For persons between 15 and 24 years of age home is a fairly safe place, but 10 out of every 100,000 children less than 15 years old died in domestic accidents. Among persons more than 55 the rate is 19 per 100,000, and for those more than 65 the rate is 62.

Burns, falls and inhaling poisonous gases are the chief causes of fatal accidents in homes. Twelve per cent. of all firearm accidents occur in homes, and other deaths are blamed on amateur electricians, worn-out insulation on wires and neglected cuts and bruises.

JAPAN FAVORS New Superintendent WORLD PEACE

HARRY W. WOODS

Dr. Crashaw of Colgate Says He Found Masses Opposed to War.

Hamilton, N. Y., March 6.—The Japanese favor peace and international friendship, according to Dean William H. Crawshaw of Colgate, who addressed a large audience in the Colgate Memorial Chapel on the subject of the "International Mind of Japan." Dr. Crawshaw has just returned from the Orient, and speaks from his own observations.

Crawshaw has just returned from the Orient, and speaks from his own observations.

"Although there is a distant military element in Japan," he said, "the great masses of the people want peace. Students hold peace meetings, and professors have been forced to resign from the Faculty because they held militaristic views. The people are actually too poor to fight, anyway."

Regarding relations with America, Dr. Crawshaw said:

"The Japanese are distinctly friendly toward Americans, and there is an always present desire to manifest that friendliness. They are intensely patriotic and ambitious, but are unquestionably an enlight of race. For this reason they are too wise to seek war."

"The Japanese do not want the Philippines, and for a very definite reason. Past experience has taught them that they are woefully unsuccessful conolizers of new lands.

"In regard to the California question, all they ask is fair play for the Japanese that are here. There is no new demand for immigration to this country. The yellow peril is a myth, with only 115,000 Japanese in this country."



# MURDER CHARGE charge of murdering the woman, GREEN TEA POPULAR AGAIN

Ginghams Confession is Not Allowed in

for the accused, and the charge of Chief Justice McKeown the jury retired at 4.55 o'clock yesterday afternoon and returned at 5.20 o'clock. There was a large number of people in the court room, among whom were several women.

Dr. Powell moved for the discharge of Godwin and this was granted by Chief Justice McKeown. Before dismissing the jury and adjourning the court until this morning at 10.30 o'clock, the Chief Justice remarked, "I heartily concur in the verdict."

The contention of Dr. Powell, that any statement given by the accused to the officers was not admissible as evidence, as the accused had not been warned by the officers, that anything he might say would be used against him at his trial, was sustained by the Chief Justice, who also stated that he would not admit as evidence any questions that had been put to the accused by the father.

These alleged statements were the chief grounds on which the crown officers were basing their case, and when these were not allowed, there appeared to be nothing left on which the officers could expect a conviction.

Chief Justice McKeown said that in view of the importance of the trial he had not restrained the time that counsel had taken in their arguments. It was not his duty or idea to justify the law, but to state what the law was. The burden was on the Crown. Volunteered evidence must be given without fear or prejudice on the part of the accused.

There were several factors entering

of the accused.

There were several factors entering into mind whether the statements were made voluntarily or in response to inquiries, whether they were voluntarily falling from his lips with nothing said to him to make the remarks or whether made in answer to questions. Evidence Rejected.

Other questions were, where were those statements made, were the people in a place where the accused would feel at ease, or was it in the presence of persons before whom he could open his mind clearly, how were they made, was a caution given? There was the age of an accused person, the mental characteristics of the accused to be considered. Continuing the Chief Justice said that he had watched the accused closely. He had given slight attention to the importance of the charge. "All these things convince me that this evidence given by the Crown is inadmissible." The statements of the accused and any actions of his while in custody were excluded, he ruled.

At the conclusion of the trial a prominent barrister said that Godwin could not be arrested and tried again for the murder of Mrs. Clara Whiteside no mater what ever evidence was produced, and Godwin, who was said to be mentally deficient, could not be con-

fined in any institution unless at the request of his family.

Sergeant Detective John Power said last night that so far as the Godwin case was concerned the Crown had assembled its evidence and that as it had been thrown out and that they had no other person in mind whom they could arrest and place on trial on the charge of murdering the woman.



MIRAMICHI LUMBER.

Eighty-five million feet of lumber will come down to the Miramichi river booms for rafting this year, according to the official estimates, says the Gleaner. Lumbermen on the Miramichi are preparing for an early break-up, and as a result of last year's experiences, when large quantities of lumber were carried out with the ice, all logs on the streams are in position where they cannot be disturbed by an early break-up. It is expected that about fifty million feet of logs will come down the South West Miramichi this year, and about thirty-five million feet down the North West Miramichi River.


McTIGUE STARTS TRAINING Prepares for Bout With Stribling in Camp at Ballston Spa.
