## A Criminal Maniac

New York, Sept. 16.—Hans Schmidt, priest, who confessed that he slew Anna A. Miller, is in the observation ward of the Tombs Prison under the eye of Dr. M. G. Guite, the prison physician. Warden Fallon, of the Tombs, declares that the man is insane and one of the most dangerous men ever confined in prison. From far off Mainz, Germany, there came yesterday to Mgr. Mooney, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of New York, a cablegram from the Secretary to the Bishop, who said Schmidt had been declared insane here and suspended by the Bishop. The message read: "Schmidt" was born in Aschaffenburg, and was a priest of the Diocese of Mainz. He ran away from Mainz because of attempted frauds. He was arrested by the police, declared insane by the court and discharged, and was suspended by the Bishop of Mainz for his acts and for presenting falsified documents regarding the studies he pretended to have made. He then left the diocese.

### Before Judge Oke

Hunt, on behalf of the defendant, suggested that a conference take place between the parties, which was agreed to. The matter in dispute was then settled satisfactorily between both parties.

### Fish Prices

A considerable quantity of new fish came in during the week, the most of it having been bought in the outports by agents of city firms. The price is as last week, \$6.00 to \$6.20 in the outports, and \$6.25 in St. John's. Labrador off the coast is quoted at \$4.30; a better dried article has sold in St. John's at \$4.50 to \$4.60. Common codoil is still quoted at \$80.00 per ton, and finds ready sale. Lobsters have taken another leap this week. Some sales have been made at \$22 per case, and we hear of parcels of prime goods going at \$22.50. As the goods are now nearly all in exporting hands, this will probably be the highest figure for the season. — Trade Review.



### C. H. E. Exams

The results of the examinations held by the C. H. E. last June have recently been placed before us, but as to whether we are to judge the good being done by that body by the results of these examinations, many and divers will be the opinions.

On the whole we find a considerable falling off in the number of passes as compared with those of recent years. This may, no doubt, be attributed to several causes: The new Syllabus of 1912, with the raising of the pass mark from 30 per cent. to 40 per cent., while the papers, as a whole, in the June examinations of the different grades (Primary excepted) were of a more difficult standard than usually.

To quote from the Examiners report, we find that "many commendable papers were sent in." Still there must be some defective teaching or lack of genius when we read that Henry VII was called the "Solomon" of English History because he had so many wives; "set" for "sit" (this occurring in many papers); "we got to" instead of "we ought to," etc. etc. Yet we think it is most unfair to judge the work done by the teachers in our schools throughout the Island simply by the results of the C.H.E. examinations. Many of them do most admirable work, especially in sending up candidates for the council's exams, they have to teach all other standards, including even the A.B.C.'s. It is practically impossible for such teachers to do efficient work. Something or someone must be neglected, and in the majority of cases it is the children of the lower standards and those who do not sit for examinations who are so treated and consequently suffer.

Still, there is room for improvement in many ways, and we would earnestly suggest that the system of teaching throughout be made more practical than it is at present and that "cramming" be done away with.

### Message from the Ill-Fated Titanic

Editor Evening Telegram.

### The Home Rule Question

London, Sept. 15.—The presence of the two most prominent Conservatives of the two Houses of Parliament at Balmoral as the King's guests, Andrew B. Law, who was titular leader of the Opposition, and Lord Curzon Kedleston, who recently declared in the House of Lords that the Irish question would never be settled except by the consent of both parties, is keeping the discussion of the possibilities of an attempt at compromise at fever heat. Before going to Balmoral Law had a conference with Lord Lansdowne and Balfour, former leaders of the opposition. It is therefore evident that Conservative leaders are in consultation with newspaper editors of both parties. England evidently is anxious for some settlement which will prevent the civil war threatened by Ulster if the Bill becomes law. English parties might get together, but there is a gulf separating the Irish leaders for complete Home Rule, as they would accept nothing else.



## Bond Should Be Driven from Public Life

### So Says Coaker

When the announcement was made some few weeks ago that Sir Robert Bond had decided to associate himself with Coaker and conclude an amalgamation with him to secure the support of the Fishermen's Union, some of the supporters of Sir Robert Bond in this district threw up their hats in jubilation, while others shook their heads and predicted disaster to the party.

The cool, level-headed supporters of Sir Robert publicly regretted that he should have allied himself with "that fellow Coaker" who had so roundly blackguarded him and the Liberals for four or five years and had helped somewhat to bring about their defeat in 1908. They predicted the alliance would prove disadvantageous to the party, and that Sir Robert Bond would lose more than he could gain by associating himself with Coaker. Their prediction is already verified in this district. Scores of old-time supporters of the Liberal Party are openly disclaiming connection with the amalgamated party. They make no secret of their resentment to Sir Robert's action in taking into partnership their recent bitter enemy and traducer, and assert that a meeting of the party's supporters, representative of every district in the country, should have been called and their opinions obtained before such a radical step was taken. We have heard representative men from every settlement in Conception Bay express their opinions of the alliance, and they are practically unanimous in their condemnation of the political chique in St. John's for their arrogant proceedings in connection with the Coaker-Bond alliance. It makes it impossible for self-respecting and independent supporters of the party to continue their allegiance or to recognize the present party as the Liberal Party to which they formerly gave their support.

Speaking to one of the best known Liberals in Conception Bay a few days ago he denounced in unmeasured terms the coterie at St. John's that was responsible for cajoling Bond into an alliance with his bitter traducer, and the rabid and relentless enemy of every man in the country who by industry has built up a business into which he has put his capital and a lifetime's labor. He said that by this action Sir Robert has confirmed Coaker's opinion of him that he is unfit to be a leader of any party.

It is true that Coaker has a certain following, composed mainly of old-time Liberals and a few disgruntled individuals who like to be against a government, anyway. But the electors who supported the People's Party in the last election are, in the main, remaining loyal and true, while others have been added to the ranks. Coaker, no doubt, would have got some support had he stuck to his guns and went before the electorate with a Union Party, having no connection with Bond or Morris. But now that he has enslaved himself with the old Liberal Party, stores of his would-be supporters will have nothing to do with him. The same is true of large numbers in this section.

Coaker has not yet told the public who offered him \$250,000.

Next Tuesday's Gazette will likely name the day for nomination and polling.

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden— At Botwood, on Friday the Twelfth, and Saturday the Thirteenth days of September next; At Twillingate, on Monday, the Fifteenth and Tuesday, the Sixteenth days of September next; At Fogo, on Wednesday, the Seventeenth and Thursday, the Eighteenth days of September next; At Greenspond, on Friday the nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of September next; At Bonaville, on Monday, the Twenty-second and Tuesday, the Twenty-third days of September next; At Catalina, on Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth day of September next; At Trinity, on Thursday, the Twenty-fifth day of September next; At Brigus, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next; At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-eighth, Tuesday, the Twenty-ninth, Wednesday, the Thirtieth, and Thursday, the Thirty-first days of September next; And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do there; and if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do by these Presents, further order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court, in the Northern District of Our said Island, being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the dispatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.


