The Dominion Rifle Meeting.

Without exception the greatest ever held upon Rideau range, was the annual prize meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, which opened on the 2nd and closed on the 6th inst. There were close upon 425 competitors, against a greatest total of 363 on any previous occasion. Every province of the Dominion was, as usual, represented, and a gratifying and unusual feature was the presence of a team of ten officers and sergeants from the Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment (Imp.) from Halisax, and of five officers and men from H.M.S. Bellerophon, from Montreal. The meeting was under the direction of Lieut.-Col. Maunsell, D.A.G., as chief executive officer, and the range officers were Lieut.-Col. Boswell, 90th, Winnipeg; Major Radiger, 3rd Vics., Montreal; Major W. E. Hodgins, G.G.F.G., Ottawa; Capt. Mutton, Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto; Capt. Aumond, R.L.; Lieut. Macnachtan, Garrison Artillery, Cobourg; and Lieut. Winter, G.G.F.G., Ottawa. The secretary, Lieut.-Col. Bacon, and the treasurer, Lieut.-Col. John Macpherson, looked after their duties in the usual satisfactory manner; and in the statistical office, where Major Walsh, S.L., presided, the compilation of the prize lists proceeded with a promptitude and accuracy highly gratifying to the competitors.

The weather from Monday to Thursday was quite hot, and the wind for the most part was up the range, with a bothersome variation from right to left and vice versa. It was not heavy, but quite sufficient to convert unwary markesmen's intended bulls-eyes into outers. The light was good for the most part, but hazy at times. On Friday morning, when the Governor General's match was in progress rain fell in liberal quantities, but the light was beautiful, and the wind perfectly steady, so that the morning was really the best of the week for high

scoring.

THE COMPETITORS' MEETING.

The usual competitors' meeting was held in the drill hall Tuesday night, Lieut.-Col. Wm. White, chairman of the executive committee, presiding. Major Sam. Hughes, of the 45th Batt., acted as secretary. About 100 competitors were present. The chairman, in opening the proceedings, urged the compétitors not to be diffident about bringing up any questions, discussions of which might benefit themselves and the association.

Lieut. Macnachtan, of Cobourg, introduced the question of further target accommodation. Year by year, he said, there had been an increase in the number of competitors, and now the limit had been reached unless additional targets were secured. He hoped before next year the council would consider the advisability of erecting more targets, at least eight or ten. The chairman said between this and next year the council would do their utmost to see if an improvement could be made. He had it upon the authority of Major Perley, who as engineer for the association knew all about these matters, that it was possible to increase the targets by ten. Major Perley said it would not be well to make any promise on the matter. Certainly he believed room for ten additional targets could be found on the western side of the field, but, unfortunately, the range was not government property, and as the association's lease expired next May, increased accommodation was contingent upon a new lease of the property being secured.

Lieut.-Col. the Hon. J. M. Gibson, 13th Batt., said he believed every Canadian rifleman must have been gratified at the success of the team which went to Wimbledon this year. Personally he was delighted that his old friend Col. Bacon had been appointed commandant of the team this year and had brought the Kolapore cups back to this country. He also spoke highly of the services of Capt. Hood as adjutant of the team, and he concluded by moving that the riflemen here assembled from all the provinces of Canada desire to express their great satisfaction that the team representing Canada at Wimbledon once more brought to this country the Kolapore cups and generally made a capital record, and also to congratulate Lieut.-Col. Bacon, Capt. Hood, and the whole team on the record made on behalf of Canada. Capt. Adam, of

the 13th, in seconding the motion, said he believed the success of this year's Canadian team at Wimbledon was due to the fact that practica shooting men were in command. If the practice were continued suc cess must surely attend the efforts of our representatives. The resolution was unanimously adopted. Lieut.-Col. Bacon acknowledging the vote, said no better team could have been sent to England to represent the Dominion than went over this year. Not a dissentient word was heard from the men and a thorough esprit de corps prevailed. Capt. Hood also briefly returned thanks. He acknowledged the uniform kindness with which the team had been treated in the mother country. In view of the fact that great interest was manifested in the doings of the team he would suggest that next year the commanding officer be authorized to cable the results of each day's winnings to Canada. Respecting the match with the Massachusetts team he stated that a challenge had been duly sent their representatives, but no answer had been returned to it. Lieut.-Col. Tilton said it was a matter of great regret that fuller accounts of the Canadian scores were not telegraphed from Wimbledon, and he trusted Capt. Hood's suggestion would be adopted.

Major Sherwood, 43rd, expressed regret that some post entries had been refused this year, although the men would have paid the extra twenty per cent. The Chairman said the Executive had had the matter under consideration, and had no alternative under the circumstances,

but to refuse the entries.

Capt. Adams, Halifax Garrison Artillery, moved, seconded by Capt. Hood, that the meeting views with pleasure the attendance at these matches of teams respectively representing the regular army and the navy of the British Empire, and trusts that the practice will continue.

The resolution was adoped.

Lieut. Sutherland, 43rd, called attention to the fact that no pool targets have been established this year, although such had been promised in the official programme. The Chairman stated that this was due entirely to the want of target accommodation. The Executive had carefully considered the matter and decided that the first consideration must be the matches.

Capt. Adam, Hamilton, moved, seconded by Major Hughes, 45th, a vote of thanks to the Executive Committee for the admirable manner in which the general work of the meeting had been conducted.

The resolution was adopted.

Major Hughes called attention to a circular which had been sent out to officers commanding battalions, asking their views in regard to the discontinuance of Government grants to local rifle associations and suggesting that instead these grants be made to district associations. He deprecated any such change being made. On the contrary he favoured additional grants to the local associations, and would like them to be granted to company headquarters. He moved a resolution offering the opinion of the meeting that no change be made, but on the contrary, if possible the grants be extended to the local associations. Capt Grant, 20th Batt., seconded the motion, which was adopted.

Major McSpadden, York Rangers, asked if any complaints had been received this year with regard to the ammunition. He had heard some grumbling and had seen some drop shots. The chairman said no complaints had reached the executive. Major Garrison, of Halifax, said he was convinced the '89 ammunition was not as good as that of '88. Several shots to his knowledge had dropped. Capt. Hartt, St. John Rifles, said the New Brunswick men had been making splendid shooting at home with the '88 ammunition, but when they arrived at Ottawa a change was noticeable. Major Hughes, Capt. Hood, Lieut. Sutherland and others spoke in the same strain. Major Perley said at the recent Metropolitan matches the fact that the ammunition was defective had been brought to his attention, and he had deemed it proper to lay the matter before the proper authorities. Sir A. P. Caron only heard the complaints for the first time on Friday last, and had ordered a searching investigation to be made at the factory as to the cause. On motion of Capt. Hood, seconded by Major Garrison, the meeting resolved that the ammunition of 1889 could not be commended in the same high terms as the ammunition of 1888 was last year. The meeting then adjourned.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A formal presentation of prizes took place on Thursday evening in the spacious building of the Rideau Skating Club, where a large throng had gathered to see the rifle champions receive their rewards. Among those on the platform were Lt.-Col. Geo. A. Kirkpatrick, M.P., president of the association; Sir Adolphe Caron, Minister of Militia; Lieut.-General Sir Fred. and Lady Middleton, Hon. C. H. Tupper, Col. Walker Powell, Adjutant-General; Col. C. E. Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia; Col. Tilton, G.G.F.G.; Lieut.-Col. White, Ottawa; Lieut.-Col. Maunsell, D.A.G.; Lieut.-Col. John Macpherson, treasurer; Lieut.-Col. Thos. Bacon, secretary; Major Bond, Montreal; Capt. Mutton, Q.O.R.; Major Walsh, Ottawa; Major Toller, Guards; Capt. Sims, Vics.; Lieut. Macnachtan, Cobourg Garrison Artillery. The proceedings opened with a speech from Col. Kirkpatrick, laudatory of the Canadian riflemen for their high scoring at home and for the distinguished victory achieved by their representatives at Wimbledon this year, whose crowning glory was the winning, on this the last occasion of their being offered at Wimbledon, of the Kolapore cups, which the Canadians has won the first year they were offered there. The first prizes to be distributed were those to the teams, the winners being paraded in full dress uniform and marched up as their names were called. Then the individual prizewinners were called up. The prizes were handed to the winners in turn by Sir Adolphe Caron, Sir Fred. Middleton, Lady Middleton (who presented the Caron Cup), Col. Kirkpatrick and others. In presenting the chief prize of the Dominion of Canada match, the most important concluded event of the meeting, Sir Adolphe Caron made an eloquent address, in which he warmly eulogized the Canadian militia for their devotion to duty whenever called upon, and the interest they had always taken in time of peace to prepare themselves for the serious duty they might be called upon to perform. He apologized for the absence of Sir John Macdonald, due, he said, to fatigue, the premier having spent the two previous nights in travelling to and from Port Hope, whither Sir Adolphe had accompanied him to assist in the unveiling of the monument to that brave soldier, Col. Williams.

An "at home" was given on Wednesday evening by Lieut.-Col. Tilton and officers of the G.G.F.G., in the officers' mess-room, to the officers of sister corps taken part in the D. R. A. matches. Among the guests present were Lieut.-Col. G. A. Kirkpatrick, M.P., president of the association; Lieut.-Col. the Hon. J. M. Gibson, 13th Batt.; Lieut.-Col. Ray, 96th Batt.; Lieut.-Col. Boswell, 90th Batt.; Lieut.-Col. Massey, 6th Fusiliers; Lieuts. Murray and Dundas, R.N.; Major Walsh, Ottawa; Delamere, Q.O.R.; Burland, 6th; Blaiklock, R.S; Radiger, V.R.; Starke, V.R.; Hughes, 45th; Capt. Trench and Lieut. Becher, Duke of Wellington's Regiment; Capt. Ibbotson, 5th R.S.; Macdonald, Q.O.R.; Mutton, Q.O.R.; Sims, V.R.; Benedict, 90th; Dennistoun, 57th; and Bliss, O.F.B. A very pleasant evening was spent. The band of the G.G.F.G. afforded music.

Some very interesting tie shooting took place during the meeting. Sgt. Loggie, N.F.B., and Staff.-Sergt. C. N. Mitchell shot off for third and fourth place in the Grand Aggregate, the former winning. Pte. J. C. Chamberlin, N.W.R; Major S. Hughes, 45th; Staff-Sergt. J. S. Huntingdon, 56th; Corp. D. McNaughton, 51st, and Pte. A. Robertson, 77th, with 264 each, shot off for the last two places in the sixty, and Chamberlin and Robertson were successful. In the Gövernor-General's match Staff-Sergt. T. Mitchell, 10th R.G., and Capt. E. G. Zealand, 13th, shot off for the third prize, \$100, and Mitchell won. Capt. J. A. Longworth, P.E.I.G.A., Staff-Sergt. C. N. Mitchell, 90th, Sergt. Hall, 79th, Lieut. Desbarats, Vics., and Staff-Sergt. Pink, 43rd, shot for the last two of the ten badges given in the Governor General's match, and the winners were Longworth and Mitchell.

The announcement that the sergeants of the West Riding Regiment (Regulars), would give an exhibition of the new physical exercise and bayonet exercise Thursday afternoon attracted a large crowd of spectators. The exhibition took place in front of the council tent, and the greatest interest was manifested. Among those present were the Hon. Sir A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia; Lieut.-Gen. Sir Fred. Middleton; Colonel Powell, Adjutant-General; Lieut.-Col. Kirkpatrick, M.P.; Lieut.-Col. Bacon, Secretary of the Association; Lieut.-Col. Macpherson, Treasurer; Capt. Trench and Lieut. Becher, West Riding Regiment; Lieuts. Murray and Dundas, of H.M.S. Bellerophon, many of the officers attending the competition, local militia officers and a large number of citizens. The squad was in command of the Sergt.-Major of the West Riding Regiment. The appearance of the sergeants was greeted with hearty applause, and the precision with which the various movements were gone through caused its frequent repetition. The physical drill was performed to the music of the Guards' band. The bayonet exercise was performed in full dress, first by word of command, and then without it. The exhibition was highly appreciated by the spectators, and proved one of the most interesting events of the competition.

Lieut.-Col. Kirkpatrick, M.P., President of the Association, wa "At Home" Thursday afternoon from half past four until six o'cloc

at the Council Tent, where the prizes won during the competition were on exhibition. Col. Kirkpatrick's callers, military and civil, were numerous. The ladies were recived by Lady Middleton, in the absence of Mrs. Kirkpatrick in Quebec. Refreshments were served in the marquee. The band of the Governor-General's l'oot Guards was present, and played a choice selection of music.

Capt. Trench, of the Duke of Wellington Regiment, reports having left a pair of binocular glasses, in a black leather case, at the 600 yards firing points. It is requested that the finder leave the same at the office

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
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
