THE TORONTO WORLD

We take the liberty of suggesting that our esteemed fellow-citizen, Mr. Nordheimer, the German Consul, should cable a despatch to Berlin, inviting Prince Henry to visit the City of Toronto. It is altogether likely that the Prince and his party will pay a visit to Niagara Falls, and if he comes within that distance of the Dominion there ought to be no difficulty in having him cross the border and come on to Toronto. Canada is not unknown in Germany, and there are quite a number of German people resident in different portions of this country. We think that Emperor William would esteem it as an honor to receive an invitation for his brother to visit the Dominion, and we trust that steps will be taken to issue the invitation in proper shape, whether thru the Dominion government or thru the German Consulate of this city at Montreal. In any event, no harm could be done by the Mayor of Toronto, on behalf of the citizens, and by Mr. Nordheimer, on behalf of the German residents of Ontario, cabling invitations to Berlin.

THE SMOKE NOISANCE

Most of the large cities are adopting measures to mitigate the coal smoke nuisance. Coal smoke not only gives a city an uncleanly appearance, but the carbon contained in the smoke is injurious to health, especially in the case of those of weak lungs. No individual or company has a right to perpetuate a nuisance upon the community, and if those who are guilty of the smoke evil do not see fit to stop it of their own accord, the law should step in and compel them to do so. The City of Berlin has tackled the evil, with the result that it has become a comparatively smokeless city. The good results attained there are far more due to the excellent management on the part of the city authorities, to efficient police control and to faithful and intelligent care of fires than to the employment of expensive methods and devices for consuming smoke. The population of Berlin is about 2,600,000. The city covers a great area, and is situated in the midst of a broad, level plain. In 1900 there were 1351 manufacturing plants in operation, and its consumption of coal and coke amounted to 1,968,040 tons, of which coke was a very small percentage. In addition, there was a consumption of inferior brown coal, chiefly in briquette form, amounting to 1,920,705 tons, making a total coal consumption for the year 1900 of 3,888,745 tons.

ONLY ONE WAY TO SETTLE THE CASE

The scheme for getting the gas company out of the hole in which it found itself, by reason of its wanton violation of the statute of 1887, has fortunately been nipped in the bud. As a result of the recent municipal elections, the injustice of the scheme has been emphasized, and steps have been taken to repudiate the proposed settlement, and to insist upon one by which the citizens of Toronto will receive some show of justice. The whole matter will now be thrown open, and it looks as if a majority of the aldermen will declare in favor of the principle of public ownership as the only satisfactory method of bringing this long-standing controversy to a termination. It is to be hoped that Ald. Spence and those who support him will keep cool and steady in the pitfalls which the friends of the company will prepare for them. Ald. Spence has firm ground to go upon. His ultimate object should be the municipalization of the gas plant. Just how that is to be effected may be open to argument. On the main issue, as to municipalization, the city has an excellent case to present to the legislature. In the first place, there is nothing new about public ownership. It has been tried very largely in Great Britain, in the United States, in Canada, in fact in all the countries of the world. So that even if the trouble between the city and the gas company did not exist at all, our Council would have very good reason for petitioning the legislature to grant the petition of the large majority of ratepayers who a year ago voted in favor of the city's acquiring the plant and business of the Consumers' Gas Company. In addition, however, to our having good cause to petition the legislature on the principle of public ownership on its own merits, we ought to be able to convince the legislature that a great injustice has been done this city by reason of the failure of the Consumers' Gas Company to live up to the statute of 1887, and that the only remedy for this injustice is public ownership. It may be replied in answer to this argument that the question of the company's delinquency is now before the court, and that the legislature, consequently, is not in a position to take cognizance of the city's complaint against the company. Our answer to this is that the facts of the case are undisputed. The company can set up no pretence that it has lived up to its obligations. The statute of 1887 was passed by the legislature, and that body surely is interested in seeing that its acts are respected and lived up to. The act in its present shape is unworkable, as it provides no machinery whereby the City of Toronto, which is in some respects the more important member of the partnership, can compel its observance. For these and other reasons, the legislature would be quite justified in interfering in the matter, and if it interferes at all, it ought to settle the matter for good, and in a manner that will be satisfactory to all concerned. This settlement should undoubtedly take the form of ownership and control by the City of Toronto. The settlement which was proposed by the solicitors of the city and company, and ratified by the municipal Council of last year, is no permanent settlement. It is merely a truce for the time being, with the probability that within five years the fight will be on again. We therefore trust that the advocates of public ownership in the Council will keep strictly to the text, which is the municipalization of the gas plant. When deals are discussed before the government and the legislature, it may be found that the municipalization should be effected by the purchase of the plant outright, thru arbitration or by guaranteeing rental equal to the maximum dividend allowable under the act. The means by which municipalization may be effected is much less important than the carrying into effect of the principle itself. Ald. Spence's plan of action is perfectly clear. He should ask his fellow-members of the Council to have the plebiscite of 1901 endorsed by the Council, and then have the Council request the legislature to carry it into effect. It is only when we have failed to acquire possession of the plant and to operate it as a municipal service that we should think of making any temporary compromises with the company. The question is now one of urgency, as the legislature will not be long in session. The special meeting of the Council should be held from day to day if necessary, until finally is reached.

INVITE PRINCE HENRY TO TORONTO

The Dominion of Canada should not fail to send an invitation to Prince Henry of Prussia to visit this country on the occasion of his trip to the United States next month. The Prince will be on this side the ocean for a couple of weeks, and he can not doubt spare the time to spend a couple of days in the Dominion.

TO MAKE BEET ROOT SUGAR IN ONTARIO

The growth of sugar beets and the production of sugar will probably within a very short period be one of the greatest industries of Ontario. Heretofore, since the decline of the cane sugar industry, the greater part of the 320,000,000 of sugar used annually in Canada has come from European beet sugar producing countries, chiefly France. It has been conclusively shown by experiments conducted by the Ontario government that the sugar will ripen fully as well in Ontario as in any portion of the adjacent States, where the industry has assumed importance. Acting upon the conclusions reached by governmental investigation, a number of prominent gentlemen of Toronto and Berlin have formed the Ontario Sugar Company with the intention of going extensively into the manufacture of sugar in this province. In the vicinity of Berlin they have found almost ideal conditions for the producing of beet sugar, a rich soil, which experiment has shown to be admirably adapted to beet growing, level roads and all other conditions necessary to the successful carrying on of the industry. The climatic conditions are such as to assure a larger percentage of sugar than is obtained in Michigan and other States, where beet-growing has thriven remarkably. Added to these there is the proximity to Toronto, which is the chief distributing point for sugar in Ontario and the West. The trade conditions are such as to assure a steady and unlimited market. There will always be a differential in favor of home-grown raw sugar. The consumption is increasing enormously. More land is being put into orchard in Ontario every year, and every addition to orchard means greater consumption of sugar.

PARTIES IN THE HOUSE

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—The government now holds 133 seats in the House of Commons, as against 76 opposition, showing a ministerial majority of 57. There are, however, four seats vacant—Victoria, B.C., Lisgar, Quebec West and Monneuve, or Terrebonne. Mr. Prefontaine will be held until the election proceedings in Terrebonne are concluded. 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Presentation of Petitions and Introduction of Bills Only Business Before House.

METHODISTS OF NILE CIRCUIT Will Support Extension if it Doesn't Wobble on Prohibition, Says the Minister There.

The presentation of petitions and the introduction of several bills was the only business transacted at the legislature yesterday afternoon, and the session was accordingly brief.

The bill of the Attorney-General to amend the Marriage Act received its second reading, Mr. Gibson explained that it was not really an amendment, but merely provided for the incorporation into the statutes of the various degrees of consanguinity that are prohibited and also that the prohibited degrees of relationship shall be printed on the marriage license.

Mr. Barr (Dufferin) introduced a bill to amend the Manhood Suffrage Registration Act. It provides that the provisions of the Act shall extend to all towns and incorporated villages. Now the Act is applicable to county towns and other large centres only. It also provides that the police magistrate in towns and county towns and the clerk of the municipality shall constitute the Board of Registration.

A bill was also introduced by Mr. Barr to amend the School Act by striking out the clause which says that when the school boundary has once been defined it shall not be changed for five years.

Mr. Hoyle (North Ontario) introduced a bill to amend the Municipal Act so that aldermen, councillors or school trustees may not hold a dual position.

Mr. Preston (South Brant) and Mr. Auld (South Essex) introduced respectively bills to amend the Municipal Act and the Ontario Games Act.

Mr. Fardeau (West Lambton) presented a petition from G. R. Lovelock and others of Lennox, U.S.A., in respect of the Petrolia Electric Railway Co., and Mr. McKee one from the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Rapid Railway, who want to increase their borrowings.

The Township Council of Pelee petitioned through Mr. Auld for power to amend the establishment of a steamship service between Pelee Island and the mainland.

To Ratify Agreement. Col. Leys presented a petition from the London Township Council asking for legislation to ratify an agreement with the London Street Railway Co. and the Ontario Street Railway Co. by which the assessment of the McLeary Hamilton petition was to be bylaw fixing the assessment of the McLeary Manufacturing Co. and George White, Sons & Co.

Mr. Carleton presented a petition from Hamilton asking that where municipalities employ solicitors or counsel at a regular salary, they should be given the right to recover costs on all actions, the same as if their solicitors were not receiving a regular salary.

Another grant of temperance petitions was presented to the House. On one petition from Nile Circuit, West Huron, the minister, Mr. Robinson, wrote: "Our board will support a government straight on prohibition, but not if it wobbles."

Others presented were from the following circuits: Mr. Lee; Bellwoods Circuit, by Mr. Gibson; Holmesville Circuit, by Mr. Garrow; Nile Circuit, by Mr. Garrow; Petrolia Circuit, by Mr. Pardee; Winchester Circuit, by Mr. Whitney; Kincardine Circuit, by Mr. White; Port Huron Circuit, by Mr. White; Rockwood Circuit, by Mr. Murray; Tyrone Circuit, by Mr. Bell; Pelee Circuit, by Mr. Russell; Hastings Circuit, by Mr. Blazey; Bolivar Circuit, by Mr. Histo; Milton Circuit, by Mr. Barker; Lambeth Circuit, by Mr. Robson; Orangeville Circuit, by Mr. Barr; Paisley-street Circuit, by Mr. Murray.

Assembly Notes. The Provincial Board of Health has the same story to tell about the small-pox situation in Ontario—it is still spreading. The disease has been discovered in another family in Raleigh township, Kent County. Two young boys, aged ten and eleven, who were playing violins at parties are supposed to have been the carriers of the outbreak. The schools in the district have been closed, and the children ordered to be vaccinated. There is also a case at Campbellville and Nassagaweya Township, Hamilton County.

Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann had an interview with Premier Ross and Hon. E. D. Davis yesterday.

Of the bills introduced into the House next week, Mr. F. S. Munn introduced three, one to amend the Assessment Act, and a third to amend the Voters' List Act. Hon. J. T. Garrow will propose an amendment to the Elections Act; Mr. Connors one to the law of libel and slander and Hon. J. M. Gibson an enactment to divide the district of Rainy River.

Mr. Brethaupt has introduced the following inquiry: Has the government taken into consideration the question of utilizing Canadian grown flax in the manufacture of binder twine and rope, instead of procuring the raw material from Manila, New Zealand and elsewhere?

The announcement of the appointment of a successor to D. E. Thomson as license commissioner is expected to be made in the course of the week. Mr. John Macdonald of John Macdonald & Co., the big wholesale house, has been mentioned for the position.

DOCTOR DIES WITH PATIENT. Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 17.—Mrs. Edmund Bachus, living on the fourth floor of an Elm-street flat, was taken suddenly ill last night. Dr. C. H. Thurman was called and hastened to her relief. She died just as the doctor entered the apartments.

The doctor also died immediately on entering of exhaustion from climbing three flights of steps. Both were troubled with heart disease.

Another Week. The moving pictures at the Robert Simpson Company's palatial store continue to be a source of entertainment and instruction, and instead of diminishing the attendance is increasing daily, and up to last night some 16,000 people, by actual count, had seen this splendid exhibition. Next week the new series of views will be exhibited at 11.30, 2.30 and 4.30 performances. To-day will be the last opportunity of seeing the series, which shows the King and Queen and the Prince and Princess of Wales.

Boycott German Goods. St. Petersburg, Jan. 17.—The Polish boycott of German goods is spreading. The Association of Agricultural and Co-operative Societies, covering several provinces around Warsaw, has passed a resolution not to purchase any more German products. Many firms which hitherto had always handled German goods are now exclusively ordering American implements and machinery.

TO HURRY NEW BUILDINGS.

Exhibition Directors Decide to Recommend Adoption of Last Year's Plans.

THE COST LIMITED TO MONEY VOTED

Construction Referred to Joint Committee of City Council and Exhibition Board.

Initial steps toward the erection of the new buildings at the Exhibition grounds were taken at a joint conference of the Exhibition Board and a sub-committee of the Parks and Exhibition Committee of the City Council...

The chairman explained that the object of the conference was to arrange for the erection of the new buildings for which the city had authorized the expenditure of \$133,500.

A letter was read from Messrs. Gregg & Gregg, architects, stating that they had the plans for the dairy building, which were accepted last year, and were ready to submit the construction so soon as tenders were called for.

This gave rise to the question as to whether it was obligatory on their part to accept the plans prepared last year. The chairman explained the conditions under which the plans were drawn, and while it was agreed that they were not compelled to accept them, it was thought that the plans should be adopted, as follows:

Moved by Mr. McNaught, seconded by Mr. Booth, that the plans adopted by the board last year be recommended to the Parks and Exhibition Committee of the City Council as the plans of the new buildings to be erected, provided the buildings can be erected for the amount voted for that purpose, and subject to any changes that may be deemed expedient by the joint committee.

Moved by Ald. Oliver, seconded by Dr. Orr, that a sub-committee be appointed from this board to act with the Board of Control and the committee from the Parks and Exhibition Committee, with full power in all matters in connection with the erection of the new buildings, said committee to be composed of Mr. R. J. Scott, Dr. Orr, Mr. McNaught, Mr. A. Maclaren, Dr. Orr, Ald. Oliver, Mr. Ellis and the president.

On motion of Ald. Sheppard, it was decided that Ald. Oliver and Dr. Orr should be a committee to look into the question of the cataract cure, which will be given later.
