－The drying of fish by artificial heat is being successfully carried on at Anma－ polis．N．S．About＇ 500 quintals wre pre－
pared weekly and exported to the West Indics．－The apple evaporating works have not been so largely patronized as ex－ pected．which seems strange as this enter－ prise pays cash for the smallest apples． which otherwise would have no market value．－The briek works have been run－ ning to their uitmost capacity，－Lumber－ ing operations have been carried on largely during the past year，the lumber being exported chiefly to the Spanish and West India Islands．Pulp wood has also been in good demand．about 3,000 cords hav－ ing gone to supply the Baltimore paper mills，thus giving employment to a num． ber of countrymen during the dull season in winter，

smallest month February, where the exeess is $\$ 5,066,000$. The grand total of cleariugs has been $\$ 590,0 \pm 3,000$, an increase of 14 多 or $\$ 75,400,000$, over the preceding year, or within 21/s per cent of being double the increase shown by 1891 over 1890.
This increase is all the more gratifyiug when we contrast it with the ratio of increase shown by New York city, aimougst the 61 Clearing Houses of the Union, which is only 8.6 per cent. Our local Wall St, coniesses to a very large inerease in the volume of speculative ventures for the past. year, and doubtiess these transactions have helped our figures upward. At the same time we have only to recall the many favourable features of our commercial progress in the year just closed to warrant the statement that bona-ite trade has largely contributed to the imr proved clearings. New Xork has undergone a shrinkage of stock and bond ventures on the part of European speculators, whicle accounts for her decrease as compared with the cities of Chicago and Philadelphia, to the west and south of her, both showing an increase of 15 per cent over 1801.

In pursuing an enquiry as to the amount needed to clear transactions of so large a sum as $\$ 500,043,000$, we have been informed that it has taken onily $\$ 85,500,000$, from which it will be apparent to how great an extent the establishment of a Cleariug House las diminished the labour and risk of loss which accompaniod the making of deposits and sottJements between bank inul bank in formar days.

The month of December showed the largest volume of clearings the total being $\$ 57,738,000$, and February the smallest, its figures being $\$ 37,983,000$. The largest weekly cleariog was $\$ 10$,111,000 ior the week ending oth Octo-
ber, and the smallest $\$ 7,583,000$ for the week ending 22ud May.
The average daily clearings have reached the sum of $\$ 1,921,000$.

Were we writiag in support of a particular fiscal policy or govermment party, which we are mot doing, we should be justified in pointing to the Clearing House statistics along with the figures emanating from the Customs aud.Revenue Departments, as indicating marked prosperity througliout the Dominion during 1892. And if recent history shows that a tariff inaugurated by $65,000,000$ of people has for its effect on $5,000,000$ of people simply that of chauging the direction of the latiter's trade without diminishing its volume, it must be evident that abundant liie, energy, and resources are back of that smaller population which may justly arouse a feeling of pride in the breasts of those who form part of it. Our prosperity is a complete answer to those dissatisficd ones who clamour for Independence, Amexation or some other form of national life, forgetful of the fact that population alone is what we need to make us even greater rivals of our near neighbours, while exemption from excessive tarifi burdeus, and political frecdom under the aegis of a great empire both conduce to make us a prosperous and contented people.

THE TORONTO BANQUET.
The annual banquet of the Toronto Board of Trade.was, in several respects, a notable event and was probably the most successful ever held. In view of the proposed celebration when the new Montreal Board of Trade building is completed it is unfortunate that Montreal was nọt officially represented.
Lord Stanley, who has not equalled some of his predecessors in the epeech
malring line, foretold his departure and gave a broad statesmanlike address favoring the statu quo and pointing to a "partnership with the mother country." The speech most eagerly looked for was that of the new premicr; sir Jom. Thompson, but those who looked for startling revelations on matteris of State policy in comection with racial or religious questions were, of course, disappointed. Such questions the speaker remarked as that concerning the smallest, but not least important of our provinces (Manitoba) were not to be opproached in a partisan, or political spirit, but must be met and dealt with in the widest spirit of patriotism. 'rhe goverument would be guided by the constitution of the country. He urged the people to regard this question as they shonld all others, "in a spirit of tolcration, in a spirit of conciliation, and even if necessary in a spirit of concession, where concession can ?e made without sacrifice of principle." The Premier was rather more definite in dealing with the trade question which ho said would be calmly and carcfully considered by men of both political parties. Canadians were çonsidering whether the United States would propose free trade, reciprocity, or restriction and strife, in its dealings with this country. The retiring president had been directing attention to causes of complaint and these were be: ing removed. Such action will no doubt clear the way for friendly overtures when the Cleveland administration once more pesumes offices, though in the case of the recent change in the sugar duties a valuable trude may be lost to Canada. Fe pointed out that the Democrats when last in office had negotiated about the Athantic fisheriesand that a solution was arrived at which was pronounced satisfactory and
toforable, aithough "at one time the Fresdent wad dechered that the ques tyơif hata brought the countries to the verge of war:" Me modus wivendi has bed extendea mote than once so as to give the United states auple time for deliberationn." The poliey of the government would be to make Cinada and the United states the best of neighbors, "aitliough, piense God, never to be anything cise but neighliors," a sentiment catiting fortri loud apprause.
Deallng with the questions of the day which appear to be rising up for solution the Hon. gentleman said:-" What is to become of us-free trade, reciprocity with the United States, or retallation? Lete us talce counsel by thic past on this questioin. That same party now in power held offiee, held the texecutive, Hell the House of Representatives four years ago, and the greatest advance thicy made in the direction of free triale whis to prepare a tariff mearly forty per cent. Migher than the Canadian tariff. Adimitted that elanges have talen place in thic pumie mind, and that far greater progress in tarif reform will be made, let us wath and see the measure of the manli. of that great change of opinion. We tare not ditien to seck our eximple, our suldance, in the statesmen of that couitry; bitit should be a fool if I did not adinit that every country is bound, every Gowernment is bound, to take Lessons by the experiene of its neigh bouts, and to bo controlled to some exteill fin the romition of its tariff, in the regulation of to trade, by the conahtoris of the tunde and tariff of that counitry. Is it to be reciprocity? It mat be we shan be grad to see what terinie wili' be profoesed, but they will have to be beter terms than were proposed to my conleagues and myself eleven'montuis ago, a proposal to desert our duties to our Empire, and to desert the pirmeiples on which this empire, on atisy other empitre, alone can hold to. gether; to consent that mekimeyism. shoilid be atopted in Camada just as it was aboutt to be discarided in the United States. I know of defects both in the frame and fin the administration of the present tariff which require remedy, and therefore we propose to take the good advice of the motto and "To lop the woulderlig branch away." There are other questions whicll have been put forward as great problems set before us to deal with, though I must confess I do not so regard them. We have been challenged with the fact that there is a movement in this country not only looking for a ehange in the constitution of the country, but in the public allegiance of its peophe. 3 think both parties in this country and the men and women outsile of party polities will put that problera out of existence upon the first opportunity they get to to so. Ar regneps other guegtions sonnected with the status of this country, looking to the future of this country, I can commend to you the eloquent words of the Governor-General to-ugght, who spoke worlds of caution as to the charges, responsibilitits, and burdens that are involved in tho assumption of national burdens. I am sure that every man who has Canada at heart feels that Cimala ought to be a antlon-(bear, hicar) -and please God we shall help to make her a nation; buit we do not desire she shal: be a uation, a separate nation, but a nation as a bulwark of the Britr Lsh Etupire, whose traditions we atmire, whose protection we enjoy, and Whed has given to this country in the fullest degree the right and power and sell-goverament."
Sir Oliver Mowat made a pleasant sallly in responding for the legislative alssemblics. In the course of his remarls, he satd, I have now, as you have been reminded, been a gooid many years in the position which $I$ an at present occupying. The Dominion Premier, I think, told you I had occupied it for some twenty years, During that time my friends and myself hive been sit'turg on the right of the speaker in the old puilding which wo have just left, atal I taike this opportunty of sasing that I will make no viotent obfection to occupying the position for twenty sears more mo the new building to wheli we are going. (Great cheering and laughter.) I limit what I say to
tirenty years because $I$ am now sevent ty-two; $I$ thill in twenty years more I will begin to be an old nan. CLaugh: ter.) But in the meantime you will bear in mind that our opponents are Conservatives. Conservatives do not like unnecessary changes. (Renewed laughter.) They have dono splendid duty for twenty yenrs on the left of the Speaker, and I call upon them as Conservatives, and acting upon good sounci Conservative principles, to stay on the left of the Speaker. (Laugiter.) Ho denled the statement, lately made, that the Liberal party is now as distinctiy American as the Tory party is distinctly anti-American and European. Both partles were Canatian and were resolved not to stive away their hall of the continent to the Onited States or anybody else.
The Hon. Mr. Foster, at the outset, reterred to the progress made in the past four years, or since he had spoken in Toronto. Trade and commerce liad increased 25 million dollars, or 28 per cent.; imports 12 millions, or 11 per cent: ; the total trade 37 millions or 18 per cent. In the same time there had been an increasing outpot in agery brancl of the industry and production of the country. Public works had been maintained and proceded with, until today we stood within a measurable distance of secing a time when the great works undertaken at the time of Confederation shall have been finished, and the capital aecount in regard to them to a lavge extent elosed, while the great benefits receivalbe from these grent works would continue inderinitcly. Referring then to agriculture he paill: The products of the field in 1868 were ralsed to feed the population. We ther had to export to the value of $\$ 12,000,000$; in 1892 the agricultural proincts were raised to feed five min: ions of people, a much larger number than in 'is, and to export at the same time to the amount of 22 million dollars, an increase of 90 p . c. in that time. In 'Gs animals and their products were raised to feed the people of this coun. try, and at that time to export be. sile to the amount of $\$ 6,500,000$; in 189: the $5.000,000$ of people were fed from these products and exports were made to the amount of $\$ 28,500,000$, an inerease of 350 per cent. in the period inmein, In 1868 chesese was raised for the consumption of this country and for export to the tune of $\$ 500,000$; in 1895 it was $\$ 11,500,000$, an increase of "nlout 800 per cent. In 1868 apples were exported to the tune of $\$ 500,000$, pestles what were consumed here; in 1892, $\$ 1,500,000$, an therease of 1,560
per cent. Manufactories have grown largely. Between 1881 and 1891 industrial establishments increased from 49,000 to 75,000 , 52 per cent ; employes. increased from 254,000 to 367,000 , over 44 per cent; wages increased from $\$ 59$,$40 \mathrm{C}, 000$ to $\$ 99,700,000$, or 68 per cent ; capital invested, from $\$ 165,000,000$ to $\$ 353,000,000$, or 114 per cent. ; raw materials increased from $\$ 179,000,000$ to $\$ 256,000,000$, or 42 per cent. ; the value of products made increased from $\$ 209,-$ 000,000 to $\$ 475,000,000$, or $521 / 2 \mathrm{per}$ cent. See what this means as regards labour, as regards the products of manufactures, as regards the wealth added thereby to the wealth of this country. The import of raw material in 1882 was $2,000,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. ; in 1892, 10 ,$000,000 \mathrm{lbs}$., an increase of 395 per cent. In $1868,1,000,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. of cotton were brought in to be made, last year 32,$00 \mathrm{c}, 000 \mathrm{lbs}$; hides and skins, $\$ 891,000$ worth in 1867, in $1892 \$ 1,837,000$, an merease of 106 per cent.; hemp in 1879 $\$ 199,000$, in $1892 \$ 877,000$, an increase of 340 per cent. Lumber and timber, chiefly for cabinet purposes, $\$ 203,000$ in 1869 ; in 1892 s $91,094,000$. or an increase of 438 per cent. Silk, $\$ 35,000$ in 1879 ; $\$ 260,000$ in 1892, an increase of 632 per cent. Raw sugar in $1869, \$ 2,000,000$ worth brought in to be made in the refineries of the country. Last year $343,000,000 \mathrm{lhs}$. of sugar, an increase of 1,484 per cent. This is another indication of the great advance of manulacturing industries. Let me add one more to that. We exported goods in ' $68 \$ 1,500,000$, in ' $92 \$ 7,000,000$, an increase of 432 per cent in export alone. I say, looking at all this, there is no boundary to the future of our country except our own enterprise and capacity. Proceeding to the third of the trinity of a nation's features, I have now to spaak of the increase of our commerce. Last year and the year be: fore were supposed to be crucial years for the country. Despite the McKinley bill the exports in 1892 were 114,000,000 , as against $\$ 98,000,000$ the year before, an increase of $15 / 3 /$ per cent. Our imports increased $61 / 2$ per cent, and the total trade 11 per cent. Our trade with Great Britain Increased $\$ 15,000$,000, with the West Indies one and a third millions, with Germany $\$ 1,800$,000 , and with China and Japan $\$ 1,100$,000. Our exports of products of the mine have increased 300 per cent. since 1868, the fisheries 190 per cent., animal produce 314 per cent., agricultural produce 720 per cent., and manufactures from $\$ 1,500,000$ to $\$ 7,000,000$. The dpeaker reterred to the technical
and sclentific schools in Europe and to the princely contributions for the pro motion of instititiens where the farmer can learn his trade, where the mechanic can get hold of the principles of his trade, and where the manufacturer can acquire the secrets of the processes of manulacture.
The other excellent speeches included one by Mr. Van Horne who dwelt upou the fast Atlantic service. A passage could be made from Quebec to Euston station in 5 days and 12 hours and passengers could reach points in the United states one and even two days earlier than by New York. It was pos. sible to take freight from Montreal and put it on the wharf at Liverpool for the New York terminal charge. Further it was quite within reach to make such a saving in conveying power as to increase the value of exportable products 10 per cent.
our trade with jamaica.
During the carly part of last summer the first steamer to carry Canadian goods from our ports, to the West Indies, sailed. During the recent exhibition in Jamaica, Canada was ably represented by the Hon. Adam Brown, and it was acknowledged on all hands, that the exhibit made by Canada was one of the mos't prominent, and interesting features of the exhibition. It practically demonstrated to the public of Jamaica, that they meed no longer wholly depend upon United States sources, for their supply of provisions and manufactures, but that Canada, a sister colons, was equally able to supply her with these necessities, and if the efforts made by Canadian exhibitors were an earnest of what was to come, Canada by this time should have established a good trade with Jamaica.

The only impediment which lay in the way of this trade being speedily established was the considerably further distance our goods would have to be carried, and the improbability of any adequate return cargo being secured, unless it was composed to a large extent of tropical fruits. Thus although our merchants and manufacturers were ready and anxious to trade with Jamaica the means of transport were lacking. The prospects for commencing such a service were not very inviting, as cargoes of fruit even to New York and Boston had often proved precarious and disastrous, and there was no prospect of any immediate large quantity of frelght to Jamaica being avallable. True, our Government had subsldized
a line running from Halifax to the Wegt Indies, but it was impossible for pur merchants and manufacturer to, mav/ the heavy rail charge $x_{y}$ on goods from here to Halifax, and send them to Jampaica to compete with imports of Ami erican goods. Montreal is our New York, and only by placing goods on board steamers at Montreal and secur-: ing low rates of freight, would our merchants be able to send their goods to Jamaica and compete with American shippers.
To meet this emergency Canadian enterprise came to the front, and without government aid a fast steamship called the 'America' has during the past summer been making regular trips between Montreal and Jamaica, and our goods and manufactures have been landed there on that island, to successfulty compete with those of American importation. As a result of this effort on the part of the Montreal and Jamaica S.S. Co. the first cargo of bananas ever landed in Canada, came to our port lant June, and this fruit could be purchased as cheaply on the Montreal dock, as in" New York. Hitherto this trade had been entirely in the hands of dmerican lines, and choice fruit rarely found its way to Montreal, which previously had been at the mercy of New York and Boston shippers. The size and fine quality of the fruit brought in by the "America" during the past season was a surprise to many. Not only have bananas been thus imported, but large quantities of cocoanuts haye been brought to our manufacturers at very low prices. This company have also freighted to Montreal quantities of sugar, coffee, cocoa, pimento and other apices. This is pretty strong evidence that there is before us, the possibility of a successful import trade in tropical products.

On the other hand we have sent to Jamaica supplies of lumber, fish, flour, grain, butter and cheese, and various manufactures, including stoves, organs, carriages, boots and shoes, clothing, etc. All these goods have given satigfaction, and many merchants in Jamaica are quite ready to extend their comnection in Canada. The public of Jamaica have not lost sight of the fact that we both form parts of the same great Empire, and an American monopoly of their business has not been their wish, but more the result of circumstances.

We regret to learn that this enter? prise, so boldly established, is in danger. of being lost to us. Canadians, are pat. rlotic, but when private enterprise has
to be sucrificed for the public good, put riotism sometimes requires a stimulant. The line above named is now buiding a filst steamer for this busiuess, but unless govermment aid is grantel the prospect is,t hat she will run to Now York, instead of to Montreal.
Enterprises of this kind reguire Govarmment aid, and our Government has always been ready to foster the development of new ifchles for her fast increasing produets. We trust our Government will not give American companies the satisfaction of sceing this Canedian business nipped in the bud.

We understand that the subsidy asked is very moderate, and Camatia ints often expended many thotusands upon matters of much less importance.

The anxicty which prevailed on both sides of the Atiantic over the delay of tho steamship "Umbria" in reaching port, has revived the feelings of appehemsion genemaly, respecting the sately of the new and late fast-running steamships now erossing the Athatic. It was only a short timo before that the German steamship "Spree" mel with a serious disatiter, owing to the breaking of her propeller shatit, by which the magged parts of the mathinery broke a hole in one of the after compartments which, filling with water, left the vessel helpless to drift about on the waves. Her sigatals of ilistress were fortunately seen by another steamer which towed her Into port. The itecilent to the " City of Paris" not mary months ago is also frecell in the minds of our readers. One of her propelier shatts broke down and the filying fragments of iron broke Grough the botcom of the ship, and chased considerable danage also to the ailjoining engine-room, whereby witer quickly filled both compartments, disabling both her engines. The double propeller system had been previonsly regurded particularly safe, as it was reasoned that it any aecident happened to one set of machinery, the remaining engine ant propeller coukd drive the vessel aloag, though at in somewhat reduced speed.

Owners and builders are now considering whether all reasonible means of securing the salicty of oceath steamers In ense of accident have been arailed of. The "Sciontific American," dealing with the subjeet, thinks they are not, and points out where much improvement may still be done without materially fucrensing the weight or the expense of
preparing the ressel. "Nearly all steamers of the class mentioned," snys the "Scientific American," "are provided with a number of independent donker-engines, boilers and pumps." It seems as though it would not be a dipficuli matter to cariy pipes to bow and stem, and to arrange suitabic conaections with the pumps so that in the event of accident to the main propeller machinery, the various streams of water could be joimed and used to propel the ship the same as now practiced on the jet-propelled vessels. By the same or similar arrangement, the vessel, in case of damage to her rudder, could be stecred and head kept to the wind if the engines were disabled. It is also probable that by a simple at. tachment the maln engines and boilers might be used for jet-propulsion, in case of loss of the propeller blades which is not by any means an uncommon accideut. The principle has been successfully applied in England, especially in the steam life-boat "Northumberland." As applied to these bonts, one of the alvantages of the jet system is that there is no projecting propeller to be injared or iouled by ropes or by pounding on sand or 'wreckage. The "Scientific dmerican" also recommends, in addition to thu supply of jet pipes to ocean steamers, that they be furnished with one or more steam life-boats such as the "Northumberlanid." The suggestions made apply not ouly to ocean pasecuiger vessels, but to ships of war. In the event of battle, the disabling of the rudder or eagine leaves the ship a helpless turget to the encmy's guns.
'HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUR.
It appears from some of our American exchanges that one of the largest Anerican Life Insurance Companies purposes celcbrating its jubilee by adopting two new plans of insurance and what is said to be "a novel depart" ure in life insurance, no policy of "cither sort having ever been issued "previously, so far as known, by any "company in any country." The plan to which special prominence is given is named "The Continuous Installment Flan" and the essential feature thereof seems to be the securing to the benefleiaries a fixed ineome for a specified number of years, instead of the amount insured being paid over in a lump sum, and thas relieving them from the anxiety and uncertainty of obtaining a sate and remuncrative investment for the prlucipal, while at the same time obviating the possibility of the principal being squandercd within a year or two
owing to the imprudence or financiering ineapacity of helpless widows and orphans.
Whatever honor there may be in devising such a plan, it would appear Hhat the priority of claim fairly belongs to one of our Home Institutions, viz., The Confederation Life Association, for it a few yours ago inaugurated what it terms "Ine Annuity Jondownent" plan. The peculiar ieature of this is that an Annuity Endowment, for a period of say 20 years, at a medjum age can be obtained at a less cost by about fiften per cent than an ordinary eudowment at a similar age, whereby unider a policy for say ten thousand dollars, the insured, if he sumvive the endowment period, will secunc to himself an income of $\$ 500$ per annum for a period of twenty years therearter if he still survive, and to his helrs for the balance of that perioil if he should die sooner; or if he should dio before the completion of the endowprent period the bencficiary will have the option of an anuuity certain for fiventy years to self or heirs of $\$$ STO per ammum ; or for fifteen years of $\$ 000$ per annum, or for ten years of $\$ 1,900$ per ammun. The proposed plan of the American company referred to may vary to some extent in minor details, but the fundamental principle is the stame.
The plan may unhesitatingly be pronounced a good one. It will doubtless meer the desiderated requirements of many intending insurers, and its various ardvantages are woll worthy of consideration by all who are desirous of making provision for those dependent upon them for support, or for their own later years.

## SUGAR AND SUGAR DUTLES.

The advance in refined sugars, mentioned lasti week, was primarily duo to the inproved statistical position of the raw market and to the fact that prices here were ruling relatively lower thatu in the Unite aStates. It wing be remarked that business has been dull for some time past there being no incentive to speculative activity.
So little is heard of the beet sugar industiry in the ruma parts of the province. that it might be thought this enterprise was extinct. but wre are informed that one concern in the Trownships produced some 2,000 burrels last year. One large wholesaler said: "Mauy of us do not use it or keep it, 'end there is $n o$ call for it from our customers. Some people do not like it because it changes the color of the ten." It appears that the product of the regular refineries rapies greatly. Sometimes the
sweettening power of a lot of sugar will average 75 and 80 per cent., and the narit lot will range much below that in stirength. No complaint is made by consumers because they know too little nbout it but some grumbling is heard about yellows being damp and sticky. The opinion was expressed that if any adulteration was practised here there was much more of it in the United Statics. "The American sugars we used t'o get on here were neveir so good as ouss," remanked one gentleman in the grocery trade.
It appears that the action of the Government in removing the discriminating daties against indirect importations of raw sugar and molasses took the refining interest completely by surprise, as refiners were not consulted as to how they might suffer from the change. The principle of distinguishing between direct and indirect importations was established when the system of Protection Was fintit adopted. The United States Were not discriminatiod against any more than England. If the sugar came from Great Britain it was as much on indirect shipment as if it was brought on here from the United States. The shipment was direct if it came from a point in the country of growth and production to a por't in Canada, without deviation. The duity on an indirect shipment was increased by a charge of 7 1-2 por cent. This was an fittempt to divert doreign business fo Canadian ocean ports and venofit our shipping and railways. It meant $a$ difference of about 1-Se per lb. on thie sugar. When the duties were removed from refining sugars the tax was continued in the shope of a 5 per cen't. chairge on the f.o.b. value of sugar imported indirect. : An extra duty of 21-2e peir gallon on molasses was also imposed to pirotect that trade between Canada and the West Indies.
The changes will affectis shipping and failways more than the refineries, al'though we sce it stated that tho Halifax refinery will bo handicapped to the extent of $\$ 2$ on every ton refined as compated fwith the Montreal iofincries. Tha protest against' the action of the government appears to have proceeded chiefly: from the lower provinces where othor than refinery interests, pure and simple, are evidenti'y touched.
Opposition to the "Surrender to the Sta'tes" policy is not unlikely to spread in those parts. The statement, however. that all sugns for Moutreal will go by way of Bositon, or New, York, is a little premature. The Boston and New Tork markets will be open to our buyers and they ate likely to pick up odd cargoes there, when iwanted, buit in tho past. they haye found it advantageous to buy
in the producing niarkets and will most proliably continue to do so, the sugar coming on to Montreal vill the St. Lawrence, as belore, The prospect's of tho Intercolonial for the winter traffic are dimmed by the superior attractions for shipping, including rethrn cargoes, of the leading American ports.
Taking it' all round the change in tho duties may causo a greator disturbnaco than was appreent at the outset.

At a time when there is more or , less feeling abrond, because of the real or supposed enormons profits 'accuring to cer'thin joint stock companies operating in Canada, we arail ourselves of the occasion to matice a feiv remarks concerning the new prospectus of the Consumers' Cordage Co. of this bitity, of which full practical details are given in another page of this issue.
This company certhinly affords a favorable illustintion of the benefits derivablo from the application of that modern tendency in trade and manufacture, more than once areferred to in our columns, the consolidation pl business on a large sealo under one managementt, By this inethod as already pointed out, cconomies not practicable under a series of small cstublishments, become quite feasible; one untrammeled master-mind directs, as k general his inmy, the enormous business under his control, an lousiness which is successiful for the reason that all trade should be successitul, which unfortunaltely $i$ it fis not'.
The causés that operate most strongly againsti sucecss in business arise from an abise oi credith through $a$ competition which, acking capital and experience, is driven to disregard the legitimate rules of tirade and hust sell goods at auy price to get paper to discount, and at a raté often that no bank manager laving reasonable employment for his funds, will domand or expect: The suceess of the great dry goods houses affords a mercantile example of white ean be accomplished under the capablo one-man direction. The larger the business the smaller the ratio of expense. The recont consolidation of a majority of our struggling cotton companies hins brought prosperity in its wake. but serious were the losses incurred for years before the now organization was perfected. .The vaiue of the shanes. which reached over twice and a half their par, attests its succeas.

The Consunctra' Oordage Co. is hhout to follow the san'y example of that pire terpriso, not for the sume causes but through a desire to secure further the coopeation of the public, who are not invited to purchase shares on more specula-
tion, or in a compnnys in which dividends were problematic-like certain of thoso about to be launched-but in an entermise that has been paying dividends of over $S$ per eent., and which points to auarterly distributions of $13-1 /$ per cent. or 'more. 'Those who have heretofore looked with envious eyes-as well as tho many twho can contemplate great prosperity fwithout such nervous disturbance -are how afforded an opportuaity of being curolled in tho list of those who partake of the grood things that are spread before the shareholders of the Consumers' Cordage Co. If it bu a monopoly or a combine it can afford all the more protit to investors. The farmer also, who too often lends to his ambitious neighbor at 6 or \& per cent., can here invest in a business which promises better returns, aud camod fua amay to Mrexico with lis principal.

## PROFITS SHARING.

A paragraph which appeared in a recent issue of the "Journal of Commerce" on this subject, has brought us a communication' from Messre. TV. S. Simms it Co. of St. John, N. B., mianufacturers of bruslies corn brooms and whisks. They say "Wo are the ouly firm that lias tried it, that we are aware of, and we suppose it must refor to ourselves." "On account of causes outside of the manufacturing depurtment, the profits wero not so large as was anticipated or as we had hoped, but the plan itself was satisfactory to ourselves, and we have yet to learn that our employees were dissatisfici." "We firmly believo that Profit Sharing is a scheme mutually beneficial to employers and employeos, and hope to see the matter given a thorough trial by employers of labor." . . . . Mesers. ग. I . S. Simms \& Co. have evidently misunderstood our paragraph. Thero was no intention on our part to disparage or decry the plan in which these entorprising manufactiress have courageously led the van in Cumda. They have our best wishes for the success of the sehemo during the current year and for the future. The plan has worked satisfactority in some parts of France where it has peen conducted on a large scale, but it has, of course, met in other places, with the disappointments that seem inseparable from new departures in busíness methods.

## BAY OF QUINTE NOTES.

The Inathbun Company, of Descronto. will get out more logs along the Kingston and Pembroke line this your than last. There is a decrease in the stock of wood being ent' however.-On the Mackay limits, the Rathbun Compans,recently cut for the Lavant operations sixty-five logs from four trees. From one treo they cut seventeen loge 13 feet and four 16 fect in length; from a second tree they eut seventeen logs 13 feet long from the third fiftien logs 13 feet long; and from the fourth twelve logs 13 feet in length. ## iron smbliting in canada.

A company at Jeseronto, Onl., has made applicalion to the Ontario goverament for a honus to cuable it to establish iron smolting works, on a proititible basis at that place. As our readers are doubtless aware the iron producing industries in Caunda enjoy a bounty of $\$ 2$ a ton on their output, and a tariff protection o $\$ 4$ ton, which gives them an advantage of \$6 a ton. There are no smelling works in the sister province. By the establish ment of direct railway commanication with the ore beds of North Hastings the leseronto company elaims to be in a position to transport the ore to the furnaces ait a minimum of cost, and it has niso in its favor the ability to produce chenply all the chatcon that would be reauired. There are two iron smelting industries in Quebec-lhat of the Comadian Iron company, north of Thre kivers, and that of John MeDourall \& Co. at' Denmmondville. The former has a daily output of 25 tons which, by doubling the driving power. will be inereased to 50 lous a day. The Drnmmondville concern, which is now carricd on by Mr. Robert Cowan of Montreal, produces thiticent tons a day. The province of Quebee pays no bomily. Nova Seotian capital has been invested in the fron smelting industry. The following statement shows the monat of the ctame for bounty on pirg iron monufuctured in the Dominion since the inception of the bounty principle and the amomes paid in cach fiseal yent:

during the year. Iron foundry and other industries have also been prosperous. Customs collections at the port amounted to $\$ 48,667.50$, as compared with $\$ 117,093 .-$ 50 in 1891, and the decrease is entirely the to the abolition of the raw eagar dutiess the inuportation of other clastes of goods showing some increase. The exports of Moncton and outports show some decrease in value from 1801, but a slight incrense as compared with 1800. Moucexports embraced $\$ 2,000$ railway ties shipped to United States ports by a firm who loaded 30 vessels with ties, hemlock bark, pulp, wood, etc. At Eillsboro 106 vessels of 24,305 tons, carried 26,183 tons rock plaster, and 12,776 barrels calcined besides 036 standard deals and 2,674 cords puly. Shediac shipments to the West Indies included 18,427 bushels potatoes, 78 tous hay 4,672 bushels onts 98,500 shooks 9horses and other articles of a total valuo of $\$ 20,003$. To Great Britain $10,156,053$ deals of a value of $\$ 78,760^{2}$. To the United States, miscellancous articles of the value of $\$ 29,357$. From the outport of Harvey, 23 ressels of 8,950 tons carried deals and other products of the valuo of $\$ 88,088$, chiefly to Great Britain. Tho outlook for the new year is good.

Foreiga competitors continue to have a hard time in lighting American flour. Hurcariau millers are unable to dislodge Unitod States flour from the markets of western Europe. Cumadian millers are unable to hold their own with United States millers in their own Beitish Weat Indian colonies Linglish millers seem to have given up in despuir and are importing flour from the United States. So says an American milline joumal. Even at the low price of wheat there is little or no profit in making flour fotexport' and foreign millers are wise to adipt themselves to circumstances. The American plan of great manufacturing combinations, stifî home priees and slaugh ter rates for the exportable surplus, in bad for the bmall Ameriean manfactures aud consumer, but vastly improves the lot of the consumer elsewhere.

It appenrs that the Erie caual is fast losing ground, so far as the grain movement is concerned. Comparing 1892 with the arerage of the previous five seasons the receipts of grain at Buffalo increased 17,896,201 bushels, or 26.68 per cent. Deliveries by camal fell off $0,274,882$ bushels or su. 75 par cent; liy river and const, 114,218 bushels, or 25.05 par cent'; while rail shipments incrensed 27,285,206 bushels. or 78.62 per cent. The stendy falliug off in the canal movement, in spite of the low freights obtaimble (averaf. ing, in 1.892, 3.42e per bushel on whent and 8.00 e per bushel on corn. Buffalo to New York), and enormous gatin in the rai! movement, are cansing grent anxicty to the canal men.
