

HAVANA, Cuba, April 19--While not the most destructive storm that has recently swept over this end of Cuba, that of Monday, April 1, was by far more picturesque in effect than the record-breaking hurricane of last October.

THE PEOPLE CHOOSE

Politically St. John is a somewhat peculiar constituency, and sometimes, therefore, the unexpected happens. It would certainly be the unexpected in the present instance if the Liberal convention, in the face of Saturday night's great demonstration, should nominate any other than Hon. Dr. Pugsley as its candidate for the bye-election to fill the common vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Stockton, M. P.

A study of the names on the requisition presented to Dr. Pugsley makes it clear that only a factious obstinacy, or the clear ambition opposed to the desire of the vast majority, could prompt the nomination of any other man. Nevertheless, so uncertain is the political game, when clever manipulators set themselves seriously to work, that indifference on the part of one group at the primaries sometimes results in a triumph for another in the convention. Therefore, until the primaries and the convention have been held nothing should be taken for granted. Dr. Pugsley should go to Ottawa with the prestige that belongs to the chosen candidate of his own party in convention.

That he would go in any case, so matter nothing should be taken for granted. Dr. Pugsley has the support of influential men of both political parties; and since it is generally recognized that he is the man who can best champion the rights of the city and province at a time when vast interests are at stake.

It is significant that many who in times past have been politically opposed to Dr. Pugsley now recognize that he is the one man whose ability, experience, and acknowledged devotion to the interests of St. John make him the man of the hour. Events have moved rapidly in our political history during the past two or three years. Momentous changes have occurred in the ranks of the political leadership of the province. Changes wholly unforeseen have completely altered the complexion of affairs. During this time Dr. Pugsley has steadily risen to higher positions, until today the Liberal party have no other man so able, so strong in the qualities of leadership, so resourceful, or so favorably regarded by men of all political parties. Is this statement doubted? The answer is in the list of names attached to the requisition presented to Dr. Pugsley on Saturday evening.

If there should be another claimant for the Liberal nomination, by whom and for what purpose will his cause be championed? Will it be to advance the interests of St. John—or personal ambition—or feelings of another sort? And which of these motives should the electors regard with favor?

There is no reasonable doubt that if Dr. Pugsley is nominated by the Liberal convention he will not be opposed, but will go to Ottawa to champion St. John's interests with all the prestige of an premier, chosen by acclamation to represent this city, and personally qualified as no other available man would be to become, in the event of cabinet reconstruction, a member of the government.

The argument is conclusive. The opportunity is exceptional. It could not have been foreseen, and it should be embraced with a full sense of what is meant by effective representation of this constituency in parliament at what is really a critical period in the history of the winter port.

The primaries will be held this evening. It is known that there is some personal opposition to Dr. Pugsley's nomination, and that an effort may be made to secure supporters for another candidate. The choice will be settled at the primaries, and the friends of Dr. Pugsley should be out in force, in order to make assurance doubly sure.

Were the name of Dr. Pugsley put forward by a small faction there might be reasonable grounds for presenting other names, but when a spontaneous movement by the leading men of the party, heartily endorsed by many leading followers of the other party brings such a requisition as was presented to Dr. Pugsley on Saturday evening there is no escape from the reasonableness of the statement that he should be made the unanimous choice.

Since the above was written, the Times has received the information that Hon. H. A. McKeown declines to have his name placed before the convention. In this Mr. McKeown acts with a proper and highly commendable appreciation of the situation. But this does not settle the matter, as a requisition in the interests of another gentleman has been circulated within the last few days. The friends of Dr. Pugsley should attend the primaries this evening.

very generous in making financial provision for the work to be done, and Mr. Fisher still hopes to have an additional dredge at work within a short time. Failing that, he may arrange with Mr. Mayes to clear the site for the new berth. This of course could be done, but at the expense of other work which, if not so much needed, is nevertheless of great importance. Until the digging on the 600-foot site is actually in progress there will be general anxiety in this city, since the need of increased facilities is urgent and the extent of the work to be done makes time an important factor in the case.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

The British chancellor of the exchequer has grievously disappointed the Socialists by postponing the old-age pension scheme. "It is a brutal budget," says James Keir Hardie, the Socialist-Labor leader. "The government has reserved its gifts exclusively for its middle-class supporters. The aged poor will learn with dismay that the cup of hope raised to their lips by Mr. Asquith's statement during the debate on the address in reply to the King's speech has been dashed. This will drive away hundreds of thousands of the government's working-class supporters, who had expected better things from the party which they did so much to place in power. Mr. Asquith is one of the most reactionary-minded men on either side of the house of commons. The Laborites will oppose the budget in parliament and expose it outside."

And yet Mr. Asquith made a very definite statement in favor of old-age pensions. We quote from the press report: "In regard to old-age pensions, the chancellor said he would not commit himself to any scheme for the purpose. Everything must be done by steps. But, in behalf of the government, he declared that in the sphere of finance the ministers regarded old-age pensions as being the most serious and most urgent of all the demands for social reform. It was their hope and intention before the close of the next session of parliament, if they were allowed to have their way, to lay a firm foundation for this reform."

Such a statement should prove satisfactory to men of moderate views, and indeed it is approved by the moderate liberal press. The budget, in fact, sets aside \$7,500,000 for the scheme of old-age pensions.

The Toronto board of education has decided to purchase a site for the proposed new technical school at a cost of \$62,500. The Hamilton education committee has endorsed the request of the city council for a technical college in that city. In Montreal the promoters of a technical institute are completing arrangements for evening classes in the new high school building. The members of the Manufacturers' Association are giving aid to the project.

Politics in Ontario is reduced to a science. Hence we find in a Toronto paper this advertisement:—"Organizer Wanted.—Young unmarried man, who has had experience, to take charge of political organization. Give references and state experience." Presumably the political economy with which this accomplished young man would necessarily be familiar would not be that of the text books.

The statement is made that lumber operators anticipate little difficulty in saving the logs stranded in the St. John river last summer. If the last winter's cut is also brought down without serious difficulty the backward season will not have been without its merits.

The serious conditions at the Crow's Nest coal mines continue, and naturally give rise to much apprehension in communities receiving their coal supply from that region.

It is said Mr. Bourassa is to have a daily newspaper. If Mr. Bourassa is to be heard from every day the country will have its own troubles.

The New York state assembly has adopted a bill providing for a flat rate of two cents a mile on all railroads in the State.

The case of Collins vs. the City was settled in the Supreme Court on Saturday before Chief Justice Tuck, on appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada. About a year ago the case was tried in circuit here and a verdict of \$1,000 was rendered for the plaintiff. The defendant took an appeal to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. The appeal was dismissed from the judgment of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick.

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

THREE THOUSAND VOTERS REQUEST PREMIER PUGSLEY TO ACCEPT A NOMINATION

And in Splendid Speech at Saturday Night's Big Mass Meeting the Premier Accepts the Call--A Most Enthusiastic Reception to the Man of the Hour--Business Men Support Him in Practical Speeches.



HON. WILLIAM PUGSLEY, The Man Whom 3,000 Electors Ask to Represent St. John City and County at Ottawa.

All signs point to Hon. William Pugsley as the next member for the City and County of St. John at Ottawa.

On the platform besides the chairman and secretary, were G. Sidney Smith, Joseph A. Lively, A. M. Rowan, P. J. Money, Robert Thomson, Thomas McAvity, A. P. Carruth, A. O. Skinner, D. J. McLaughlin, E. Lantulum, M. P. P., W. H. Barnaby, Geo. McAvity, E. C. Elkin, George Robertson, M. P. P.

Mr. Gorman announced that the object of the meeting was to present a largely signed requisition containing more than 3,000 names, asking Mr. Pugsley to be the Liberal candidate for the vacant St. John city and county seat at Ottawa.

Dr. Pugsley, in the course of a ringing speech, announced that if the nomination was tendered him he would accept.

He had spoken at some length before he definitely accepted the requisition and again and again had been interrupted by outbursts of cheering and applause.

He said he would accept the requisition and become the standard bearer of the party, ready to lead it to victory, if the nomination were tendered him, the applause and cheering swelled to a mighty volume and continued for some minutes.

Even Berryman's Hall has witnessed few such demonstrations of enthusiasm. For some minutes Hon. Mr. Pugsley was unable to proceed with his speech, but stood awaiting the end of the thoroughly spontaneous and hearty demonstration.

The meeting, which launched the campaign of the Liberal party for the election to fill the St. John city and county vacancy at Ottawa, was attended by a truly great gathering.

A line of electors four deep filled the space along the west wall of the hall while many stood in other parts of the room, and hundreds were turned away because there was no room for them. Every man in the hall was a voter.

"Pugsley and victory" was the spirit of the meeting. The requisition and the meeting itself afforded the strongest proof that the party's call to the Premier was strong, representative and imperative.

A little after 8 o'clock Hon. Mr. Pugsley, who had been chatting with friends near the door of the hall, advanced to the front amid hearty applause. As he took a seat on the platform, Col. H. H. McLean moved that Thomas Gorman be appointed chairman of the meeting.

Dear Sir: I regret exceedingly that I shall not be able to attend the meeting at Berryman's Hall this evening in connection with the presentation of the requisition to Hon. William Pugsley, but I beg to assure you that the movement to induce him to become a candidate for the house of commons for the city and county of St. John has my entire approval.

"I have since discussed the situation with many of my friends in this city and I am now in a position to say that I accept the requisition with pleasure (cheers) and that if on April 26 I am nominated as your candidate it will afford me the greatest pleasure to enter the fight, if fight there be, and carry your standard on to victory."

This announcement was greeted with prolonged cheering and applause. Continuing, Dr. Pugsley said: "You have all had the opportunity of watching my career, you have often heard my praises sung here in Berryman's hall, and you have also heard much that has not been to my credit (laughter)."

"Time brings its changes. It is not many months since the great Liberal convention was called together by Hon. H. R. Emmerson in this hall. We had with us then Mr. Blair in the full vigor of manhood, and looking forward to a time when the people of this city might ask him to return to parliament. He has been called from among us. So, too, has our friend, Dr. Stockton, an associate in business with Mr. Blair, and my warm personal friend. Mr. Emmerson has felt himself called upon for reasons to which I need not refer in detail here, to resign. Politics have moved forward with marvelous rapidity and following on these changes the people are now looking to me to take my place in the arena at Ottawa. (Cheers.)"

"Before I proceed with my remarks I would say one word with regard to Mr. Emmerson. I am one of those who hope and believe that the charges brought against him will be proved false. I have heard that it is said that this movement is hostile to him. It is not so. At no time have we been more friendly and it happens that I am one else concerned engaged to prosecute the men who are slandering him. Before proceeding, I desire to read this resolution because I feel that the people of this province are always ready to recognize the merits of its public men."

Dr. Pugsley then read and subsequently moved the following resolution: "Whereas, the Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, minister of railways, has been charged with the result of legal proceedings which have been pending in the courts of this province and this meeting desires to record its appreciation of Mr. Emmerson's public services, both to the province and to the Dominion; and it is therefore resolved: That in the opinion of this meeting the Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, while the representative of New Brunswick in the cabinet of the Dominion, discharged the onerous duties of his office with such good judgment and appreciation of and devotion to the best interests of the country as to earn for him the lasting gratitude of the people of this province and of the Dominion; that, his successful efforts to place the intercolonial upon a paying basis and his determination to keep the national railway."





CHEAPER SCHOOL BOOKS

(Toronto News.) The Department of Education of Ontario, it is likely, will announce its intention of immediately advertising for tenders for the supply of Public School Readers for a stated time, probably five years. Canadian publishers will alone be considered, and if the prices quoted by the tenders approximate the estimates a contract will be awarded.

The standard material and character of the books will materially raised, and the subject matter will be determined by a special consulting body which will likely include representation from the Literary Council as well as prominent outside educationalists. Notwithstanding the improved character of the books, The New Department warrant them in anticipating a reduction of some 40 to 50 per cent in the present prices.

The question of the distribution of books by the Government will probably be left temporarily in abeyance, nor will the matter of free school books to rural schools be dealt with at present.

INTEMPERANCE IS INCREASING

Speakers at Anti-Alcohol Meeting in Montreal Deplore Increase of Intemperance in Canada.

Among the speakers at an anti-alcohol meeting under the auspices of the League Club in Montreal last week the speakers included Dr. L. J. Lemieux, M. L. A. for Gaspe; the Hon. W. A. Weir, Minister of Finance; Dr. R. L. Laurier, M. P. for L'Assomption; Dr. Godfrey Langlois, M. L. A. for St. Louis; Dr. LaCombe, M. L. A. for St. Mary's division; Dr. Deschamps, and Messrs. Y. Gaudet, T. Marcell and A. David.

Dr. Lemieux spoke of the alarming increase of intemperance in Canada. Last year alone six million gallons of alcohol were produced in Canada—one gallon for each inhabitant. Adding to this the beer, wine and spirituous liquors imported, one could not help entertaining a fear that Canadians were rapidly advancing in the work of intemperance. With the increase of alcohol consumed comes increase of vagrants, criminals, insane and sick persons. Official reports of prisons for 1905 show that in a total of 6845 prisoners, 2,468 were sentenced for drunkenness.

Dr. Lemieux referred to the dangers of fevered by patent medicines, having alcohol as their basis, which now flood Canada. He also spoke eloquently of the grand temperance movement of Archbishop Bruchesi. The clergy in his own country had done good work in a population of 12,000 in the Caspian peninsula there is only one hotel license, and there were only two arrests for drunkenness in one year.

The doctor advocated the principle of the Central Public House Trust Association, referring to the good result of its operation in England. He insisted on commencing temperance education in the school house, advocated a broadcast distribution of temperance literature, appointment of a commission to study the Central Public House Trust Association system, closing of bar-rooms at 7 o'clock on Saturdays.

LAKE ERIE ARRIVES
