Declares Explosive Turns Leaves to Iron

Dr. Munroe Also Tells of Making Fabrics Permanent by a New Method.

Washington, June 28-Dr. Charles E Iunroe, chief chemist of the Bureau of

Munroe, chief chemist of the Bureau of Mines on explosives, has announced that experiments were being carried out which had as their object the making permanent, by the use of explosives, of perishable things such as leaves of trees, pieces of lace and various fabrics. The process is known as the "Munroe effect," and it is hoped to bring about developments which will be of benefit to the world industrially.

"We have not only turned leaves of trees and laces into iron," said Dr. Monroe, "but we could write words with fire—in other words, with detonated explosives—and turn them into iron, exactly as the aviator in the sky writes words with smoke.

"At the moment the explosive is detonated, this solid explosive is converted into gas, occupying the same space as the explosive, and it therefore has the same density. The molescules from which it is resolved travel at an enormous rate of speed, probably more than 20,000 feet per second. This gas is intensely hot. As the molecules strike each other, there is great turbulance.

"The gas assumes a vortex motion. Late Spring Chicks Mean Egg Scarcity

Poultry Expert Gives Warning of Low Production Next

"The delayed spring this year was responsible for many poor hatches and a large portion of late spring chicks, this will mean far fewer pullets than usual," says Prof. F. Elford at the Poultry Division of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. A serious situation has thus developed, according to Canada's chief poultry authority. At the present there are practically no eggs in cold storage, Usually eggs are coming forward in heavy shipments at this season and the storage houses become well filled. This year their floors are practically bare and supplies in sight are more limited than they have been for some considerable time.

Canadians are today consuming more eggs per capita than ever before, and so, with this combination of circumstances, the late-hatched chicks this year present a serious problem.

During the last ten years (1912-21) a considerable percentage of the lepers segregated at the Kalihi Hospital near Honolulu and on Molokai Island have been paroled; that is, they have been released as being "not a menace to the public health," but have been required to report for examination at certain intervals which vary with the individual case. Of those paroled about thirteen per cent. have relapsed and have returned to segregation; but about one-fourth of these were later paroled for the second time. In all, 242 lepers were paroled; thirty-one relapsed and seven of these were later paroled. Ten were completely released from parole.

The chance of arresting the disease decreased with the length of time that it had been allowed to go without treatment unless this period was seven years or more. Apparently patients who survive without treatment for seven years possess powers of resistance that slightly increase their chances for marked improvement under treatment.
