FIRST EDITION. GOSSIP FROM LONDON.

COCKETS ALL AGO OVER THE PRINCE OF WALES'S HEAVY DEBT.

Liberals Flushing up Heart—Money For Evicted Irish Tenants Only to be Used by Tories.

LONDON, May 8.—By winning the Stowmarket and Harborough elections, the Liberals have more than neutralized the Tory success at the two preceding elections. The Tories have no reason to be over-optimistic in their belief that the Liberal disorganization, the consequent Liberal disorganization, and the big bribe of free education which the Tories have offered to the Democracy, have all failed to stem the flowing tide of the Liberal success. It seemed probable last week that the Liberals would abandon Home Rule, but these elections have fought chiefly on Gladstone's Irish policy, with the result that the Liberals have won two out of the four vacant Tory seats contested. These Home Rule victories, coming at this juncture have been most effective in convincing the Tories of the failure of Balfour's policy than all their previous electoral losses. Negotiations have been proceeding during the past week between Mr. Thomas Sturton and Mr. James Williamson, M.P. for Lancaster and a millionaire manufacturer, for a grant of \$100,000 for the Irish evicted tenants. Mr. Williamson is an ardent Liberal and has prepared to give this sum to meet the present necessities of the evicted tenants, but he has been unable to obtain a reconciliation of the two sections of the Irish party. However, the McCartneys have made no overtures for settlement to the Parliament, and they have endeavored to induce Mr. Williamson to give them the money for the tenants; but his object being more political than benevolent, he so far declines to grant any money otherwise than on his own conditions.

Society has been convulsed this week by the statement of the Prince of Wales that he has been gradually overhauling his debts in a misleading manner. The correct figure of his liabilities is about \$1,500,000, of which three-fourths are due to heavy play and betting transactions. During the past seven months the Prince's liabilities have increased by some \$2,000,000, and he has had to sell some of his best property to meet his obligations. He met with some big losses on the stock and the table last autumn. At that time his friendship with Baron Hirsch had raised the resentment of the English plutocrats. It is well known that the Prince's intimacy with the moneyed "big wig," has not on his side been wholly disinterested. Several times during the last few years they have made up a purse for him which has exceeded him from financial gain.

When he advanced Baron Hirsch to the position of first finance minister from the other sources were suddenly withdrawn, and though Baron Hirsch had been ready to pay for his position, even he could not be expected to make up for the closing of all the other sources of pecuniary aid. It was that the Prince plunged more heavily in the hope of recovering himself, but he did not succeed in his policy because the disbursements now made have been laid off by various devices for some time. The Prince has applied to the Queen, and the publication of the letters which he has written to her in a last effort to force the Queen to aid him. It is believed that the Queen will come to his assistance, for she is also a large money-bag, and has pride in her power.
