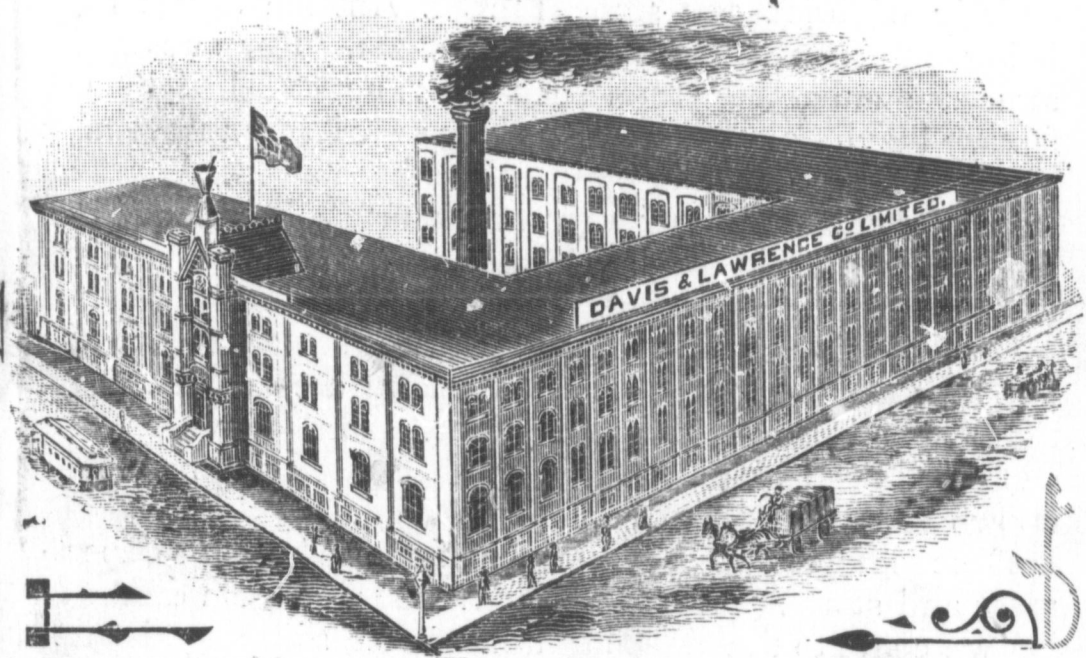

OUR NEW FACTORY.

On the front cover of this book we give to our readers a birds-eye-view of our new factory building, which we have just had erected in Montreal for our especial use. We cannot enter into a description of it in the limited space at our disposal here, further than to give a general idea of its size and uses. In extent it covers three sides of a square having a total frontage on three streets of 404 feet, with an inner court in which is built the engine and boiler house. It is four storeys high with the basement, and is built entirely of brick and stone, the St. Antoine Street front being handsomely faced with sandstone. For substantial structure and architectural beauty it is not excelled by any factory building in Montreal. Every modern improvement that would facilitate the business has been adapted, such as steam elevators, hand railways, machines for bottle washing, bottle filling, bottle corking, &c. Steam and gas are carried to all parts of the building.

Commencing at the top floor, which is set apart entirely for laboratory purposes, it is here where are manufactured those world-renowned preparations, some of which are described in this book, and which are so well and favorably known to the people of Canada.

Descending to the next floor we find the bottling department and store rooms for finished goods. Again descending we come to the finishing apartments, shipping department, sample rooms and offices.

The basement is used for the storage of cased goods, and as a bonded warehouse. It also contains the printing office.

As stated above, we cannot describe the new factory in the space here at our disposal, but feeling confident that we have a building not surpassed in convenience, size and elegance either in the United States or Canada for the purpose it is intended for, we invite all our friends to come and see us, when we will give them a hearty welcome.

There will be four Eclipses during the year 1885 : two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. March 16th, there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, visible here as a partial Eclipse.
Eclipse begins March 16th, 3 h. 17, in Longitude 136° 57' W., in Latitude 13° 30' N.
Eclipse ends " 8 h. 13, in " 32° 51' W., " 49° 6' N.

II. March 29-30, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, not visible in these parts. Visible in the Eastern portions of Europe and Africa, in Asia and the Western Pacific Ocean.
First Contact of shadow with Moon's limb 139° from the North point toward the East, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude 135° 53' East of Greenwich and in Latitude 3° 16' South.
Last contact of shadow with Moon's limb 104° from the North point, toward the West, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude 89° 32' East of Greenwich and in Latitude 3° 48' South.

III. September 8th, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible in the South Pacific Ocean, and therefore not visible here.
Eclipse begins Sept. 8th, 6 h. 34 m in Long. 171° 53' E. and in Lat. 16° 12' S.
Eclipse ends " " 7 h. 7 " " 84° 8' W. " " 50° 29' S.

IV. September 23rd, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, visible here, on the Atlantic Ocean, North and South America, and on the Pacific Ocean.
Moon enters penumbra Sept. 23rd, 11 h. 52m, Astronomical Time.
Middle of Eclipse " " 14, 20 " "
Moon leaves penumbra " " 17, 27 " "

First contact of shadow with Moon's limb 37° from the North point, toward the East; when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Long. 95° 45' West of Greenwich, and in Latitude 0° 13' South.
Last contact of shadow with the Moon's limb 73° from the North point toward the West; when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude 141° 37' West of Greenwich, and in Lat. 0° 18' North.
