will drink. The choice of water or alcohol, harmless fulds or rank madefining poisons, is open to them, and if they prefer the poisons no power outside themselves can prevent them so long as the stuff is to be had at every turn as easy as a paper of cigarettes or a yard of calico.

The lesson then to be learnt from these
