Calculated for the Meridian of HALIFAX, in Nova-Scotia. Lat. $44^{\circ} 44'$ North, and 4 Hours 14 Minutes West Longitude from London; but will serve without sensible error, for any Part of Nova-Scotia.

There will be four Eclipses this Year, two of the Sun and two of the Moon in the following Order.

I. The first will be of the Sun the 20th Day of February, Invisible at 4h 31m in the Afternoon.

II. The second will be of the Moon March the 6th, Visible, by Calculation as follows. D. H. M. S.

III. The third will be of the Sun, August the 16th in the Morning, Invisible.

IV. The fourth will be of the Moon August 30th in the Morning, Invisible. — By the Tables of one Author, who has been esteemed a good Writer on the Science of Astronomy, the Moon will set Eclipted. — The curious are therefore requested where they may be favor'd with a clear Horizon to observe whether any part of this Eclipse be visible at any Place in this Province; and to favor the Public with such Observations, which will assist in determining how far those Tables are to be depended on.

- ③ Mercury. ♁ Saturn.

- ⑥ Conjunction, or Planets situated in the same Longitude.
- ⑦ Opposition, or Planets situated in opposite Longitudes or differing 6 Signs from each other.

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

BALLS of FIRE explained.

Various have been the opinions of the balls of fire seen in different parts through Britain. The elements contained a great quantity of electric fluid, but the clouds not sufficiently condensed to form a regular and strong charge of lightning, these balls dropped from a surcharge, of course, without the report of thunder, and the thin dark clouds, opening a small bore, and dispersing on the discharge. These balls having dropped from a greater quantity, rolled along the atmosphere, and were round at first as a drop of water, till the compression of the air, as they approached the earth, either give different shapes to, or divide them when dropped, in that other and grosser medium of air. These fire-balls were strongly ignited, and, had they fallen upon hay, straw, or the like, would have readily communicated fire: they were charges of lightning dropped from uncompresed clouds, and in the same state would all like lightning fall, without force or impetuosity, did not the great body and compression of the clouds hurl it forth with such violence, that nothing can resist it, immediately followed by reports of thunder.

"I will," said I, "though they should beat me,"



For the information of those who reside in the country near the several rivers which run into the Bay of Fundy. It may be observed.

THAT in and about Mines Basin, Windsor and that neighbourhood, at the Full and Change of the Moon, it is High Water about twelve o'clock, and of course, when the Moon quarters, it is high water about 6 o'clock.

At Cumberland and Annapolis, it is high Water at the Full and Change of the Moon about 15 Minutes after 11 o'clock.

In Five hours from the Time of high water at Windsor, the River is fordable at Falmouth, and it remains fordable for three Hours in summer, and two Hours in the Winter Season.

High Water at Windsor about 50 Minutes later than at Boston, and in Cumberland Basin and Annapolis Basin nearly the same as at Boston.

The Treasure of Health,

Quick cure for colds, weaknesses, and some consumptive cases.

DRINK plentifully of mathmallow-tea, twice a day, till you find the disorder abated. This tea is admirable in the gravel; but then you may add thereto a few drops of spirits of nitre. *How to make the King of France's Teeth Powder, famous for making the Teeth white, and preserving them from the Scurvy.*

Take of chalk and pebble-stones burnt, of each one ounce, myrrh bole-armoniac, and dragon's-blood, of each half an ounce, of ammoniacum and cuttle-bones, of each three drachms, and let them be all finely powdered.

A Medicine for the Cholick, which not only gives Ease in the most violent Fits, but also, being often used, prevents their returning.

Take of the best manna, and oil of sweet almonds, of each one ounce and a half, camomile-flowers boiled in posset drink, in handful; let the posset-drink be strained from the flowers, and mingled

very well with the oil of almonds and manna, let the patient take it three days successively, and afterwards every third day for a fortnight.

An excellent Remedy for a Bruise.

Take of red coral, dragon's blood, Irish slate, and mummy, of each half an ounce ; of Lemnian earth, and spermaceti, of each two drachms ; of rhubarb three drachms ; let them all be finely powdered ; give a drachm of it at a time in a draught of Brunswick ale, after the patient has been bled.

A famous Water for a sore Mouth or Cancer ; by Dr. Lower.

Take three pints of small-beer ; half a pound of honey ; of red sage, rosemary, bramble leaves, and celandine, of each an handful ; roch-allum, as much as will make it sharp, let it boil till it comes to a quart, then strain it, and keep it for use. This water will cure any sore mouth, if curable : if at any time stinking ulcers infect the gums or mouth, let half an ounce of unguent, ægypticum be added to half a pint of water.

To create a good Appetite, and strengthen the Stomach, by Dr. Lower.

Take of the stomachic pill with gums, extractum rudii, of each a drachm, resin of jalap, half a scruple ; tartar vitriolated one scruple ; oil of anniseeds, four drops ; mix with syrup of violets, and make into pills ; of which take four or five nights ; they are of excellent use in the megrims, and vertigo, by reason they carry the humours off from the stomach, which fumes up into the head.

For a Man.

Take of black soap, and unquenched lime, of each a like quantity mix them upon sheep's leather ; apply to the part affected, & it will consume away by degrees.

For a fresh Strain.

Take of linseed-oil, and rectified spirit of wine, of each two ounces ; oil of spike, one ounce ; mix and rub the part very well with it, and lay to it a plaster of paracelsus, with an equal part of adbernium.

For a Consumption.

Take the yolk of a new-laid egg, beat it with three spoonfuls of red rose water, put to it half a pint of the strokings of red cows milk, sweetned with a sufficient quantity of sugar of roses ; add to it a little nutmeg scraped, take this every morning for a month, fasting two hours after it ; this alone restored a gentleman that was given over by the doctors.

An excellent ointment to cure one that is burnt with gun-powder.

Take an handful of groundsel ; twelve heads of house-leek ; of goose and chickens dung, of each a pound ; bruise the herbs, and mix them very well with the dung, then take two quarts of bear's grease, and boil them all together for a quarter of an hour ; strain, and keep for your use.

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
