FIRST EDITION. FEARS OF FLOOD.

MUCH DAMAGE TO SHIPPING AT ANTWERP IS ANTICIPATED.

Fifteen Thousand Persons are Thrown out of employment and have been reduced to a destitute condition by the cold weather in Spain—Deaths by Freezing.

BY TELEGRAPH TO GAZETTE. LONDON, Jan. 14.—The rapid thaw conditions in this city and Paris. The thaw has just commenced in Antwerp, where grave fears are entertained that the sudden breaking up of the ice will cause a great deal of damage to the shipping.

15,000 persons are thrown out of employment through the closing of the rivers. The ice has been reduced to the most desolate condition and widespread suffering prevails.

The weather which prevailed yesterday was the coldest yet recorded in Spain. Many trains are reported snowed under in Galicia and the Asturias. Several sentences have been found frozen to death at their posts. Numerous animals have perished.

YANKEE, Jan. 14.—The storm that has been raging throughout Austria, has ceased. Five children were recently frozen to death while on their way to school. It is believed that many other persons had perished in the storm.

COUNCIL OF THE BOARD OF TRADE. Next Meeting and Discuss the Next Step—A Meeting Will Be Held.

The Council of the Board of Trade met at 11 a. m. today for the purpose of considering what action should be taken regarding the proposed investigation, under William Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine, into the dock load law, and the effect of the operation of the Hinnell bill.

After some discussion it was resolved that the president be requested to call a meeting at an early date, and that notices be published in the daily papers inviting ship-owners and all others interested to meet the Board and discuss what action in the matter it would be advisable to take.

It was further resolved that a general invitation be extended to shipowners at the various Bay of Fundy ports to be present.

The following gentlemen were appointed a committee to interview Mr. Van Horne in reference to the proposed terminal facilities: President, Geo. Robertson; Vice President, H. J. Thorne and J. DeWolfe Spurr.

Mr. Schofield informed the committee that he had information to submit to Mr. Van Horne, and among other things stated that it was generally supposed that steamship lines coming to this port could not compete with Boston, Portland and New York, but that such was not the case, as New York rates had already been granted for trans-Atlantic freight, and some important cargoes were secured for steamers from St. John.

The meeting then adjourned.

The secretary of the board later in the day received an answer to a telegram which he had despatched to Wm. Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine, which read: "Hinnell cannot come to St. John. I expect to be there in about two weeks, and will be happy to meet Board of Trade."


