lions of Pounds Sterling to

London, Feb. 23.—The naval estimates
for 1900 and 1901 total £27,522,000, an in-
crease of £28,100, providing for an in-
crease of 220 officers and 4020 men for
new ships. It is proposed to build two
new battleships, six first-class armored
cruisers, a second-class cruiser, two twin
screw boats, three gunboats and two tor-
pedo boats.

DEFENCE OF LADYSMITH
WAS MOST BRILLIANT.

Full Details of the Sixteen Hours' Fighting on Jan. 6,
When the Boers Were Repulsed by
White at All Points.

London, Feb. 23.—Few more brilliant
stories have been written in the
annals of the war. The Standard cor-
respondent of the Boer front, Jan. 6, says:
The defence of Ladysmith, which was
intensely interesting, first of all, is
given a full explanation of the mysterious
way in which the Boers managed to get
so close before they were discovered.

Boers Moved at Night.
"At 7 o'clock Friday night," he writes,
"500 picked Boer rode from the larger
hill Bulwana and, fording the river, came
to a kopje south of Caesar's Camp. They
then bivouacked until 1 o'clock in the
morning, when they crept cautiously along
the ridge, and were discovered by the
British pickets and patrols, one section
moved up the ridge to the eastern shoulder
and climbed silently up the slope in the
fog of the hill."

"Another company moved along the
southern slope of the hill, and were
discovered by the British pickets and
patrols. They were ready to assist the
main body, and to occupy the hills
in front of the camp, and to close, amid
a fusillade that almost drove the British
back to their own lines."

Men Fell on Every Hand.
"This did not go on for hours without any
intermission. On either side, the men

ASK FOR INJUNCTION

Against the Striking Moulders Interfering with the Men on Duty at Their Works. They Also Claim Damages.

A big legal fight was started yesterday when a writ was issued at Osgoode Hall on behalf of the Massey-Harris Co., Limited, Frederick G. Ball, moulder, 21 Turner-avenue, and William Dodson, moulder, 115 Edwin-avenue, against Charles H. Woodward, 172 Shaw-street, William Wood, 132 Rydenham-street, William Skirton, 1 Euclid-place, Michael Allen, 111 Strachan-avenue; Stephen Ball, 184 Strachan-avenue; Ralph Fernley, 80 Dundas-street, and Robert H. Emmett, 29 Fowley-street, all iron-moulders, and the Iron Moulders' Union No. 28 of Toronto. The following is the claim of the plaintiffs as set forth in their writ: "The plaintiffs claim an injunction restraining the defendants and each of them, their agents, servants, attorneys, officers and members from interfering with or molesting the plaintiffs or any of them, their servants or employees, in the discharge or performance of their duties or work as manufacturers, mechanics, workmen or apprentices, and from using violence or intimidation by threats of violence to place or to bring about any person in the factory, house, shops or other places where they or any of them carry on business or work or reside, or to prevent them with a view to compel them or any of them to abstain from their manufacturing operations or from their employment and service and apprenticeship in such operations and from unlawfully and maliciously procuring or conspiring to procure persons to break their contracts with the

plaintiffs, or to leave or quit their employment or to induce persons not to enter into contracts with the plaintiffs and from interfering with, molesting, disturbing, preventing and unlawfully inducing and disseminating by speech or otherwise, men, employees or workmen employed in the course of their employment with the plaintiff company or in the course of obtaining such employment and for such further and other injunction and order and relief as to the court may seem necessary, and for damages.

Huntley-Scales. The parties to the suit of J. W. Huntley against Mrs. Scales of Queensville, York County, are endeavoring to arrive at an amicable settlement of their troubles at the suggestion of Chief Justice Armour. The suit has arisen out of a dispute in the neighborhood of Queensville, and the many witnesses who attended the trial had some very angry arguments in the corridors yesterday. Numerous arms were offered to be waved, and invitations to go outside and settle differences with fists were as common as challenges by professional pugilists.

The Benjamin Estate. The estate of the late Alfred D. Benjamin was the subject of a motion in court yesterday, when the court decided that it would itself administer the estate. By his will he disposed of only \$6000, while the value of his whole estate amounts to over \$100,000. Certain creditors asked for an order that the court administer the estate.

In August last eight employees of a tannery at Huntley were fined for working on Sunday. Yesterday they obtained a writ of certiorari from Judge Falconbridge to bring up their convictions in an endeavor to have them set aside by reason of the scope of the investigation was widened. The resolution was as follows: Whereas, by resolution contained in Report No. 2 of the Board of Control, adopted by this Council on the 6th day of February, 1900, an enquiry has been directed into the conduct of the tannery, and whereas it has been deemed expedient to extend the scope of such enquiry:

Therefore, be it resolved that His Honor the Judge of the County Court of the County of York be requested to take evidence and investigate whether there has been any interference by any members of the Fire Department or other municipal officers, whether such members acted at the instance of or in aid of the said John Thompson or otherwise, and to report the result of the enquiry, and the evidence taken thereon, forthwith, after the closing of the said investigation.

Aid. Sheppard thought that if such a resolution were passed the County Judge would be kept on the case all next summer. The Mayor was of the opinion that the scope of the enquiry should be restricted, and pointed out that one of the witnesses who was a fireman, at the investigation refused to answer certain questions because they affected him personally.

THE PUBLIC NO RIGHTS?

Ontario Legislature Usurps the Sovereignty of the People By Its Action.

PETITIONS HAVE BEEN CUT OFF

By the House Adjourning Till Tuesday Next—The Speaker's Pointers to Hobos.

The solemn up in the Queen's Park are acquiring a vast idea of their own powers and privileges than has been. Leaders of Government and Opposition do not seem to think that they encroach the people when exchanging laudations across the floor of the House of their personal and collective honor and trustworthiness as company directors and presidents of corporations.

The outrage perpetrated against public rights yesterday was the adjournment of the Legislature till 10 o'clock on Tuesday. Every one knows that Monday, the 26th, is the last day for receiving petitions.

Rules Are Laid Down. Presenting and reception of petitions to the Legislature is a matter which authorities on constitutional and parliamentary procedure treat with the utmost consideration and importance.

And, of course, there is a great rush on the last day for presenting petitions, the formalities of presentation in many important instances being delayed to the last moment for obvious reasons.

All Out of Date. This outrage was marked by the following attendant circumstances. The orators taking part in the Legislature yesterday were to occupy benches for two days. They were to resume their eloquent exercises with a better attended House.

The Speaker on Rules. Before the actors of the day were taken up in the Legislature yesterday, Speaker Evans made a speech. He said: "I desire to call the attention of hon. gentlemen on both sides of the House to one of the parliamentary rules, not only of this Legislature, but of every Legislature, Imperial and colonial—a rule which has been inserted in the books for a purpose. It is, I believe, one of the most important regulations of any Legislature, and is to the effect that no new bills should be introduced after the 10th of February."

heard by one hon. gentleman to another as "You have said this, and 'You have said that.' This is not accepted in any British Parliament; and if, in speaking on the floor of the House, reminders are necessary of declarations already made by hon. members, the rule is to say, 'The hon. gentleman said this,' and 'The hon. gentleman said that.' I ask the co-operation of both sides of the House in enforcing this rule. It is with delicacy that I make these observations; but I have taken the opportunity to do so, because, gentlemen, I understand, and the House will understand that I am making reference to no hon. gentleman in particular. I call attention to a parliamentary custom of general interest, which has, perhaps, not been sufficiently observed in this Legislature."

The Financial Commission. Mr. Whitney asked the Premier whether he had reconsidered the desirability of bringing down the report of the financial commission. Mr. Ross replied that the usage of bringing down reports in his possession after the conclusion of the debate on the address, he expected to make the budget speech on Thursday next, but that depended upon whether the House would give the report to the House in good time.

Business in the Courts. In dealing with the passage of the speech promising amendments, expediting business in the courts, Mr. Fox drew attention to the fact that North Waterloo was not represented in the present session. He said: "It was not represented at the last session. For two sessions this great county has been without a voice in this Legislature. No defeated candidate ought to have the right to postpone proceedings as long as the North Waterloo election has been postponed. It is an outrage that, after four months, an appeal is not ready for trial in this case. We have also West Huron tied up in appeal."

Rainy River Railway Bonus. Mr. Fox made a remarkably wide shot at the Rainy River Railway bonus. He said: "When that bonus was introduced last session, at an early hour of the morning the hon. gentleman who introduced it was called upon to follow a gentleman of great affability and courtesy. The success of Mr. Latchford would be attained if he filled the position in a manner quite the opposite to the public service and to those who would have to deal with him as Mr. Stratton. Mr. Fox said: Referring to Mr. Stratton, Mr. Fox said: 'The Provincial Secretary is not new to the House. His relations with the hon. gentleman on this side of the House have been such that we believe the same cordial feelings will continue in the future.'"

San Jose sent, the Department of Agriculture is sending out instructions for the fumigation of nursery stock offered for sale in the province. This is done under the act of last year. A bill will be introduced this session to circumvent the coding system. The minister of agriculture, Mr. D. R. McLean and McCallum, have been appointed Clerk of the Municipal Committee, in place of Mr. Lewin.

One important petition was presented in the Legislature yesterday. It was that of the Nickel Copper Company of Ontario, Ltd. The petition was for the incorporation of the company, and increasing the capital stock of the company to the amount of \$10,000,000. Power is also asked with regard to amalgamation with other companies for special agreements with other companies of a similar, or in part similar, character.

The City Treasurer Sends a Letter of Explanation Regarding Proposed Routes. The following letter to the committee from the City Treasurer, which explains itself, was sent on to Council. I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 19th inst., stating that it was contemplated to make a few street railway extensions, and also to construct two new routes, and asking for replies to the following questions: 1. The amount of street railway payment debenture debt already issued is \$1,210,775.57, maturing as follows: Jan. 1, 1902, \$248,310.00; July 1, 1904, 625,122.24; July 1, 1906, 114,248.00; Jan. 1, 1910, 227,095.33.
