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

Tevery one really respects the girl tractive without costly furnishings and expensive linens. To be sure real good linen is never expensive, as it will last three times as long as cheaper grades and will also always look respectable. But to make a table attractive the chief requirements are clean table linen and will polished dishes. Doilies, carving cloths and pretty, centre pieces are not only an adornment to the dining table, but are also a great saving of the linen cloth. The embroidered pieces and other small cloths should always he washed by themselves in suds made of pearline and warm soft water. Wash by rirsing up, and down and pressing and squeezing the fabric between the hands; rinse in clear water then dry the white cloths in the sun and those embreidered in colors must be dried in the shade.
