FRENCH CAPTURE TRENCHES **REACH GULLY IN CHAMPAGNE**


Commanding Position at Lagoutte Ravine Captured, Giving Allies terence to Japan's attitude for the Control of Entire Length From West-German Attack Repulsed in Vosges.

ARIS, Oct. 12 .--- The capture of trenches at a point northeast of Souchez P by the French is revealed in tonight's official communique, which

says that the enemy today violently bombarded these with his artillery, and that the French took in this action 165 prisoners. On the Champagne front, the French have progressed in the direction of Lagoutte gully and now dominate it from the west, putting them in a position for further decided progress. The repulse of a German infantry attack in the Vosges is reported. The official communique is as follows:


York Township Meeting Held for Purpose of Organization for Trafalgar Day.

UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

OFF FOR MEDITERRANEAN




