Your Committee wish to draw attention to the peculiar condition of the representation of New Westminster Lodge, No. 3. Royal City Lodge, No. 13, amalgamated with this Lodge on the 14th of April, 1800 and the latter Lodge is therefore not entitled to representation. The Constitution of Subordinate Lodges provides that all lodges shall be entitled to representation in accordance with the Semi Annual Reports rendered on the preceeding 31st December, on that date New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, had 93 members and were entitled to one representative, Royal City Lodge, No. 13, had 67 members and was also entitled to one representative.

By the above law New Westminster Lodge, No. 3 is only entitled to one representative and the membership of late Royal City Lodge, No. 13 is disfranchised, which we consider an injustice. We therefore recommend that New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, be allowed representation at this Session on the same conditions as existed on 31st December last, viz: Two representatives and that Bro. T. A. Muir, P. G. who was elected by New Westminster Lodge, No. 3 in error, be granted the rights and privileges of a representative at this Session.

The Grand Master read his Report of the past year, which was on motion ordered to be received and handed to a Committee to distribute same to the several Committees.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT.

*To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia,
I. O. O. F. :*

BRETHREN. —Another year has been added to the past, and for the twenty-fifth time the Grand Lodge of British Columbia has been called together to review the work of the past twelve months and legislate for the future.

In beginning our labors at this time, we cannot but feel grateful for our present condition and satisfied with the great progress our Order has made within the quarter century just closing since the institution of this Grand body, and we must be strongly reminded that this prosperity is mainly due to the wisdom and devotion of good and true men within our Order, many of whom have passed beyond to their reward; and that it is left to us to carry on the good work begun by them. Let us hope that we shall be able to continue advancing the spirit of Oddfellowship in our glorious province, and let us direct our best energies in that direction on this occasion, remembering that our Order is progressive in its character and that our legislation must be of a nature fully abreast of the times. Let us not fail to work harmoniously in our deliberations and in all our acts to strengthen the bond of unity between the scattered Brotherhood in our jurisdiction. With this fixed purpose before us, and ever acting on the grand principles of our Order, we need have no fear for the future, but may safely look forward to a time when the influence of Friendship, Love and Truth shall unite all mankind into one great Brotherhood.

CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

During my visits through the jurisdiction I found that general prosperity prevailed. In most places Lodges own their halls, and their enterprise in some instances in this direction may possibly lead to embarrassment and loss, especially in the less solid mining towns in the interior, and the Lodges should be very careful how they invest their funds.

I am pleased to be able to report an increase of forty-four members in the Subordinate Lodges to 31st. December, 1898, and accord-

ing to reports and information I have received, with new lodges added since that date, there is reason to believe a much larger increase will be shown at the end of this term.

The financial standing of the Order will be fully reported upon by the Grand Secretary, and I will simply state here that the gain in the assets of the lodges for the year has been \$2,919.12, and the total assets on the 31st. December, 1898, were the enormous sum of \$198,880.58, which is held in trust for 2,815 members.

Two Lodges have surrendered their Charters and merged with other Lodges to the advantage of all concerned, and two new Subordinate Lodges have been added to our list, viz.: One at Trout Lake City and one at Cranbrook. Encouragement has also been extended to Brothers at Fernie to organize a Lodge, and their application is expected.

Selkirk Lodge, No. 12, has been compelled to cease holding its meetings at Donald on account of its membership having nearly all removed to Revelstoke, where I have granted them permission to meet temporarily. They will suffer the loss of their fine hall at Donald, but they are not dismayed, and hope to be able to continue their Lodge at Revelstoke.

With the phenomenal growth of the towns in the interior of the Province as well as on Vancouver Island, a large field is opened for the institution of new lodges, but care should be exercised in granting Charters to avoid if possible the failure of any to continue after having been started.

The great calamity that befel the City of New Westminster affected our Order there and caused the merger of two of the Lodges, but of that I shall make special report.

REBEKAH BRANCH.

The Rebekah branch has not increased its membership in the jurisdiction during last year, but the D. D. G. M's. reports are encouraging.

Two new Lodges have been instituted—one at Carson City and one at Rossland—and in the near future applications may be expected from Ashcroft and from Sandon.

The Charter and effects of Esther Rebekah Lodge, No. 11, at Union have been returned to the Grand Lodge, the Lodge having been practically defunct for two years.

Bethel Rebekah Lodge, No. 7, of Mt. Pleasant, has also handed over its Charter and effects to the Grand Lodge.

This Branch of our Order is new in our midst and has not reached that period at which it is sufficiently independent to prosper. The benefit of the Rebekah branch to our Order is well recognized, and with more experience and encouragement from the Brothers will continue to advance.

MERGEMENT OF LODGES.

July 28, 1898: Granted petition of Acme Lodge, No. 11, Victoria, to merge with Dominion Lodge, No. 1, of the same place.

The merngement was duly consummated under my supervision on the 1th day of August, when 58 members (total membership) of Acme Lodge, No. 11, were enrolled on the books of Dominion Lodge, No. 1. Their books, regalia, etc., together with \$783.75 (their total assets), were handed over to the said Dominion Lodge and accounted for on the books of the same. The charter and rituals of Acme Lodge were duly returned to the Grand Lodge.

March 28, 1899: Granted Petition of Royal City Lodge, No. 13, New Westminster, to merge with New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, of the same place. The merngement was duly carried out on the 14th of April, 1899, when the names of 65 members (total membership) were entered on the books of New Westminster Lodge, No. 3. The total assets of the Lodge, amounting to \$2,915.73, were handed over to New Westminster Lodge No. 3, all under the supervision of Brother R. May, D.D.G.M., who took charge of the Charter and Rituals of the defunct Lodge.

At the end of my predecessor's term of office, or at the beginning of mine, a merngement took place of Friendship Lodge, No. 30, into Black Diamond Lodge, No. 5, at Nanaimo. No report of the proceedings has come to me as yet, and I am unable to give any details. Brother Neen, D.D.G.M., of District No. 3, has been instructed to report upon it and will probably do so in a supplementary. The permission to merge was granted by Brother Morton, P.G.M.

PETITIONS.

I received a petition to the Grand Lodge from New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, to be allowed to change its name to Royal City Lodge, No. 3, which is hereby submitted for your consideration.

APPEAL FOR FINANCIAL AID.

In consequence of the disastrous fire at New Westminster on 19th September last, and after having communicated with the brethren of that City as to their needs, I felt that it was a case where the jurisdiction should be asked to promptly render assistance, and accordingly, on the 22nd of September, I issued the following appeal:

*To the Lodges subordinate to the Grand Lodge of British Columbia,
I. O. O. F.;*

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS:—You are doubtless aware of the great disaster which befel the City of New Westminster on the 19th inst., by which it was almost destroyed by fire. As might be expected in such a general calamity, the Lodges and individual members of our Order have been heavy losers.

The imposing Odd Fellows' Hall and the Records, Regalia, Furniture and other effects of the Grand Encampment, the three Subordinate Lodges, the Rebekah Lodge and the Subordinate Encampment were, with trifling exceptions, completely consumed.

It is estimated that at least one-half of the members of the Lodges, residing in the City, have to some extent, been personal sufferers, and in many cases, I am sorry to state, have lost all they possessed.

In such a time of widespread distress, it appears, to me to be fit and proper that the Lodges of this jurisdiction should be appealed to for fraternal aid and assistance on behalf of these unfortunate brothers, and I do therefore confidently ask that you will both cheerfully and liberally respond for their relief.

A Relief Committee, composed of representatives of the Lodges and Encampment, has been formed at New Westminster for the purpose of receiving and distributing amongst the necessitous members of the Order any funds that may be donated, and you are earnestly requested to forward such sums as you may feel disposed to contribute to Bro. W. C. Cotham, P. G., Secretary of the Committee, with as little delay as possible.

This amount was distributed by a committee of ten, formed from members of the New Westminster Lodges as follows:

Two from No. 3; two from No. 13; two from No. 27; two from the Encampment, and two from Beulah Rebekah Lodge, No. 5.

This Committee elected Bro. D. Welsh, D.G.M., Chairman; Bro. W. C. Cotham, Secretary, and Bro. R. L. Reid, Treasurer.

A canvass was made by the Committee to ascertain the losses and pressing needs of each individual Oddfellow. The funds were divided into shares of \$10.00 each and a distribution was made of one or more shares to each individual, according to loss and actual need; then a second distribution, a third, and so on until the fund was exhausted. In this manner 67 members were relieved, receiving from \$5.00 to to \$10.00 each, an average of \$21.00 per member, or nearly 2% of the actual loss sustained, omitting those covered by insurance.

Certified statements have been received by me from the Secretary, which are accessible to the members of this Grand Lodge, giving in the most minute form details of the work of the Committee, with a condensed table of names, losses, amounts received, etc.

In concluding my Report of this transaction, I feel that I owe a debt of gratitude to the Committee who so wisely, economically and equitably administered this fund without any compensation for their arduous labours, and I would suggest that this Grand body place on record its appreciation of the services of this Committee by a unanimous vote of thanks.

I also beg to suggest that all the records of the manner of distribution be kept on file by the Grand Secretary for future reference should misfortune ever again demand our united assistance.

At the request of Amity Lodge, No. 27, and New Westminster Brethren generally, I inserted a card of thanks on their behalf to all the Lodges who had contributed to their relief, in the B. C. Oddfellow, over my signature as Grand Master.

On Nov. 14th, 1898, I refused permission to Pulaski Lodge No. 20, S. C., to appeal to the Lodges in this Jurisdiction for financial aid for the purpose of building a new hall.

APPEALS AND DECISIONS.

From Bro. F. Williams, Victoria Lodge, No. 1, against the action of the Lodge in refusing to pay him benefits.

Statement: On the 31st December, 1897, Bro. Williams was indebted to the Lodge for dues and assessments in the sum of \$3.50, of which fact he was notified according to the By-Laws. This amount

was paid to the Secretary on the 7th of January, 1898, directly after receiving notice. Bro. Williams met with an accident on the 5th of January, and claimed benefits, which the Lodge refused on the grounds that he was out of standing when taken sick.

Finding that the Lodge had complied with the Constitution and By-Laws, and that assessments are counted as dues on the 31st December; that Brother Williams when taken sick was out of standing, and only paid up after he was taken sick, I dismissed the appeal.

From Bro. J. Wriglesworth, P. G. M., against the action of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, in the mergerment with Acme Lodge, No. 14, on the grounds:

1st: That only fifteen members were present at the meeting, July 14th, 1898, when the question of mergerment was brought up, and that four voted against.

2nd: That at a very small meeting in July the Lodge appointed a committee of investigation on the members of Acme Lodge, which without leaving the lodge reported favorably on the said members, and balloted for them at the same meeting, contrary to Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Grand Lodge.

3rd: That Dominion Lodge at a regular meeting, July 28, voted \$20.00 out of the funds of said Lodge to defray the expenses of a banquet, to take place at the time of the mergerment of the Lodges.

I found that the proceedings of the Lodge in the matter had been carried on in a justifiable manner, and dismissed the appeal on that account, but decided that it was illegal to vote the \$20.00 for the banquet.

Re: Brother W. M. Ross, of Selkirk Lodge, No. 12, against the action of the Lodge in refusing to pay him benefits:

This case had been appealed to my predecessor Bro. Morton, during his term as Grand Master, and decided on such evidence as had been produced. Brother Ross not being satisfied procured further evidence of his sickness by certificates from doctors and his own sworn affidavit.

After perusing the whole correspondence thoroughly, I decided that Bro. Ross was entitled to benefits.

From Columbia Lodge, No. 2, against the decision of the D. D. G. M. for District No. 1, on the following question:

Statement: Brother Croft ceased membership for non-payment of dues last year, and now petitions for reinstatement, sends a doctor's certificate, and pays dues. The Lodge declines to receive

petition on the ground that he is a saloon keeper and sells liquor. The Brother objects and the D. D. G. M. decides as follow:

As Bro. Croft was in the saloon business before the enactment of said Sovereign Grand Lodge, and has been in it continuously, therefore Brother Croft has certain vested rights that his Lodge cannot interfere with, and Brother Croft is eligible for reinstatement.

I sustained the decision of the D. D. G. M., but decided further that if the Brother had given up the saloon business and engaged in any other pursuit, he could not again enter into that business without forfeiting his rights to reinstatement.

From Victoria Lodge, No. 1, against the decision of the D. D. G. M. for District No. 1. The question submitted to the D. D. G. M. was as follows:

Can the Noble Grand of a Lodge permit the admission of the members of a visiting Lodge when paying a fraternal visit in a body, without each member giving the regular password at the inner door, or should the Inside Guardian obtain the password from each individual separately before admitting him?

The D. D. G. M. decided that the password must be given by each individual member, and I sustained his decision, referring the Lodge to Installation Charges to the Noble Grand and Inside Guardian.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

1. *Ques.*—Can a D. D. G. M. grant a Dispensation to confer the three Degrees on a Brother at one meeting?

Ans.—The duties of the D. D. G. M. are laid down in Sec. 7, Art. IV, Constitution of the Grand Lodge. For power to confer three Degrees on a member at one regular meeting, see Con., Sub. Art. V, Sec. 1.

2. *Ques.*—1st. Can a Brother decline nomination for office? 2nd: In case all nominees decline, what then?

Ans.—1st: Yes. 2nd: Failure to elect officers would result in the Lodge forfeiting its Charter.

3. *Ques.*—Is a Noble Grand who served eleven nights of the term in the chair and had to leave the town to attend to his work, entitled to Past Grand honours?

Ans.—No.

4. *Ques.*—a. Is the Warden eligible for the office of Noble Grand, not having served a term as Vice Grand?

Ans.—No.

b. *Ques.*—Is he eligible under above conditions if there are Past Grands who will accept?

Ans.—No.

c. *Ques.*—Will you grant a dispensation to allow the Warden to act as Noble Grand if elected and a Past Grand nominated?

Ans.—No.

d. *Ques.*—Does Clause 98, Page 238, White's Digest, mean qualified Brothers in the Lodge room at the time of nomination or both the Lodge room and District?

Ans.—It is legal to nominate a Scarlet Degree member for the office of Noble Grand if all qualified Brothers present refuse to accept.

e. *Ques.*—Was I as D. D. G. M. compelled to give a decision irrespective of receiving your reply to my questions?

Ans.—You have power to decide such questions without consulting the Grand Master, and there is no compulsion as to doing so immediately.

f. *Ques.*—The Past Grand who was nominated with the Warden for the office of Noble Grand having withdrawn, there being other Past Grands who will accept the office, have I power as D. D. G. M. to grant Dispensation to allow the Warden to act as Noble Grand?

Ans.—If the nominations have been regularly held and declared closed, and none but Scarlet Degree members willing to accept, then the Grand Master can grant a Dispensation to allow the Lodge to elect such.

g. *Ques.*—Is it constitutional and admissible for each and all Past Grands to refuse nomination, to allow our Warden to qualify?

Ans.—Your question may be construed in two ways, and I will answer them both:

1st. All Past Grands have the privilege of refusing to accept nomination for Noble Grand.

2nd. No. If all Past Grands present refuse, the Warden is eligible.

5. *Ques.*—Does the office of Banner Bearer in a Rebekah Lodge qualify for the office of Vice Grand?

Ans.—No. Banner Bearer is not an officer of a Rebekah Lodge in that sense. See Art. V of Constitution of Rebekah Lodges, Sections 1 and 2.

6. *Ques.*—Can minutes adopted three or four weeks ago be re-considered?

Ans.—Yes, if a mistake has been made.

7. *Ques.*—A brother joins a Lodge and meets with an accident before the first six months expire, and continues sick for three weeks after the three months are up, is he entitled to three weeks benefits?

Ans.—I will refer you to a similar decision, which was sustained, on page 1213 of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, 1895.

8. *Ques.*—A Brother wishes to withdraw from his Lodge and affiliate with this Lodge; Can we take him in as a non-beneficiary member with a lower rate of dues than \$1.00 per month, or will he only be taken as an honorary member. The Brother could not pass a medical examination?

Ans.—If the Brother is a non-affiliate and over fifty years of age, and your By-Laws do not provide to the contrary you can take him in at a less rate than \$1.00 per month. I will refer you to Art. II, Sec. 4 of Constitution of Subordinates, by which you must be guided. For further information respecting your communication, I will refer you to Sections 613-619, White's Digest, 1895.

9. *Ques.*—What constitutes a bartender?

Ans.—This Question is too general. I can only give my opinion on specific conditions or instances.

10. *Ques.*—If a Brother is a carpenter, leaves his trade and goes behind the bar for two months and sells intoxicating liquors, and other work around the hotel or saloon, and is compensated for same, can he be termed a bartender?

Ans.—Yes, if it is part of his duty to attend at the bar and sell liquor, he becomes a bartender.

11. *Ques.*—If a Brother engages in the hotel business, goes behind the bar at any time and sells liquor, has he violated the law?

Ans.—If he has a regular bartender, but on certain occasions as proprietor of the hotel serves a customer but does not take his regular shift as bartender, I hold he has not violated the law.

12. *Ques.*—If a Brother engages in the hotel business, but does not go behind the bar to sell liquor himself, but employs a bartender, has he violated the law?

Ans.—No. See Grand Sire's Decision, 111 and 183, on pages 11,082 and 11,087, Journal of Proceedings, Sovereign Grand Lodge, 1806.

13. *Ques.*—If a resolution is moved to expel a member, which takes two-thirds majority of members present to carry same, and the vote stands 22 for, 11 against, and one blank, has the resolution carried? Does the blank count for either side? If so, which?

Ans.—No, the resolution has not been carried. The blank must be counted with the negative vote. See Section 1070, White's Digest, 1805.

14. *Ques.*—A person whose duty it is, besides that of steward, to attend to the bar on a steamer when not in port, makes application for membership; can the Lodge accept him?

Ans.—No.

15. *Ques.*—Can an application for membership be received, Committee appointed, Candidate elected and initiated on the same night?

Ans.—The Constitution does not permit it to be done, though somewhat loosely worded, but the Grand Master can grant a Dispensation to authorize a Lodge to do so.

16. *Ques.*—A Brother makes application for reinstatement, sends a proper certificate of health, is balloted for and elected, and pays the necessary fee. Is it necessary for him to appear in open Lodge and sign the Constitution to entitle him to the privileges of membership?

Ans.—No, it is not necessary, he becomes a member in such standing as your By-Laws may direct upon receiving a legal receipt for the payment of the required fee.

SPECIAL PERMISSIONS.

On a Petition from Selkirk Lodge, No. 12, of Donald, I granted permission on May 12th, 1800, to remove the Charter to Revelstoke and there hold its meetings until dealt with by this Grand Lodge.

On a Petition from Trout Lake Lodge, No. 41, I granted permission to accept applications for membership from certain three or four good, healthy, robust men whom they had in view, without the doctor's certificate, for the reason as stated—that the nearest physician was fifty miles away and it was unsafe and almost impossible to travel at that season of the year. This privilege was conditional, and extended only to April 1st, at which time, on asking for a re-

port upon it, I was informed that no members had been accepted under these conditions.

On a request from the D. D. G. M. of Rebekah District No. 6, I granted permission for the D. D. G. M. of Rebekah District No. 4, to install the officers of Fidelity Rebekah Lodge, No. 10, Ladner. The sickness of Mrs. Stainton, the D. D. G. M., was the reason for her inability to do the work.

Attached to this are the reports of my D. D. G. M's. as far as they have been received to date. I have examined these and find myself in accord with them.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

During my life as an Oddfellow, and more particularly during my term as Grand Master, it has been impressed upon my mind that our Order does not take full advantage of its own power for good. It has appeared strange to me that with the immense wealth and large membership, and, in consequence, the great guarantee we are in a position to give, our members individually are only secured by the Lodge to which they belong—the assets of which are in many cases almost nothing. Why can not every member who joins our ranks be secured their benefits and their standing in our Order by the whole Jurisdiction, and—if need be—by the whole Order? The great stability it would add to our Institution, and the inducement it would be for men to join our ranks, must be plain to all thinking men. Legislation can accomplish this, and it behoves our Order to

work in that direction in the near future. It need not affect the individuality of the Subordinate Lodges. It need not make them less perfect units of Oddfellowship than at present. Indeed, I have no doubt it would strengthen them, and made them pay greater attention to the fraternal side of our organization.

The benefit-paying portion of our Order is purely an insurance; then why not place it on a business basis as such? I would suggest that each Lodge be allowed to retain a certain sum in hand at the beginning of each term, be allowed to take in members only on proper doctor's certificates, pay certain stated benefits only on legal advice, use only a certain percentage for management, a certain percentage for benefits, and the balance, if any, to be paid into a Grand Lodge fund. If a Lodge pays out more in benefits than a certain percentage, it will be repaid annually from the Grand Lodge fund, which should be held in trust for the Lodges and invested only on good security by a Board of Directors, elected. The assets of the Order in the Province would thus become a guarantee for each Lodge. Again, if a Jurisdiction should be called upon to pay more than a certain percentage of its dues during any year, it would in turn be refunded from the Sovereign Grand Lodge, thus making the entire assets of the Order a guarantee for each individual member. If Lodges become extinct for want of membership, the remaining members should be taken into any Lodge to which they might apply. There would be no injustice done to members of defunct Lodges, and there would be no occasion for Government interference with our Institution; neither would an injustice be done to members of wealthy Lodges, as at present they do not profit by being members of such Lodges, except by having a better security for the fulfillment of the Lodge's obligations; but the security would be far better under the suggested system.

An Insurance Branch, paying, say, \$1,000.00 at death, should be provided on the same basis, and it could be made optional with members whether they would belong to that or not.

As so great a change as this would require time to accomplish, and no doubt meet with opposition from some quarters, and as I believe the wishes of the Subordinates should be the foundation for all legislation, I would suggest that this matter be brought before the Lodges in this Jurisdiction, and dealt with at the next meeting of this Grand Lodge.

Another change which I would recommend for the consideration of this Grand body is, that the business of the Grand Lodge be conducted in the Scarlet Degree, and all the Third Degree members in good standing be allowed admission as spectators during the session, without any voice in the business of the meeting.

CONCLUSION.

I have during my term endeavoured to the best of my ability to fulfill the duties of the responsible and honourable office of Grand Master, which year by year are becoming more arduous as our Order spreads in this Province. The continual changing of conditions, incident to the rapid progress of development of our new country, necessitates the watchful care of the superior officers of our Order. My whole ambition has been in the interest of the Order, and, if any errors have been committed, I assure you they were unintentional.

The many pleasant meetings with Brethren and kind letters of appreciation I have received have done much to spur me on and make my duties agreeable, and I shall always look back with pleasure and pride to this period of my life as an Oddfellow.

Brethren, I will conclude by extending thanks to all who have kindly assisted me, and to the Representatives of the Jurisdiction for the high position with which they have honoured me; to my District Deputies for the careful performance of their duties, and most particularly to the Grand Secretary, Bro. F. Davey, whose ability, experience, and untiring efforts constitute a great factor in the progress of our beloved Order in this Province.

The Grand Secretary read his report which was ordered to be received and handed to the Committee on Distribution.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 14th, 1899.

To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F.

I have the honor and the pleasure of presenting for the fifteenth time a report of the transactions of the Grand Secretary's Office and of submitting a synopsis of the condition of the Order in this Jurisdiction on the 31st of December last and of the work of the Subordinate Lodges for the year ending on that date.

NEW LODGES.

"Trout Lake" Lodge, No. 41, was instituted at Trout Lake City, on 12th December last by Bro. R. Gordon, Special Deputy Grand Master, and "Key City" Lodge, No. 42, at Cranbrook by Bro. A. E. Lott, Special Deputy Grand Master, on 9th May, 1899.

"Harmony" Rebekah Lodge, No. 12, was also instituted at Carson, by Special Deputy Grand Master, T. Hardy, on 28th September, 1898, and Bro. H. J. Raymer, P. G. M., Spécial Deputy Grand Master, instituted "Deborah" Rebekah Lodge, No. 13, at Rossland, on 12th April, 1899.

All these Lodges are reported to have been organized under most favorable auspices.

Correspondence has taken place with members at Fernie and Trail who are anxious to have Lodges of our Order at these places and it is expected that petitions will be received shortly.

MERGEMENT OF LODGES.

On 15th June, 1898, "Friendship" Lodge, No. 30, of Nanaimo, merged with "Black Diamond" Lodge, No. 5, of the same City.

"Aeme" Lodge, No. 14, and "Dominion" Lodge, No. 4, of Victoria, were consolidated under the latter name on 4th August, 1898.

On 14th April last, "Royal City" Lodge, No. 13, merged with "New Westminster" Lodge, No. 3.

These consolidations, it is believed, have proved beneficial to the Lodges immediately concerned and has conserved the best interests of the Order, it has also demonstrated the propriety of the legislation enacted two years ago making provisions for such contingencies which although deemed by some intricate and cumbersome, could not safely be simplified, in my opinion, without endangering the protection that should be afforded to the rights and interests of all the members affected.

DEFUNCT REBEKAH LODGES.

I regret to state that it has been found necessary to recover the Charter and effects of "Esther" Rebekah Lodge, No. 11, Union, and of "Bethel" Rebekah Lodge, No. 7, Mount Pleasant, Vancouver. In the former case the members express a hope to be in a position to apply for a restitution of the Charter and effects and to resuscitate the Lodge next winter and have been assured that every facility will be rendered them to do so.

LOSSES BY FIRE.

On the 11th September last, a most disastrous fire occurred at New Westminster which almost entirely destroyed the City. In this deplorable calamity our Lodges and individual members were heavy sufferers; and it appeared to the Executive Officers that it was an occasion on which the sympathy and fraternal aid of the

brotherhood of this Jurisdiction should be invoked. Accordingly an appeal was circulated amongst our Lodges which was most generously responded to. This fraternal feeling was not confined to our own Jurisdiction but from the neighboring State of Washington messages of sympathy and substantial and welcome assistance were received, showing the universality of the bond that binds us. The Special Committee formed by the New Westminster brethren to receive and distribute the funds donated, conducted their duties in such a methodical and business-like manner as to merit the warmest praise. A detailed statement of the amounts received and disbursed will be furnished in the Grand Master's report.

On the 10th inst. a telegram was received from Bro. Edgren, D. D. G. M., at Rosslund containing the unwelcome news that the Hall of Rosslund Lodge, No. 36, was destroyed by fire on that date and the Charter and part of the Regalia were saved.

ODDFELLOWS HOME FUND.

I am pleased to report the slow but steady progress of this fund; as will be seen by the statement attached, it has been increased during the year by \$180.44, the contribution of 5 cents per capita, a donation of \$2.00 by two worthy members of Harmony Lodge, No. 6, Wellington, and \$41.00 proceeds of the offertory at the Anniversary Service of the Victoria Lodges at St. Saviour's Church, Victoria West, on 30th April, 1899. This fund now amounts to \$490.42.

Strenuous efforts are being put forth in other Canadian Jurisdictions on behalf of the establishment of Odd Fellows Homes, a matter in which we on this side of the line are very backward when compared with what has been accomplished by our brethren to the south of us. This object cannot fail to commend itself to our approval and support, and there are many ways in which it could be assisted by our Lodges, it is suggested that it would be advisable to appoint a special committee to take this matter under their consideration and to take steps to bring it more prominently than hitherto to the attention of our lodges and the membership generally.

It is recommended that an appropriation of 5 cents per capita be made to this fund for the ensuing year.

AGED ODD FELLOWS FUND.

This fund which was created last Session, has been benefited to the extent of \$100., amount realized by the sale of Trout Lake Lodge, No. 41, of the Regalia etc., formerly belonging to Perseverance Lodge, No. 29, and \$7.00 from other sources, and now aggregates \$133.88, as shown by the attached statement.

NATIONAL SANITARIUMS.

A circular letter has been received from the officers of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, relating to the action of that Grand body at its last Session, respecting the establishment and maintenance of National Sanitariums for the reception and care of sick and enfeebled members of the Order and recommending that the several Grand Lodges contribute a sum to this object not exceeding 25 cents per capita.

The letter in question is submitted herewith for such action as you may deem advisable.

MAXIMUM BENEFITS.

In order to ensure a full and complete expression of the wishes of the members on the proposed legislation respecting maximum benefits, I addressed a communication to all the Subordinate Lodges calling their attention to the Resolution adopted last Session and likewise wrote to the D. D. G. M's, reminding them of the duty imposed on them in this connection. As a result replies have been received from all but six Lodges and have been placed in the hands of the Special Committee having charge of this important subject.

STATISTICAL.

As customary I beg to submit in tabulated form, statistics of the work of the Subordinate Lodges during the year ended on the 31st December last, showing the increase or decrease under each item as compared with the preceding year, also abstracts of the Semi Annual and Annual Reports of the Lodges for publication in the printed Proceedings of this Session. It is gratifying to note that there was a gain of 41 members during the year 1898.

FINANCIAL.

I also submit a detailed statement of the moneys received and disbursed on Grand Lodge account during the past year, observing that both receipts and expenditure very closely approximate the estimates made last Session.

It is respectfully submitted that it is unnecessary to have such a large balance in the hands of the Grand Treasurer at the end of the year; all that is needed is sufficient to meet the expenses of the next Session of the Grand Lodge, and in view of this, the Per Capita Tax for next year might with safety be reduced, say ten cents per member, which would, I am sure, be appreciated by the Subordinate Lodges.

The following statement of the work of the Lodges during the year ended 31st December, 1893, is compiled from the Reports to that date and a comparison is made between the result and that of the previous year:

The Grand Master appointed the following Committee on Distribution:—W. H. Morton, P. G. M., No. 5; J. Stark, No. 26; J. E. Phillips, P. G. M., No. 3.

T. F. Neelands, No. 8, presented and read the Report of the Grand Representatives which was on motion ordered to be received and printed in the proceedings of this Grand Lodge.

Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of B. C., I. O. O. F.

Your Representatives beg to submit a synopsis of the proceedings of the Seventy-Fourth Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge held in Boston, Mass., September 19-24, 1898.

A formal reception was held on Monday, September 19th, at which addresses of welcome were given on behalf of the City by Mayor Quincy, and for the State by General Appleton; and by the Grand Master, Grand Patriarch and the President of the Rebekah Assembly of the State of Massachusetts. To us the address of the Grand Master was somewhat marred by reference to ancient history, which, while of interest to some of the Representatives, was distasteful to Canadians.

At the conclusion of this meeting an adjournment was made to Copley Hall where the Session was held. All Grand bodies were represented, and seven Past Grand Sires were in attendance. Very little legislation of benefit to the Order was enacted, and no changes in the unwritten work were made.

Extract from Grand Sire's Report:

GENERAL CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

While the membership of the Order has not increased during the period covered by this report to the extent that was desired, yet there is much to encourage us, for the country where the great bulk

of our membership is to be found has not entirely recovered from the financial and business depression of the last few years, which accounts, to a large extent, for our increase, not being larger than it is, the membership of the Subordinate Lodges shows a very substantial increase, as does also that of the Degree of Rebekah, while the Patriarchal branch, notwithstanding the remedial legislation of the last two sessions of your body, shows a small decrease.

The condition of our Order in Europe and other lands not on the continent of North America is good, and will be more fully discussed under the head of International Affairs.

The following shows, in a condensed shape, the statistics and conditions as to membership, revenues, and expenditures of the various branches of the Order, save of the Patriarchs Militant, of which I have not the figures, on the dates indicated, and was prepared from the last annual reports made to Grand Secretary Grant.

Extract from Grand Secretary's Report:

This table comparing the returns for 1897 with those for 1896 is an interesting study. While the gain in the Subordinate Lodge membership is a slight improvement over that of the previous year, the slackening in the growth of the Rebekah wing of our peaceful army is phenomenal, the gain there being but little more than one-half that reported for 1896. Another disappointing fact is noted in the loss of nearly three thousand in Encamp-

ment membership. This somewhat depressing state of affairs is accounted for in a general way, by repeating what was said a year ago of the enforced idleness in some sections, and unremunerative employment in many others, by the financial stringency so universally complained of among the laboring people and those of moderate means.

The great Order of Odd Fellows seems to be composed of two classes of men and women: those (deplorably in the minority), who are moved and controlled by unselfish philanthropy; and those who are Odd Fellows for revenue only. Our teaching and our practice are founded upon love for the neighbor, and in our lessons we teach much of good to mankind, that is far above the love of money. If in selecting candidates for initiation, they can be persuaded to join us from a desire to help in a noble work, unimpelled by lustful longing for the funds dispensed as benefits, we will enjoy the present satisfaction of seeing our new members begin right, and they, as well as the whole Order, will be blessed in the dawn of a better future when selfishness and fault-finding are banished from the hearts and minds of all.

SUBORDINATE LODGE DECISIONS.

1. *Ques.*—What is the status of lodge property on the dissolution of the lodge? Does it belong to the Grand Lodge? If so, in what way could the Lodge possess itself of the real estate in case of opposition on the part of any member of the defunct Lodge or otherwise? Is there anything to prevent a Lodge, while in existence, selling its real estate if it choose so to do? Must it have authority from the Grand Lodge under which it works?

Ans.—On a dissolution of a Subordinate Lodge, its property becomes at once the property of the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction, and the Grand Lodge, if such Subordinate Lodge owned real estate, could proceed to take possession of it, as a private individual could; if, however, any member of such defunct Lodge was in actual possession of it, a suit to recover it would become necessary. It is usual for lodges, both Subordinate and Grand, to be incorporated under the civil laws of their several states, and such Grand Lodge should sue in the corporate name. Not being familiar with the laws and procedure of the civil courts of Vermont, cannot further advise you as to the method of procedure, but any good lawyer of your state could point out the remedy of the Grand Lodge. Subordinate Lodges, while in existence, have a right to dispose of any real estate they may own without asking or obtaining permission of the Grand Lodge to do so.

2. *Quæ.*—On what terms can one who in 1866 was initiated and received the first and second Degrees, be received now into membership?

Ans.—If an Ancient Odd Fellow, by depositing his card, or making other satisfactory proof of his former connection with the Order, and by paying the sum fixed by the by-laws of the Lodge for the admission of an Ancient Odd Fellow, and by being admitted by a ball ballot as prescribed for an initiate.

3. *Quæ.*—Does the official receipt entitle a brother to admittance into a lodge within his own Jurisdiction without the semi-annual pass-word, or is it necessary for a brother holding an official receipt to have the semi-annual pass-word in order to be entitled to admission?

Ans.—A brother seeking admission into a Lodge within his own Jurisdiction, must give the semi-annual pass-word given out by the Grand Master of the Jurisdiction; or, if he produces an official certificate or receipt, the A.T.P.W. No Brother can be admitted to a Lodge, whether or not he has a visiting card or an official certificate, unless he has one or the other of these words. Only his own Lodge can admit him without one or the other word; and no Lodge except his own should so admit him.

1. *Quæ.*—Has a Jurisdiction that licenses one insurance company, formed from members in its own state, any right to say that a company from another state shall not do business in that state?

Ans.—It has not, provided always that the company so refused has complied with the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and obtained authority from its officers to do business.

5. *Ques.*—Can a Jurisdiction make any discrimination as to the companies it will license, provided it license any, and the company produces a license from the Sovereign Grand Lodge? In other words, has the Subordinate Grand Jurisdiction any discretion as to the companies it will license, provided the company has the Sovereign Grand Lodge license?

Ans.—It has not.

[Questions 4 and 5 were approved with the following qualification and modification: If the "insurance company formed from members in its own state," referred to in said decisions, belonged to the class of "voluntary associations or small corporations" and "confining their operations to towns, cities or jurisdictions in which they are located and not seeking to do general insurance business," then and in that case the Grand Lodge of such Jurisdiction is not required to grant a license or permit to a company from another state or jurisdiction. See Digest of 1895, Sec. 591. Also Vol. 18, Journal of 1895, pages 14,435 to 14,438, and 14,470, 14,571.

6. *Ques.*—If a Brother steps up to the Secretary to pay his dues and assessments and says nothing about a receipt, has the Secretary a right to give him any other than the official certificate?

Ans.—He has not; if any acknowledgement is given in writing or on any printed form, it must be given on the form of the official certificate.

7. *Ques.*—If a Lodge agrees to transact business between the Lodge and its members, relative to their dues and assessments, without the use of the official certificate, and the Brother does not care for a receipt, has the Lodge a right to evade the law by so doing?

Ans.—When a member pays any money to his Lodge for dues or assessments and does not desire any written acknowledgement for such payment, he need not be given such acknowledgement; but if he does ask for such an acknowledgement, the Financial Secretary must issue to him an official certificate, showing the amount he has paid. When such evidence is demanded, no other form can be used than that what is known as the official certificate. The third resolution of the report of the committee on legislation, as amended and adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, shows plainly what the laws on the subject are, said resolution reading as follows: "That hereafter the official receipt (certificate) shall be designated as the 'official certificate,' and shall be issued in all cases where members pay dues and assessments to subordinate bodies, and shall request a receipt, and that such change be made in the form and matter as to make it plain and distinct, with ample space for necessary signatures, and a line for the location of the body issuing it, and the date."

8. *Ques.*—Is a member who is one month, or even one day, in arrears for dues or assessments, in good standing, so as to be entitled to sick benefits?

Ans.—No; but the length of time and the amount of dues to constitute a Brother in arrears is a matter of local legislation.

9. *Ques.*—A vacancy having occurred in the office of Degree Master of a Degree Lodge during the term, is the Deputy Degree Master eligible to fill the vacancy? Both Degree Master and Deputy Degree Master are installed into office with the same ceremony as the Noble Grand and Vice Grand of a Subordinate Lodge.

Ans.—If the Deputy Degree Master would have been eligible to fill the position of Degree Master, had he not been Deputy Degree Master, the fact that he was already Deputy Degree Master would not have disqualified him from being elected to fill such office, the vacancy occurring during the term.

10. *Ques.*—The question you propounded is in regard to the apparent conflict between the Constitution for Subordinate Lodges of your Jurisdiction (Lower Provinces) and the By-Laws of a Subordinate Lodge of such Jurisdiction, the constitution providing that application for membership shall be referred to a committee of three, "who shall report upon the application upon the next succeeding regular meeting (unless unavoidable circumstances prevent), when the candidate shall be balloted for with ball ballots, etc." The By-Laws of the Subordinate Lodge, which have been legally approved, provide, "When the report shall have been submitted to the Lodge, action shall be deferred until the next regular session, or from time to time, until any doubt as to the fitness of the candidate may be determined."

Ans.—In my judgment there is no conflict between the Constitution and the by-laws quoted; in many instances the word may is construed to mean shall, owing to the nature of the context, and in the same manner, where the word shall is used it may not always be mandatory, but the remainder of the sentence may be looked to to interpret the true meaning. In my judgment, therefore, the language of the Constitution does not mean to inhibit a Lodge from postponing action on a report of an investigating committee on an application for membership, for the language used by it in brackets, showing that it being (unless unforeseen circumstances prevent), and of course such unforeseen circumstances must be judged of by the Lodge itself, and certainly a Lodge would have the inherent right, as shown by the law as quoted in White's Digest, Art. 649, to postpone consideration of any committee report where they may deem it advisable or proper. The Lodge having then the right, even under the language of the Constitution, to postpone action on the re-

port of a committee on application for "unavoidable circumstances," of which it is the sole judge, it can provide in its by-laws, that all committee reports on applications shall not be considered until another session, and if these by-laws, as in this case, are approved by the Grand Lodge or its authority, it amounts to an interpretation of the meaning of the apparent mandatory language of the constitution. I therefore decide that there is no conflict between the constitutional provision quoted and the article of the by-laws.

11. *Ques.*—Is it optional or obligatory with a Lodge to indicate in a withdrawal card the rank of the member withdrawing?

Ans.—It is imperative with a lodge granting a withdrawal card, to state in it the highest rank the Brother has attained in the Lodge; especially is this the case when such a Brother demands such statement. The law as contained in Sec. 157, White's Digest, clearly settles this question.

12. *Ques.*—Have the Past Grands of any prescribed territory the right to organize themselves into an Association, taking the name or any similar one, of a "Past Grand's Association of—?"

Ans.—The question is one of considerable doubt, as there seems to be some discrepancy between the law as written and strictly construed, and the usage and practice; although I think the discrepancy is more apparent than real. The law prohibits conventions of members of the Order to influence legislation, as well as the organization of any body not authorized by the law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which shall require as a requisite for membership, good standing in the Order. The Sovereign Grand Lodge, however, has rather encouraged the formation of Odd Fellows organizations for social purposes, as witness the Past Grand Representatives' Union, composed of those who have been Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and of which organization the Junior Past Grand Sire is always the President; also, the organization of associations of Past Grand Masters, which exist in many Jurisdictions, one such being, I understand, in Ohio. These social organizations already being in existence, I can see no very good reason, nor, indeed do I find any positive enactment, prohibiting Past Grands within any designated territory from forming themselves into a social organization, provided they do not attempt to usurp any legislative functions which must belong to recognized bodies of the Order. I therefore come to the conclusion that it is permissible for Past Grands of any prescribed territory to form a Past Grand's Association, unless such is positively forbidden expressly by the Subordinate Grand Jurisdiction, and certainly they should be allowed to do so, with the assent of such Jurisdiction.

13. *Ques.*—Does continuous good standing as applied to qualifications for a veteran jewel demand that a Brother to be entitled to a veteran jewel shall not be at any time during the twenty-five years' period, in arrears for dues to his subordinate Lodge; or if a member failed once only during the twenty-five years to pay his dues as required by the by-laws of his lodge, and thereby became in bad standing, and not entitled to benefits for any sickness, would this fact disqualify him from receiving the veteran jewel?

Ans.—It is my opinion, that a fair and reasonable construction of the law relating to the veteran jewel is, that when a member of the Order has been continuously a member of a Subordinate Lodge and carried on its rolls, not having been suspended for any cause, that the fact that he may have been one or more years in arrears for his dues, thereby being temporarily deprived of the right to draw benefits during sickness, does not deprive him of the right to receive and wear the veteran jewel. If he has been a member of a Subordinate Lodge, or Lodges, for twenty-five years without having been suspended, he has a right to the jewel. It is further my decision, that where a Brother has taken a withdrawal card from his Lodge and has within twelve months thereafter, deposited the same and has been admitted to membership in another Subordinate Lodge, that the fact of such intermission in his active membership in a Lodge does not break his continuous membership in the Order so as to preclude him from claiming the veteran jewel. If, however, he permits more than twelve months to elapse from the date of taking his withdrawal card, and depositing it in another Lodge, he then becomes an Ancient Odd Fellow, and breaks his continuous membership, and is not entitled to wear the jewel. Of course, if after his second admission to a Lodge a period of twenty-five years of continuous membership intervenes he is entitled to the jewel.

14. *Ques.*—Can a Lodge legally grant relief from its general fund to the widow of a member who died in bad standing, resulting from non-payment of dues?

Ans.—Yes, when not prohibited by the state Grand body,

15. *Ques.*—Can a Lodge legally grant relief from its general fund to persons in distress outside of the Order?

Ans.—It can not.

16. *Ques.*—The Secretary of a Lodge retains moneys paid in as dues and uses them for his own purposes. After the Lodge learns the facts it takes a note from the defaulting officer in settlement for the money. Can the Lodge after such settlement punish the Brother for retaining said monies?

Ans.—Yes.

17. *Ques.*—A Brother sues the Lodge because of reduction in sick benefits; he loses his case. Has the Lodge the right to retain accruing benefits as a set-off for the cost in the case allowed the Lodge by the court?

Ans.—As a general proposition the Lodge has such a right, though this may not be the case in some Jurisdictions where the municipal law may otherwise provide.

18. *Ques.*—Under the uniform constitution for Subordinate Lodges of Colorado, it is provided that where there is but one candidate for an office "he may be declared elected by acclamation." Is such provision in conflict with general law?

Ans.—It is not; the Grand Lodge of Colorado had a right to make such a provision in its constitution for the government of Subordinate Lodges.

19. *Ques.*—Is it legal to ballot on the application of a candidate for the first Degree, the second Degree, or the third Degree, at a special meeting called for that purpose?

Ans.—It is not, unless the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction has provided for such special meetings. In the absence of such authority it would not be proper to ballot for any Degree at a special meeting.

20. *Ques.*—Can a Subordinate Lodge hold Memorial Services accordance with proclamation of the Grand Sire, which proclamation designates the second Tuesday in June, or on such other day as may be practicable, on a Sunday?

Ans.—While our laws forbid the holding of Lodge meetings on Sundays for general or regular Lodge business, and such meetings are illegal, yet it is legal and proper for Subordinate Lodges to meet on Sunday to attend the funeral of a Brother. I therefore think that the members of a Lodge, meeting to hold Memorial Services in honor of the worthy dead of the Order, and decorate their graves, is not only not illegal to be held on a Sunday, but that for many reasons is the most appropriate time. Of course each Lodge must be the judge of which day is practicable for it to hold such services.

21. *Ques.*—Can a Subordinate Lodge pass a resolution providing that if any of its members enlist in the present war between the United States and Spain, that their dues and assessments will be paid by the Lodge, out of the treasury, so that said members may be kept in good standing until their return home?

Ans.—Under our laws a Lodge cannot remit dues nor can it draw money from its treasury to pay dues for any class of members, no matter how meritorious such members may be. Therefore I decide the question asked in the negative, with this qualification however,

that a Lodge may, out of the 5 per cent. fund which it is authorized to set apart for any purpose it may see proper, pay the dues of any class of its members.

22. *Ques.*—Statement: The Constitution of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina, Art. X, Sec. 1, reads as follows: "This Constitution shall not be altered, amended or annulled, unless a proposition to that effect be made in writing at a regular communication, and laid over until the next annual communication, and adopted by a majority of three-fourths of the members present." At the annual communication of the Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F. of South Carolina in 1896, a committee was appointed to revise the constitution and by-laws of the Grand Lodge, and to report the next annual communication. The committee reported at the annual communication in 1897 and made various changes in our constitution and by-laws. Their report was adopted by the Grand Lodge. Is the adoption of the committee report legal or should it have lain over till the next annual communication?

Ans.—Its adoption at the time was illegal. It should have lain over for one year, or until the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge. See Sec. 428, White's Digest, edition of 1895.

23. *Ques.*—Has a Grand Master the right to grant a dispensation to one or more Lodges to solicit subscriptions from the members of the Order throughout its Jurisdiction for the purpose of erecting a monument to a worthy member of the Order?

Ans.—He has the right to give such permission, provided the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction has passed no law declaring that permission to solicit aid for any purpose, must be granted by the Grand Lodge only. That a Grand Lodge or a Grand Master, unless prohibited by such Grand Lodge, may grant permission to a Lodge to solicit aid even for an individual member, seems to have been decided by the Sovereign Grand Lodge. See Sections 1558, 1559, digest of 1895.

24. *Ques.*—When a Lodge elects a Brother to membership, who makes application upon a visiting card, and certifies his election to the lodge issuing the visiting card and asks for a withdrawal card should not the Noble Grand and Secretary immediately issue a card without action of the Lodge, all fees and dues being paid, unless charges are preferred? By analogy will not the law that requires a dismissal certificate to be issued without action of the Lodge govern in this case?

Ans.—Were this an original question, that is, one that had never been actually passed upon by Sovereign Grand Lodge, I would hold that under the fact stated, the Noble Grand and Secretary

should issue the withdrawal card without any action of the Lodge directing them so to do, were it not for the fact that the decision of Grand Sire Busbee, made in 1891, holds, "It is necessary that the Lodge to which a Brother applies for membership should notify the Lodge issuing the visiting card, of his election; and thereupon the Brother must apply for the necessary withdrawal card or dismissal certificate; but the Secretary of the Lodge may apply for such card or certificate, at the instance and by the authority of the Brother." See White's digest, Sec. 669, edition of 1895. This contemplates clearly that an application shall be made to the Lodge and not to an officer of the Lodge. The reason for compelling an application to be made to the Lodge probably was, that it was thought possible that a Brother after obtaining a visiting card might have been guilty of some improper conduct, and that the Lodge issuing such card should have the right to enquire into such matter before giving the withdrawal card. I therefore hold that a Lodge must by its action grant the card, and that without such authorization the Noble Grand and Secretary can not issue it.

25. *Ques.*—What action should be taken if a Lodge, on ballot being taken, refuse to grant a withdrawal card, when a Brother has been elected to membership in another Lodge upon application with a visiting card?

Ans.—If the visiting card was regularly and legally issued, and no charges had been filed against the Brother during the period between its issuance and the application for a withdrawal card, if the Lodge then refuses to issue it, it would be the duty of the Grand Master, if the facts were clear and undisputed, to direct the Lodge to issue such card.

REBEKAH DECISIONS.

33. *Ques.*—Can a Rebekah Lodge, instituted the last of April, elect and install officers in June, or should they hold over?

Ans.—Where a Rebekah Lodge is organized and instituted during the last half of a term, say in April, the officers elected at the institution hold over during the June term, and the term for which they hold will be styled a special term. See Sections 1507, 1510, digest of 1895.

34. *Ques.*—Can the Grand Lodge delegate the power to the President of the Rebekah assembly, to act ad interim, on appeals from Rebekah Lodges, with a proviso, that any lodge or individual feeling aggrieved by such decision, "shall appeal to the Grand Master, whose decisions must be final, until reversed by the Grand Lodge," or should the appeal be taken direct to the Grand Master for his decision?

Ans.—The Grand Lodge, in my judgment, can so delegate its powers, and if it so delegates them, the appeal lies in the first place to the President of the Rebekah Assembly, with the right of appeal from her decision to the Grand Master.

35. *Ques.*—Can the Grand Lodge delegate to the President of the Assembly, power to act, ad interim (without the approval of the Grand Master), and render decisions and answer all questions of law and usage, arising in Rebekah Lodges, and to stand as law until reviewed and passed upon by the Judiciary Committee at the succeeding Grand Lodge; or should all questions of law and usage of Rebekah Lodges be submitted to the Grand Master for his decision?

Ans.—It seems to me that the creating of Rebekah Assemblies, and formulating laws for them, clearly indicates that the design of the Sovereign Grand Lodge was to allow them full power to govern Subordinate Rebekah Lodges, if the Grand Lodges of the several jurisdictions choose to clothe them with such power. I therefore answer by saying that the Grand Lodge can delegate such authority as you have named to the President of the Rebekah Assembly. See Sections 30 and 32, Rebekah Code.

36. *Ques.*—Can the Grand Lodge delegate to the President of the Rebekah Assembly, the authority, ad interim, to approve by-laws of Subordinate Rebekah Lodges?

Ans.—It can.

37. *Ques.*—Can the President of the Rebekah Assembly, ad interim, grant dispensations to Rebekah Lodges, without the approval of the Grand Master?

Ans.—She can, provided such authority has been granted by the Grand Lodge of her Jurisdiction.

38. *Ques.*—Has the Grand Lodge the power to grant the Rebekah Assembly the right to make a law that an appeal from Rebekah Lodges shall be made to the Rebekah Assembly?

Ans.—That a Grand Lodge may grant such a right; the law as found in White's Digest, Article 1178, seems to have been repealed by necessary implication, by the adoption of the Rebekah Code, adopted after the law as found in said article, and by the terms of such Rebekah Code. See Sections 30 and 32 thereof. It seems to have been the intention to allow Grand Lodges to invest Rebekah Assemblies with a large amount of power to regulate the affairs of this branch of the Order. Section 32, providing that appeals from the "decision" or action of a Rebekah Assembly shall be made to the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction, etc.

39. *Ques.*—Can an expelled member of a Rebekah Lodge be reinstated without the permission of the Grand Master, or, in other words, will permission of the President of the Assembly be sufficient?

Ans.—Under the law, as found in White's Digest, Article 713, a Grand Lodge of a Jurisdiction may confer the power on a Grand Master during the recess to grant a petition from a Subordinate Lodge to restore an expelled member to said Lodge. I therefore have to hold, that under the idea that Grand Lodges have the power to clothe the Rebekah assemblies with larger powers for the government of the Subordinate Rebekah Lodges, that if such general powers have been so conferred upon Rebekah assemblies, that such assemblies have the right to authorize and empower the President of such assemblies to grant permission to restore expelled members of subordinate Rebekah Lodges; but without such direct authority from the assembly no matter how undoubted may be the power of the assembly to act in such matters, the President cannot grant such authority, no more than a Grand Master could in the absence of authority of his Grand Lodge.

40. *Ques.*—Is there any rule of law to prevent a young Rebekah Lodge making up white robes for the team, as the sisters may elect to do, to be used in the work, pending the time the Lodge is able financially to buy something better?

Ans.—There is not. Any Rebekah Lodge may, if it deem it proper, make up for themselves any regalia or robes, only such regalia must be as prescribed by the law.

41. *Ques.*—Does the marriage of a Rebekah Sister to one not an Odd Fellow in any way affect her standing as a Rebekah member?

Ans.—It does not.

42. *Ques.*—Should the Recording Secretary of Rebekah Lodges or the Financial Secretary sign the official certificate showing payment of dues?

Ans.—When a Rebekah Lodge has a financial Secretary, that officer should sign; if a Rebekah Lodge has no financial Secretary, then the Secretary should sign.

43. *Ques.*—If a Degree of Rebekah Lodge meets every week and wishes to meet only once every two weeks, will it be necessary for them to ask for a special dispensation?

Ans.—Where the by-laws of a Rebekah Lodge, duly approved by the competent authority, provides for weekly meetings, the Lodge can legally change the number of meetings from weekly to twice a month, by changing the by-laws, and where there is no pro-

vision that the President of the Rebekah assembly shall have authority to approve amendments to by-laws, they can only be approved by action of the assembly. The regular time of meeting can not be altered or permitted by issuing a special dispensation, although a dispensation can be issued to such Lodge, and will be lawful to hold a special meeting at a time not provided for in the by-laws.

41. *Ques.*—Where the Grand Lodge of a Jurisdiction authorizes the President of a Rebekah assembly to appoint and commission Deputies for Rebekah Lodges, what should be the title of such Deputies?

Ans.—The title of such officer is District Deputy President.

45. *Ques.*—Statement: A woman joins a Rebekah Lodge; some months after she moves to another town in the same Jurisdiction, where she makes application to a Rebekah Lodge located there for admission by initiation. She is duly elected before it is learned by the last named Lodge that she held membership in another Lodge. She never applied for nor received a card from the Lodge she first joined. What is her status as a member? What law, if any, has she violated? What action or decree should the Grand Master make in this case?

Ans.—She is still a member of the first Lodge she joined, never having legally become a member of the last named Lodge. She is liable to have charges preferred against her in the first Lodge, and while she acted in possible ignorance of the law, of which the Lodge must be the judge on the trial, such ignorance, if proven, may be taken in mitigation of the offence, which is seeking to become a member of a Lodge by fraudulent misrepresentation. The Grand Master, after his attention has been called to the case, should direct the second Lodge to strike the name of the woman from the roll of membership and notify the Lodge to which she really belongs to prefer charges against her. I think in this case, if the woman erred through ignorance, it might be well, if she is otherwise worthy, for the first Lodge to ignore her offence, and ask her to apply for a withdrawal card, so that she can deposit it in the Lodge where she now resides. This would get the matter straight, and perhaps save a worthy woman to the Order. This last, however, is a mere suggestion, not official. My answer to the query is the law as I construe it.

46. *Ques.*—May a sister, a member of Rebekah Lodge, prefer charges against a brother in his Subordinate Lodge, and would the Lodge have jurisdiction of the brother in the matter, and could it proceed to trial upon charges so preferred?

Ans.—In the case you cite, the sister of a Rebekah Lodge can prefer charges against a brother of a Subordinate Lodge, but in the absence of local legislation upon the subject, should first present such charges in the usual form to the Rebekah Lodge of which she is a member. Such Rebekah Lodge shall forthwith forward to the Lodge of which the accused is a member, a certified copy of the charges, over the signature of the N. G. and Secretary, and attested by the seal of the Lodge, and the Lodge to whom such charges are made shall proceed to hear and determine the same in like manner as if preferred by a member of its own body. See Sec. 1,024, White's Digest, Edition of 1805. I hold that this Article 1,024, applies as well to members of Rebekah Lodges, as to other members of the Order, although they are not specifically mentioned in said article.

47. *Ques.*—The legal title of Rebekah Lodges having been fixed as "Rebekah Lodges" by legislation enacted in 1891, can such Lodges instituted previous to that date continue to use a seal with any other title, such as "D. of R" degree, etc.?

Ans.—Under the legislation referred to, the old designation of Rebekah Lodges was changed from Lodges of "Daughters of Rebekah," to "Rebekah Lodges," consequently the seals used by such Lodges should conform to their style as so fixed. Therefore I hold that it is not proper to use a seal with a designation of the name on it as it was before the name was changed. The Grand Master should call attention of Rebekah Lodges to this, and direct them to procure seals with the proper name and title. The use of a seal with the old name thereon, it seems to me, is improper, as it would be for a Lodge to use an old seal, after such Lodge has changed its name with assent of the Grand Lodge.

48. *Ques.*—As to the right of a President of an Assembly, to whom has been granted the right to appoint and commission district Deputy Presidents, to formulate and give out the term pass word?

Ans.—That where such authority is given by the Grand Lodge of a Jurisdiction, the President of the Assembly has such right. See Sec. 36, of the code of laws for the government of Lodges, to be found on page 349, White's Digest, edition of 1805.

49. *Ques.*—Has any jurisdiction the right to confer the Assembly degree upon Past Grands of Subordinate Lodges, who are not Past Noble Grands of Rebekah Lodges?

Ans.—It has.

50. *Ques.*—Must Rebekah Lodges go without representation in assembly until they have a P. N. G. in good standing?

Ans.—A Subordinate Grand Lodge has the right to authorize representation of Rebekah Lodges in the Rebekah assembly by Past Grands of Subordinate Lodges who are members of Rebekah Lodges in good standing, as well as by Past Noble Grands of Rebekah Lodges. In case such authority is given, a Rebekah Lodge having in its membership a Past Grand need not go without representation until it has a Past Noble Grand. In all cases a representative from a Rebekah Lodge to a Rebekah assembly must possess the qualifications required by the law of the Jurisdiction. If the Lodge has not among its members in good standing such qualified members, it may elect as its Representative a member of another Rebekah Lodge, who does possess the requisite qualifications, if the local law so provides.

51. *Ques.*—Statement: The S. G. L. of 1896 approved the following decision of Grand Sire Stebbins, it being as follows: "Brothers in a Rebekah Lodge, no matter what their position, official or otherwise, can only wear the Regalia of the Subordinate Lodge." At the session of 1897, the S. G. L. approved your decision, which is in direct contradiction to the one first voted, your decision being as follows: "When any one is elected to office in a Rebekah Lodge, whether male or female, they must wear the Regalia provided by law for such office." The first decision was incorporated as law in Sec. 25, of the Rebekah code, which remains the same to-day as in 1896. Which decision takes precedence, the one approved in 1896 or 1897? Which is law now?

Ans.—In answering the question which I now do, I must first correct the statement, which is quoted just as it is submitted by the representative, for it states as facts some things which are not so in a very important particular; *after* the decision of 1897 had been approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, see page 15,533, Journal of 1897, the Sovereign Grand Lodge adopted the report of the committee on the Degree of Rebekah, which materially changed Sec. 25 of the code for the government of Rebekah Lodges, striking out from the section the provision, "The Brethren shall wear the Regalia they are entitled to wear in a Subordinate Lodge. The Sisters shall wear Regalia and Jewels as follows," etc. The committee in the report, after specifying the Regalia to be worn by each elective and appointive officer, proceed as follows: "All of the foregoing shall apply to all officers and Past Noble Grands, irrespective of sex. Brethren who are not officers nor Past Noble Grands shall wear the Regalia they are entitled to wear in a Subordinate Lodge. Sisters who are not officers nor Past Noble Grands shall wear badges or collars of pink and green, not exceeding three inches in width." See Journal of 1897, page 15,643, et seq. Thus the statement as made by the Brother asking the decision is materially wrong as to the correct facts. To answer now the broad question I reply, that

the Sovereign Grand Lodge having approved a decision of the Grand Sire, which is, or appears to be, in conflict with a former decision of that officer, the last approved decision stands as existing law, until reversed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

MISCELLANEOUS DECISIONS.

62. *Ques.*—In the new Subordinate ritual, a Rebekah sign is spoken of. Is this the same sign given in Rebekah work for recognizing brothers?

Ans.—It is.

63. *Ques.*—Does the decision, "It is a brother's right to vote a secret ballot" apply to a poll for the election of officers and representatives where written ballots are used?

Ans.—It does.

64. *Ques.*—Would a brother who endeavored to find out the names of those voting for the candidates be guilty of an offence under our laws?

Ans.—It would not; it being understood that this answer applies only to voting for officers of the body, and not for balloting for candidates for admission, either by initiation or affiliation, in which last named case the ballot must be secret, and no one has any right to endeavor to ascertain how any one other person voted.

65. *Ques.*—A committee being appointed to investigate charges against the "tellers or scrutineers" at an election for officers, can said committee order Brothers voting at said election to expose the character of their votes and tell for whom they voted?

Ans.—Where the election of an officer is contested, the body in which the election took place has a right, through such agencies as it may create, to find out and ascertain how and for whom each ballot was cast. In such case, if the written ballots were preserved, they would be the best evidence, but if not preserved, the several members voting could legally be examined as to how they voted.

66. *Ques.*—Statement: A Brother is granted a withdrawal card from his Subordinate Lodge on December 14, 1896; on September 10, 1897, he applies for admission by card and is rejected; on December 1, 1897, he applies for a withdrawal card from the Rebekah Lodge. Is he entitled to a withdrawal card from the Rebekah Lodge and to visit on same in Rebekah Lodges for one year thereafter?

Ans.—The Rebekah Lodge of which he is a member has the right to grant him a withdrawal card, and when it has been so granted he has a right to visit upon it for twelve months after its date.

67. *Ques.*—Can a Brother deposit the receipt in another Lodge for admission the same as a visiting card?

Ans.—Yes.

68. *Ques.*—Has the Lodge the right to appropriate the funds of the Lodge to pay railroad fare or carriage hire of any of its members or officers to attend the funeral or burial of a member of their own or any other Lodge?

Ans.—It has not the right to make such appropriation; see Decision No. 31, approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge at its session of 1897, as found, with approval on pages 15,168, 15,551, 15,581, Journal of Proceedings. This decision does not, however, prohibit the Lodge from making the appropriation from the 5 per cent. authorized to be set apart by Lodges, with consent of Grand Lodge, for certain special purposes as provided for in the law as found in Art. 378, of White's Digest, last edition; but the inhibition applies fully to appropriations made out of the general fund.

69. *Ques.*—If an officer or Degree Staff enter from or retire to an ante-room through a door way other than the one in charge of the Inside Guardian, must they address the chair as directed on page 33 of the ritual?

Ans.—He or they need not. The team work contemplates the entrance of the team at certain points in their work, through some other entrance than the regular entrance to their Lodge room.

70. *Ques.*—Can the holder of an unexpired withdrawal card, be a petitioner for a new Lodge, and become a charter member, without either the A. T. P. W. (or A. P. W. if a Rebekah Lodge) or an order for it?

Ans.—He can; his card is the authority for becoming such petitioner; the possession or non-possession of such word does not affect his right.

71. *Ques.*—Statement: A member of the Order is charged with conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow (using insulting language to the Noble Grand of his Rebekah Lodge). He is, on trial, found guilty. The Constitution provides a penalty of suspension or expulsion for the offence of which the member was convicted. The Lodge refused to enforce that penalty. The matter was appealed to the Grand Lodge. The committee of appeals reported that the evidence of the Brother's guilt was overwhelming, and ordered it back to the Lodge for the enforcement of the penalty, and the Grand Lodge approved the report. The Lodge suspended the member for twenty-four hours. The Lodge met Saturday night. Would you consider such

a suspension reasonable, a sufficient punishment and a compliance with the mandate of the Grand Lodge.

Ans.—Where there is a minimum and a maximum punishment prescribed by law, it is the province of the trial body to prescribe and fix the punishment. Unless the constitution of your jurisdiction fixes the minimum period of suspension, the Lodge had a right to fix any period it chose. The punishment adjudged by the Lodge, does not strike an impartial observer as being adequate, but it having the legal right to fix the punishment, and it being within the terms of the law, its decision must stand, as it has inflicted some punishment.

72. *Ques.*—Are printed ballots legal?

Ans.—They are. I know of no law which forbids their use in an election, although it may not be in good taste to have them prepared in advance of an election, as savoring too much of electioneering.

73. *Ques.*—Where a Lodge (Subordinate or Rebekah) or a Subordinate Encampment, has the office of Secretary or Scribe divided between two persons, one having charge of the records, etc., and the other of the accounts, what is the official title of each one?

Ans.—The officer of a subordinate Lodge or Rebekah Lodge and a Subordinate Encampment having charge of the records, is known and described officially in the case of a Lodge as "Secretary," and in the case of an Encampment as "Scribe;" where the Lodge has another officer to take charge of its finances and accounts, such officer is styled officially as the "Financial Secretary," and in a similar case in the Encampment is styled "Financial Scribe."

74. *Ques.*—Is it a violation of law of the Order to publish in an Odd Fellows' periodical notices of expulsion of members from the Order, after such notice of expulsion has been promulgated by the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge to the Subordinate Lodges by circular letters?

Ans.—It is not a violation of the laws of the Order so to do.

75. *Ques.*—Can an officer-elect be installed into office, he being twelve weeks in arrears for dues, the uniform constitution for Subordinate Lodges of the Jurisdiction requiring a member to be thirteen weeks in arrears for dues, before he becomes non-beneficial? In other words, a member of this Jurisdiction is in good standing, until he becomes thirteen weeks in arrears for dues.

Ans.—The officer-elect being in good standing, according to the Constitution, he is eligible for installation, into office, providing he has performed such previous service in other offices as is required by law.

77. *Ques.*—By the by-laws of a Lodge in Oregon, it is provided: “That in conducting the funeral of a Brother of this Lodge, in good standing who is to be buried in a cemetery beyond the city limits, the Noble Grand is hereby authorized to procure at the expense of the Lodge, a sufficient number of conveyances, of which he shall be sole judge, to accommodate such Brothers as he may appoint to assist him, and to proceed to such cemetery and perform the funeral ceremony of the Order, provided such expense shall not exceed the sum of fifteen dollars.” Is such a by-law legal?

Ans.—It is not. The Sovereign Grand Lodge, at its session in Springfield in 1897, approved a decision of the Grand Sire, No. 31, to be found on page 15,168 of the proceedings of said session, by which it was declared, that a Lodge had not the right to appropriate the funds of the Lodge to pay railroad fare and carriage hire of its members to attend the funeral of a member who died and was buried several miles from the Lodge room. This decision stands, therefore, as one of the laws of the Order, and under it, no Lodge has a right to pass such a by-law as is quoted, but a Lodge may appropriate money from the five per cent fund, authorized to be set apart for such uses as it may deem proper, for the purpose of hiring conveyances to transport Brothers to the funeral of a deceased member.

78. *Ques.*—The constitution of the Grand Lodge (Oregon) prescribes no residence qualification. Under same, is it legal for one Lodge to prescribe by by-law, that no person can petition the Lodge who has not resided in the state three months, for another to require four months and another six months residence?

Ans.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge not having passed any general law specifying what length of residence in a Jurisdiction shall be required of persons applying for membership in a Lodge situated therein, it would be perfectly legal for the several Subordinate Grand bodies to fix such period, and where such period has not been so fixed, it seems to be within the powers of Subordinate Lodges, to fix such period by their by-laws, which by-laws, of course, must be approved by the Grand body to which such body is subordinate.

79. *Ques.*—Has any Jurisdiction the right to confer the assembly degree upon Past Grands of Subordinate Lodges, who are not Past Noble Grands of Rebekah Lodges?

Ans.—It has.

80. *Ques.*—The Rebekah ritual provides that Brothers should wear the regalia they are entitled to wear in the Subordinate Lodge, etc. Is it proper for a Brother who holds office, when sitting in a Subordinate Lodge, to wear the regalia and jewel of such office when sitting in a Rebekah Lodge?

Ans.—The law governing the Rebekah branch provides that officers of a Rebekah Lodge, whether Brothers or Sisters, shall wear the official regalia of the office. The code was amended to this effect at the session of the Sovereign grand Lodge held in Springfield, in 1897. A Brother, member of a Rebekah Lodge, not an officer of such Lodge, shall wear the regalia he is entitled to wear in a subordinate Lodge. For this law, see pages 15,611-2, Journal of Proceedings, S. G. L., session of 1897. The law being what it is, I decide that a Brother, not an officer of a Rebekah Lodge, can wear the regalia he is entitled to wear in a Subordinate Lodge.

81. *Ques.*—Is it a violation of Sec. 5 of Art. XVI, S. G. L. Constitution, for a Brother to open and conduct a saloon, he being at the time a bartender rightfully and legally so employed?

Ans.—It is.

The Grand Sire's decisions were all approved, with the exception of Nos. 12, 75 and 81.

We give those affecting the Subordinate and Rebekah portion of the Order.

LEGISLATION.

Hereafter the Grand Sire in making his decisions shall send a copy to the parties interested only, and the decisions shall not be printed until they have been submitted to the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

The persons who are the beneficiaries of the funeral benefits are the widow, orphans (under the age of twenty-one years) or the dependent relatives of the deceased, or relatives upon whom the deceased was dependent at the time of death. In the event of the death of a member in good standing not possessing any of the above named beneficiaries of a funeral benefit, and leaving no estate or insufficient assets to pay the expenses of funeral, the Lodge shall pay the bill of the undertaker and such other necessary expenses, not exceeding the amount of funeral benefit.

That the several Grand bodies be, and they are hereby, fully authorized to declare in the several Jurisdictions what length of time or what sum of dues a Brother shall owe for dues to constitute such Brother non-beneficial.

All official certificates printed in future shall have a line for date of payment.

The possession of an Official Certificate for dues paid to a later date than when it is presented, properly signed by the Secretary and Noble Grand with the seal affixed, be and is hereby declared sufficient authority for any Noble Grand to communicate to the holder thereof,

upon proper identification, the current travelling password of the Order.

All legislation heretofore enacted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge; in any way recognizing or authorizing life or accident insurance in the name of Odd Fellowship, be and the same is hereby repealed, and further, that all certificates heretofore issued to such life or accident Insurance Companies are hereby revoked.

Section 3, Article 9 of the Constitution was amended, making it necessary for a Grand Representative to be a member of a Rebekah Lodge in good standing.

It was decided that after the Session of 1898 the practice of presenting to new Representatives, without cost, copies of bound Journals of all the proceedings of this Grand body be discontinued, and all legislation in conflict with this resolution be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 531, White's Digest was repealed.

Section 18 of the Constitution was amended, so that in future each Grand Lodge will be allowed as many copies of the printed proceedings as it has Subordinate Lodges, and twenty copies for the use of the Grand Lodge—each Grand Representative shall be allowed five copies, and each Grand officer and Past Grand Sire one copy.

In all cases of appeal, the appellant at the time the appeal is filed, shall notify the appellee of such filing, and thereafter either party filing any argument or brief, shall serve a copy on the opposite party:—when a Grand Lodge is appellee such service shall be by sending the copy to the Grand Secretary of such Grand Lodge.

REBEKAH.

A resolution was introduced asking that Rebekah Assemblies be allowed representation in the Sovereign Grand Lodge. This was defeated.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge refused to authorize a National Rebekah Assembly.

No changes in the Rebekah Ritual were made.

The question of paying stipulated weekly benefits was decided in the negative.

A resolution providing for the admission of married daughters and sisters of Odd Fellows, whose husbands are not members of the Order, was also decided in the negative.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The following Officers were elected for the ensuing two years:—

A. S. PINKERTON of Massachusetts, Grand Sire,
 A. C. CABLE of Ohio, Deputy Grand Sire,
 J. FRANK GRANT, re-elected, Grand Secretary,
 M. RICHARDS MUCKLE, re-elected, Grand Treasurer.

In accordance with your instructions the following was moved:

Resolved, That Subordinate Grand bodies may enact legislation whereby members of defunct Lodges, who at the time their Lodge became defunct were in good standing, and unable through sickness or disability to earn a livelihood, or who have continuously been a member of the Order for twenty years, shall continue to be entitled to all the rights and privileges of the Order on payment of dues to their Grand Lodge.

The necessary power was not given by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

All amendments relating to biennial sessions were defeated, but will be taken up again at the next session. An amendment was introduced adding to the qualification of Grand Representatives the provision that they must be members of a Grand Encampment and a Canton.

An amendment was also introduced providing for the admission of the five civilized tribes of Indians residing in Indian Territory, and forever excluding persons with negro blood.

INSTALLATION.

A public Installation was held on Saturday. A large number of visitors were present: the following were installed:—

 Grand Messenger, C. F. Lamsden of North Carolina,
 Grand Chaplain, Rev. J. W. Venable of Kentucky.

The entertainment of the Representatives by the people of Boston left nothing to be desired, (unless it was that there was a little less of it.)

The parade was the largest that we have ever witnessed and left an impression on our minds that will not soon be effaced. We were particularly pleased with the reception accorded us as Representatives of British Columbia along the line of march, not on our

own account, but because honor was paid to the country we love so well; and for that reason we shall always have kind feelings towards the people of Boston.

In conclusion we beg to thank the members for the honor conferred on us by electing us to the Office of Grand Representatives.

We also wish to congratulate the members on the standing of the Order to-day, for at no time in its history has it been in so prosperous a condition as at the present time; this we have every reason to believe will continue, until the destiny of this Grand Order has been fulfilled.

It was on motion *Resolved* that this Grand Lodge do now adjourn to 7:30 o'clock this evening.

The Grand Lodge adjourned accordingly.

EVENING SESSION.

The Grand Lodge met pursuant to adjournment at 7:30 o'clock p. m. The Grand Officers and a quorum of Representatives present.

The Roll of Officers and Representatives was called.

The special Committee on Uniform System of Dues and Benefits presented the following Report which was on motion ordered to be received and its consideration made the first business to-morrow morning.

To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F.

Your Committee beg to report that the data collected by the Grand Secretary through the D. D. G. M.'s regarding the proposition submitted to the Subordinate Lodges to reduce the maximum amount of sick benefits from \$10 to \$8 per week for each dollar of monthly dues, have been placed in our hands and we have carefully considered the same.

We find the Lodges very divided, but gather from the difficulty experienced by them in obtaining information on the subject, that little study has been given the question.

Thirty-one Lodges reported—fourteen favorable to the proposition—and seventeen unfavorable thereto. Six Lodges failed to report.

The arguments used by those Lodges reporting unfavorably, seem to be:—

(a) At present able to save something out of dues and investments.

(b) Can continue paying the same amounts as heretofore for many years to come, but eventually the necessity of a reduction will be more apparent.

(c) Certain Lodges may be able to continue at the prevailing rates, but the Lodges generally cannot afford to unless the dues are increased, as one dollar per month is not sufficient to meet their liabilities according to the statistics of the best authorities.

(d) Two dollars, or other small amount paid for first two weeks, and assessments made for funeral and nurse expenses.

(e) That the full and absolute control of funds should be invested in each Lodge and that the Grand Lodge should have no authority to interfere.

(f) Quite satisfied to allow things to remain as they are at present.

(g) May have to reduce the benefits at some future time.

(h) Not in the best interests of the Order to make reductions in benefits compulsory by legislation.

In favor of the proposition we advance the experience of older jurisdictions and Lodges, and are anxious that the brethren of this Jurisdiction should not pass through their trying financial worries. We are of the opinion that the time has come for the Grand Lodge to go into this vital question in a comprehensive manner, such as will place the finances of the Lodges on a sound footing, and assure our members for all time to come the reasonable expectation that on joining the Order at 21 a Brother after paying dues for twenty or thirty years will have some assurance of receiving aid from his Lodge similar to that afforded to others during that long lapse of time.

The Grand Bodies of Odd Fellowship both in Great Britain and on this Continent, have through the wisdom and experience of over fifty years arrived at conclusions which are now inspiring confidence in the economic management of the funds of the Order. This was not always so.

At one time in the history of the older Manchester Unity, much confusion reigned as to the payment of proper benefits owing to the Lodges being permitted to regulate their own finances. The Grand Body had made no provision in its system of jurisdiction for obtaining any knowledge of or attempting to regulate the finances of the Lodges, or to restrict their use to the legitimate purposes of the Order. What funds the Lodges had, for what purposes used, were sealed volumes to that Grand Body, except as bankrupt Lodges surrendered their charters or suffering members made appeal.

In 1815 the following propositions were adopted, which it is claimed were the first systematic solidification of the basis of the government that has since given to that great arm of Odd Fellowship its existing great prosperity.

First—All Lodges shall have the power of fixing the amount of weekly contributions to be paid by their members.

Second—The whole amount of the initiation money and a fixed amount of contribution shall go to a fund to be called "the General Contribution Fund" which fund shall be appropriated exclusively to the payment of sick and funeral gifts.

Third—All Lodges shall establish a fund which shall be called "the Incidental Expense Fund," out of which all expenses incurred in conducting the affairs of the Lodge (over and above the payment of sick and funeral donations) shall be paid.

Fourth—For a fixed sum per week contribution Lodges shall be allowed to pay not more than a certain amount per week during sickness, which after twelve months receipt, shall be reduced one half, and they may pay so much on the death of a member, and half the amount paid on the death of a member, on the death of a member's wife.

Fifth—A scale of contributions, sick gifts, and funeral donations shall be drawn up by the Grand Master and a Board of Directors.

From time to time the foregoing basis has been modified to meet the changed conditions of things. Instructive experience tables have been obtained and dues and benefits graded in accordance with them.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge has discussed this question since 1853, and itself took definite action at the session of 1833, urging its consideration in these strong terms: "If this Order is to maintain its promises to its members in the matter of relief, in the way of sick and funeral benefits, and meet its other necessary expenses promptly and fully, it must see to it that Subordinate Lodges so regulate dues and benefits that there shall be no question of their ability to keep faith with their members, and pay all just liabilities in all time to come; in old age as in youth."

The experience of the past has shown this to be difficult of accomplishment, and we would ask, is it wise to continue in the same old unsatisfactory way for another forty or fifty years? Your Committee are of the opinion that it will not only be unwise, but disastrous.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge has enacted that the minimum rate of dues in all Lodges immediately subordinate to that Grand Body shall be ten cents per week, or \$5.20 per year, the sick benefits to be allowed in such Lodges per week shall not exceed one-half of one year's dues, and the funeral benefits shall not exceed five times one year's dues. Most of our Lodges are charging twelve dollars per year dues, and their benefits range from ten dollars per week for various periods, consequently, under the above legislation those Lodges paying ten dollars per week would have to drop to six dollars.

Your Committee have found that the opposition to the work of committees of this character has been encountered from two classes of members—"those who are anxious to have things remain as they are, and those who hold that subordinates are sovereign in all questions relating to finance," but we feel that this is lessening, and although the desire for more uniformity is by no means unanimous, we believe that much good may be accomplished by a full and free

discussion of the facts by the Representatives here assembled. Such discussion cannot help but guide you to a disposition to support the amendment to the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges your Committee propose.

In the large Jurisdiction of Pennsylvania the careful calculations of reliable statisticians show that during a period of twenty years the general average duration of sickness for every 100 members was at the commencement, 62.25 weeks, ten years later 97.60 weeks, and at the end of the time 111.53 weeks. The increase during the first ten years was 35.44 weeks, and at the end of the period, 49.28 weeks.

While at the present time we cannot compare these averages with those available from the able returns furnished by the Grand Secretary to the Grand Lodge of British Columbia for the reason that we have many young Lodges there is every reason to anticipate some striking changes in our averages, as the Jurisdiction grows older and becomes more populated.

Life insurance statistics also bear out the law of this increase in averages, as it has been determined that it costs three times as much to carry a life insurance risk at 60 as at 40, five times at 67 as at 40, and ten times at 76 as at 40.

But we should be influenced in reaching a decision by the agitation in this direction now taking place among the brethren of Ontario, who found that not a few of the older Lodges, in many of which sentiment took the place of wisdom, have discovered, after twenty-five years of experience, that now they have a membership of advanced age, with sickness and death benefits crowding on them thick and fast, every possible means of retrenchment must be resorted to so as to avoid disaster, when instead a full treasury should exist.

The special committees on Dues and Benefits appointed by the Grand Lodge of Ontario, early discovered it to be their unpleasant duty to report to that Grand Lodge that their investigations had convinced them that the lodges of that Jurisdiction before the reforms effected at the past session of their Grand Lodge had undertaken to pay more money than their income could warrant them in paying.

A few examples will illustrate the position many Lodges found themselves in, and it must be remembered that the claims upon them for benefits are steadily increasing, that the more liable members become to illness through age the less liable are they to become in arrears for dues and thus forfeit their claims to benefits.

One Lodge expended for a year's benefits, \$1,135.20, while its receipts for the same period were \$885.19. Six months later there

was a deficiency of \$180.63, or a total deficiency in 18 months of \$460.73. Another Lodge paid out for benefits in one year \$912.03, to which amount it had gradually risen from \$559.31 in ten years. Another Lodge paid out in six months \$230.04 more than its receipts, and during the year following, \$34.67, a loss of \$273.71 during eighteen months. In ten years its total funds had fallen from \$4,294.79 to \$3,268.17. One Lodge with a membership of 200 paid out in one year \$863.27 for relief, and ten years later, with a membership of 172, the relief amounted to \$1,740.63. In ten years the property and funds of another Lodge had dropped from \$3,015.32 to \$1,993.71.

In concluding this report your Committee would refer to the experience of Victoria Lodge, No. 1. The members pay \$12.00 per year dues, and there are assessments besides. The management expenses of the Lodge absorb about 40 per cent of the dues so that there remains \$7.20 per year to meet the claims for benefits. The average amount paid for sick benefits per member during the past sixteen years was \$16.13, so that had the Lodge been relying entirely on dues to meet this liability there would have been a deficiency of \$8.93 per member.

The cost per member for 1898 was \$21.38, almost three times as much as the net amount available for sick benefits.

Happily, however, the receipts from investments have helped to meet this drain, but the Lodge has had to trench on its capital to the extent of \$6,700 in the last seven years to do so.

We give below a statement of the number of members and amount of sick benefits paid by Victoria Lodge, No. 1, during the years 1883 to 1898.

The Constitution of Subordinate Lodges we would amend by stating in Article IV, Section 2, that sick benefits for six months shall not exceed per week two-thirds of the annual dues, nor exceed six dollars per week, for a further six months, nor after twelve months continuous sickness exceed four dollars per week for each dollar of monthly dues.

We would further recommend the appointment of a Special Committee to go into the subject of dues graded according to age, whose duty it shall be to draw up scales of dues and benefits adaptable to the Lodges of this Jurisdiction.

Fully believing that the proposed changes should be effected, your Committee beg respectfully to move the adoption of this report.

To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F.:

Your Committee on Legislation, to whom was referred that part of the Grand Master's Report, dealing with greater security to members for payment of benefits, the establishment of an insurance system providing for the payment of \$1,000 at death, and the desirability of doing the business of the Grand Lodge in the Scarlet Degree, beg to report as follows:

We agree that the security for payment of all benefits that may accrue, should be as absolute as possible, but are not clear as to the best means of bringing about such a result. We suggest that the matter be thoroughly gone into, by Subordinate Lodges, after which the Sovereign Grand Lodge might be approached with a view to securing the necessary legislation. A long step in the right direction would be, to maintain a proper proportional adjustment of dues and benefits. A Lodge paying larger benefits than the revenue warrants, is on the road to bankruptcy.

We do not regard the establishment of an Insurance Branch as being, under the present circumstances, advisable.

With regard to Grand Lodge work being done in the Scarlet Degree, we are of the opinion that Legislation by this Grand Lodge would be *ultra vires*.

Sec. 8. Lodges may by by-law fix the time after admission at which a member shall become entitled to benefits, but a member admitted on an unexpired withdrawal card shall be entitled to benefits upon his admission to membership after signing the Constitution and By-Laws, provided that the member is not a newly initiated charter member when in that event he shall be entitled to benefits as directed by by-law in the case of members admitted by initiation.

The progress of the past year has been beyond our expectations and we quite endorse the recommendation of the Grand Secretary as to the reduction of 10 cents in the Per Capita Tax, and we as a committee are of the opinion that the amount thereby gained should be applied to the fund for the Odd Fellows' Home.

We beg to call attention to the action of Kootenay Lodge, No. 16, in keeping a record of the addresses of the relatives of visiting brethren, which in the case of accident or sudden death would be very useful for the purpose intended, and we respectfully recommend that all Lodges take like action.

We regret that the official organ of the Order in British Columbia, the B. C. Odd Fellow, has ceased to exist, and trust that at some future time it may once more spring into life and more successfully fulfill the purpose for which it was intended.

Regarding the merging of Lodges, it is to be regretted that it has become necessary, but it is better so, than that they should cease to exist. It makes it only too apparent, that the care to be exercised in instituting new Lodges, cannot be over estimated and we urge the strictest investigation on the part of the Grand Master, and D. D. Grand Masters, into the conditions surrounding the districts from which such applications are made.

The valuable financial assistance rendered the sufferers of the awful fire at New Westminster, is an illustration of the advantage our Order possesses in affording relief at a moments notice.

The splendid attendance at this Session is a subject of great satisfaction, as showing the lively interest taken in the work and we hope for a continuance of the same in the future.

In conclusion we beg to express our pleasure at the manner in which the Grand Master has conducted his tour over the Jurisdiction and trust that the precedent established will be followed by his successors.

REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

VICTORIA, B. C. May 29th, 1899.

A. Henderson, Grand Master, I. O. O. F. of B. C.:

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER:—I have much pleasure in submitting to you my report as D. D. G. M. for District No. 1, for the past year.

The Order in Victoria is progressing very favorably at the present time and the indications are that it will continue to do so for some time to come. During the year, Acme Lodge, No. 14, amalgamated with Dominion Lodge, No. 4, that in my opinion was a very wise thing to do, and in the best interest of the Order.

As you have been resident in Victoria I have not installed any of the officers of the Lodges as you very kindly officiated yourself.

From Columbia Lodge, No. 2:

Statement:—A brother having ceased membership for non-payment of dues now petitions his Lodge for reinstatement, forwards the sum of \$12.00 also the usual Medical Certificate, the Lodge declines to accept the petition on the ground that the brother is engaged in the liquor business, (which is not denied by the brother.) The petitioner objects to the ruling of the Lodge and demands to be informed what section of the laws governing the Lodge they are acting.

Ques.—Can the Lodge legally refuse to receive the petition of a brother for reinstatement who is and has been in the liquor business for many years, such brother having ceased membership for non-payment of dues.

Ans.—The case as I understand it is that Bro. Croft was suspended for non-payment of dues, he now wishes to be reinstated and has tendered you one year's dues and a medical certificate that he is in good health and ask for reinstatement, and that Columbia Lodge, No. 2, refuses to receive his application on the ground that he is in the Liquor business contrary to the Sovereign Grand Lodge Law as Bro. Croft was in the liquor business before the commencement of the said Sovereign Grand Lodge Law, and has been in it continuously, he has certain vested rights which his Lodge cannot deprive him of.

I therefore rule that Bro. Croft is eligible for reinstatement.

From Columbia Lodge, No. 2:

That the D. D. G. M. be asked to give his decision in the case of a brother in the saloon business suspended from the Lodge for non-payment of dues, and ceases the occupation during his suspension, as to whether he is eligible for reinstatement also to give his authority for his ruling.

To this I replied as follows:—

I am duly in receipt of yours of the 7th inst, and in answer to it beg to ask you if this is a hypothetical case or has it actually occurred in your Lodge. It appears to me from the similarity of it and the one of recent date, that it is the same put in a different way, but has not actually occurred.

Now, while I am willing at all times to answer any question that may arise to the best of my ability as D. D. G. M., I am not expected to answer hypothetical questions and quote authorities unless I feel disposed to, this would take up quite a lot of my time and I have not got it to spare.

As I have already stated if it has occurred I will be pleased to answer it.

From Victoria Lodge, No. 1;

Ques.—Can a Noble Grand or Lodge permit the admission of the members of a visiting Lodge, when paying a fraternal visit, in a body, without each member giving the regular password at the inner door, or should the Inside Guardian obtain this password from each individual separately before admitting him.

A.s.—No, the Inside Guardian must obtain the password from each individual separately before admitting him. See White's Digest, page 459, decision 1776 which is as follows:

“The Noble Grand of a Lodge has not the right to admit a member belonging to another Lodge in his State Jurisdiction without the term password.

I would strongly recommend that in future, District Deputies when appointed be given a copy of White's Digest, and to be returned when their term of office expires, my reason for this recommendation is that when a question from the Lodges is submitted to them for a ruling, they have to borrow a Digest to enable them to give a ruling and this very often causes a good deal of delay and inconvenience.


