American Manufacturer Says They Are a Great People to Patronize in Home Industry.

WILL NOT BUY AMERICAN GOODS

When They Can Get a Home-Made Proposition for the Same Money.

Martin Kline, assistant general manager of the Michigan Machine Works of Detroit, is a Rossin House guest. He is in the city looking after his company's exhibit at the Toronto Exhibition. "I expect the machinery here project of the Exposition to attract a great deal of attention," Mr. Martin remarked. "This is a feature that should have been encouraged long ago by the directors of the Exhibition. I observe machinery from many parts of the States at the hall and all parts of Canada are represented. This cry about United States goods, I can't see where the mechanical ingenuity of the people in the States has any advantage over the Canadians. They have the material and the skill and the home market. What have they to fear, then? There is tariff enough to protect them, and they have nothing to fear. They have cheaper labor than the States and the difference in their favor of the tariff. Canada will always supply the bulk of her home markets. We Americans will always sell some lines to Canadians, but it will be small in comparison to the volume of business done by the Canadians with their own people. Canadians are great people to patronize home industry. They will never buy an American article when they can get a home-made proposition for the same money. This is the best guarantee that the market over here is always Canadian first."

"I have just come down thru the Canadian Northwest, stopping at a large number of places. COMPANY OPPOSES UNION LABOR COUNCIL PROSPERS Strong Trades Union of Hamilton Reported to Be in an Unusually Flourishing Condition. ENGINEER'S BODY BROUGHT HOME. Man Poisoned by Eating Canned Salmon in Critical Condition.

Hamilton, Aug. 15.—The third arbitrator in the electrical workers' dispute has not yet been named. William Bell, arbitrator for the Cataract Power Co., prepared an agreement of submission to be signed by the officers of the union and the company, in which both parties agree to be governed by the decision of the arbitrator. In the agreement the questions to be arbitrated on were outlined. The three principal clauses deal with the matter of hours, wages and the recognition of the union. This agreement was handed by Mr. Bell to the signatories of the other side to secure the signatures of the officers of the union, but up till noon it had not been returned. Until the agreement is signed, nothing can be done with reference to appointing a third arbitrator. In the meantime the situation remains unchanged.

Machinery is Still Kept Moving. The company has so far managed to keep its machinery in motion. The men are simply resting on their own and have left the whole matter in the hands of their arbitrator. They have furnished him with plenty of material, documentary and otherwise, in support of their claims, and expect that he will be able to bring the strike to a satisfactory close. A hearing in the arbitration proceedings occurred this afternoon. The men refused to sign the agreement, and submitted another agreement in its place, but the company is not disposed to consider it. Some difficulty has arisen, which will probably prevent the arbitration proceeding as planned. The men claim that Manager Hawkins, during the last trouble, agreed to recognize the union. Now they say the agreement was not signed, and they are determined to have their union shall be recognized. If the company will not do this, they say they will go on strike. This men say in the city will be a serious blow to the company, and very serious consequences will ensue if the electrical workers' union is not recognized.

PIGEON WALKS 175 MILES. Broken Wing Prevents Bird From Flying, But It Gets Home. Columbus, O., Aug. 15.—Teddy Dermott, a bird fancier of East Liverpool, O., claims the championship for a pigeon walking 175 miles. The bird, which was named "Scotchman," was brought to this city five weeks ago for a homing flight. It had been injured by a hunter shortly before, but it was believed to be that one wing was broken and it could not fly. Nothing more was thought of it until yesterday, when the bird walked into the yard of its owner at East Liverpool. Mr. Dermott is confident the bird walked the whole distance, 175 miles.

TOO MUCH POTASH IN PRUSSIA. Crisis in Industry Due to Overproduction of Niles. Berlin, Aug. 15.—The Polish industry is undergoing a crisis, due to overproduction. The Prussian Treasury mines have discharged hundreds of workmen and have reduced the wages of others from ten to thirty per cent. All private mines and factories took similar steps. It is explained that the industry was not affected by the depression in German business till the end of April, when all factory warehouses were stocked to the roof. Much bitterness prevails among the discharged workmen against the syndicate for forcing the production in 1901 far beyond the market demands, thus rendering it impossible to keep the workmen employed this year.

Fahrenheit Thermometer. Sir James Spence, writing to "Knowledge," gives the history of the origin of the Fahrenheit thermometer, which is generally used in this country. It was really invented by Sir Isaac Newton, and the name of Fahrenheit is attached to it because he was the first to use it. Newton's paper is to be found in the Philosophical Transactions for the year 1701. He describes his instrument as a glass tube filled with alcohol, and to which he attached a scale to measure the degree of heat of the liquid into which he plunged it. His lowest point was that of freezing, as his highest was that of boiling water. He chose for the starting point of his scale the point of the human body, and this he called by the round number 12, the quadrantal system being then in use. He divided the space between the freezing and boiling points into 12 parts, and made it 24 degrees instead of 12. He also made a scale for the starting point of the freezing point, which he called 0, and this he divided into 100 parts, and made it 100 degrees instead of 100. A few years afterwards, when Fahrenheit had finished his experiments, but finding the scale not quite accurate, he made it 72 degrees instead of 100.
