# SPAIN'S DIRE TROUBLES

Cannot Yield to the Demands of the United States and  
Resume the War—Commissioners Afraid of Being Mobbed  
If They Accept the Conditions—Internal Trouble Also—Lord  
Curzon's Farewell to His Constituents.

The lot of Spain is indeed unhappy. There was no joint session of the Peace Commission in Paris yesterday, Spanish Commissioners finding it impossible to get their memoranda ready. The U. S. Commissioners granted the delay asked, and it is expected sessions will be resumed Wednesday. Meanwhile the Americans will not recede from the position taken regarding the Philippines, and the Spaniards will acknowledge their helplessness, seeing they cannot resume the war. A Madrid despatch says, on the authority of officials there: If the United States persist in their present claims, Spain will accept the conditions after formally announcing at a session of the commission and in a circular to the powers that she fields to force, and owing to the impossibility of renewing the war without unobtainable assistance in defence of her rights.

The Spanish Commissioners point out that they dare not face their country if they accept the American conditions, fearing official degradation and even mob violence. Added to this trouble is internal dissatisfaction. Catalonia and Aragon provinces demand decentralization of the government, saying that the "Anglo-Saxons of America, aided by the Anglo-Saxons of Europe, have obliterated half of Spain from the maps."

## SPAIN'S DILEMMA.

London Papers See No Alternative for the U. S. But to Go the Whole Length.

London, Nov. 15.—The morning papers comment editorially upon the Peace Conference crisis, and the American naval preparations, reiterating their conviction of the hopelessness of Spanish opposition, and recognizing that the United States have practically no alternative, especially after the elections, but complete annexation, and that, if Spain continues obstinate, the United States must send a fleet to Europe, an action which no power but Great Britain would welcome, though none would be likely to interfere in Spain's behalf.

The Daily Telegraph says: "We cannot believe that President McKinley favors a compromise that would leave Spain a portion of her far Eastern possessions. Such a policy would commend America, since Spain would speedily sell the remnant."

## LORD CURZON'S FAREWELL.

The New Governor of India and Lady Curzon Say Good-Bye to His Lordship's Constituents.

Southport, Eng., Nov. 14.—The visit to this place to-day of Lord and Lady Curzon of Kedleston led to a remarkable demonstration of good-will for His Lordship, who has represented this division in Parliament since the last general election, in 1895. All the city functionaries and the county bodies participated in it, the streets were decorated with flags and crowded with people, and at the railroad depot the public officials, in their robes of office, presented an address of congratulation to His Lordship on his appointment to the Viceroyship of India.

The Lady Mayoress presented Lady Curzon with a bouquet of orchids in a silver holder, and with a ribbon attached to it, inscribed in gold letters, "Farewell to Lady Curzon by the Lady Mayoress, in behalf of the Southport Division."

A procession was then formed and Lord and Lady Curzon proceeded to the municipal buildings amid the cheers of the people, mingled with the pealing of the church bells. Lord and Lady Curzon afterwards held a reception. Prominent among the decorations were trophies representing the Union Jack, the Stars and Stripes and the Star of India entwined. At a later function Sir William Fernwood presided. He said that never had there been a Viceroy of India appointed who was so heartily approved of by the entire nation. Sir William added that the charm and refinement of Lady Curzon, who is an American lady, will adorn the viceregal court.

After the presentation of a eulogistic address from the Conservative Association of Southport and a handsome and massive silver bowl, weighing over 200 ounces, and a pair of gold spurs, Lord Curzon made a speech, during which he formally bade farewell to his constituents.

## THE HOOLEY CASE.

Sir W. Marriott Calls Hooley's Statements Regarding His "Pure Inventions and Abominable Lies." London, Nov. 14.—The examination in bankruptcy proceedings of Mr. Ernest Terah Hooley, the company promoter, was resumed this morning. Sir William Marriott took the stand and declared that Mr. Hooley's statement that he had paid the witness £1000 for introducing him (Hooley) to the Carlton Club was "a pure invention and an abominable lie." Sir William added that he knew nothing at the time about Mr. Hooley's alleged donation of £10,000 to the Conservative party funds through the Marquis of Abergheny, though Mr. Hooley told him afterwards that he had given the Marquis £10,000 for the "fighting funds" of the Conservative party, which, Sir William Marriott explained, had nothing to do with the Carlton Club. The witness also said he had helped Mr. Hooley in political and financial matters, but had always declined remuneration for his services.

Later, Sir William Marriott said Mr. Hooley told him, in December, 1896, that he was engaged with an American syndicate, which was going to raise an enormous loan for Cuba, and said he (the witness) had been appointed counsel to the company's commission, which was to visit Cuba, and that his fee was to be £10,000, in view of which Mr. Hooley paid him £1000 on account.

On cross-examination, Sir William Mar-

riott admitted that he had received a cheque for £50,000 from Mr. Hooley, which he handed to representatives of the Conservative party. Mr. Hooley believed this would secure him a baronetcy at the Jubilee, but he was informed that he could not have it and the cheque was returned to him.

During Sir William Marriott's examination Mr. Hooley made a statement and threatened to pitch the witness out of the box. While Sir George Lewis, Q. C., was cross-examining Sir William the witness several times got angry and refused to answer questions put to him.

Hooley Retains in Mind. Mr. Hooley, on cross-examination, flatly contradicted the evidence of Sir William Marriott. He reiterated his statement that he had promised and had paid to Sir William £1000 for an introduction to the Carlton Club. Sir William, Mr. Hooley added, told him that he did "all the dirty work" for the Conservative party. Sir William suggested the giving of £50,000 by Mr. Hooley for a baronetcy, and he was to get £10,000 if Mr. Hooley was made a baronet.

## COMPLAINED TO THE EMPEROR.

And William Says the Regent Shall Have His Rights.

London, Nov. 14.—For the first time a Federal sovereign of Germany has officially complained of the Emperor. Count Bismarck, of Liepzig-Bischofswerde, wrote to Emperor William that he was humiliated by the Emperor's order that military honours were not to be paid to the Count's household, but only to the Count and his wife.

The Emperor replied: "The Regent shall have his rights; nothing more." Count Bismarck has now laid his claims before his fellow-sovereigns of the German Empire in a long address, which is nothing less than an indictment of the Emperor.

## Next Governor of Malta.

London, Nov. 14.—The Malta correspondent of the Daily Mail says it is reported that Lieut. General Sir Francis Wallace Greenfield, Inspector-General of Auxiliary Forces, and in supreme command of the operations conducted by the Sir. Lieut. General Lord Kitchener, for the reconquest of the Egyptian Provinces in the Sudan, will be the next Governor of Malta.

## France Adding to Her Navy.

London, Nov. 14.—The Daily Mail says this morning that the French naval construction program for 1899 includes two battleships of 14,500 tons each, with very powerful armament and protection; two cruisers of 4,000 tons each, two large torpedo destroyers and eleven torpedo boats.

## German Army to Be Increased.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The semi-official papers announce that the German army will be gradually increased by about 15,000.

## Antarctic Expedition.

London, Nov. 14.—The Royal Geographical Society offers £5000 to fund a subscription for outfitting an Antarctic expedition.

## Belgians Capture Dervish Post.

London, Nov. 15.—The Daily Chronicle this morning says: "We are reliably informed from the Congo Free State that the Belgians have captured Bohr, a Dervish post 30 miles north of Beja, on the White Nile."

## MISS WILLARD'S TEMPLE SCHEME.

Was abandoned. It was feared it might wreck the organization. St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 14.—The W.C.T.U. to-day held a lengthy discussion on the late Frances Willard's temple scheme. It was feared that the fight for the temple would wreck the organization. Miss Willard had done so much to build up, and it was, after five hours' bitter and personal debating, by a vote of 285 to 71, decided to abandon the project as an affiliated interest. Resolutions were presented on the subject, which may precipitate the whole controversy once more, if called on this morning, as expected.

Capt. W. W. Kerr, principal owner of the Pittsburg Baseball Club, left for the East last evening. The captain will call a meeting in New Jersey to-day, at which he will elect himself president and P. L. Auten vice-president of the club. Last season W. H. Watkins acted in the capacity of president. ## LAUNDRY TRUST LAUNCHED

Toronto, Capitalists Go Into the Laundry Business on a Large Scale—There is a Sequel.

The announcement in the Gazette of the incorporation of a company, to be known as the Beatty Manufacturing Company, and to be engaged in the manufacture of women's and children's clothing and do laundry, is the talk of city business circles. What especially interests the public curiosity is the mystery which envelops the whole affair.

Starting with the clue that the company consisted of W. H. Beatty, C. W. Beatty, Harry Beatty, J. W. Beatty, W. G. Gooderham, T. G. Blackstock and W. H. Cavatina, and that the capital was \$200,000, a World reporter yesterday called on the members to get further information. W. H. Beatty told a semi-comical story, whose moral was: "Mind your own business, whose moral was: 'Mind your own business, but don't be bothered by reporters.' W. G. Gooderham is out of town, and all one could get out of T. G. Blackstock was the exclamation, 'The devil!'"

Then the reporter made for other sources of information. A leading white-goods man, who was seen, said: "The Beatty family has only so far bought out a portion of Edward Mahony's children's headwear business on Wellington-street east. The purchase was made to find Harry Beatty a job, and it cost only a few hundred dollars. Mr. Mahony still retains his embroidery business, and had it distinctly so stated in the sale. The real object of the new company, as you will see, is to form a trust which will control all the white goods and laundry in the province."

## MARVELOUS OLD AGE.

Mrs. Margaret Davis of Jordan Lived 110 Years and Eight Months—Born in Ireland.

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 14.—Mrs. Margaret Davis, who was by more than 10 years a centenarian, died yesterday at her late residence, near Jordan Station. She was aged 110 years 8 months and 10 days. Mrs. Davis was born on Lord Downshire's estate in the County of Down, Ireland, where 23 children were born to her. About 40 years ago Thomas, her youngest son, who lives on the Thorold-road, in this city, came to America, and was soon followed by his two brothers, John and Joseph. They settled in Louth on a farm, Thomas afterwards moved to St. Catharines, and in the summer of 1872 he sent for his mother, who was then living in Glasgow with other sons and daughters. Mrs. Davis was then 85 years of age, but she braved the Atlantic to come to America, and on July 4, 1872, she landed in New York. Until a few years ago she was very active, and in the warm weather she would do some of the chores around the farm. She lost the sight of one eye some years ago through an accident, but the sight of the other was good until the time of her death. She was seldom ill. The human mechanism simply played out after 110 years.

# DAWSON CITY BURNED.

Half a Million Dollars' Worth of Property in the Heart of the City Gone Up in Smoke as the Result of a Row in a Saloon Between Two Women—A Few Men Were Injured, But No Deaths Resulted.

Vancouver, Nov. 14.—(Special.)—The steamer Cottage City brings news of a disastrous fire at Dawson City, which happened on Oct. 14. The fire started in the Green Tree Saloon, Belle Mitchell throwing a lighted lamp at another woman. Four of the chief city buildings were destroyed. The citizens fought the flames heroically, and a few men were injured.

Following is a list of the principal buildings destroyed:

Wardner Hotel, loss \$50,000; Pathom's saloon, \$40,000; postoffice, \$10,000 (all mails were destroyed); Green Tree saloon, \$35,000; Empress bakery, \$40,000; McPherson & Johnson, \$20,000; Vancouver Hotel, \$25,000; John Sargent, \$3000; New York store, \$21,000; Case & Gilsey, \$8900; Malson-Horton, \$48,000; Hibbard's store, \$6000; Meier's store, \$16,000; John M. Donald, \$6000; George Brunet, \$8000; Foley's, \$5000; Seattle Restaurant, \$9000; other small stores, \$30,000; 12 cabins, \$18,000.

There is no insurance. The heart of the city has been wiped out by the flames, and there is not enough lumber and window glass for rebuilding this winter. People must live in tents.

The total loss is calculated at close upon \$500,000. Some of the buildings contained cartridges, and occasionally a fusilade would make the crowd scatter, but no one was killed or fatally injured.

C. P. R. Press Report.

Among the fire-fighters who received in-

juries were: Pte. Mullins of the Infantry, contusions, sprains and burns; G. O. Ellis, contusions on head and a shattered shoulder; Dan Milten, scalp cut and skull cracked; W. A. Jones, head battered and burned; Constable Tipp, burns and sprains; Pte. Enfield, face and arms burned; Al. Halkeus, leg badly wrenched. A number of men lost eyebrows and whiskers.

The Cottage City brought 200 passengers from Alaska ports. Her passengers were mostly from Skagway and other coast cities, but there was a small scattering of miners from Cook's Inlet, Dawson and Atlin, as well as from the Sitka country. The Atlin men bring news of a new strike, a creek paralleling Plac Creek having been found which feeds Atlin Lake, about eight miles south of the first discovered creek. The discoverer, M. McKee, who was one of the passengers down, took out five or six pans, the average per pan being \$1. The new creek, which has been called McKee Creek, after the discoverer, who is an old Altonian, mines, promises to rival Plac Creek. The find was made fully two months ago, but kept a secret until friends could reach the scene.

Belle Mitchell's Second Fire.

The fire of a year ago was caused by the same woman, who threw the lamp at a man with whom she had a quarrel. A month ago she burned her own place on Third-avenue in Dawson, by throwing a lamp at a woman, and now she has caused a conflagration by again losing her temper and wielding another lighted lamp.

BAD ACCIDENT AT BOWMANVILLE.

G. T. R. Express Ran into a Freight—Engineer and Fireman Hurt.

Last night the Grand Trunk express, No. 7, due at Toronto at 9:15, ran into the rear end of a freight train near Bowmanville, demolishing the van of the freight and shaking up the passengers of the express considerably.

The engineer and fireman of the express, who jumped before the crash came, were both seriously injured. Engineer F. Warren was hurt internally and Fireman T. Casey had his right leg hurt and was also cut about the head and face.

The freight train, which was carrying a large quantity of lumber, was stopped by the engine crew.

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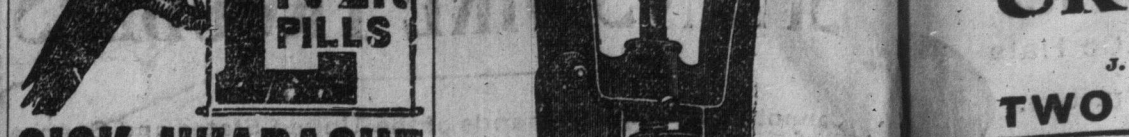

INSURANCE CONSOLIDATION.

The Coxes and Gooderhams are After the Small Companies.

Mr. Gooderham Bags the Temperance and Mr. Cox the Excelsior.

Are We Entering on a Period of Loan and Trust Company Consolidation?—Six Dominion Companies Reaching Out for All the Insurance Business.

These are the days of consolidations of enterprises of all kinds. The particular line that is up for consolidation at the present moment seems to be life insurance.

A consolidation of loan companies and of trust companies is likely to follow the consolidation of insurance companies that is now under way.

Up to the present moment no actual consolidations have occurred, but Mr. George Gooderham (President of the Manufacturers Life) has secured the controlling shares in the Temperance Company, and Mr. George A. Cox (chief shareholder of the Imperial Life) has secured the controlling stock of the Excelsior Life.

Other of the minor companies are likely to go the way of these two, and the World was informed last night that before many days the business would practically be in the hands of six companies with federal charters.

Mr. E. P. Clarke, M.P., until a few days ago was President of the Excelsior Life. Edwin Marshall is secretary. Sir Oliver Mowat is President of the Imperial, and Fred G. Cox chief agent. Mr. F. G. Cox is an up-to-date insurance man, who will in all likelihood be at the head of the consolidated Cox Company. Senator George A. Cox is himself Chief Agent for Eastern Ontario of the Canada Life, and has been for many years.

Hon. George W. Ross is President of the Temperance General, and Henry Sutherland Manager. There is considerable rivalry over the great distiller getting control of the Temperance Company. George Gooderham is President of the Manufacturers, and James F. Junkin Chief Agent. It was freely stated last night that Mr. Gooderham's second son, Albert E., the popular captain in the Grenadiers and a thorough business man, would be President of the Gooderham consolidated companies.

There is said to have been considerable rivalry between the two big capitalists as to who would get the two companies already secured, with a result that was contradictory so speak.

There were 250 shareholders in the Excelsior Life in December, 1897. David Field had 87 shares and George Gooderham 100. Mr. Cox wasn't then down for any. And yet he gets this company.

The Temperance General had at the same date only 34 shareholders, and Mr. Cox was down for 230 shares, or nearly one-fourth of the paid-up stock. This is the company that Mr. Gooderham gets.

The fun of consolidation is said to be only beginning and that new deals will be announced in a few days.

Mr. Cox controls the majority of shares of the Canada Life by a slight majority. Whether a consolidation of this great company and the Imperial is in the future the World does not presume to say at this moment. But Mr. Cox is evidently sitting up at night thinking it over. At the present moment the Ramsey interest has the management of the Canada Life.

Are There Too Many Insurance Companies?

A gentleman friendly to consolidations gave The World the following statement last night:

"During the year 1897 business was transacted by 23 life insurance companies—15 Canadian, 8 British and 10 American. Of the 8 British and 10 American four British and one American may be said not to have been in the race for business, thus leaving 28 companies in possession of the field.

"The total amount of policies in Canada taken during 1897 (excluding industrial business) was \$41,270,046; an average for each of the 28 companies of \$1,473,200. The largest amount written by any one company was \$3,703,000 and the smallest amount \$63,915. Only two companies wrote over \$3,500,000.

Three companies wrote between \$3,000,000 and \$3,500,000. One company wrote between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000. Three companies wrote between 2,000,000 and 2,500,000. Four companies wrote between 1,500,000 and 2,000,000. One company wrote between 1,000,000 and 1,500,000. Seven companies wrote between 500,000 and 1,000,000. Seven companies wrote less than 500,000.

"Here it is seen that no less than 19 companies out of the 28, or 68 per cent., wrote less than \$2,000,000 of business, while 14, or half of them, wrote less than \$1,000,000.

"If the last-mentioned 14 companies had not been in the field in 1897, and assuming, for the sake of argument, that the business written by these companies would not have been secured by the other 14 active companies, the decrease in the amount of insurance written would only have been \$6,883,376, or but 17 per cent. of the whole.

"The ratio of expense of those companies doing a small business is, generally speaking, greater than that of those companies doing a large business; the reason, of course, being that in every life insurance company there are certain fixed charges to be met, no matter whether the business transacted be large or small, and another reason is, that those companies doing a small business, not being popular, have to pay a higher rate of commission to attract agents, etc., to work for them.

"A cancer, which is gnawing at the very vitals of the business to-day, is the abnormal cost of securing business, and one of the heroic measures which is suggested to stay this awful disease is the reduction in the number of companies competing for the business."

It was resolved to petition the manager and directors of Montreal not to sell the book debts, judgments, etc., by tender, as proposed, but to place them in the hands of a public auctioneer for a fortnight, and subsequently to sell them by auction at so much above the dollar as the tenderer should see fit.

Alleged Money Letter. A routing man, recently employed by the Montreal Postoffice, was this afternoon arrested at Richmond Station on the charge of having stolen some money letters, which he is supposed to have been carrying to a resident of this city.

Not Satisfied With the Amount. The celebrated case of the Bank of Montreal v. Demers is to be appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada, which is not satisfied with the amount granted by the court, this is \$6000. On the other hand, Mr. Demers demands a cross-appeal on account of the strong reason given by Judge Livingston dissenting.

Mr. John Livingston, accountant of Montreal, representing American capitalists, has been arrested on the charge of having stolen some money letters, which he is supposed to have been carrying to a resident of this city.

U. S. Senator at the Capital. Senator St. J. A. Darby of Richmond, Va., is on his way to Washington, D. C. He is a good Democrat. Speaking to a reporter about the recent elections in his State, he said that the Democrats made large gains, and he believes they would have defeated the Republicans but for a recent vote.

Mr. Darby says the people would have voted for the Democrats but for the fact that they had not been long sight of in the excitement of the war.

Death of Daniel Schoff. An old resident of Lucas, Father of Elgin Schoff, Toronto. Lucas, Ont., Nov. 14.—Daniel Schoff, late an Inspector for North Middlesex, died at his home in Clarendon at 6.30 this evening. He was 80 years of age.

Found Dead Near the Tracks. G. T. R. Section Foreman Probably Died From Heart Disease. Chedoke, Ont., Nov. 14.—This afternoon Mr. Robert Warrington, a section foreman of the G.T.R., was found lying dead on the tracks near Chedoke, three miles north of this place. It is supposed he died from heart disease.

War Tax Will Stay. Washington, D.C., Nov. 14.—The Washington Post states that the war tax will stay in effect until the next session of Congress and that there will be no revision of the tariff whatever. The Government has not yet received the revenue produced by the war taxes. During the month of October the war expenditures exceeded the war revenue by some \$24,000,000, and this month they will be \$10,000,000 in excess. This being the case there will be no change, at least this session.

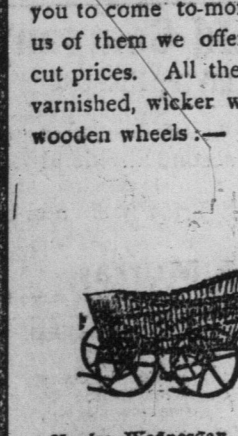

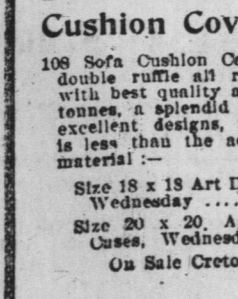

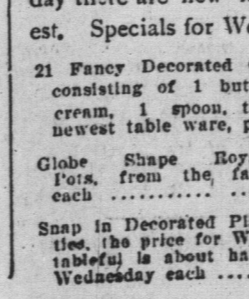

Ald. Lamb Says Controllers Spent This Money Unsanctioned.

Either the Estimates, or by Vote of the People—Says Aldermen and Officials May Be Liable to Criminal Action—Will an Injunction Be Got Out Restraining the Spending of Any More of This Money on the New City Hall?

The winter of Council's discontent with the Street Railway Company is fast approaching. With equal velocity the cold, dreary day of electoral judgment comes on as well. It was to be expected, therefore, that a good deal should be asked of the company at yesterday's meeting, which it needed not to ask some months ago.

But this was only an incident in the meeting. The lion, or rather the scorpion, of the hour was Ald. Lamb, who made the date book his final fling at the Board of Control. Lamb's Hard Roast. The Board of Control, said Ald. Lamb, is a question of privilege. He pressed this report of the Property Committee asking for a money bylaw. They were without having the funds provided. They had acted illegally. Ald. Lamb emphasized the illegality charge by frequent repetition. He emphasized it still more by warning that any responsible citizen could get out an injunction on the business. The aldermen and officials had no right to spend money without any sanction from Council or people. The report of the Property Committee, calling for a vote of \$110,000, had been suppressed, yet this open account had been run since. "If you should get the people, and they should vote to vote the money the Board of Control has spent," he added, "it may leave members of this Board in a somewhat precarious financial condition. You spent \$10,000 amongst other things in furnishing the new Council Chamber. You had no money for that." He mentioned other contracts, which, however, were pointed out to have been provided for in the estimates.

Why Didn't You Help Me? Ald. Lamb having buried all his efforts to have New City Hall expenditures thoroughly investigated throughout the year, and for then coming down with his belated report, he had sanctioned all these expenditures.

An Inquiry Interrupted. There were numerous interruptions, but the contention between those quoted were lying in open account were not referred when the subject was snuffed out. But it is only quieted for a time. Ald. Lamb will put an enquiry on the order paper as to how much money had been spent on the pile without any sanction from Council or people.

Denison the Klecker. Ald. Denison, as a matter of privilege, explained his position in reference to giving up the plans for market improvement. But the Mayor informed him that Architect Symons had already consented to give his plan, so the matter ended, and the citizens have the benefit of Ald. Denison's explanation that the market delegation had only drawn mileage money from the city, and not a cent for Pullman or hotel bills.

Through some mysterious swanbox manipulation between the Controller and the Mayor was asked to vote \$120,000 postal cards to tell the electors where to vote. The Board was probably ashamed to show its flag in the light of the fact that they were supposed to have killed it in the estimates but they were not disposed to have faith in this change of heart and Ald. Frankland moved to refer it out. This was carried in committee on a vote of 10 to 9, but in Council Ald. Leslie moved its re-consideration, and carried it out.

The Don bridge money bylaw and the by-law for appointing deputy returning officers, the latter after some quibbling, were also carried through the various readings.

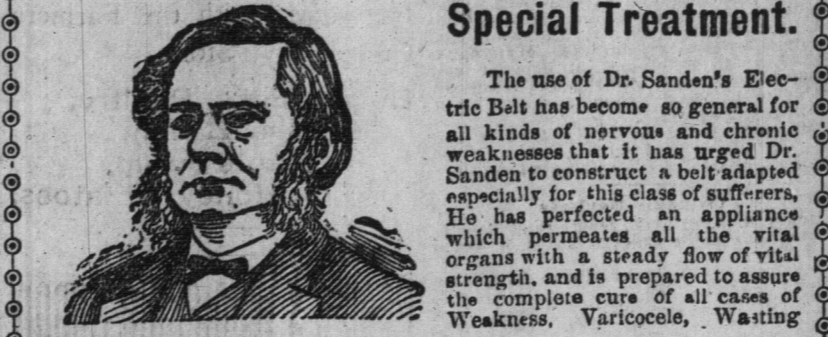
