GREAT MILITARY CONSPIRACY IN BAVARIA IS UNCOVERED

New York, April 7.—Foreign exchange rates declined in initial transactions today in contrast to the strength shown when the present Franco-German situation began to develop.

THE BUFFALO SWITCHMEN ALSO GO ON STRIKE

Buffalo, N. Y., April 7.—Five hundred switchmen on the night shifts of all railroads entering Buffalo, with the exception of the Erie and Pennsylvania lines, went on a strike last night and this morning, taking an effective 100 per cent of the city.

F. J. Sheehan, president of the Switchmen's Union, said the strike was undertaken to secure any definite information as to why the men went out.

Toronto, April 7.—The unknown soldier who landed at St. John from the steamship Grampan, and who says he is Frank Hall, is believed by F. C. Gillen of this city, to be his brother.

INCREASE IN OCEAN FREIGHT RATES LARGE

London, April 7.—Increases in ocean freight rates from the United Kingdom to North America will take effect on April 19 and will range from 25 per cent on lower classes of goods to 80 per cent on more valuable articles, according to the London Times.

CONCILIATION BOARD ON MATTER OF WAGES FOR GRAND TRUNK MEN

Montreal, April 7.—Mr. Justice MacLennan will be president of a board of conciliation and investigation on next Monday to inquire into the merits of a demand made by the clerks and station men of the Grand Trunk for an increased scale of wages.

TRUE BILL AGAINST A C. P. R. BRICKEMAN

Ottawa, April 7.—A Carleton county grand jury yesterday returned a true bill against Thomas J. Curley, C. P. R. workman, who is arraigned to stand trial on two charges of criminal negligence arising out of the Corbett wreck of January 28.

RIOT IN SPAIN

Murcia, Spain, April 7.—Thirteen were injured in a riot which broke out during an Easter procession here.

JURY COMPLETE IN TEIPER TRIAL

Young Man Alleged to Be Slayer of His Mother and His Brother.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 7.—The jury in the second trial of John Edward Teiper, alleged murderer of his mother and brother, was completed this morning. The trial will be on an indictment relative to the killing of the mother, Mrs. Agnes Teiper, for which he was convicted in December, 1916, and sentenced to life imprisonment.

MILLION POUNDS FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS ASKED

London, April 7.—Earl Grey, Premier Lloyd George, Admiral Beatty, former Premier Asquith, Lord Robert Cecil and John R. Clynes present an appeal in the London Times for £1,000,000 sterling to keep fresh in the minds of the people of this country the spirit and ideals which underlie the covenant of the League of Nations.


The appeal points out that the League of Nations union already has done in its educational campaign. It says that a million pounds sounds like a large sum, but that if the British people do not support the League of Nations with all their might and resources "the league itself will assuredly wither and die and if the league should die, God help our children, for no human agency can save them from calamity to which those of the late war will appear as the merest trifle."

Ottawa, April 7.—Canada so far has paid \$64,943 as her share of the expenses of the League of Nations. This is for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1920.

DON'T LET THEM BLOCK PROGRESS

Section in Proposed Bill Which Can Hold Up Paving Indefinitely.

St. John wants paved streets, wants them and wants them right away. This is agreed upon by both those in favor and those against the abutters' tax scheme. And under the system of general assessment, all that is necessary is a unanimous vote of the common council and every street in the city could be paved permanently. But under the provision of the bill now before the legislature, here is what can happen—and what is likely to happen in many cases:

- (1) The council decides to pave a street—Section 7, sub-section 1.
- (2) The resolution is published in daily papers—Sub-section 2.
- (3) Sixty per cent. of the property owners, representing not less than one-half of the lineal frontage on the street present to the council a petition, praying that such paving be not done—Sub-section 3.
- (4) No further action will be taken, nor shall the council again initiate such work within two years after the date of the petition.

If St. John wants paving, the electors do not desire to have on the statute books an act which will permit the work being held up indefinitely. The matter is in the hands of the electors now, and it is up to them to nip in the bud this weed which will choke the growth of the city. Copies of the bill can be obtained from the common clerk at City Hall.

POLICE COURT.

Southend England, April 7—Eighty cases of drunkenness were dealt with at Southend last year, compared with half that number in 1918.

COMMON COUNCIL

At yesterday's meeting of the common council the question of the prohibition act was discussed and a letter from the Moncton council was received, asking the city to co-operate with them in asking for a proportion of the fines. This was agreed upon. Mayor Hayes, the city comptroller and city chamberlain were announced as a committee to deal with the sale of municipal bonds.

Daylight saving was brought up but no action taken.

It was decided to increase the remuneration for returning officers at civic elections to the following scale: Commissioners, \$7.50; scrutineers, \$8, and constables, \$4, with an allowance of \$6 to each booth for meals.

As it is likely that the federal government will abandon the free employment service unless the provincial government will bear one-half the cost, it was decided to memorialize the legislature to assist to that extent.

The report of the committee of the whole was adopted.

Commissioner J. B. Jones reported that more than 100,000 superficial feet of lumber, in the vicinity of Loch Lomond and Lake Latimer, belonging to the city, has been cut by private parties and that some of this was brought to the city and sold to city departments. Considerable cutting had been done on a portion of the Raymond property known as Donaldson Point. The amount voted last October for the investigation was \$800, but the work has cost more than \$2,000. Of this amount \$221 was for labor; board for the men, \$439.75; fee for G. G. Murdoch, deputy land surveyor, \$1,043.04. The report was referred to committee of the whole.



It will be interesting to learn how many voters will turn out at the primaries this year, when there are so many candidates in the field. It is remarked after one of the previous elections that the confidence of the friends of one candidate that he would be in the final caused them to refrain from voting at the primaries and he was defeated. This year's vote will be more divided, and it is expected that there will be a very close contest.

There is the usual crop of rumors regarding the influences behind this or that candidate, and the stories flow in the telling. They may all be disregarded by the intelligent voter, who will have no difficulty in selecting men in whom he has confidence, and who will also be wise enough to know that in an election campaign every candidate is more or less a target for those who very much desire the election of another man, and are not too scrupulous as to their methods of campaign.

In appealing for financial support in England for the League of Nations the leaders of all parties join in this striking assertion: "If the British people do not support the League of Nations with all their might and resources, it will assuredly founder and die; and if the League should die, God help our children, for no human agency can save them from calamity to which those of the late war will appear as the merest trifle." One would think such a very grave statement over the signature of men like Earl Grey, Lloyd George, Admiral Beatty, Mr. Asquith, Lord Robert Cecil and Mr. Clines would arouse some interest in the United States.

Canada's war expenditure this year is estimated at \$350,000,000. Last year it was \$446,519,489.48. It is coming down rather slowly. This year's total exceeds that of any of the real war years, the heavy bill for 1919 being due to demobilization. Apart from war expenditure the accounts for the year are expected to balance fairly well, but the financial statement reveals the grave necessity for keeping expenditures within reasonable limits. Interest charges alone this year will call for \$105,000,000.

The London Times recently endorsed the action of France in sending troops into the neutral zone, and expresses the view that if British assistance should be needed it will be given. The Times makes one remark which shows that it appreciates the situation in the United States when it says that country is reverting more and more to her old attitude of isolation, "until, at any rate, the elections are over."

NEWSPAPERS RAISE PRICE. Los Angeles, April 7.—Publishers here announced yesterday that the price of morning papers would be advanced on May 1 from three to five cents and two afternoon papers from two to three cents, while a third afternoon paper, now selling for one cent, would advance to two cents.

TOY BALLOON CAUSES THE DEATH OF A BOY. New York, April 7.—A two-cent toy balloon caused the death of five-year-old Pappy Doyl at his parents' home, 309 Broadway avenue. The child put the balloon in his mouth instead of it choked him.

LAZIEST MAN ADMITS IT. London, April 7.—A "very lazy man" admits as follows: "Absolute horror of work of any description; lives for sport; but uncomfortably hard up, owing to late laurelled war, seeks means to live comfortably and comparatively luxuriously with minimum exertion. Any suggestions?"

Graze for Champagne. Brussels, Belgium, April 7.—In moving that the tax on drinking bars and all night restaurants be made higher Deputy Mayor said that at the bars money flowed like water, at one bar \$1,000 being spent for champagne in a night.

To End Picketing. Washington, April 7.—The federal government moved yesterday to put an end to picketing of British embassy by women sympathizers with Irish rebellion. Two women were arrested but were later released.

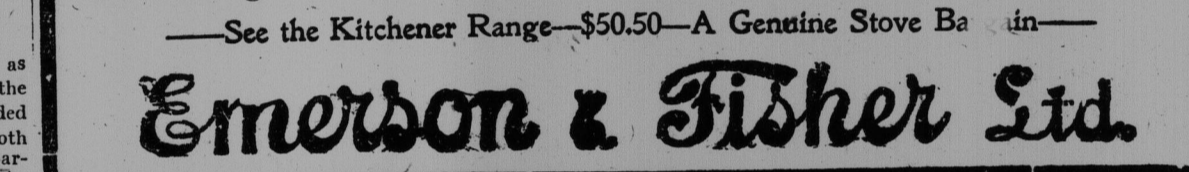

LAST OF JESSE

JAMES BAND DEAD

Memphis, Tenn., April 7.—Kit Dalton, the last of the notorious Jess James band and the Quantrell guerrillas, will no longer be seen in the streets of Memphis clad in the uniform of a Confederate officer. He died this week, with his boots off, penniless and at the age of seventy-eight, in a boarding house here. Broken health accomplished what federal officers were unable to do during his seventeen years of outlawry.

The story of Dalton's picturesque life is more thrilling than any work of fiction depicting bold robberies. He started his role as bandit under the leadership of the James boys, taking part in the hold-up of thirty-six trains, eight stage coaches and the robbery of twenty-two banks. He plied the same means to a livelihood with the Quantrell guerrillas and the Boss gang of Texas.

Dalton forsook banditry to become a gambler in Memphis when the federal government granted amnesty to all Civil War raiders. Later he reformed and became an evangelist.

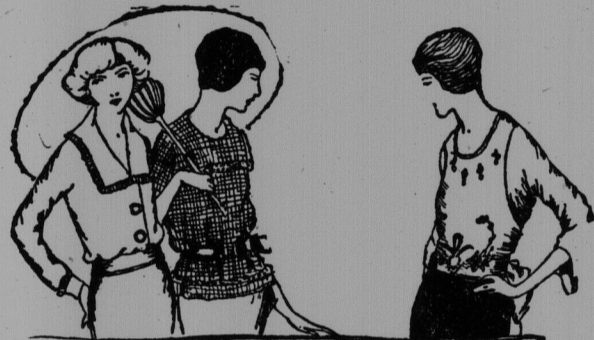

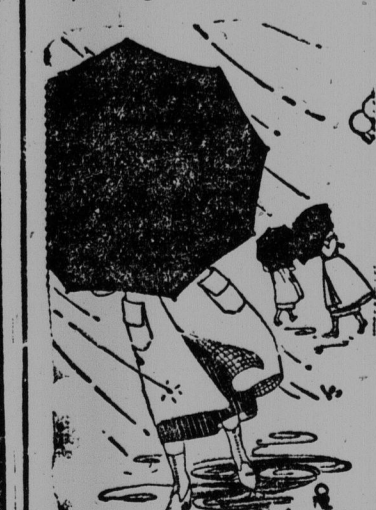

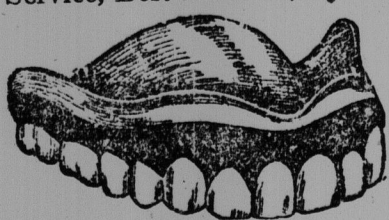

THE PAVING QUESTION

To the Editor of the Times:
Sir.—Being a property owner in City road, and one that is opposed to the abutters' tax, I wish to show to the citizens who will have to pay the extra tax and will use my own property to prove my statement.

I have a house with sixty-four feet frontage on City road. I have three tenants, each paying \$15 per month. This property has paid me five per cent. for twelve years. Using the contractor's figures that were tendered for this work and my experience as a builder, it would cost, with interest, \$1,500 per foot per year.

Mr. Agar told one of the abutters on Union street when it was paved that the total bill for his frontage would be approximately \$10, but when he got his bill it was \$22.70.

If this unjust tax becomes law, I will have to raise each of my tenants \$30 per year. Boosters say the city will pay the other third. Is my property not part of the city?

You compare Montreal with St. John. The truth of the matter is that abutters in Montreal have not paid for any pavement yet. It has only been suggested, and in Halifax the street railway pays for the car tracks. The actual cost for a double track, seventeen feet wide, with one foot for foundation with granite blocks, would be \$85,000 per mile, so the abutters' charge is very light. In St. John the street railway only pays \$5,000 per mile.

If this paving bill becomes law, abutters on Brussels street, March road, Haymarket square and Douglas avenue will all have to raise the rents of tenants to meet the extra cost and very likely the landlords on the other streets will take advantage of this on account of scarcity of housing and raise their rents

accordingly and the poor tenant will have to bear the full burden, and property owners on streets already paved will go scott free, and not the man on the side streets as represented. Perhaps this is what boosters call "passing the buck."

The tenant or poor taxpayer would only have to pay an increased tax of about fifty cents per year, if done by general assessment.

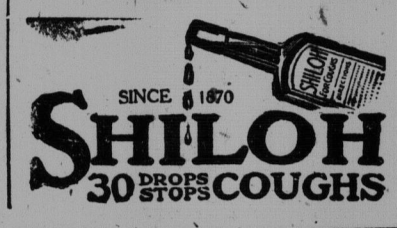
Now, Mr. Booster, would it not be a

more commendable Easter spirit for the business men and members of the Noble 17 to say we are with the poor tenant and will bear some of his burden.

This is only the entering wedge of the abutters' tax and other streets will follow. Yours may be the next.

In conclusion I may say that six or seven miles of principal streets have already been paved by general assessment and I don't think it is fair to ask property owners on those different streets to bear the burden, especially when those streets are trunk lines and used chiefly by the general public.

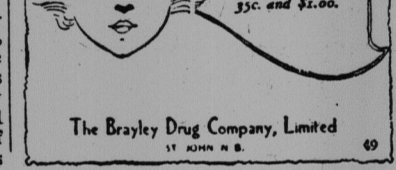

INCORPORATE WESTFIELD CLUB

Prominent City Men Organize Country Club for Social and Athletic Purposes.

Today's Royal Gazette contains notice of letters patent incorporating David W. Ledingham, steamship manager; Horace Clyde Groat, general superintendent; C. F. H. Frank M. Robertson, clerk; Geo. L. Warwick, merchant; Frederick Gilmore Spencer, theatre owner; William E. Goring, luncheon merchant; and H. E. Rankine of St. John as The Westfield Country Club. The purpose is to establish and conduct a club for social and athletic purposes and to develop field and water sports; to take an active interest in the welfare of the community and to do any and such other things as are incidental or conducive to the objects of the organization. The operations to be carried on in this province and elsewhere and the company is to have power to acquire property valued at \$50,000. The club is to have no capital stock or issue any share certificates. The head office is to be at Westfield.

THE GREAT MARSH

Legislation at Fredericton is Being Advocated by Councillor Donovan.

Legislation in the interests of the great marsh to the east of St. John is being advocated by Councillor Jeremiah Donovan, as a member of the Great Marsh Commission. Owing to constant encroachments on the banks of the Marsh Creek, the "pondage" or area capable of holding the excess water after heavy rainfalls or during the freshet season, has been considerably reduced. The result of this has been shown on more than one occasion this spring when floods in the Marsh district have proved more serious than in many years. It is suggested that the commission be given additional powers to deal with encroachments and also that this body should exercise its right to assess property owners in the district affected to raise money to clear the Marsh Creek and make other improvements necessary to preserve and improve the drainage of that large area.

DE MONTS CHAPTER

The monthly meeting of DeMonts chapter, I. O. E., was held this morning in the provincial government rooms with the regent, Mrs. W. E. Foster, presiding. Routine business in connection with the provincial annual meeting was discussed. The sum of \$10 was voted for assistance to a soldier's wife; \$2.50 towards the purchase of a typewriter; and \$10 for school prizes. Reports of the convenors of a bridge to be held soon reported progress. It was decided to take up the work of sewing for the West Side orphanage. A resolution of congratulation to A. C. Skelton on his recent honor received from the Boy Scouts was passed unanimously. Mrs. A. W. Adams was elected delegate to the national annual convention at Calgary.

TELLS OF STABBING AFFRAY IN BARN

Wm. J. Coholan From Hospital to Witness Stand

Says John Cullinan Struck Him in Face When Questioned About Parcel and That Attack by Wm. McNulty Followed.

A case in which William McNulty is charged with cutting and stabbing William J. Coholan with intent to do bodily injury, was taken up in the police court this morning. John Cullinan, charged with assaulting the complainant, was not able to appear in court this morning and the case was proceeded with against McNulty. Coholan was allowed to leave the hospital to give evidence. He said that while he was on his way home on Saturday night in Rockland road, he saw a light in the barn owned by Cullinan and he went in and found Cullinan there; that soon afterwards the accused handed Cullinan a parcel; that Cullinan then went to another part of the barn and came back to the complainant with something in his hand which the witness said looked like a bottle, but on being asked what he had behind his back he said, "None of your business," and struck the witness in the face.

The witness said he started to go out the door when he was attacked by the accused, who made a lunge at him, striking him in the face; that the same time the witness caught his hand and found it contained a knife. He said he then called to Cullinan to take the man away, that he was crazy. Again the complainant told of making an attempt to go out the door, but said he was blocked by the accused and that, although he succeeded in tripping him, the accused grabbed him by the coat, cutting him around the legs with the knife. After considerable scuffling he said he managed to get away and go to his home, and on getting there found that he was bleeding about the breast from a wound received during the scuffle. He said he was taken to the hospital from the loss of blood and it was necessary to remove him to the hospital. His clothing, procured in court, was marked with blood.

On cross-examination by W. M. Ryan, counsel for the defence, the witness said that he was taking a short cut to his home when he noticed the light in the barn, thinking that the night he had been left burning by mistake, went over to put it out, as he was well acquainted with the owner. The case was postponed for another hearing and the complainant was taken back to the hospital. A case against Kenneth Morris and Cornelius Flynn, charged with stealing oats from the barn of G. Selig, was taken up and the accused pleaded guilty and were reprimanded. The magistrate said he would likely send them up for trial, but would recommend that Flynn be allowed to go on suspended sentence.

AT INDIANTOWN

River Steamers Are Getting Ready—One Added to the Fleet This Year.

Unless the ice in the St. John river and tributaries runs out within the next few days navigation will not be any earlier this year than it was in 1919. The continued cold weather has retarded the usual spring freshet and although the water is now almost level with the top of the public wharf, this time last year it was much higher. There is still a large amount of snow in the woods and a warm spell would bring the water up much higher.

The river steamers are all receiving finishing touches to their machinery and hulls, and are expected to be ready to start up river as soon as the ice runs out. There will be comparatively little change in the run of the steamers from last season; all are reported to be going on the same routes. There is one small steamer to be added to the fleet this year, but enquiries failed to elicit any information as to where the steamer would run. This vessel is owned by Captain Taylor and was formerly "The Dream." One rumor has it that she will run two trips daily to Brown's Flat to take care of tourist and passenger travel, while another is that she will be placed on the route between Gagetown and Fredericton. Navigation on the river practically opened last year on April 11, when A. W. Adams was elected delegate to tug went up to Fredericton. The first passenger boat to go up river was the Oncon, which left on April 15.

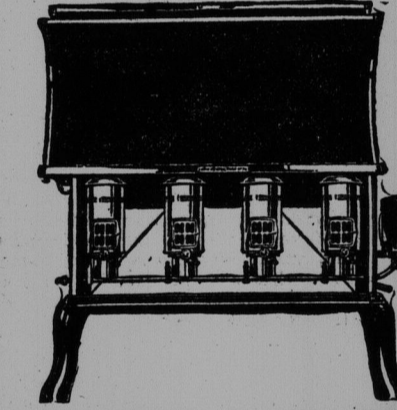

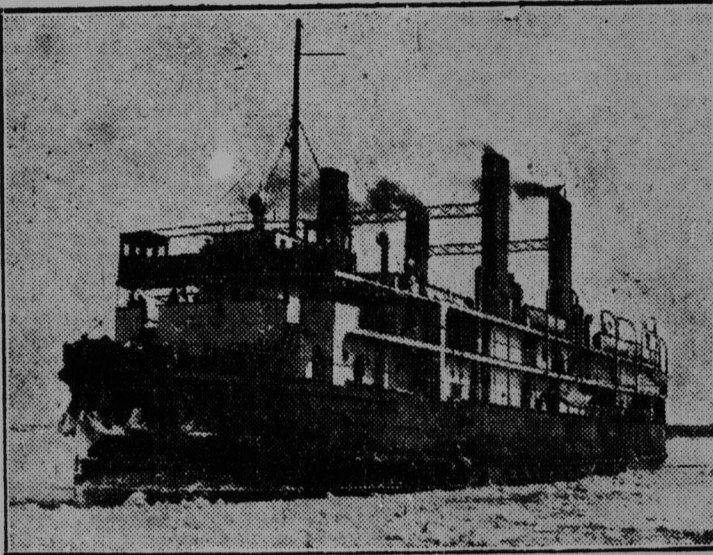
Steamship in Trouble.

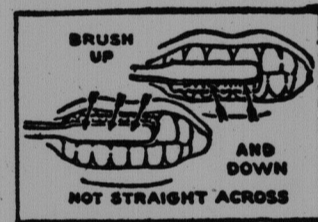

London, March 28.—(A. P. Correspondence)—The British government is taking steps to restrict the operations in England of spies from foreign countries. FINE RECORD OF AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale in Able Speech Reviews Progress Made.

Fredericton, April 6.—By the time Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture, had concluded his address in the budget debate today, even a partisan critic could continue to place no faith in the serious, although vague charge of incompetency and inefficiency which had been made by the opposition leader. The minister showed the remarkable gains which had been achieved under his administration. Production had been encouraged and increased, the quality of many agricultural products had been elevated to a much higher standard than had obtained in former years, the work of the department had been broadened and its aid brought closer to the individual farmer. He showed that since the change in government the results secured through the efforts of the department had proved of increasing value in each successive year. He could not understand why the opposition leader, who had preceded him as minister of agriculture, would invite comparisons when the latter's chief achievement had been the maladministration of the potato potato affair.

The debate was resumed in the afternoon by A. A. Dysart, of Kent, who made an excellent speech and answered some of the opposition criticisms, a rather light task, as there were few to be answered. He advocated a sliding scale of stumpage rates, continued road expenditure on a scale that would not allow Nova Scotia with a \$17,000,000 programme to outstrip this province, a classification of oyster beds and closer co-operation between the maritime provinces in dealing with federal matters.

In a brief speech Dr. Campbell, of St. John, suggested an annual report on expenditures held by the province, closer adherence to the annual estimates, a reduction in probate stamp fees, encouragement to induce more men to enter the teaching profession and religious education in the public schools.

Mr. Hunter, of York, who followed Mr. Tweeddale, argued for higher stumpage rates, criticized certain road expenditures and made an appeal for returned soldiers.

With that mixture of horse sense and ready wit which always characterizes his remarks, Dr. McGrath, of Northumberland, held the close attention of the house at an hour when the members might be inclined to nod, and in a practical manner dealt with some of the issues before the members, answered some of the opposition criticisms and made several valuable suggestions in connection with legislation before the house.

A new plan for fixing stumpage rates was suggested by R. W. Grimmer, of Charlotte. His idea was based on a minimum rate of one dollar per acre to which would be added each year an amount to make the total equal to the average current rate in the various sections of the province. By this method, he said, the operators would be saved from loss in unfavorable years and would share their profits in the years when conditions were more favorable. He also suggested an increase in the motor vehicle tax but asked if it could not be arranged on a mileage basis so that those who used the roads the most would pay the most. In supporting the appeal of St. John for the co-operation of the province in promoting the interests of the port, Mr. Grimmer also asked for similar support for the development of the St. Croix harbor.

Provision was made for the introduction of a bill from the New Brunswick branch of the International order of King's Sons and Daughters regarding a trust, and of a bill incorporating the Fraser Paper Co., Ltd.

GENERAL CURRIE'S NEW YORK SPEECH

New York, April 7.—The speech delivered by General Sir Arthur Currie, commander of the Canadian corps on the western front, and now inspector-general of the Canadian military forces, appears to have left a deep impression here.

General Currie's recital of the deeds of Canada's fighting men was heard by the largest gathering of members of the Canadian Club and their friends that has assembled to hear any speaker during the last year. The big ball-room of the Biltmore Hotel was crowded. Many Americans were present as guests of members of the club.

"I never before realized the extent of Canada's sacrifice in the cause of humanity," said one American guest afterwards. "The forceful way in which General Currie told of the wonderful work of the Canadian corps made a deep impression upon me."

General Currie's speech really was a simple, straightforward tribute to the Canadian soldier. He told of the men in the ranks, of their suffering and their heroic qualities of self-sacrifice and service. He put forward no claims for the higher officers, said little or nothing of himself or of the others who had directed the battles.

The Canadian "Tommy" was the subject of his address, and he kept his audience keyed to a high pitch of interest as he described the achievements of the men in the ranks. He told story after story of incidents which had come under his personal observation, little tales of heroism unsung, and each was greeted with a round of applause that was a tribute to the men who had upheld the honor of the dominion.

There is a general feeling among Canadians here that General Currie's visit has helped to create a better understanding of Canada, and a keener appreciation of the great war record of the dominion on the part of hundreds of citizens of New York.

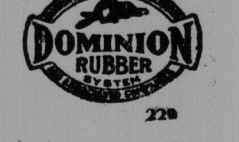

WHERE WILL MONEY COME FROM?

If money is to be found for this very modest programme under general assessment only a few years will elapse before the city will weary of the burden of extra taxation and the balance of the streets that are unpaved will have to stand for years and years untouched.

THE BETTER WAY

Would it not be better to START RIGHT at the beginning and ask the abutters to pay a third of the cost? The city would then have more money at its disposal, the city's credit would be stronger, and instead of two miles per year double or treble that mileage could be paved. The city would reach its objective in half or quarter of the time, and the additional taxation would not be appreciably felt.

DISAPPOINTMENT AHEAD

It was a dry goods store. People who are arguing in favor of street paving under general assessment and expect to get results within the next twenty years have similar disappointing experiences awaiting them.

THE NEW ACT TO THE RESCUE

Under the proposed act the question of whether any particular street should be paved or not rests very largely in the hands of the abutting property owners. Half the frontage may petition for pavement. Then it's up to the Council.

THIS LETS DOUGLAS AVE. DOWN EASY

One of the clauses in the new paving act provides that a residential street, carrying a heavy through traffic, shall only be required to pay for the kind of paving that would be necessary if this heavy traffic wasn't there. This cuts Douglas Avenue rate down. Property owners who have been losing sleep over what they might have to pay can now return to their slumbers.

WANT QUICK ACTION

"Quick, a quarter's worth of carbolic acid!" blurted out an excited chap. "This is a hardware store, not a drug store," explained the quick-witted sales clerk, "but we have a fine line of ropes, revolvers and razors."

Either method would provide for a quick get-away for an individual, but civic suicide could be obtained quite as rapidly under the general assessment plan that some people are proposing for St. John.

HERE'S AN EXAMPLE

"The reason I bought a residence on Germain Street when I came to St. John two years ago was because a friend of mine told me it was the only residential street in the city that had a really good pavement," remarked a business man to The Booster.

Germain Street was paved under the abutters' plan. The above incident shows the possibilities in the line of residential development if all our residential districts were similar paved.

The City Engineer, in his 1918 report says: "It might be well to note that a paving programme was first started in the year 1910 and in nine years eight miles of pavements have been laid—a little less than an average of one mile per year, whereas there are 45 miles of used streets in the city. 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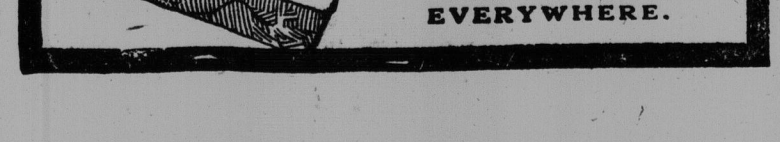

THE FEDERAL ESTIMATES FOR FISCAL YEAR

Ottawa, April 6—Canada's population is estimated for the fiscal year of 1920 at 9,000,000, her total revenue at \$225,000,000, and her total expenditure at \$275,125,000. As \$380,000,000 of the latter amount is shown as destined for "war" expenditures, it would seem that the finance minister hopes to make the revenues and expenditures other than war balance, as Sir Henry Drayton indicated in the house of commons that he did not intend to have a victory loan campaign this fall if it could possibly be avoided. It is supposed that the \$380,000,000 war expenditures referred to are already looked after by the amounts outstanding on January 1, from the Victory loan of last autumn. This is considered a very large war expenditure for a year which is fourteen months removed from the armistice day, and it is only \$96,000,000 less than 1919, the heaviest war expenditure year when the army was demobilized and all those demobilized given varying sums for de-

mobilization bonuses. It is the second heaviest "war expenditure" year since the war began, the others being as follows: 1915, \$60,750,476; 1916, \$166,000,000; 1917, \$306,000,000; 1918, \$348,000,000, and 1919, \$446,000,000. For 1920 it is proposed to extend \$270,000,000 chargeable to consolidated fund and \$55,000,000 to capital, the largest yet. The revenue per head of population has grown from \$7.38 in 1911, to \$26.11 in 1920, and the total expenditure from \$8.44 to \$75.01 in the same period although the consolidated fund expenditure has grown only from \$7.50 to \$28.

BEATING MOTHER-IN-LAW NO GROUNDS FOR DIVORCE New York, April 7.—"Beating up one's mother-in-law is no ground for separation," said Justice Kapper in the Brooklyn Supreme Court in considering the case of Mrs. Rose Horowitz against her husband, Abraham. The wife charged that her husband had called her mother vile names and that a fight resulted. The couple are still living together, and Justice Kapper decided that a new suit would have to be brought if they still wish a separation.

L. Woodworth and A. M. Gregg gave an explanation of the boys' work. The ladies' auxiliary served refreshments. The affair was greatly enjoyed.

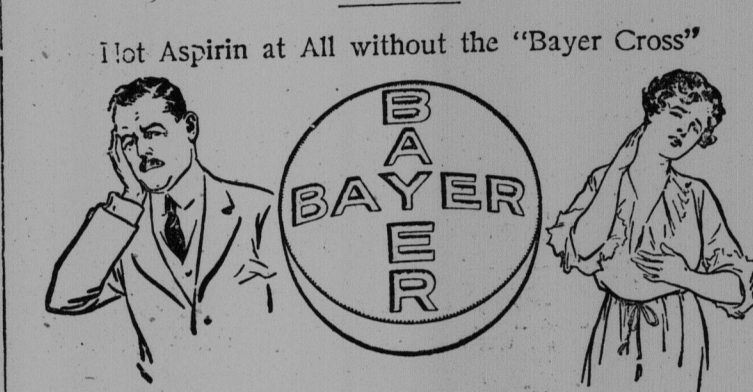

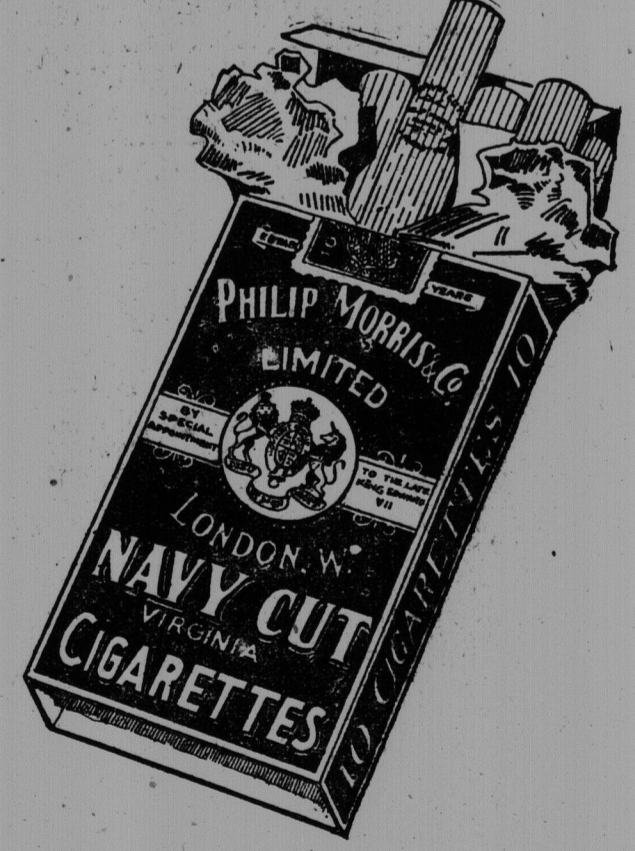

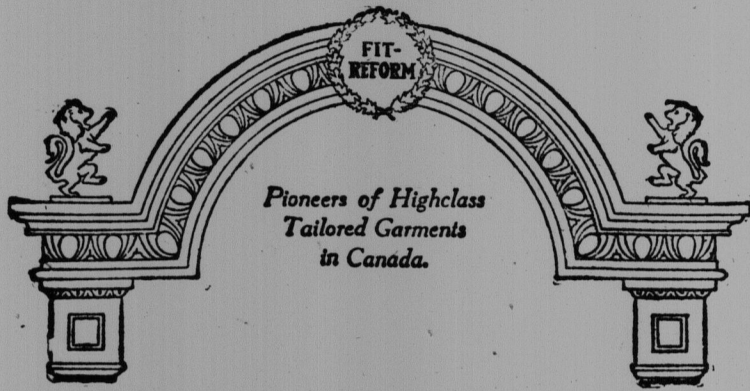

New Orleans April 6.—John M. Abrams, local promoter, today telegraphed to George Descamps of Chicago, 600 for George Carpenter to meet Bill Brennan here for a fifteen round heavy-weight bout. Five thousand dollars was guaranteed for a six round match.

Boston Championships.

Boston, April 7.—A group of fighting champions, regarding excellent possibilities for selection as representatives of the United States at the Olympic games, were developed at the national amateur boxing title tournament which closed here last night. Six new champions were added to the 1920 list, while two of last year's winners, who tried to retain their laurels, were beaten back.

Tommy Murphy of Kansas City returned to the title list on which he appeared three years ago, and Samuel Lagonia of New York repeated his success of last year.

Principal interest in the closing bouts centered in the gritty attempt of Edward Eagan, Yale's boxing leader, to retain the heavyweight title which he won last year and gain also the 175 pounds crown. He went down to defeat in two bouts, each a semi-final event that gave the best exhibition of fighting since the night Burke Eagan's conqueror in the 175 pounds class, lost a chance for the double honors which the Yale man sought when he broke his right hand in defeating Rudolph Peterson of San Francisco for the title in that class and was forced to default in the heavy division.

The final bouts without exception were hard and close. That in the 135 pound class went to Tommy Murphy of Kansas City, retaining his title through a foul by B. Ponteau of New York, a negro.

McDonald in Halifax.

Halifax Recorder: Roddie McDonald has arrived in town from Glace Bay, having practically recovered from his recent severe cold, with which he was in hospital. He says there is quite a delegation coming from Cape Breton for Thursday's bout.

Great Interest in Bout.

Halifax Recorder: There is a lot of interest in Thursday evening's boxing bout between Mike McTague and Eugene Brousseau. The former looks in splendid condition and is working out in a local gymnasium with Johnny McIntyre and other boxers. McTague, who is very quiet and unassuming, has little to say about the bout. When told that "I will do my best, and no man can do more."

He said Battling Ortega failed to meet him at California, but he met two local boxers, one of whom knocked out in fifty seconds, and the other, who had some time previously met Sailor Petkey, he put out in four rounds. He said that his right arm which troubled him somewhat when last here, was again in good shape.

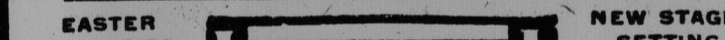

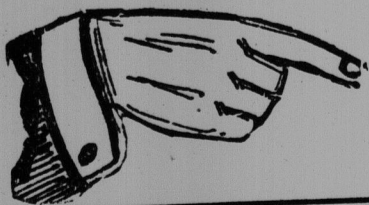
