Interesting Letter from the Pacific Province for Capitalists

In Great Britain—Ore shipments from West Kootenay—Gold Gravel of Cariboo and the Amount of the Yellow Metal Taken Out—The Trail Creek Camp—New Quartz Fields—Boring for Coal—Changes in the Mineral Laws.

Special correspondence of The London, Eng., Mining Journal.

The output of the precious metals and the associated products of the mines continue to enlarge steadily in West Kootenay, although some of the richest districts of that region—notably points in the north—have not yet begun, as a rule, to show to any very full extent by output their great natural possibilities. The Sloan and Trail Creek districts consequently yet retain their pre-eminence, the former district of rich silver lead ore being still noted as, on the whole, the most prolific yielding and productive area in the precious metal region of British Columbia. Notwithstanding the depreciation of silver, and the fact that the Sloan ores, which are mainly bearers of the white metals, have to bear comparison with the Trail Creek output of gold and copper, the Sloan district, which is especially having regard to cost of working, with the average worth of 880 per ton of 2000 lbs. of ore, is still being favorably compared with the Trail Creek output of gold and copper, which is being valued at 140 per ton, and is being appreciated. West Kootenay's aggregate precious metal ore shipments, well smelted "matte," amount in value for the first four months of 1897 to the goodly sum of \$2,911,291—a great increase upon the corresponding total shipments of the first three months of last year. It is thus evident that West Kootenay's output for 1897 is steadily enlarging, and is amounting to at least a worth of \$8,000,000 at the end of the twelvemonth. Meanwhile other districts—namely East Kootenay—will also add largely to the precious metal output of the province, for, despite the delay in the commencement of the Crow's Nest Railroad, mining development is proceeding with quite untiring activity in East Kootenay. The North Star mine has thrice made big recent shipments of galena, and several other mines are entering, and will shortly enter, the producing line in continuation of the successful undertaking of the district's greatest mining activity.

PRECIOUS METALS OF B. C.

Meanwhile preparations are being made for a busy season's hydraulic work on the gold gravels of Cariboo, and the great district of Lillooet, long the source of profitable placer gold mining, will in 1897, for the first time, become a centre of free-milling gold quartz mining in and about Cayoosh Creek, not far from the old mine village of Lillooet, and easily reached from Vancouver by rail and road. Sufficient working capital has been obtained for active productive operations on the Golden Cache group of mines here situated. In these mines investors in and about Vancouver are largely interested, and it is understood that English capital is also to a limited extent invested in the undertaking, which is worked by a company having an authorized capital of \$500,000, while the deposits being clearly workable. Here a large stamp mill will shortly begin work, and those behind the company freely assert that the first centing of a considerable tonnage of rich rock should show an average of \$500 a ton. It is thus evident that the claims vary considerably in assay; but there is a general belief, which the season's working should either verify or refute, that the Golden Cache group of mines is among the richest of the free-milling gold propositions in British Columbia, as a result of which the shares stand at a very high premium. Other ventures, showing either the same or adjacent leads, will also be preliminarily developed this year, among the more noted of these being the Alpha Bell group,
