

## OUR NEW FACTORY.

On the front cover of this book we give to our readers birds-eye-view of our new factory building, which we hav just had erected in Montreal for our especial use. V cannot enter into a description of it in the limited space : our disposal here, further than to give a general idea of $i$ size and uses. In extent it covers three sides of a squa having a total frontage on three streets of 404 feet, with inner court in which is built the engine and boiler hou It is four storeys high with the basement, and is $b_{1}$ entirely of brick and stone, the St. Antoine Street fr being handsomely faced with sandstone. For substantia structure and architectural beauty it is not excelled by any factory building in Montreal. Every modern improvement that would facilitate the business has been adapted, such as steam elevators, hand railways, machines for bottle washing, bottle filling, bottle corking, \&c. Steam and gas are carried to all parts of the building.

Commencing at the top floor, which is set apart entirely for laboratory purposes, it is here where are manufactured those world-renowned preparations, some of which are described in this book, and which are so well and favorably known to the people of Canada.

Descending to the next floor we find the bottling department and store rooms for finished goods. Again descending we come to the finishing apartments, shipping department, sample rooms and offices.

The basement is used for the storage of cased goods, and as a bonded warehouse. It also contains the printing office.

As stated above, we cannot describe the new factory in the space here at our disposal, but feeling confident that we have a building not surpassed in convenience, size and elegance either in the United States or Canada for the purpose it is intended for, we invite all our friends to come and see us, when we will give them a hearty welcome.

## Holidays Observed in Public Offlces in the Frovince of Ouebec.




There will be four Telipses during the year 1885 : two of the Sun and two of the Moon.
I. March 10th, there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, visible here as a partial Eclipse.

Eolipse begins March 16th, 3 h .17 , in Longitude $138^{\circ} \mathrm{5} 7^{\prime} \mathbf{W}$., in Latitude $13^{\circ} 30^{\circ} \mathrm{N}$.
Eelipse ends " $\quad 8 \mathrm{~h} .13$, in " $32^{\circ} 51^{\prime} \mathrm{W}$., " $49^{\circ} 6^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$.
II. March 29-30, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, not visible in these parts. Visible in the Eastern portions of Europe and LAfrica, in Asia and the Western Pacific Ocean.

First Contact of shadow with Moon's limb $139^{\circ}$ from the North point toward the East, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude $135^{\circ} 53^{\prime}$ East of Greenwich and in Latitude $3^{\circ} 16^{\prime}$ Scath.

Last contact of shadow with Moon's limb $104^{\circ}$ from the North point, toward thy West, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude $89^{\circ} 32^{\prime}$ East of Green wich and in Latitude $3^{\circ} 48^{\prime}$ South.
III. September oth, there will be a total Eclipse of tiae Sun, visible in the South Pacific Ocean, and therefore not visible here.

IV. September 23 rd , there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, visible here, on the Atlantic Ocean, North and South America, and on the Pacific Ocean.
