British Casualties Ux To July 18 Are Told Of

STATEMENNT BY ASQUITH

Ten to Thirteen Thousand a Week in Army is Casualty Record of Fighting Since May 31-The Dead and the Wound-

London, July 27—The casualties in the British army and navy have reached a total of 330,995, according to a printed statement issued by Premier Asquith.

The naval casualties up to July 20, were 9,106 and the military casualties to

Premier Asquith announced in the. House of Commons on June 9, that the total British casualties, excluding the naval division, had been 258,069, up to May 81, in killed, wounded and missing. This shows in the army alone casualties of 68,820 between May 81 and July 18.

A statement made in London on June 15, giving the number of killed, wounded and missing in the British navy up to May 81 as 18,547 evidently was erroneous in the face of Premier Asquith's statement.

On April 11, H. J. Tennant, under secretary for war, announced the total of British losses since the beginning of the fighting as 189,347. If his figures were correct, the British have lost 182,542 men in the last fourteen weeks, an average of 18,000 a week.

Great Britain is the only one of the powers engaged in the war, which has announced, from time to time, her total casualties. Germany has issued at home full lists by name of all men killed, wounded or missing, but the government has given out no officia total. No comprehensive lists of casualties have been given out by France, Russia, Austria-Hungary or Italy.





From the information that can be obtained, the system employed for utilizing the unsupplied to the system of used ground around the city is similar to that which has been adopted in many American cities. The city is divided into nine sections or charitable districts, Montreal Girl Out of Work Attacked by each of which has a superintendent to carry on the work of their respective discarry on the work of their respective districts. Miss Howe, secretary of the Social Service Committee for the east end, gives an encouraging report of the work in hand at the Evangelia Settlement. The use of the land is given gratis, and many of the churches contribute the seeds for planting. The officials are careful to see that no undue advantage is taken of the opportunities offered, and permit each individual applicant to have the use of a specified piece of ground. Many prominent citizens are interesting themselves in the work, and promising results are looked for within a short time. Among others, the Rotary Club has gone into vacant lot gardening on large scale. F. E. Robins, chairman of the committee, stated recently that they had over 500,000 square feet already under cultivation. 'We prepare the land, which is loaned to us for cultivation,' said Mr. Robins.
