

County Solid for Popular Candidate and Reciprocity—A Tremendous Crowd at Greatest Political Demonstration Ever Held There—Ovation for Hon. Mr. Pugsley

The convention in the afternoon was held in the St. Stephen Curling Ring and every seat was taken in the large hall. When the band arrived, on motion of John W. Scovil, who called the meeting to order, Senator Gillmor was chosen chairman and he ascended the platform amid the cheers of the gathering.

The senator made a fighting speech, in which he said the large attendance in the busiest season of the year could only be accounted for by the fact that there was something more at stake than the mere

St. Stephen, N. B., Aug. 14—Prosperous Charlotte county progressed another step today by coming out strongly in favor of Laurier and large markets in the greatest political demonstration ever held in the county.

In open convention in the St. Stephen curling rink this afternoon 300 Liberal delegates, from every parish in the county, unanimously nominated William F. Todd, member for Charlotte since 1908, to again contest the county in the government's interest.





Geneva, Aug 15—An exciting chase after a murderer, across a spur of the Mont Blanc range, took place the other day, and the fugitive was finally arrested and handcuffed at a height of 7,700 feet by gendarmes and Alpinists.
