BRILLIANT SOCIETY EVENT Annual Ball of Hamilton Riding Club. Attended by Many Toronto People.

13TH'S VICTORIA DAY PROGRAM Trades and Labor Council Favor Fund to Fight Unions' Battles in Legislature.

Hamilton, April 17.—The ball of the Hamilton Riding Club at the Royal Hotel to-night was one of the swell society events of the season. All the fashionable people in this city, again from Toronto, Buffalo, London, St. Thomas and Chatham were present.

At this meeting to-night the Trades and Labor Council endorsed the scheme to raise a \$100,000 fund to fight all proposals for legislation hostile to unions, and to appeal all cases which are decided against them in the lower courts.

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IRISHMEN IN CONVENTION DISCUSSING THE LAND BILL

Dublin, April 17.—The national convention called by the United Irish League to consider the new land bill, which assembled here yesterday, reconvened early to-day in the round room of the Mansion House in this city. There was a smaller attendance. In the case of certain English papers, John Redmond, the chairman, introduced a strong home rule resolution, declaring that the Irish nation never would be satisfied until it shall have obtained a full measure of self-government. "No full measure of self-government," he said, "can or will be accepted."

Michael Davitt briefly seconded the resolution, saying Irishmen would be neglecting their sacred duty to the cause if they did not stand such a resolution. William O'Brien then proceeded to explain the bill and to propose amendments to the land bill. Aid to Evicted Tenants. An amendment for providing financial assistance to the evicted tenants was welcomed, but many of the delegates wished it to go further.

Patrick Flynn of the Cork branch of the United Irish League, a man of great gifts, with a brilliant intellect and a broad-brimmed hat in the other, then moved the same resolution. "I did not," said Mr. Flynn, "hear the conference spellbound by the extraordinary eloquence with which he evicted the tenants from their holdings which formerly belonged to evicted peasants should themselves be evicted. This speech was a masterpiece of a storm against 'grabbers,' but Mr. O'Brien's more moderate counsel prevailed."

Oshawa expects a new \$25,000 post-office. London is about to establish a firemen's benefit fund. A Montreal Stock Exchange seat has been sold for \$26,500.

Palmerston is about buying the electric light works from the Bank of Hamilton for \$25,000. Peterborough cyclists have to go slow and ring their bells at every cross street, under a penalty of \$50.

Kingston has forced the G.T.R. to build an overhead bridge at a cost of \$270,000, at the company's expense. Peterborough will check the Minister of Customs to make a return to which the company will be asked in bond.

The St. Thomas Times intends putting in a typetting machine. It is the only Ontario daily using hand-set type. Mr. T. Passmore, butcher, had a couple of fine spring lambs in his Easter sale, and some of which were quickly bought up.

The teamsters employed by the Woodstock Council have declared their intention of striking for \$3.50 a day. The strike situation with the Canada Aired for truckmen has simmered down to a fight and staying power will count for the best finish.

Chagoyan papers say that the Fairfield Publishing Company, the largest on the Clyde, has decided to build a plant on Sydney, N.S., having been purchased by John Henry, well-known character of Ottawa, has just celebrated his 82nd birthday. GAMBLERS TELL ON CROOKS

Inspector Stark Explains Why Criminals Are Easily Detected in Toronto These Days.

INFORMATION COMES FROM JOINTS

Therefore, He Would Have Gambling Suppressed by Morality Department.

The Montreal system of putting the suppression of gambling in the hands of the detective department, while it seems more efficacious than ours, does not appeal to Inspector Stark.

Yesterday he expressed his satisfaction with the system at present in force in Toronto, which draws a clear distinction between the duties of the Detective and the Morality Departments.

"Toronto, compared with other cities, has a remarkably light calendar of crime," said the inspector, "and I attribute this largely to the policy of prevention pursued by the Detective Department. The great majority of criminals who come to Toronto are caught and expelled before they have had an opportunity to do any harm. Now, the way the department gets wind of these arrivals is through the class of people who are the keepers and promoters of gambling joints, houses of ill fame, etc. It is as simple as the number of these people who, with no hope or reward, will put themselves out to lay information before the detectives. These people are, however, much more likely to understand that giving this information procures them no reward for unlawful practices on their own account.

"The investigation that the detectives may gain with regard to any unlawful practice is held before the Morality Department, but I consider that would be very bad policy in the Detective Department to prevent anyone from the disclosure of information by prosecuting them directly."

Easy Method of Repairing a Dunlop.

Deflate tire by unscrewing the valve cap and pressing the valve plunger. Take hold of the tire at a point farthest away from the valve, pushing one edge of the cover into the bottom of the rim with the thumb, as in illustration No. 1.

Keep the thumb pressed down firmly on the wire in the edge of the cover and move hands around tire in opposite directions until they reach each other near the valve, where the entire edge of cover is off the rim. Push the valve through the valve hole and remove the air tubes. Then the other edge of the cover can be removed from the rim in the same manner as the first edge.

When properly adjusted inflate to riding pressure, and see that the valve cap is screwed on. When screwing on the valve cap always grasp the valve stem firmly between the thumb and fingers.


