

BESTS WAR OFFICE

In Line of Gun Fire at Military

and Gets Gun-Proof Home

London, June 24—A woman farmer on Dartmoor has been too much for the War Office. The widow, whose name is Endicott, is a tenant on Ockment farm, which is adjacent to the artillery camp on the hill overlooking Okehampton, where the troops had built a dummy village for the purpose of knocking it down by howitzers. The widow had resided at Dartmoor for years. The government tried to persuade her to move to another dwelling during the gun practice. Mrs. Endicott declined to budge. The authorities yielded and provided her with a bomb-proof structure in which she and her two children can take refuge when the guns are being fired in her direction. It is constructed of rocks and plaster and lined with sheet iron. Mrs. Endicott's laborers are performing heir usual work, each resplendent in a ed jacket so that he can be easily seen by the troops as they climb the ridges lriving the ponies and cattle to grazing joints that are out of harm's way.

REMARKABLE UPWARD

TREND OF FOOD PRICES

In Fifteen Years Buying Power of Shilling Has Fallen Two And

London, June 24—An abstract of the labor statistics of the United Kingdom just issued shows that 109 3-10 pence was needed in 1911 to buy the same quantity of necessaries of life that were buyable for 100 pence in 1900, or 88 2-10 pence in 1896. Thus, in fifteen years, the cost of living has advanced 25 per cent. equivalent to a deduction of 2 1-2 pence from every shilling of wages paid.

The increase in the price of food stuffs is extraordinary, as 113 4-10 pence were needed in 1911 to buy the same quantity of corn that was bought in 1894 for 80 3-10 pence. Potatoes, rice, beef and mutton are not seriously higher, but bacon and eggs have soared. Bacon was lowest in 1896; when 82 7-10 pence would buy what cost 142 3-10 pence in 1911.

The latest official figures are for 1911, but statisticians agree that the increase is continuing and that the worker is worse off today than he was last year.


