Crops in England.—The Wheat Harvest very generally commenced in the South of England about a formightago—a large portion of it has been carried in, to be free from blight or rust, though some complaints of smut are occasionally heard. Conjectures as to the amount of future produce, are seldom to be relied on; but it is evident, that except on the best-soils, and those that are cool and retending, the bulk of straw will be less than last year; and although the produce with some exceptions is likely to be good, both in quantity and quality, yet in neither respect will it turn out equal to the hargest of last year. The state of the barley crop presents a more varied and less faremable character than that of wheat. Outs must be short in straw, and although accasionaly in favourable situations, they may yield a tolerable produce of grain, yet in others, and more generally, the crop appears likely to be miscrably deficient. There has been generally, a favourable account of hops.—Bells' W. M.

The woolen trade of the West Riding of Yorkshire is nevertheless considerably better than it was a month ago; nome slight improvement has taken place in the demand for worsted goods; and even the cotton trade begins to revive. We trust most sincerely that this improvement will be permanent, and that we shall be saved from the horrors and dangers of universal distress during the winter season."
