



The best varieties pay good profits in the large markets, but the common blue plums were a drug upon the local markets this year, being sold as low as 15c per 12-quart basket. Pears are probably the steadlest fruit, and even in the most adverse season will show up a fair crop, and the prices, although rather low compared with some fruits, remain about the same and can be depended upon. 
